### **Bloomingdale Real Estate & Housing Update**

The month of September saw a slow-down in the housing market but not as much of a decline characteristic for this time of year. In fact, according to Florida Realtor's Andrew Barber, closed sales of single-family homes statewide were up 8.6 percent from this time last year. In Bloomingdale, there was not much of a change from September

to October. There were 21 properties sold in September compared to 22 in August and 18 new listings, just one less than last month.

A more substantial decline in new listings is expected over the next couple of months before picking up slightly during the holiday season. After hearing about The Landing Bar and Grill from numerous sources, I decided to try it. I have returned several times since and have enjoyed everything!

First the appetizers... my family and I tried the beer battered

Cajun Fried Pickles with a side of Cajun Ranch dressing. Simply delicious! For beverages, I was happy to see several local micros on draft and my spouse had the Sangria, which, in an unusual twist, had a pineapple juice base.

Specials change daily – on our first Saturday visit, it was Prime Rib roasted to perfection with a homemade 'horsie sauce' and au jus on the side. Garlicky green beans, fresh mashed potatoes and dark gravy rounded out a good meal.

My son enjoyed his usual burger and fries and my spouse tried one of the Flat Bread offerings. Of note, portion size and the freshness of ingredients are a plus.

Dessert changes every night too. We ordered the Bacon Pretzel Peanut Butter Brownie that came to the table as a tower of ice cream scoops and freshly chopped bacon bits over a sizeable peanut-butter brownie. I love it when such an unusual offering can wow me.

On another visit, I tried 'Beef on Weck' a New York roast beef specialty served on a kummelweck roll. It certainly helps that the owners hail from Buffalo, N.Y. so they know their beef. My spouse ordered the Cobb Salad, a literal feast.

The Landing combines family friendly with suburban watering hole. The bar area is separated from the dining room. TVs line the walls with a variety of sports playing at low volume. The service was very good and the price was right – especially for the quality and portion sizes. I can definitely see why this place has become such a popular spot for local diners.

### INS & OUTS WHAT RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SEXUAL PREDATORS AND OFFENDERS

With Halloween right around the corner, parents need to look out for more than just tainted candy. Sexual predators and offenders are always a concern. Knowing who they are and where they live in our neighborhoods is important in keeping our kids safe.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) is dedicated to educating residents on exactly what a sexual predator or offender is and how to locate them in your neighborhoods.

There are specific laws that help control the activities of predators and offenders. The Sheriff's Office works diligently to ensure these laws are upheld and violators are arrested. Having an informed community is a key factor in controlling these criminals and preventing them from harming our kids.

Understanding the difference between a sexual predator and a sexual offender is the first step to understanding the scope of the problem. Both are serious criminals. So, what is the difference between a sexual offender and a predator?

According to Florida statutes, a sexual offender is a person convicted of (or who has pled no contest or guilty to) a sex offense involving a minor and who is released on or after Oct. 1, 1997 from the sanction (e.g., fine, incarceration, probation, etc.) imposed as a result of the offense. Offenses include, but are not limited to, child pornography, sexual performance by a child under 18 and procuring a person under 18 for purposes of prostitution. Consult the Florida statutes for a complete listing of offenses.

A predator designation requires that a person be convicted of a first-degree felony sex crime, or two second-degree felony sex crimes (with offenses, convictions or release from


court sanctions occurring within 10 years) and which occurred after October 1, 1993. In addition, the court must issue a written order finding for predator status.

Florida law requires sexual offenders and sexual predators to register their address with the FDLE or the local sheriff's office. The FDLE site also has a searchable database of predators and offenders residing in Florida.

Using the site is simple. Go to https://offender.fdle.state.fl.us. Select "Offender Search" from the upper left corner. The next webpage will offer a variety of search options including a "Neighborhood Search." Fill in the blanks and select a radius of 5 miles to include all of Bloomingdale. Click search and prepare to be surprised. Results can be in list or map form.

Talk with your children about protecting themselves and "stranger danger." Make sure they understand the dangers around them – it will keep them safe.





### **13 Fright-Free Halloween Safety Tips**

Halloween may not be as innocent as some remember, but it can still be a ghoulish good time. Emphasize safety to ensure your Halloween frights are make believe and not of the real variety. With a few precautions, parents, teens and kids will have good scary memories instead of frightening tragedies.

