





#### **Neighborhood Snapshot - Windsor Woods**

Windsor Woods is a voluntary HOA neighborhood located along Culbreath Road across from Alafia Elementary School. The street names are Blackwood Place, Cold Creek Drive, Eagle Wood Street, Hollow Wood Drive, Kiowa Lane, Timberfall Lane, and Treeline Drive. The homes were built between 1988-2000 with an average square footage of 2,295, and an average of 4 bedrooms and 2-3 bathrooms.

Over the past 365 days, 11 homes sold in Windsor Woods at an average of \$125 per square foot. Nine were pool homes. The lowest sales price was \$190,000 and the highest sales price was \$325,500.

\*MLS statistics were based on rough property lines for individual neighborhoods and included homes sold between June 25, 2017 and June 25, 2018. Sales not entered into MLS did not count in these statistics.



#### **Tax Referendum Vote is August 28!**

Vote yes to increase the BSTD assessment from \$130 to \$170 per year on the Primary Ballot

#### What is the BSTD?

Special Districts, like our Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD), provide specific, local, governmental services for people that directly benefit from them. The Bloomingdale tax assessment is 100 percent Bloomingdale money, spent 100 percent for the maintenance and beautification of the common areas shared by the 32 subdivisions/5,300 homes/23,000 residents that comprise our Bloomingdale community. Bloomingdale resident Trustees who are unpaid volunteers manage the funds in accordance with County and State requirements.

#### Why is a tax increase is needed?

Like you, our expenses have increased since the BSTD was established in 1985. Hopefully unlike you, our income has stayed the same since the last tax assessment increase in 2006 despite inflation and the aging infrastructure issues that increase expenses year-to-year.

The tax assessment increase is critical for the BSTD to meet its primary responsibility, which is the maintenance of the walls, trees, lawn, landscaping, and community signage along Culbreath Road, Natures Way Boulevard, Canoga Park Drive, as well as along the ingress/egress roads of Rosemead Lane, Bloomingfield Drive, Garnet Drive, Glenhaven Drive, Green Hollow

Lane, Springvale Drive, and Erindale Drive. In addition, once the Bell Shoals widening project is complete, the BSTD will inherit the maintenance of new landscaped medians placed to expedite traffic flow at those entrances to our neighborhood.

#### **The History**

Special Districts are not a new concept. Benjamin Franklin established the first special district in 1736 when he created the Union Fire Company of Philadelphia, a volunteer fire department. Residents in a defined neighborhood paid a fee to receive fire protection services.

That's the crux of a Special (Taxing) District—to provide a way for us to have local control over how our dollars are spent for the good of the community in which we live.

The BSTD was created in 1985 with an original assessment of \$80 per year. That means that in 33 years the per annum tax assessment has increased only \$50!

Help us keep Bloomingdale a neighborhood we're proud to call home! Vote YES on August 28.

Every homeowner pays the Bloomingdale SDD non-ad valorem tax (highlighted) of \$130 to maintain our community. On the Aug. 28 Primary ballot is a Referendum to increase the tax assessment from its current annual amount to \$170. This would be the first increase in 12 years, and is necessary for the BSTD to continue to maintain the aging community at its current level.


#### Wanted: A Forever Home and Family!







## STATION NOTES By Community Resource Deputy Clifford Fletcher and CSO Debbie Vijil

#### **Area Law and Order**

Between May 12 and June 12, there were 552 calls for service in the area. Deputies conducted 13 traffic stops in the Bloomingdale area. Those traffic stops resulted in six verbal warnings, five written warnings and two citations. There were ten non-injury traffic crashes and three injury traffic crashes.

There were nine incidents of criminal mischief reported in the area, which included the Bloomingdale Ridge sign and Bloomingdale directory sign, one reported residential burglary and three vehicle burglaries. Also, there were two thefts of motorcycles and three vehicle thefts. During this time frame there were four arrests, two for warrants, one domestic related and one as a result from a disturbance.

#### Summer's here - keep your family safe!



#### What's Happening In And Around Our Community

Last year, the Bloomingdale Gazette published a comprehensive development piece complete with an interactive map. Over 40 projects were profiled. This year, we will focus on just a few projects in our area. Sources include leasing companies, county representatives and public information resources. Reports will be coming at a later date on safety improvements on Natures Way, Canoga Park and Erindale Drives, paving of our neighborhood streets, and BL East and West Park Upgrades.

#### 1. Sidewalk Repairs Begin



Thanks to the combined efforts of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, the Bloomingdale Taxing District; Merit, Inc., the District's Property Management company and Commissioner Stacy White, residents now have safer sidewalks.

For over 10 years, the deteriorating sidewalks have been a major concern for community leaders. Piecemeal repairs had been ongoing, but as of last month, county initiated a three-year common area sidewalk repair. This fiscal year through FY2020, nearly \$1 million dollars will be spent on the project. Note: County maintains responsibility for maintenance of our common area roads and sidewalks.

In December 2016, Merit, Inc. prepared a 100 percent inspection of sidewalks. More than 500 slabs were identified as needing repair. The BSTD provided the inspection report to Commissioner White and county officials.

A frequent champion of issues in the Bloomingdale community, Commissioner White said, "I heard loud and clear that Bloomingdale sidewalks were in a state of disrepair Beyond just aesthetics, safety is a concern

and residents should be able to walk on the sidewalk rather than the street. I am thankful I can be here to support the community and help it to continue to be the beautiful community it has always been. Thank you, Commissioner White!



The three-year sidewalk repair program is split into six sections. Ongoing now are B1-1 (in purple) and BL 2 (in blue). These include Greenhollow Lane, Springvale Drive and portions of Natures Way to Kingsford Place and Elba Place. For close up detailed maps, a link will be posted on the HOA website homepage and FB page when available.

#### 2. Bell Shoals Interim Repaving Project



Last month, Bell Shoals drivers received a welcome surprise - a smooth ride from Boyette Road to Bloomingdale Avenue. From the county website, "The roadway surface in this section is severely deteriorated, resulting in excessive maintenance activity to address repetitive potholes and roadway surface failures." County performed an asphalt overlay maintenance resurfacing instead of a traditional resurfacing to extend the roadway surface life until the road is completely reconstructed as part of the Bells Shoals Road Widening Project. The process involved an additional one-LAKES OF

inch thin treatment of hot asphalt onto the existing roadway in order to create a uniform driving surface. The new surface will improve roadway drivability and safety, and restore surface conditions such as smoothness, friction, and aesthetics. #### **3. Bell Shoals Widening Project**


This project has been in the works for many, many years. Parcel acquisition issues have been resolved through imminent domain procedures. At this time, the project is expected to begin this fall and continue for three years. The project includes:

- Widening Bell Shoals Road from a two-lane, undivided rural road, to a four-lane, divided urban facility.

- Approximately 3.1 miles of roadway from just south of the Alafia River to north of Bloomingdale Avenue.
- Two 12-foot lanes for vehicles, a 4-foot bike lane, and sidewalks in both directions.
- Widening of the existing bridge over the Alafia River.
- Improvements to traffic signals at Glenhaven Drive, Rosemead Lane and Bloomingdale Avenue. LLAGE RIDGE

The new design will increase the level of service along Bell Shoals Road, accommodating higher traffic volumes while maximizing safety along the corridor. Project Manager Tom Rawls will be at both BHA and BSTD board meetings next week to provide updates. 


This illustration depicts a portion of the Bell Shoals widening project at the Glenhaven Road entrance. KHORN












#### 6. Manhole Rehabilitation along Natures Way



Also this month, county will perform rehabilitation on existing manholes along Natures Way Blvd from Lornewood Drive to Callista Avenue. The rehabilitation consists of installing a liner inside the old infrastructure to provide manhole structural reinforcement. In some areas, traffic lane or road closures may be necessary.

#### 7. Springvale Drive and Bloomingdale Avenue

18-0510 - Proposed Childcare building on Bloomingdale Ave @ Springvale Drive. Entrances / Exits will be located on Springvale as well as Bloomingdale. Bloomingdale exits will only be able to make a right (east-bound) turn. Site Plans show two buildings on the property – the childcare center and a medical office complex.

#### 8. Fifty49 Bell Shoals

The Board of County Commissioners approved rezoning of the former St. Stephens Catholic Church at 5049 Bell Shoals. Construction is slated for spring 2019 on a 260-bed, 10-building "aging-in-place" assisted living facility appropriately nicknamed Fifty 49 Bell Shoals. Developer Bridgepoint Lifecare Group LLC plans for the community to have a "neighborly" feel with gardens and courtyards.

#### 9. Another Hole in the Wall...

First, everyone survived this accident, but no one should die or be injured on our residential roads. The speed limit in the majority of the community is 30 mph and in some cases, 25 mph.

This accident occurred in the early morning hours of July 1. A driver in a pickup truck traveling west on Erindale Drive missed the trintersection stop sign, hopped the curb, took out the just replaced community signage and landscaping, blew through the concrete community wall, tore through a screened lanai and ended up in the deep end of a resident's pool.

Why is this an update? These accidents cost taxpayer money. While insurance covers a great deal IF the driver has it and limits are not exceeded, there are still costs residents bear.

Over the past five years, there have been five fatalities, too many injury-accidents to count and since March 2018, five wall strikes. No cost can be assigned to loss of life or injury, but material costs so far are nearly \$34,000. The sign replaced last week cost \$2,500 alone.

<u>Bottom line:</u> slow down, don't text and drive, and don't drink and/or do drugs and drive...this must stop. This is just one more reason residents must vote yes on the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District proposed tax increase coming up for vote on the Aug. 28 referendum.

Why, you ask? To start with, he is not so typical. Andrew has autism and cerebral palsy, conditions which have made it challenging for him to find a job. Not to be deterred, Andrew decided to focus on what he could do instead of what he couldn't do.

Fiercely independent, Andrew decided to start his own recycling company, Andrew's Aluminum with the slogan, "Supporting Myself One Can at a Time." Always interested in helping the environment and meeting new people, the new business was a perfect fit.

In June, the entrepreneur went door-to-door collecting his neighbors' empty cans. His mother, Tina, posted his business on Facebook and was pleasantly surprised by the community's immediate and overwhelming response.

She said, "It's easy to feel isolated in this situation and then you put something small out there like a post and immediately strangers come forward and want to help. It reminds you that you're not alone. I can't thank the community enough."

Andrew was also surprised as he "didn't think it was going to be as successful as it became" and now he feels "like a million dollars."

Andrew plans to reinvest the money into the business by purchasing additional drop-off bins for more collection locations around town and hiring extra help when needed.

Many local businesses are stepping forward to help Andrew by donating their aluminum cans and/or making room for a public drop-off bin. The Village Early Learning Center is proud to be doing both. Andrew has a drop-off bin located outside their front door.

Owner Susan Miller stated, "Andrew's Aluminum gives us an opportunity to support Andrew Spruill, our former student, while educating our current students about our recycling for our environment and helping others at the same time."



#### **Coyotes Howl in Bloomingdale, Be Safe** By Jon Alfano

Recently, interactions between people and coyotes have been occurring more and more frequently. While these animals pose little threat to an adult, pets especially are at a higher risk if they encounter one of these canines.

If you do happen to come across a coyote the most effective action is to try and scare the animal off. Remember, coyotes are not large animals, so they will most likely be intimidated by the average adult human. An easy method to get a coyote to retreat is to yell and wave your arms in the air, this will usually get the trick done, but occasionally it may take a bit more effort.


