Fall Festival Promotes Local Businesses Staff Report

The Bloomingdale Homeowners Fall Festival offers business owners an opportunity to introduce themselves to the residents of the largest community in Hillsborough County. While participation is free, businesses are asked to provide a raffle item, candy for the festival's "Trick or Treat" street, and tables, chairs, and canopy as needed for their booth. They are encouraged to provide promotional materials as well.

No large-scale event is cost-free and sponsors are needed to help the Association keep the event free for residents. There are many ways to help.

All sponsors receive preferred site assignment (up front and centrally located, the higher the sponsor level, the closer to the front), a sign provided for your booth area with your logo and information, and acknowledgements in our Bloomingdale Gazette (reaches 5,200 homes and more than 23,000 residents), on our website, and our Facebook pages. The Gazette is archived on the BHA website so sponsors receive "forever advertising."

There are three sponsor levels:

<u>Silver</u> - At \$75, sponsors will be acknowledged with business card and logo information at least twice, once in October and then in November.

Gold - At \$150, your business card and logo information will be published as well as a business photo/caption.

<u>Platinum</u> - At \$250, all of the above, but a Gazette business profile will be published within 1-6 months of the event as well as a photo of the business and employees.

The committee organizers are open to discuss your sponsorship as well. Some businesses have sponsored free hotdogs for the first \$100 kids, largescale games, entertainment, DJ, demonstrations, etc. However, money sponsorship is preferred to help defray the costs associated with the event.

Our Trees vs. Severe Weather (rain, hail, winds, hurricanes and tornados) By Gwen Graverson

During storm season, most people expect a rainy day or two. However, when a day becomes days of endless rain, the ground becomes soggy and saturated. This saturation also includes trees.

Saturation adds weight to trees and if a tree is unable to bend; it will break or uproot and fall. One example of a tree that does not fare well during a major storm, is a pine tree. The root system for our southern pines extends shallow and wide horizontally at the soil surface more so than down and deep.

The following are some questions that you may need to ask yourself after a severe storm when there's been damage to a tree on your property: Other than the storm damage, is the tree basically healthy/vigorous? Are major limbs broken? Has the leader, the main upward-trending branch been lost? Is at least 50 percent of the tree's crown (branches and leaves) still intact? How big are the wounds? Are there remaining branches that can form a new branch structure?

Next, you will need to make a decision - save the tree, wait-n-see or say goodbye. You may want to contact an arborist for a professional opinion first. Don't let anyone talk you into removing a tree from your property especially when the tree trunk measures five inches DBH (diameter at breast height) or larger, without obtaining a permit before removal. If the tree is dead, the permit is not required.

Keep in mind that there are additional provisions for Grand Oaks, even with pruning. Check the Hillsborough County website for more information: https://flhillsboroughcounty.civicplus.com. After Hurricane Katrina hit the Mississippi Gulf Coast 10 years ago, a lot of mighty oaks trees in Harrison County were removed believing that they were dead as a result of the storm. People failed to take into consideration the distressed state of the trees and the time needed for them to recover.

The following applies no matter the weather or season and we all need to deal with it... it's called liability. If a tree on your property is not well maintained, is dead or diseased and falls damaging your neighbor's property... as comedian Jeff Foxworthy would say, "You might be liable if ... "

Your neighbor's insurance company will pay for the damage and then most likely come after your insurance company for reimbursement in a process called subrogation. If the insurance adjuster finds that you were negligent (didn't maintain the tree properly), your insurance company may end up footing the bill, which could result in higher premiums. So, take this opportunity to talk with your insurance agent about your homeowners/ renters policy.

One final thought, don't wait until your tree comes crashing down, take pictures now and keep any documents or receipts of pruning and tree maintenance in a central location.

And while I'm at it...Rain, rain go away and come again another day...

Bending from the Hips...

When we say you need to bend over to two o'clock or 45 degrees, how you bend over is critical to an efficient swing. By efficient, I mean a consistent and pain free swing getting your club head back to the ball.

Most amateurs bend from the waist (stomach-blue line) which causes your back to round out. Bending from your hips (shown by the red line) will cause your belt line to angle upwards (45 degrees) and enable you to have a straight or flat back (yellow line).

When your posture is aligned correctly, this allows your body to rotate around your spine more efficiently and pain free. This will help you play through 18 holes of golf without popping Aleve on the back nine.

<u>Ingredients:</u> Flatbread (or any kind of soft, but stable bread) Shredded Mozzarella cheese Pizza sauce (I used Enrico's, but any will do)

Optional:3)Pepperoni slices4)Dried basilawPineapple chunks, black olives, or any pizza topping5)A small treat6)(fruit, a small candy bar, fruit roll-up, or Rice Krispy treat)6)

Directions:

1) Cut flatbread into circles with a circle cookie cutter or knife.

2) Place 1/4 – 1/3 cup of shredded cheese (about 1-2 tablespoons per pizza).

Place into a small plastic condiment container or a regular size cupcake liner.

3) Put 3-4 tablespoons of pizza sauce (1 big spoonful per pizza) into a small plastic condiment container.

4) Optional: if using dried basil, put about a teaspoon between your palms, and rub them together (this awakens the dried herb flavors). Stir the basil into the pizza sauce.

5) Gather your pizza toppings...2-3 pepperonis per pizza, small spoonful of any other toppings. Put the toppings in small containers or a regular size cupcake liner.

