NEW PUTTING CONTEST NOW PART OF THE MAY 10 BHA CHARITY GOLF TOURNAMENT

Competing with a PGA pro is a dream for most golfers. This dream will come true for many participants in the upcoming May 10 Bloomingdale Homeowners Association (BHA) Charity Golf Tournament thanks to the newest sponsor, John E.S. Cochrane Golf Schools Director of Operations, J.D. Carino.

Carino will sponsor and run the tournament's putting contest with a twist. Instead of golfers attempting to make the putt or get closest to the hole, they will be

competing against Carino to beat his putt in a "Beat the Pro" format. Those who do will be entered into a drawing where the winner will receive five private golf lessons, valued at \$295. Others who beat him will receive coupons for 20% off of private lessons.

In addition, Carino will be available during registration to give golfers an edge by providing a free putting clinic valued at \$100. Participants need to arrive early to take advantage of this free clinic.

Carino, a 23-year Air Force veteran, considers this event a mustdo, not only for the community, but for his military brothers and sisters who have served and continue to serve their country.

The tournament's chosen charity is K9s for Warriors, and Carino is fully behind the organization's objectives of teaming veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder with service dogs. "I adopted two animals from the Humane Society, and I know first-hand the calming effects they have had on me," he explained. "Sometimes an animal is the only 'person' you can talk to [other than your therapist] who can understand what you [returning military] are going through." Few people know what our returning military have experienced during war, he said.

BLOOMINGDALE 8-YEAR-OLD CELEBRATES GIVING



Eight-year-old Cooper Hinson collected 455 pounds of food to donate to Meals on a traditional birthday party.

Eight-year-old Cooper Hinson loves baseball, soccer, and mostly helping others. So instead of throwing a traditional birthday party this year, Cooper decided to hold a canned food drive to benefit Meals on Wheels of Brandon.

When the Alafia Elementary School 2nd grader was asked by his mom, Jessica Hinson, if he would like to have a party to celebrate his March birthday his response was, "I don't want people to have to buy gifts for me." And from that sentiment the idea of asking his Wheels of Brandon in lieu of a throwing friends to donate canned foods was born.

Cooper's mom began making some inquiries

about donating the canned foods, and learned that Meals on Wheels of Brandon does not receive government funding like its Tampa counterpart, but instead depends solely on donations of cash and food. This hit particularly close to home for the Hinson family—Hinson's grandmother lives with them and probably would be dependent on the services of a charity like Meals on Wheels if she did not share their home.

By word of mouth, Cooper's birthday idea began to spread—he set a goal of 323 pounds of food to commemorate his 3-23 birth date. And on April 25 Cooper's family, friends, and teachers gathered at Bloomingdale East Park to celebrate "Coopalooza," where 455 pounds of canned goods were collected. Guests were treated to food and cupcakes, and even Kona Ice made an appearance, while Cooper and his friends enjoyed playing baseball and having a fun afternoon in the park.

Meals on Wheels representatives were there, too, to pick up the donations. "He is a precious, precious boy," said Dale Graves, coordinator for the 18 churches the charity serves. "We serve approximately 400 people every week, and they will be so blessed by these donations."

By his request, Cooper's philosophy was reflected on the t-shirt dad Nick had made for him to wear to his event, "Be the change you wish to see in the world." When asked who his inspiration is the 2nd grader replied simply, "My mom." His stayat-home mom not only volunteers at Alafia Elementary, but is a guardian for foster children in Hillsborough County, and has passed her passion for service along to her only child.

"It is humbling to be his dad," said Nick Hinson. And as evidenced by the overwhelming support Cooper received in his charitable efforts, his work has only just begun.

KIM'S NATURAL PET FOODS OPENS, SPECIALIZES IN HOLISTIC CHOICES

Kim's Natural Pet Foods, located at 3110 Lithia Pinecrest Rd., is the only pet supply store in Valrico that focuses on holistic foods for dogs and cats. Owner Kim Albright worked at Bloomingdale Pet Foods for six years before the business closed and she purchased the property to continue offering pet foods to her customers, who she says had become like family to her.

"People who love pets, they're just very kind people, because they love something other than themselves," Albright said. And she was overwhelmed by how the community came together to help get Kim's Natural Pet Foods up and running. "I had an outpouring of customers who came and wanted to see it," Albright said.

"A customer completely gutted the bathroom and put in a new vanity and everything, and another donated the beautiful paw-print curtain at the front of the store," Albright said. "Customers have done wonderful things for me." One customer, Dave Willits, took a number of pictures of the store from the day it was gutted to the day it was finished, and created a kind of photo storyline. These photos can be viewed on the business' Facebook page, "Kim's Natural Pet Foods," which was also set up by a customer.

Kim's Natural Pet Foods celebrated its Grand Opening on April 5. The store, which caters to dogs and cats, offers a variety of holistic food brands, including Fromm, Earthborn, Blue, Canidae, Merrick, Taste of the Wild and Nutrisca (known to help dogs with health issues, like diabetes).

"My belief is that you can take most issues with pets, such as allergies, skin issues and things of that nature, and correct them with the proper diet," Albright said.

"All of our foods are holistic foods. Everything is natural and USA made. That's one thing I cater to, is USA products. I find a lot of people like that. That's a really big attention-getter for people here," Albright said. Another up-and-coming pet food option the store offers is frozen and freeze-dried treats, such as Stella & Chewy's.

"I have all of the accessories that a pet would need, litter to toys to treats. All of our bones and treats, again, are USA made," Albright said. She also acknowledges that taking care of pets can be expensive. To help alleviate some of the expense, Kim's Natural Pet Foods offers affordable shot clinics once a month in the store, making veterinary needs affordable to the community. Rabies shots are as low as ten dollars.

SHERIFF'S 2014 OPERATION MEDICINE CABINET A SUCCESS

The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office completed another successful special Operation Medicine Cabinet last month at the Hillsborough County Park's Maintenance Department site in Bloomingdale. Bloomingdale Resource Master Deputy Curtis Warren worked with Kristi Campbell from Home Instead Senior Care of Brandon, District IV Sheriff's Deputy Jennifer Smith and Mack Austin, a Sheriff's Honorary Deputy and BACC member to collect 108.45 lbs. of unused and outdated prescription medicines and drugs. The drugs were collected and destroyed to prevent abuse and keep these medications from ending up in our water system or landfills.

Sluggers is the sort of family friendly, catch a game with a burger and beer, kind of joint that every neighborhood should have. Tucked in to the Corner of Bloomingdale Avenue and John Moore Road, there is easy access and ample parking (even on nights when a Cornhole Tourney takes up spaces). Joining me for the dining experience were my teenage kids who attend Bloomingdale High and Burns Middle Schools. For them, going out on a weeknight for burgers, fries and a soda is quite the treat and Sluggers is a perfect choice.

The burgers at Sluggers are of a good half-pound dimension, with ample toppings and options. The fries and onion rings are quite tasty just the right size. The wings are a pretty standard fare—I wouldn't go out of my way to dine on them, but as an appetizer offering they are quite satisfying. For variety, I ordered from the sandwich menu and ended up with half a chicken breast that substituted for the standard burger. It was a little dry but fulfilled what pint-size promise was expected.

And speaking of pints, I was delighted to find that the beer selection offered a couple of local options tucked in among the standard big brews. With more than a dozen televisions spread throughout the bar and dining area, pretty much any sporting event you need is available. And if you don't see the one you want, just ask your server for a channel change.

Sluggers may not produce the best burgers and wings I have ever had, but they are certainly far from the worst. The same goes for the sides and drinks. Good, solid, dependable staples with a pleasant atmosphere. This is a good place to bring the family when you just don't feel like cooking, or you need to commune with other locals for the big game, and have a hankering for comfort food on a budget.

INS & OUTS WHAT EVERY BLOOMINGDALE HOMEOWNER SHOULD KNOW ABOUT MUSCOVY DUCKS

Whatever you call them – ugly ducklings, Frankenstein's fowl, or uniquely featured creature – Muscovy Ducks are a common sight along the running paths and ponds of Bloomingdale. Typically black in color with a purple sheen to their feather, Muscovies are large ducks with long, flattened tails and large claws. They are most easily identified by the presence of fleshy red caruncles, or warty bumps, on the face over the eyes and upon the bill. Muscovies do not "quack"; instead, the male's call is a loud, dry hiss, and the female's is a quiet coo.

According to Steve A. Johnson and Michelle Hawk of the University of Florida, Cairina moschata is not wildlife but rather a "feral domestic" duck that not native to Florida. Quite often they are initially kept as domesticated animals until they escape or are released into the wild. It is, however, illegal to release Muscovy Ducks (or any non-native animal) into the local wildlife:

Unfortunately, Muscovies are prolific and if left uncontrolled, their population can increase dramatically in a very short time. This will create problems through competition and interbreeding with native species, damage to public and private property, and the transmission of disease to other water fowl. Since they are sedentary and tend not to migrate, their year round residency does not allow local habitats to recover during the cooler winter months.

Due to ready food supplies and good shelter, Muscovy populations tend to expand rapidly in suburban neighborhoods such as Bloomingdale. Feed them and they can become aggressive towards pets and have been known to bite children. Their excessive droppings not only decrease the aesthetic value of parks and lakes, but also contaminate water, presenting a significant hazard to the health of both humans and house pets.

This brings us to what you, the residents of Bloomingdale, can do to alleviate the problems caused by this intrusive, non-native water fowl. First and foremost, DO NOT FEED THEM. Whether intentionally or otherwise through unsecure garbage, pet food placed outside, or uncovered compost piles - feeding means breeding. Though it is not recommended that residents take matters into their own hands, nests should be removed or destroyed whenever feasible.

Currently, there is a duck removal program taking place within Bloomingdale and residents are asked NOT to touch or disturb any of the large cage-like traps situated alongside several local ponds. Remember, most of our ponds are privately-owned by the residents whose property surrounds the ponds, or by the mandatory neighborhood homeowners association.

TECHPLAYZONE TRANSPORTS SCIENCE TO YOUNG TECHIES

For the Bagley family of Bloomingdale, science and technology are as much a part of life as school and church. As founder of TechPlayzone, mom-of-five Desh Bagley designs curriculum and activities dedicated to encouraging young people to become better problem solvers, programmers, and future engineers. And the business is a family affair.

Bagley began TechPlayzone in 2005 when she received a \$5,000 grant to bring a science and technology program to Edison Elementary School in Tampa. With the help of her then 7-year-old son, Darian, Bagley included activities with snap circuits and game design in the program. In 2006, the Bloomingdale mom received a small business loan and opened the TechPlayzone location on Boyette Road in Riverview, and added Lego Mindstorms Robotics workshops, SCRATCH Game Design Workshops, Steve Spangler Amazing Hands-On Science Workshops, and Adobe Green Screen Movie Making Workshops for ages 7-17. Son Daryl, Jr., currently a senior IB student at Strawberry Crest High School, also became an integral part of the program, acting as a workshop facilitator along with his younger brother.

TechPlayzone programs proved popular with home-schooled students, and summer camps were extremely successful. However, like many small local businesses, the recession hit TechPlayzone hard. So in 2013, Bagley decided to let go of the Boyette Road location and take her business mobile.

Now TechPlayzone facilitators pick up from and return to a central location the equipment needed to hold workshops. Science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM), computer science, and robotics workshops are held for home schoolers at Bells Shoals Baptist Church and Seven Mountains Academy, and every Friday robotics workshops are held at Bell Shoals Baptist Academy.

This summer, TechPlayzone will be offering summer camps at Bell Shoals Baptist Church and Seven Mountains Academy. Each week will include robotics, game design, and hands-on science based on a specific them—Oceanography, Force in Motion, Space Travels, and Chem-is-try. that are currently open for registration. Campers will get to launch rockets during space travels week, and new this summer will be the opportunity to dissect sharks as part of oceanography week. "Each week holds its own excitement. Returning campers will feel challenged, and new campers will feel at home," says Bagley. And on hand to facilitate will be sons Daryl, Jr., and Darian, now a sophomore IB student at Strawberry Crest.

TechPlayzone also will be offering six summer camps through the Hillsborough County School District HOST program for 4th and 5th graders. These camps will be facilitated by Tyler Bird, a graduate of Bloomingdale High School and rising junior in the Burnett Honors College at the University of Central Florida.

As if that is not enough for the busy Bagleys, TechPlayzone also sponsors two champion First Lego League robotics teams that meet at Hillsborough Community College for ages 9-14.

BIG BOX UPDATE

EFFORTS TO BLOCK BUILDING A BIG BOX STORE ON BLOOMINGDALE AVE. CONTINUE TO MOVE FORWARD AS OF APRIL



On March 18, the CAN-DO attorney met with Judge William Levens and several attorneys from the county and Red Cast. During this meeting the Judge reviewed the request by the county and Red

Cast to dismiss the case filed by resident Fred Brown (plaintiff) against the county. This case proposed that the county did not follow proper zoning processes and community notifications, but rather used a text amendment change process to re-write the zoning for the property. The dismissal request was made by the county and Red Cast on the grounds that the plaintiff's case was not valid. The judge did not agree with the dismissal request issuing his decision on March 31 to deny it. In Judge Leven's decision he not only denied the motion to dismiss the case, but ordered the Plaintiff and Defendants to establish mediation within the next few months.

Mediation is scheduled for June at which point the plaintiff (Fred Brown) and defendants (County and Red Cast) will meet to try to come to an agreement. If no agreement is reached, a court date will be set.

CAN-DO considers this a good first win and hopes that the community will realize that these are successes. Many voices have said that it is a done deal. But the judge has agreed that the county's motion to dismiss does not hold water and that there is validity enough that this should proceed to mediation and to court.

The county is also moving through the process of planning to sunset (retire/ discontinue) the code amendment changes that allowed for a change in zoning without requiring community input or a meeting with the community—in this particular situation, allowing development of the big box store. Representatives for the county have said that the current code is too difficult to work with and their plans to abandon it will provide new means for future changes.

Coming up in the next few months CAN-DO will be moving forward with new fundraising events and is looking for interested individuals wanting to participate at any level with its efforts. CAMPO COACH AND SWIMMER MAKE A WINNING TEAM

Malia Blythe has been swimming for only a year and a half. But with the guidance of Campo Family YMCA Coach Joey Sheppard, Malia has not only excelled at swimming but has gained confidence to overcome her biggest challenge--auditory processing disorder.

The Cimino 3rd grader swims for YMCA's competitive swim team, the TYS Stingrays. Her disorder means she us unable to process the information she hears in the same way as others because her ears and brain don't fully coordinate. Something adversely affects the way the brain recognizes and interprets sounds, most notably the sounds composing speech. Background noise, particularly in the pool, only complicates her understanding.

Blythe has found in Sheppard a coach who is patient and willing to repeat things she does understand. Through her swimming and encouragement from Coach Joey she is learning the coping skills necessary to succeed.

Sheppard has found his true passion in coaching both YMCA and USA swimming at the Campo Y for the last 2 years. A 2009 graduate of Bloomingdale High School, he attends the University of South Florida, where he switched his major to economics so he could spend more time coaching.

In a letter to the Y commending Sheppard, Alacia Blythe, Malia's mother wrote, "As you can imagine, teaching a child with this disorder in a noisy pool environment is challenging, to say the least. In spite of the many other swimmers he has to deal with Joey has an endless amount of patience for Malia. He has studied up on her condition and adapted to her way of learning and he takes the time to make sure she understands." As for Malia, her favorite part of swimming is "... when I take a stroke how I can feel the rush of the water over my hand." She swims at the silver level for the TYS Stingrays, and has achieved "B" times in the breast stroke and freestyle for USA swimming, a level only about 54 percent of swimmers achieve. Her favorite stroke is the butterfly, and her swimming idol is Michael Phelps.

There is no cure for auditory processing disorder. However, Malia has found a champion in Sheppard and his gift for knowing what his swimmers need as well as his profound interest in their success both in and out of the pool. They truly make a winning team.