Throwing objects can be another effective method, but it is important to make sure you only throw things towards the animal and not directly at it, to minimize the chance it will try to defend itself. If you have children with you, it is crucial that they do not attempt to run away, as this will likely cause the coyote to give chase.

The ones more at risk are our pets. Unfortunately, coyotes can and will prey on our lovable little friends, but there are steps we can take to protect them. For starters, keep cats indoors. A common housecat is an extremely easy target for a coyote. Small dogs need to be kept on a short leash when being walked, especially at night, and it is important to be more cautious in wooded areas, where coyotes are more likely to hide.

The idea of coyotes in your neighborhood may sound scary at first. However, knowing what to do should you encounter one will minimize the threat they pose. 

#### Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom

Even though Jurassic Park is renowned as one of the greatest blockbusters of all time, none of its sequels capture what made the original movie so special. 2015's Jurassic World came close, but it was still a far cry from the classic. Now, Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom is the latest sequel to fall flat in an everlasting attempt to recreate the original.

The film isn't bad by any means, the effects and the action are top notch. The reintroduction of animatronics after being almost completely absent from the last movie is very refreshing and helps make the animals look more convincing. The movie features some of the most suspenseful scenes since the original. And, Chris Pratt, again, is enjoyable as Owen Grady and Bryce Dallas Howard is much less one-dimensional than she was in the last movie.


However, the main thing holding Fallen Kingdom back is the plot, which is okay at times and a complete mess at others. The film falls into the same trap as all Jurassic Park sequels – the plot advances because the characters are completely incompetent. In fact, it's the driving force behind a good portion of the major plot points.

Another negative, there is too much going on. Several plot lines emerge and then are never resolved when they could have made the story more interesting. The film becomes a monster movie in the latter half, which is an extreme shift in tone from the first half. Even worse, the villains in the movie have about as much depth as a cartoon character with the most generic motivation imaginable.

Bottom Line: Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom fails to separate itself from the rest of the franchise. If you're

looking for mindless dinosaur action, then I could easily recommend it. If you're looking for a deep and engaging story, then you're best off looking elsewhere. I give this movie 3 out of 5 dinosaurs.







#### **Help Your Neighbor, the Gopher Tortoise**

She is also a life-long nature enthusiast. After seeing several Facebook postings about gopher tortoises, she decided to write an article to educate residents and help our area tortoises and turtles.)

Tortoises and Turtles are two different animals. Here in Bloomingdale, we are fortunate to have both.

Many well-intentioned people mistake tortoises for turtles and place them in water. Tortoises are not capable of swimming and can often drown. Becoming familiar with these animals can prevent you from making a deadly mistake while still helping our non-human neighbors.

If you see a tortoise or a turtle crossing a road it's important to identify which species you are dealing with. Turtles are easily distinguished by their flipper feet, while Tortoises have feet that resemble an elephant foot. Once identified, you can decide the next course of action.


While moving a turtle, make sure you flip them onto their back when you carry them. This is for your safety and theirs. Turtles can get a bit protective and may try to nip your fingers. If bitten this could cause you to drop the turtle. Flipping the turtle onto its back will keep it inside of its shell. Once you help the turtle cross the road in the direction it's heading, place it in a safe location.

Tortoises are a bit more docile. You want to pick them up from behind with a hand on each side of the shell. Grasp them firmly and pick them up slightly away from your body. Sometimes, a tortoise will get scared and may empty its bladder when handled. Once you help them cross the street in the direction they're traveling, set them down on a grassy area. It's very important that you do not relocate gopher tortoises.

Gopher tortoises are a threatened species and it is illegal to remove them from their home range. Gopher tortoises have a very strong homing range. If removed, they will try to return. Oftentimes this can lead to death as the tortoises will cross several more roads to reach their home range and will likely be exposed to heat exhaustion or predation.

