Bloomingdale Real Estate Update

To Roof or not to Roof

This month's featured neighborhood, Bloomingdale Cove, and a majority of other Bloomingdale neighborhood homes have either already replaced their roofs or are edging towards needing a new roof. Roofs are the most important large expense for your home. A new roof helps maintain your home's beauty and durability. Many worry about how to choose a roofer and how to pay for the project.

When it was time for our roof to be replaced, we interviewed three roofing companies and joined with three of our neighbors who needed roof replacements, to assist with negotiating power. As a group, we wanted a roofer with good online reviews, one who offered proper permitting and one who cleaned-up the nails and roofing debris - and one who offered reasonable pricing. I recommend that you do the same or ask a Realtor for recommendations.

The best way to pay for a roof is through your savings. "At Year 15, start planning and saving for a roof replacement," advises Alex Sanchez, Certified Roofers & General Contractors, Inc. Other options include opening a low interest credit card, using the equity in your home to open an equity line of credit or taking out a personal line of credit from your local bank. Fifth had three car garages. It has a mandatory HOA and enforceable deed restrictions.

personal line of requires credit that no closing costs and a small \$35.00 annual fee. Another great option is to finance through the roofing company. A few

companies like Sanchez's company, offer six months same as cash and long term financing through an outside vendor.

Neighborhood Snapshot Bloomingdale Cove

Bloomingdale Cove is located at the end of Culbreath Road just south of Cimino Elementary. The neighborhood boasts 253 homes averaging 2,157 square feet. The community features a pond and a

private park, which residents share with another Bloomingdale neighborhood, Somerset. The park holds a basketball court, picnic tables, a small playground, and walking trails that lead to the Alafia River. Fourteen homes have second floor bonus rooms, perfect for a home office or media room. Twelve homes sold over the past year at an average sales price of \$240,292 and \$110.20 per square foot. Half of the homes that sold were pool homes. Seven of the twelve homes that sold

BOARD MEMBERS ATTEND BLOOMINGDALE AVENUE PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT MEETING

On Jan.17, the BHA, again, attended a public meeting concerning a zoning change for a planned development on Bloomingdale Avenue north of Springvale Road. At the last meeting, applicants for the zoning change pulled the request.

This time, the developers brought engineers, statistics and three options to the table. Development options are for the construction of 71 single-family homes up to 5,000 SF each, 58 duplexes at 1,000 SF each or 116 townhomes. If approved, the developer would choose the option. Conversely, the BHA and other attendees presented their concerns including traffic congestion on Bloomingdale Avenue, motorist safety and the inability to widen Bloomingdale Avenue to accommodate current traffic congestion now.

The zoning officer will make a recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners who will vote for or against the project at the next Board of County Commissioners Meeting. Vote results will be published on the BHA Facebook page.

NEIGHBORHOOD STANDARDS CAMPAIGN STARTS

This Month, the neighborhood standards committee and county code department kick off the first of several neighborhood "sweeps." Working together, the group will drive through neighborhoods with no mandatory HOA oversight looking for violations of the "Neighborhood Standards" introduced last fall. The standards are based on current county ordinances and are enforceable through the county code violation system.

The goal, first, is to educate and inform. Many residents are unaware they are in violation of community and county standards. Violators will be cited or warnings given depending on the offense noted. In all cases, sweep members will attempt to communicate with residents in person prior to any action being taken.

The "sweeps" will continue throughout the year.

The Commissioner's News

On Jan. 9, I had the pleasure of participating in a community meeting with the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District and Hillsborough County staff. In the community meeting, we gathered concerns from constituents in Bloomingdale and board members of the Special Taxing District about hazardous sidewalks in the community. I was able to have county staff get out and start site inspections immediately for the hazardous slabs that are raised more than 2 inches. My office was informed that county staff will have in house scope of work, project estimates, and project timeframes available to me early this month. This means county staff will have the

projected data they need to get to work on repairing the more hazardous sidewalk slabs.

Recently, I met with the engineering firm working on the Bell Shoals widening project, and they did have some very positive updates. Although we are still in the property acquisition process, construction for phase 1 of the widening project is estimated to begin in July of this year. Phase 1 construction will include widening of the bridge that crosses the Alafia River between Waterford Run Drive and River Rapids Avenue. It is also my intention to advocate to keep the aesthetics of the native plant habitat intact and maintain the beautifully landscaped neighborhood entrances as we move forward with the Bell Shoals widening project.