- Depending on the age of your child, go with them or designate a trusted escort.
- Avoid trick-or-treating alone and walk in groups.
- Be seen. Wear reflective or light colored clothing and costumes.
- Choose flame-resistant costumes, avoid lit candles, and open flames.
- Carry flashlights or glow sticks to make sure you can see and drivers can see you.
- Trick or treat only at well-lit homes. Generally, a front porch light on signals a participating Halloween home!
- Look both ways and cross the street at intersections or clear areas. Never cross between parked cars.
- Make sure your costume fits. Falls and trips can send you to the emergency room.
- Check all treats before your kids eat them. When in doubt, throw them out.
- Don't let kids snack while out.
- Consider alternative activities. Many churches and schools have organized Halloween activities. The BHA sponsors a Trick or Treat street at the Fall Festival. See details this issue!
- · Control pets. Like thunder, some pets don't handle this evening well.
- Drivers, slow down and be more cautious than normal. Kids are everywhere!

### For Teens ONLY, All of the Above Plus:

- Use seat belts when traveling to and from that neighborhood Halloween party.
- Don't drink if you're underage.
- If you're old enough to drink, don't drink and drive.
- Don't ride with anyone who has been drinking.
- Don't use illegal drugs.
- Carry your cell phone and some form of identification.
- Have fun, but remember that bad "tricks" can be very costly and get both you and your parents into a lot of expensive trouble.

### **Pumpkin Artist Scares Up Halloween Fun**

### **Container Gardening - Home Sweet Home for Plants** By Patti Philipsen and Gwen Graverson

Container gardening is a popular addition to a home's landscape. It is portable, perfect for small spaces or for displaying plants around your home or for seasonal displays. The best part – anyone can do it!

There are many reasons why people choose container gardening:

1. You can give potted plants individual care based on their specific care guidelines. These include specific soil mixtures, watering requirements and feeding needs. Their portability makes the issue of "shade or no shade" a moot point and in colder temperatures or inclement weather, you can move container plants to a safer location.

2. Container planting can mean having plants in your home or not having them. This is particularly true for renters, apartment and condo dwellers, and even college students. Container plants can make a stunning addition to balconies, lanais, courtyards, decks and areas where grass or plants just don't seem to grow. A side benefit – when you move, your plants can move with you.

3. Most important – anyone can have a wonderful container garden. All you really need to get started is a container, some potting soil and either seeds or plants. There are a great variety of containers to suit anyone's taste and creativity. A few options include:

- Plastic- Plastic pots are durable and lightweight. Just remember, don't plant anything too tall in them, as they will blow over in high winds.
- Terracotta (clay) Clay pots were used by the Romans. Advantages to terra cotta are that it is porous helping to keep soil moist with less watering required over plastic pots. In addition, they offer more protection from colder temperatures than plastic. One big disadvantage is these pots can break.
- Porcelain Glazed Earthenware and porcelain are also popular options. They are quite decorative and available in a wide range of colors and designs. They can be more fragile than other options.
- Wood Wood is traditional for containers. It keeps roots cooler no matter how hot the summer becomes. Choose wood containers like teak, cedar and redwood. This will deter Florida's diverse termite population.

Whatever you decide, make sure there is adequate drainage. Nothing will kill your plants faster than wet feet. Put a window screen piece and rocks or pottery shards in the bottom of your container. This will help keep soil from slipping through drainage holes. No drainage holes in your container? Drill one, but be careful as drilling can cause the pot to crack.

Container plants are utterly dependent on you for water, fertilizing, and attention from time to time – wouldn't it be somewhat boring if they didn't. Remember, there is no right way to make a garden... there is only the one that works for you. Happy gardening!

### One plane versus two plane swing...

One plane, two plane, hands high, hands low, two flat, two steep – lots of different golf terminology that can cause you to analyze a swing incorrectly. When we talk about swing planes and angles of attack, you need to have a reference point and an understanding of what kind of swing you're working on.

At Cochrane Golf Schools, we prefer a one plane swing. Using the rotation of the body (upper and

rotation of the body (upper and lower) and less hands to square up of the clubface at impact.

The two plane swing requires more use of the hands for squaring the club face and more correct timing. This brings both sides of the golf course into play.

On a one plane swing, in the back swing, the left arm is even (red line) with your shoulders. On a two plane swing, in the back swing, the left arm is higher (yellow line) above the shoulders.

### **Breast Cancer Screening and Signs**

Breast cancer screening is often credited for the early and accurate detection of precancerous and cancerous cells, which, in many cases, are found in women who are asymptomatic and otherwise healthy. When diagnosed and addressed in its initial stages, breast cancer is one of the most treatable forms of cancer. Therefore, it is vitally important for a woman to be screened regularly in the manner and frequency recommended by her physician.

Regular screening from a physician is vital because it can help detect cancer before a lump may be noticeable; however, it is still important for women to perform monthly self-exams in between their doctors' screenings. Self-exams help women to become familiar with how their breasts normally look and feel. Any lumps or physical changes can then be brought to the attention of a health care professional.

### **Common Screening Tests**

- Clinical breast exam A manual examination of the breasts and underarm areas by a physician to detect lumps, masses or anything unusual.
- Conventional mammography The current gold standard in breast cancer screening. Low-dose breast X-rays interpreted by a radiologist. When performed regularly in conjunction with a clinical breast exam and monthly self-exams, a mammogram can be a very effective cancer-screening tool.
- Full-breast tomosynthesis A three-dimensional mammogram.
- Breast MRI A large magnet, radio waves and a computer produce detailed images of the breast structure.
- Automated breast ultrasound system (ABUS) Helpful for screening dense breast tissue.

### Breast Cancer Signs

While the presence of one or more symptoms does not necessarily indicate cancer, it is important to follow up with a health care practitioner with regard to any of the following:

- A lump or thickening in the breast or underarm area
- An inexplicable change in the size or shape of a breast
- Unexplained swelling or shrinkage of one or both breasts
- A recent onset of breast asymmetry
- Dimpling anywhere on a breast surface
- An inverted nipple
- Nipple discharge (other than breast milk)
- Nipple tenderness
- Redness, warmth and a change in breast skin texture
- Breast pain

The most common symptom that women notice is a new lump. These lumps are usually painless, but it is possible for them to be painful to the touch, as well. Malignant, or cancerous, masses are typically hard with irregular edges, but they can also be soft or rounded.

Bottom line: Take charge of your breast health. Do self-exams regularly, and consult your health care provider for the best screening options for you.

### **October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month**

My favorite health adage is "Preventing illness is easier than reversing illness." Nothing can be truer when it comes to breast cancer. While nothing can guarantee a cancer-free life, it is important to remember that only 10 percent of breast cancers appear related to genetic factors (www.cancer. org). The remaining 90 percent can be the result of risk factors, including lifestyle choices, race, age, gender and even the environment.


Nutrition is the frontline defense against all cancers. Eating an organic, high fiber, plant-based diet that is diverse and colorful will ensure that the body is receiving the antioxidants that it needs to reduce cellular damage. Cut out processed convenience foods and avoid sugar as much as possible. Cancer voraciously feeds on sugar in order to survive so removing it from your diet will definitely reduce your chance of developing disease.

Excessive protein consumption has proven to increase cancer risks. It is important to reduce the quantity of meat eaten and increase the quality. Choose pasture-raised organic meats, dairy, and eggs to reduce your exposure to artificial growth hormones and antibiotics. In conjunction with diet, maintaining a lean body composition is critical because fat produces extra estrogen which drives up cancer risks.

Funny as it may sound, wear a properly fitted bra and do not carry your cell phone inside of it. Poor lymphatic drainage around the armpits and direct exposure to electromagnetic radiation can create unfavorable conditions. Switch to an aluminum-free deodorant and get your Vitamin D levels checked for deficiency. All of these factors influence breast health.

Finally, do monthly self-exams. Preventing breast cancer requires time and effort but it's not nearly as inconvenient as dealing with a cancer diagnosis.

### Former Bloomingdale High School Standout Lands on His "Field of Dreams," Signs with LA Dodgers

As a standout athlete at Bloomingdale Senior High School (BSHS), Logan Crouse was a triple threat, playing football, basketball, and baseball. As a senior, he received Male Athlete of the Year for 2014-15. However, his true love was always baseball, and after graduation, Crouse packed up and headed to Florida State University (FSU) to play the sport of his dreams on a full scholarship. Little did he know his time there would be short. On July 17 the 6-foot 5-inch, 240 pound pitcher was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The first call from the Dodgers came just two weeks after Crouse arrived at FSU – and the brand new Seminole turned them down. Two more times calls would come from the Dodgers organization, but Crouse continued to say no because he felt the offers did not compare to his scholarship at FSU. Then on the final day of the draft and a half hour before the 5 p.m. deadline, the Dodgers made Crouse an offer he could not refuse.

