

April Board Meeting Highlights and Other Board News

General – Several residents attended last month's board meeting. The hot topic concerned ways to improve safety and security in the community. The board is researching options including promoting individual neighborhood watch programs, encouraging resident involvement in the HCSO Citizens Patrol program and the feasibility of hiring off-duty patrol officers for a "Community Cop" program. This program would require funding the BHA does not currently have and would require much community support. Another initiative discussed was the National Night Out program. This would also require individual neighborhood support. Details will be released when decisions are made.

Deed Update – The Association is preparing a list of neighborhood standards based solely on county code ordinances. The BHA through the county code department

will report and enforce these standards. Residents may continue to report violations and remain anonymous.

Board Vacancies - Two seats remain vacant on the 12-member board as well as two alternate positions. Residents are encouraged to attend the monthly meetings to see if joining the volunteer board is something they would consider. Residents may also volunteer for board committees without having to become a full board member.



AGING INFRASTRUCTURE

Bloomingdale was created in the eighties. Since that time, the community has blossomed into a beautiful neighborhood that we can all be proud to call home. However, those years do present us with challenges. The community infrastructure is aging and in need of attention. One visible area undergoing repairs and improvements is the community's irrigation system.

TAX INCREASE VOTE

The BSTD board's intent is to maintain and in fact, improve the community. To do this, more funds are needed. In August during the Primary Election, they will be asking the community to step up and vote for an increase in the annual special tax assessment.

Currently, residents pay a \$130 ad valorem tax earmarked for the special taxing district as a portion of their annual Hillsborough County property taxes. This tax covers all common area services provided by the BSTD including common area maintenance, repair and improvement. Community landscaping, while a large part of the BSTD budget is just one of many services resident tax dollars cover.

The \$130 tax no longer covers all expenses incurred in the community and some difficult choices have to be made. When the time comes, your vote is needed to help keep Bloomingdale a great place to live.



Last month, vandals tore down nearly 75 feet of creeping fig off Garnet Road. Repair costs for this vandalism including repainting and replanting had not been totaled at press time. The BSTD have been covering the walls in Bloomingdale with fig. This helps with costs and adds to the green environment that deters speeding cars. This fig is the property of the BSTD. If destruction costs are more than \$1,000, it is a 2nd degree Misdemeanor Felony.

How far away should I stand from the ball?

The length of your clubs and your posture should dictate how far away you stand from the ball. There is one constant: the distance between each club and your body is about the same.

Easy measure: The width of your hand is how much space there is between your left thigh and the butt end of your club.

If you stand too close or too far away from the ball at address, your swing will automatically adjust to find a more natural and comfortable swing path and plane.

In either case, it will very often cause you to strike the ball out on the toe (hands too far away) or on the heel (hands too close)...shanks.



WHAT RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT STOPPING POWER, PHONE AND/OR CABLE OUTAGES


Anyone who has experienced an extended power, phone or cable outage knows what an inconvenience these can be. Tampa Electric, Bright House Services and Frontier all have proactive programs that work to prevent these types of incidents. One program is to identify transmission lines that have tree limbs growing in or near the lines. Once identified, the responsible agency will trim and remove the overgrowth.

Residents can really help this effort by reporting these issues to the correct service provider. So how can you help?

Identify the type of line affected by a tree limb hazard. There are two main types of transmission lines: power and communication. In the diagram below, power lines are the upper lines while communications lines are the lower lines. Once identified, contact the responsible organization for assistance.


Hurricane season is just two months away. Do your part to help prevent outages by identifying possible problems with tree limbs in transmission lines in your area.

Bromeliads...Beautiful, Exotic and Easy


Bromeliads are the perfect plant especially if you are a bit absentminded about plant care – they require very little attention and reward you with exotic foliage and beautiful blooms that last many weeks, to several months. Florida is home to 16 native species of bromeliads and most are tropical/subtropical and can be grown either in/outdoors in areas that get indirect sunlight.

Tips for the perfect bromeliad:

- 1. Often called "air plants," bromeliads grow on other plants. First, identify the name/type of bromeliad that you have or want to grow. The more information you gather will help you achieve success.
- 2. Determine what type of planting material to use use bromeliad specific potting mixes. Different varieties have different soil needs. If a "fast drainer," the soil mixture can hold more moisture. Mix two parts ordinary potting mix with one part perlite or sand. If the plant's leaves hold water, use a coarsely packed, well-draining potting mix, or mix your own with equal parts pine bark nuggets, or mulch, perlite, and soil-less professional potting mix.
- 3. If planting indoors, plastic pots will hold moisture for longer periods and are a good option for homes with low humidity.
- 4. While Bromeliads can handle dry conditions, water when the top two inches are dry and keep the base of the plant moist. Never use a metal watering can, as trace amounts of metal that enter the water have a negative impact on the plant.
 - If your bromeliad has a cup or cylinder in the center of the leaves, keep it filled with rainwater/distilled water vs. tap water (especially if it's hard water). Mosquitoes may breed in the standing water, but can be held at bay by adding a biological, mosquito control product available from garden centers and home supply stores. With outdoor plants, know when to water and avoid high temperatures; heated water can burn your plant.
- 5. Bromeliads typically only flower once...but the lifespan may cover several years before it dies. Look for buds of new plants call "pups" under the base of the lowest leaves. Once the pup has had six months of growth, cut them off near the base with a sharp knife and plant them in separate pots (for indoor plants).