6) Using a square plastic container with a lid, insert the flatbread circles, shredded cheese, pizza sauce, and any toppings. If there is extra room, add a special treat to the container.

New Transportation Plan Meetings Scheduled

Following GO Hillsborough's extensive citizen feedback, it is apparent that citizens believe Hillsborough County is facing a potential transportation crisis. In fact, it is the top concern for citizens – twice that of jobs and our local economy.

GO Hillsborough recommends a fair, balanced, and community-driven transportation plan that will fix our roads first, relieve congestion, redesign



transit, and make our lives better. The reccomendation is funding this plan by placing a dedicated ½ percent sales tax referendum on the November 2016 election ballot. This will create \$117.5 million annually and \$3.5 billion over 30 years. At the same time a ½ percent sales tax is implemented, new growth will pay an increased and equitable share for its transportation impacts, too.

Go Hillsborough needs your input on which specific projects you want in your neighborhood so the Community Transportation Plan and its funding approach can be finalized. GO Hillsborough will host another 54 meetings in libraries across the County.

KEEP OUR KIDS SAFE - OBEY ALL TRAFFIC LAWS!

Schools are open, school buses are full and traffic is back to its normal congestion Add several major construction projects ongoing on Bloomingdale Avenue to the mix and know that your daily commute will take longer and require increased defensive driving and situational awareness. Plan ahead, be cautious and practice patience!

Traffic laws protect our kids – follow them! These include:

1. Drivers must stop both ways for school buses making stops for children on roads without median dividers. Example: Bloomingdale Avenue and Culbreath Road. Drivers, who don't stop, put our kids in danger. Also, keep a safe distance between other vehicles especially school buses, AND SLOW DOWN!

2. Obey school zone speed limits! Around our local schools, speed limits during school hours are clearly marked at 20 mph. There is no acceptable excuse for speeding, especially in school zones. An actual excuse given to a deputy by a driver -"I was on my cell phone and didn't see the flashing lights!" - Her fine was \$583. Remember, speeding fines double in school zones.

3. Obey or pay! - Traffic fines have increased. Deputies are on the scene, radar guns at the ready, around all our area schools. Disregard traffic laws and it will cost you! Save your hard-earned money. Obey the traffic laws and respect the rights and safety of others and save lives!

Special note: Citations costs do not include any possible increases in your auto insurance rates. These increases usually stay on your policy for at least three years. Talk to your teen driver as well, and above all, be a good example.

DISTRACTED DRIVING AND DWI - DANGEROUS AND DEADLY

Nearly 19,000 people across the country lost their lives in traffic accidents. The National safety council recently reported that traffic deaths were up by 14 per cent nationally in the first six months of this year.

The primary causes have been increased speed limits, drivers distracted by cell phone calls or texting and drunk drivers. Do not let one of your family members or you become one of these fatal statistics! These preventable tragedies have affected our area. We have lost too many teens to auto accidents where teens were not buckled up, were distracted, impaired, or speeding. So, do buckle up and obey traffic laws! Do not speed, drink and drive, or text while driving.

DANGER! DANGER! FIRE STATION EMERGENCY SIGNALS ON BLOOMINGDALE AVENUE

Drivers have been observed running the Fire Station Emergency Signals when they turn red and flash! This is both illegal and very dangerous. When the signals turn red, firefighters are preparing to respond to emergencies and a fire engine will be entering Bloomingdale Avenue. Pay special attention when driving in this area. Stop when you see flashing red lights!

2. Recent crimes in our area involved burglaries and retail theft.

- The first incident was at Leslie's Pool Supply next to Publix. A burglar entered the store, cut off alarms, opened the safe and removed money. Deputies arrested a suspect.
- The second incident was a burglary of a vehicle near Beef O'Brady's on Bell Shoals. No arrests have been made yet. This incident emphasizes the importance of securing vehicles properly at all times and locations.
- The last incident involved retail theft from Walmart. Several businesses in our area have upgraded to high-quality cameras, which have been instrumental in several arrests.

3. Continue to prepare your home and family for disasters, especially hurricanes! Hurricane season is at its peak; it only takes one big storm to change lives. The first hurricane of the season has already passed. We also all saw the severe damage and destruction caused by the floods in the last two months.

Focused, selfless, and athletic – just a few words one might use to describe this talented Bloomingdale High School junior.

Outside of the classroom is where Diaz really shines. His entire family is a part of a non-profit agency called Creative Kids, which cousin Jennifer Carpiet started over 15 years ago. The organization's purpose is to help sick and hospitalized kids through a variety of programs. Each month, the family donates items to children with long-term illnesses at area hospitals.

"These kids spend more time in the hospital than their own home," Diaz said.

For the past five years, he has worked with the organization amassing hundreds of volunteer service hours in the process. "Boxers by Brothers" is one of the programs he helped start with his brother, Cameron. The brothers add fun designs to boy's boxers and deliver them to cancer patients with a note of encouragement.

"I have made many new little friends over the past 4 years with the patients," said Diaz.

When asked why he volunteers, he said, "I do it because I love working with the kids and seeing them happy."

Shifting the spotlight from himself, he continued, "Creative kids is very blessed to have some great youth volunteers that help us make all of this possible each month. Our volunteers truly have the heart to serve."

While a good student with a solid academic record, Diaz is most proud of his accomplishments on the Bulls soccer field. A varsity player since his first year, he earned most improved player as a freshman followed by best attacker after his sophomore year. In addition, Diaz travels