"For five days we could not say anything [about the draft] until I could fly to Arizona and sign the contract," said Crouse. Added mother Melanie, "It was so hard, especially on his dad [Terry]." However, Crouse was able notify FSU, and on July 21 flew to Glendale, Arizona, to sign on with the Dodgers Rookie League.

Now, Crouse lives in a hotel with other rookies and practices every day from 1 to 11:30 p.m. in the hot Arizona climate. All players drafted out of high school play in the Rookie League, and his advancement with the organization is completely dependent on his performance. The next step, Rookie Advanced League in Ogden, Utah, is not something Crouse is focused on. "I am just taking it day-by-day, trying to get better, and letting the front office worry about my advancement."

As part of Crouse's contract, Major League Baseball will pay for four years of education at a Florida university should he be released or eventually retire from the Dodgers. Said Crouse, "So far my experience has been fun and challenging." He continued, "I believe we [Dodger players] are treated the best out of any organization in baseball."

The Bloomingdale athlete comes from a large family. In addition to parents Melanie and Terry, there is Nathan, who attends the University of Central Missouri; Cody, a junior and baseball player at Florida International University who goes into the draft next year; Carson, a senior at BSHS who plays football and baseball; and MacKenzie, a freshman at BSHS who is on the cheerleading squad.



Said mom Melanie, "We are so proud of Logan. He has done this all on his own."

# BLOOMINGDALE COMMUNITY STATION NOTES

### **IMPORTANT CRIME INFORMATION FOR ALL RESIDENTS!**

The good news is that crime in our area has remained low. The bad news is that too many burglaries are still occurring and most of the crimes could have been prevented!

At the September Bloomingdale Community Council (BACC), Detective James Howell and I briefed three major cases and one serious incident in the community. These cases illustrate the need for resident action to prevent crimes. Should you have information about the following incidents, call 635-8040.

### Case 1: Location - Eagles Nest Drive Type of Crime - Residential burglary

Details of Burglary - This burglary occurred in the daytime. Criminals entered the residence through a back patio door. They easily pried open the door. It did not have any additional security measures taken to secure it. The criminals, three black males, were seen on a neighbor's security camera taking a large TV. They were driving a red Ford Fusion. Note: To help prevent this type of crime, add additional security measures to any patio doors - drill a hole in the top corner of the door and add a long screw or pin and also put a metal bar or long strip of wood in the door's lower track! In addition, maintain lists of all serial numbers on valuables and take photos for proof of ownership.



### Case 2: Location - Hollow Wood Drive/Lyncrest Court/Portobello Circle **Type of Crime - Vehicle burglary**

Details of Burglary - These burglaries occurred at night. Criminals were car hopping and broke out windows of three vehicles that contained purses lying on the seats of the vehicles. Note: Prevent these crimes simply by not leaving valuables in vehicles.



### **Case 3: Location - Sandy Creek Drive**

### **Type of Crime - Vehicle burglary**

Details of Burglary - Two white males were seen using their cell phone lights to check vehicles. They found one unlocked and searched it for personal info and valuables. Note: Lock vehicles to prevent this type of crime.

### Incident 1: Location - Bloomingdale West

### **Type of Incident - Armed confrontation**

Details of Incident - A new resident was completing landscaping in his yard and placed debris by the curb. A neighbor stopped by and complained about the debris. Heated words were exchanged resulting in one resident grabbing a machete and the other going to his vehicle and pulling out a gun. Fortunately, HCSO deputies arrived and ended the confrontation. Note: If you are in any confrontation, do not let it escalate. Leave the area and call HCSO if necessary!

### **IMPORTANT TIPS:**

Don't make it easy for criminals! Home security is a full time committment. The one time you get in a hurry or forget to lock your vehicle, take your valuables inside or close your garage door is all it takes.

Any resident who witnesses a crime should use caution. Do not confront the criminals. They may be armed. Observe them and take down any critical information - detailed description, description of any vehicles along with the license number.

Install security cameras - one area resident was able to carefully video criminals in his area.

Lock up your vehicles. Take your valuables inside your home or business. And close your garage doors! It is that simple. Motion sensor lights can be very effective! Finally, report suspicious activity, call 247-8200 or in an emergency, call 911.