Two local organizations are dedicated to the beautiful bromeliad, see boxed insert. These organizations are a great way for the novice bromeliad grower to begin what could be a life-long love affair with the unique plant.

MONTHLY BACC

At the April Sheriff's Bloomingdale Area Community Council (BACC), we discussed the traffic, scams, bicycle registration, and vehicle and residential burglaries in the Bloomingdale area. Our BACC meetings are held the third Thursday of each month, at 7 p.m. at the Bloomingdale Community Station located at 3622 Erindale Drive.

TRAFFIC UPDATE

The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office completed 262 traffic stops between March 1 and April 22 in the Bloomingdale and surrounding area known as the Juliet 4 zone.

SPEED LIMIT CHANGE ON BL AVE

Drivers should have noticed new speed limit signs posted along Bloomingdale Avenue east of Bloomingdale High School near Lithia Pinecrest Road. Installed by Hillsborough County Public Works, the new speed limit signs reduce the speed limit to 30 mph from the previous 45 mph limit.

Cpl. Greg Wynn, District IV Traffic Coordinator, provided a reason for the recent change in the speed zone on Bloomingdale Avenue: Safe drivers will recognize that increased development and recreational facilities nearby require careful and prudent attention to posted speed limits. If more drivers travel at about the same speed, it will reduce the likelihood of crashes. Crashes cost money, crashes cost time, and most importantly, crashes cost lives. Please drive carefully.

If you haven't noticed the new speed limit signs, you may have noticed more flashing red and blue lights. Be a safe driver and know your limit...your speed limit that is!

VEHICLE BURGLARIES

Vehicle burglaries are a continuing issue in the Bloomingdale Community. The unlocked vehicles are an open invitation for thieves to do what they do best! This type of crime is known as "Car Hopping." Never leave valuables in sight!

The time it takes for a thief to break into a car and steal your valuables is 30 seconds... to secure your valuables takes 20 seconds! When you leave your vehicle unlocked, it is like giving permission to take whatever the thieves want.

There was recently a string of vehicle burglaries, all unlocked, in the area. One of the vehicle burglaries quickly became a burglary of a residence. Thieves gained access to the vehicle via an unlocked door. Then, the thieves used the vehicle's garage door opener to open the garage and remove items valued at over a thousand dollars.

Within a short period, three neighborhoods were targeted and numerous vehicles entered. All of the burglarized vehicles had something in common: They were UNLOCKED!

DON'T BE AN EASY TARGET!

- Always close your windows and lock car doors.
- Do not leave valuables in plain sight.
- Park where your car will be seen frequently.
- Park in well-lit areas.
- Install and use a car alarm.
- Never leave an unattended vehicle with the engine running, even for a minute. This is a State law.
- If possible, park in a garage with the door secured.

RESIDENTIAL BURGLARIES

There were 10 reported residential burglaries between March 1 and April 22. The majority of residential burglaries are easily prevented by doing one thing: Keep your garage door closed.

There are thieves that drive or walk by your home looking for an opportunity to remove bicycles, golf clubs and tools from open garages. They do this while you are inside your home or in the back yard. The good news is that when residents take the time to lock their vehicles and close their garage doors they are protecting their valuables and possessions.

When residents get better at protecting their personal property, crime goes down. When you take away a criminal's opportunity to commit a crime, you do your part to help fight crime.

Please continue to lock your vehicles, lock your homes, close your garage doors and secure your valuables. The HCSO Community Outreach Division offers confidential free security surveys for your home, office or business. Call 813-247-8115 for information.

FRAUD

There are many phone scams – popular ones are the IRS, computer virus, grandparent and jury scams. The first line of defense is to let calls go to voice mail if you do not recognize the phone number.

While these calls may sound legitimate, remember:

- the IRS and the court system (jury duty) do not request pre-paid cards as payment,
- Microsoft does not call you about a virus on your computer,
- if you think your grandchild has gotten into trouble and needs money, hang up and call a family member to make sure it is not a scam.
- if a person or organization is requesting you send payment via gift cards, MoneyGram or Western Union, it is just like handing them cash. Cash you will never get back.

To properly dispose of medication, go to any district office. Offices are open 24 hours and do not accept liquids medications. The closest district offices are District

PROTECT YOUR BIKE

Bicycle thefts in our area is a growing issue. To help combat this problem, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) established the "Bicycle Theft Prevention and Registration Program." If a bicycle is either lost or stolen and the owner has properly registered it, the HCSO will be able to return the bicycle to its owner if it is found or have the serial number on hand to help with the investigation. The success of the program is dependent upon having the bike's serial number noted in your records and registered through the HCSO program.

To register, Bloomingdale residents can contact the Bloomingdale Community Station at 816-635-8040 to make an appointment. Download the bicycle registration form by going to www.hcso. tampa.fl.us. Search for "Bicycle Theft Program" and click on the "Bicycle Registration Form." Copy the form, fill it out and bring it with you to the Community Station at 3622 Erindale Drive.

Registration takes 10 minutes. The owner completes a registration form. Information is entered into the HCSO system and a sticker is applied to the bike. If the bike is stolen or found, the information can be found via the name, serial number or sticker number. Even if the sticker is removed, the bicycle's owner can still be found via the serial number or the name. NOTE: take a good photo of your bicycle to help with proper identification as well.