As always, it is my pleasure to serve as your County Commissioner, and if you have any further questions about the topics mentioned in this column, please feel free to reach out to my office anytime.

(Editor's Note: Commissioner Stacy White represents District 4, which includes our Bloomingdale community. Standing Room Only for Commissioner White

On Jan. 9, the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District hosted a standing room only crowd for the visit of Hillsborough County Commissioner Stacy White at their regular monthly Board of Trustees meeting held at the Bloomingdale Community Offices.

Residents, members of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association (BHA) Board, and members of various community homeowners' associations (HOA's) were on hand to ask the Commissioner questions regarding the condition of the sidewalks in Bloomingdale, as well as the impacts of the Bell Shoals Road widening project on the community.

The Commissioner was accompanied by several County officials, including County Engineer Mike Williams, Project Manager

Ben Kniesly, Manager of Real Estate Acquisition Eric Watkins, and Manager of County Neighborhood Relations Wanda Sloan.

SIDEWALKS

At a previous meeting on Jan. 4 between the Commissioner, BSTD President Dave West, and Merit, Inc., Property Manager Rick Pitrowski, White was presented with a comprehensive report prepared by Merit that listed all of the locations of unsafe conditions of the sidewalks with accompanying pictures. At the Jan. 9 meeting, the Commissioner stated those pictures had already been forwarded to the appropriate County officials.

While cautioning the attendees that revenue versus expenses is always of concern to the County Commissioners, White committed to get right to work on the sidewalk issue and explore creative options for finding funding to fix the most critical areas. White further committed to working with the Risk Management department immediately to find a way to correct those areas that pose the greatest safety issues. The sidewalk report showed 17 locations where the pavement is raised 3 inches or more above ground level.

BELL SHOALS ROAD WIDENING

Project Manager Ben Kniesly presented updated details of the Bell Shoals Road widening project.

He reported the following:

- · The construction project will be put out for re-bid, with a target start date of July.
- Property acquisition has been completed from Boyette Road north to Glenhaven Drive, with construction to begin at Boyette and continue north past Bloomingdale Avenue.
- Approximately 35 properties still must be acquired to complete construction, with projected acquisition completion in early 2018.
- When completed Bell Shoals Road will be four lanes with a median, similar to Boyette Road.
- · Once started, construction is expected to take 3 years.

Kniesly told attendees that there is money and there is compensation for the impacts the road construction will have on Bloomingdale. "I want to put back what works for the community," he said adding, that workshops with the BSTD and County officials are planned for revamping four Bloomingdale entrances affected by the widening.

This was accompanied by a pledge from Commissioner White that as policy he agrees that the

County needs to replace entrances and landscaping that are impacted or lost as a result of the construction. White told attendees, "I will be an advocate for Bloomingdale to make sure it is made whole again."

Sidewalk Update

At publication, the BSTD President Dave West received an update from Commissioner Stacy White's legislative aide, David Garcia, regarding the sidewalks in Bloomingdale. The department head who oversees sidewalk repair sent his own team out to our community. They are preparing an analysis to bring to Commissioner White on what needs to be corrected immediately, how much work can be done by County personnel, and how much work can be subcontracted out to vendors. That report should be completed in early February.



Not Just a "Let the Good Times Roll" Celebration, But a Plant, Too By Gwen Graverson

While February may be best known for Valentine's Day, you can't overlook the month-long celebrations which include President's Day, Groundhog Day, Super Bowl Sunday and this year's Mardi Gras, which falls on Feb. 28.

Speaking of Mardi Gras, did you know that there are plants that go by the same name?



Mardi Gras Abelia is a pink-tinged beauty with green and white variegated leaves. Butterflies and hummingbirds are attracted to this plant especially when the flowers start to bloom from late spring through the fall. The average height is 2.5 to 3 feet and the spread is about the same.

Plant Mardi Gras Abelia 5 to 6 feet apart, in well-drained soils with full sun. Shear it one or two times a year to maintain a denser plant, and use a slow release, high nitrogen fertilizer in the spring. It's a very versatile and hardy plant with good resistance to insects, disease, frost, drought, and heat.

Another "party" plant is Aeonium 'Mardi Gras' – a succulents with rosette of yellow and green variegation combined with vivid rose to rich burgundy which offer a very striking accent. These succulents need bright light for optimum growth, but can handle cooler temperatures. Caring for succulents is the focus of next month's column, Terrarium Gardens.




I found Fastweb particularly helpful for scholarship searching, tracking and applying. Fastweb includes the following:


