Woof! 10 Pet Safety Tips for the Holidays

Follow these safety tips and help your pets enjoy the holidays, too!

- 1. Secure, hide or cover all electrical cords and electronics.
- 2. **Keep all holiday foods out of a pet's reach.** Remember that dogs can't eat chocolate so make sure this is out of reach.
- 3. Keep your pet's daily routine as consistent as possible.
- 4. **Keep your pets out of any rooms with a holiday tree.** Although this may be difficult, the fact is that decorated trees pose many dangers.
- 5. Avoid using long strings, lights or décor in areas accessible to pets.
- 6. Keep an eye on candles and open flames.
- 7. **Be careful with holiday plants.** Common items such as mistletoe, holly, poinsettias and lilies can be toxic to your dog or cat.
- 8. **Update vaccinations and ID tags.** A lost pet can literally ruin your holiday celebrations.
- 9. **Create a safe haven for your pets.** Pets need an area where they can retreat to if they are scared or overwhelmed.
- 10. **Keep a list of emergency phone numbers for your pet.** You should always have the contact information for your veterinarian, a 24-hour pet hospital, and the Animal Poison Control Center easily accessible.



The ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center (APCC) provides toxicology educational programs, consulting services, review of case data as an alternative to traditional animal research, and a 24-hour veterinary diagnostic and treatment hotline.

November Board Meeting Highlights and Other Board News

Hillsborough County officials attended the November meeting to deliver an update on the upcoming improvements scheduled for Bloomingdale Avenue and Culbreath Road. Improvements include added turn lanes, upgraded signals and bus turn-in lanes on both sides of Culbreath Road. Construction starts in January and should finish in the summer of 2016. A public meeting was held at the Bloomingdale Library on Dec. 3 to inform the community of the upcoming construction. Details including an aerial diagram will be published in the January Gazette.

River Crossing HOA President Sean Donahue was elected to the board as its tenth member. Two seats remain as well as three alternate positions. Residents are encouraged to join the volunteer board.

Final plans were discussed for today's Santa visit and meetings were scheduled for the annual clean-up and yard sale events upcoming in February and March next year. Details will follow on Facebook and in upcoming Gazette issues.

The deed restriction update began with the mail-out of the new documents

to Chadd's Ford residents on Nov. 18. A town hall meeting for the neighborhood is scheduled for Dec.19 with the BHA board and attorney. Residents will have the opportunity to ask questions and raise their concerns prior to the tabulation of official votes on Jan. 9. The initiative requires a homeowner majority "yes" vote to pass – For Chadd's Ford, this means 25 of the 48 homeowners.

Regardless of the Chadd's Ford outcome, the BHA will continue the initiative with mail-outs to Windsor Woods and Bloomingdale Estates residents in the spring. The board's goal is to gauge support for the costly initiative in these three neighborhoods prior to moving forward with the remaining voluntary HOA neighborhoods. Currently, this update does not affect our neighborhoods where a mandatory HOA is currently in place.

Happy Holidays! 2015 is coming to a close very quickly so it's time to start thinking about the new year. 
River Crossing

The average sales price was \$205,729 with a high sales price of \$239,000 and low sales price of \$141,000. The average property sold had 3.5 bedrooms, 1,939 square feet and sold for \$106.46 per square foot. Another huge selling point – some homes in this neighborhood have access to the Alafia River!


"Merry Christmas," he grinned, flashing his braces at me. "Bet you never thought you'd be sitting next to Santa today, did you?"

As the holiday season approaches, this quick reference guide will help residents plan ahead to recycle the usual containers, cans, and cardboard boxes, and provide tips on what to do with those unique holiday items. Recycling and disposal options for Hillsborough County Solid Waste customers are available at www.HillsboroughCounty. org/RecycletheHolidays or by calling 813-272-5680.

Holiday Curbside Collection Changes; No Make Up Days:

- No curbside collection Friday, Dec. 25
- No curbside collection of trash or yard waste Friday, Jan. 1
- Recycling collection will occur Friday, Jan. 1

Recycling in Blue Curbside Cart:

Empty and rinse recyclable food and beverage containers. Recycling items include plastic bottle and containers No. 1-7, aluminum, tin, and steel cans; milk, juice, and broth cartons, and glass bottles and jars. NOT recyclable: plastic bags, film, or shrink wrap.

Paper and Cardboard should be clean and tear easily. Items include newspaper, office paper, junk mail, paperback books, magazines, paperboard food boxes, cereal boxes, and paper towel rolls; greeting cards and wrapping paper. Flatten cardboard boxes. NOT recyclable: gift bags, tissue paper, ribbons, and bows.

Recycling Electronics:

Community Collection Centers for no additional fee will accept items containing
a digital display or circuit board, including televisions, computers, laptops, mobile
devices, stereo equipment, gaming consoles, VCR/DVD players and printers.
Discard small appliances such as toasters, crock pots, electric skillets, blenders,
hair dryers, and curling irons in your GRAY garbage cart.

Recycling Live Christmas Trees:

- Curbside pickup of live Christmas trees is available. Remove all decorations, lights, and tinsel. Cut the tree into sections no larger than 4-feet long and 6-inches in diameter and place curbside on your regular yard waste collection day
- Live tree drop off is available at several Yard Waste Processing Facilities, after removal of decorations, lights, and tinsel. The closest to the Bloomingdale community is at 346 Falkenburg Rd.

National Wreaths across America Day - Remember. Honor. Teach.

Remember, Honor, Teach – The simple, yet profound, mission statement of Wreaths across America, a non-profit organization. Each December, the organization coordinates annual wreathlaying ceremonies across the nation in tribute to our fallen veterans.

Established in 1992 at Arlington National Cemetery, volunteers laid 5,000 donated wreaths at veterans' headstones. Last year, at Arlington more than 230,000 wreaths

adorned the headstones of our nation's heroes placed there by 50,000 volunteers. The observance has evolved through the years to include a "Veteran's Parade" between Maine and Virginia "where organizers "spread our message about the importance of remembering our fallen heroes, honoring those who serve, and teaching our children about the sacrifices made by veterans and their families to preserve our freedoms."

The observance began at The Florida National Cemetery in Bushnell in 2006, thanks in part to a group of military veterans who organized


the cemetery's inclusion in the annual observance. From modest beginnings that year – seven wreaths were laid and 40 individuals attended – to a full-scale tribute in 2014 – 12,000 volunteers laid 10,000 wreaths – the ceremony continues to grow. With 108,000 veterans at rest in the Florida cemetery, organizers hope to one day adorn every grave with a Remembrance Wreath.

On Saturday, Dec. 12, the Florida National Cemetery will host their Wreaths Across America wreath laying tribute. A police and motorcycle escort from Lakeland will accompany the wreaths to the cemetery where they are scheduled to arrive at 10 a.m. Wreaths will be available for gravesite placement shortly thereafter. At 11:30 am, the Holiday Wreath Laying Ceremony begins and is timed to begin at all National Cemeteries at the same time.

On a personal note, my husband and I have attended the ceremony for the past few years. Arrive early and give yourself plenty of time to park. Seating is limited so bring a chair and some water. Onsite shuttles are available for those that need help getting to and from their cars.

Making more putts with better aiming...

By J.D. Carino (Bloomingdale CC campus)

Most missed putts from a short range (4-6 feet) are often a result of incorrect alignment of your body during the putting set up. We make similar mistakes of incorrect alignment during our full swing set up.

Here are a few guidelines for better aiming to make more putts:

Red Line- The line the ball travels on is your target line.

Yellow Lines - The other line we call the body line; consisting of your feet, knees, hips and shoulders. They need to all be square or even. Both red and yellow lines are aimed parallel to each other like a railroad track.



If you aim your body incorrectly (right at the hole), you will compensate by rotating your body or putter face to get the ball back to the left and get it in the hole.

Compensating is the main reason why your score varies from round to round. Aim better...putt better...no compensation.



Academic Foundation Enriches Learning at BSHS

Classroom supply lists are an expected part of preparing for back to school. Many times the needs go beyond just tissues, paper towels, scissors, or hand sanitizer. Recognizing that many teachers spend their own money to buy tools to enrich their classrooms, Bloomingdale Principal Sue Burkett, Assistant Principal Katie Rocha, and teacher Heather Hanks began an initiative to help teachers by creating the Bloomingdale High School Academic Foundation in 2014.

Burkett knew she needed a strong leader with the ability to fundraise and manage the newly launched foundation. Selecting a leader was easy as she tapped Bloomingdale resident and current foundation president Michelle Hernandez – an experienced community leader.

"The mission of the organization is to provide technology, specialized equipment, and supplemental textbooks to meet teachers' needs and enrich the classroom experience. The motto is 'A New Vision for our Academic Tradition," says Hernandez.

Fundraising is critical to the mission, and Hernandez, who is the current Honorary Mayor of Brandon, raised \$13,768.40 for the 501(c)3 non-profit foundation during the mayoral race in June. Considering the organization's \$100 initial seed money and subsequent successful fundraising efforts, the foundation is well on its way to meeting its goals.

Already the foundation has purchased a Student Check-In system for the guidance department to streamline student access to counselors and track student needs. Students are now able to login to the system during lunch to request an appointment with their guidance counselor.

Additionally, the foundation purchased an entire set of books for Cynthia Leahy-Fernandez's reading class, a throw rug and beanbag chairs for April Hunziker's intensive reading class, scientific calculators for the math department, and a 3-D printer for the Media Center. During Teacher Appreciation Week, the foundation provided a mini-grant of \$100 or less per day for teacher wish list items.

Says Hernandez, "The funds are never used for individual students, and all requests have to be cleared through Sue Burkett. This is a checks and balance system to ensure that there are no other funds available through the county or inschool funds. We take the donations very seriously, and want to make sure they go where donors intended them to go."

As it enters its second year, the foundation is looking for help from anyone who gets excited about education and technology in the classroom. Behind-the-scenes assistance with writing grants, seeking corporate sponsorships, and garnering small business in-kind donations is needed to continue the mission of the organization.