It's also important that you handle a gopher tortoise as little as possible. Studies have shown that handling tortoises for more than ten minutes causes a spike in cortisol levels, which indicates chronic stress.

Gopher tortoises are a keystone species. This term comes from the keystone in an archway. If the keystone is removed the archway will collapse. Similarly, if a keystone species is removed from an ecosystem, that ecosystem will collapse.

Gopher tortoise burrows provide homes for a diverse range of species. Having a variety of species in the area is a sign of a healthy ecosystem. The contributions of these gentle reptiles helps keep the green spaces surrounding our neighborhood healthy and vibrant.

Let's make sure gopher tortoises stay safe so we can continue to enjoy the beautiful natural spaces that they helped create. 

#### **Busy Hands...Busy Minds...Grow Orchids This Summer** *By Gwen Graverson*

Are you wondering what to do with your kids this summer? Learning to grow orchids is a summer activity the whole family can enjoy.

Florida hosts ninety-nine native orchid species. Here are some Orchids for beginners to choose from:

Cattleya Orchid – It is native to tropical America and is referred to as the "queen of the orchids." This beauty is a tree-growing orchid requiring little more than soil, bark, rocks, or perlite. If you want to grow one in a pot/container, they grow by means of a branching, creeping rhizome with thick clinging roots. When it's time to repot for more growing space, do it during the spring. Repotting can be stressful to orchids and may require a season to recover.

Moth Orchid (Phalaenopsis) – This is a popular houseplant native to Australia and southeastern Asia. Like Cattleya, Phalaenopsis (Phal for short) are epiphytic plants or plants that grow on other plants. They are long-flowering, thrive in average home temperatures and come in many colors.

**Cymbidium Orchid** – Also native to tropical areas of Australia and Asia, this is the right orchid for outside growing. Florida winters are ideal, and the plant can tolerate cooler weather.

#### **Supplies and Care:**

**Right Pot for the right plant** - Orchid Pots have larger holes and more of them, both on the bottom and sides. This ensures better drainage, which also helps with proper air ventilation for the root system. Both drainage and ventilation are essential for thriving orchids. You can choose from plastic, clay (terracotta), or wooden baskets. Note: Most orchid varieties flower well when kept moderately pot-bound.

**Potting Medium/Fertilizing** – Check for orchid mixes, including pine bark, clay pellets, perlite, charcoal, or any well-draining medium. Orchids need potting material that drains rapidly, retains moisture, and decomposes slowly (this helps extend the time between repotting). The best fertilizer sprays for orchids are those that are specially formulated for orchids and must be water-soluble (dilute to one-quarter/one-half). More research is required to determine the time schedule needed to fertilize your orchid (this includes factors such as the season, weather, if the plant is flowering, etc.).

Watering depends on several things, but for beginners, try the old fashion way by sticking your fingers in the potted medium and determine if there's moisture present. If on the dry side, it's time to water. Water in the morning and use tepid water (cold water could shock your orchid). If you have access to rainwater (rain barrow), you can avoid tap water which may have higher salt and calcium content. Avoid overwatering, which can cause root rot and kill the plant.

**Light and Location** – Give your orchid at least 6 hours of indirect sunlight (bright shade) each day. Indoor plants can be moved for sunlight conditions, but remember, orchids like to stay put vs. being moved around.

#### Holding your putter like no other (club)...

The majority of golfers hold putters just like any other club in the bag – with the grip underneath the heel pad of our hands. This causes the putter to be held at an incorrect angle.

With this grip, the putter head is toe up which causes the ball not to be hit solidly and places the path of the putter more on an arc than usual. This results in misses in both directions.

In the photos below, the putter grip is held underneath the **thumb pad** with the putter shaft going right up the forearm. The putter and arm act as one unit.

This will allow you to set your eyes over the ball, have more of a straight back and through putting arc and more center contact on the putter face.


