



# BLOOMINGDALE COMMUNITY STATION NOTES By Community Resource Deputy Clifford Fletcher and C.S.O. Sandy Capitano

Wow, where did 2017 go? As we usher in the New Year, get to know your neighbors, and spend time with friends and family members. I personally want to thank the Bloomingdale community for the warm welcome. Not a week has gone by that someone has not come up and said thank you for all that you do. In most cases, three or four times a week, I get to hear positive feedback from the community. Also thank you for the holiday cookies that were sent to the office.

## **AREA LAW AND ORDER**

Between Nov. 21 and Dec. 19, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 49 traffic stops in Bloomingdale East and Bloomingdale West. Those traffic stops resulted in seven verbal warnings, 38 written warnings, five citations and one arrest.

At community entrances and within subdivisions, there were two crashes with injuries, six without injuries and two hit and run where one of those resulted in property damage. There was also one DUI, which is one too many! Do not get behind the wheel if you have been drinking as the results can be devastating to more than just you!

Remember to slow down, stop at all stop signs and above all be a courteous driver. And, wear your seat belt at all times.

There was only one vehicle burglary and two residential burglaries. There were also two drug law violations and 12 arrests for various crimes in the Bloomingdale area between Nov. 21 and Dec.19.



### **BE ON THE LOOKOUT!**

Remember to watch out for what is happening in your neighborhoods. If you see something, make sure to call Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office Non-Emergency number at 813-247-8200.

Remember to lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors, secure your guns and lock up your vehicles. This will significantly reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim.

### **GETTING INVOLVED**

The deputies at the Sheriff's Office strive to provide Bloomingdale and surrounding areas with a safer place to live and raise our families. That is our reason for being here – to make your lives safer and provide a more secure place to live.

We work directly with concerned residents through groups like the Bloomingdale Area Community Council (BACC). You are invited to attend our monthly meeting as a representative for your neighborhood. Our meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month: this month's meeting is Jan. 18 at 7 p.m. This group works directly with the HCSO to identify community concerns and to find solutions to all types of problems. Interested residents can call the Bloomingdale Community Station at 635-8040, or come by the station located at 3622 Erindale Drive.

# VOLUNTEER CITIZEN PATROL PROGRAM (VCPP)

We can use your help. We are working to expand the number of residents serving on the Sheriff's Volunteer Citizens Patrol Program (VCPP). Residents interested in helping make Bloomingdale a safer and more secure community can contact the Sheriff's



Community Outreach Division at 813-247-8115 for information on this outstanding program.

"The VCPP is based on the concept of utilizing the talents and skills of volunteers from within the local community as partners in public safety. Citizen patrol volunteers are specially trained by the Sheriff's Office to respond to many non-emergency and routine calls for service that do not require law enforcement or regulatory authority.

The VCPP was created to reduce crime, improve the safety of our citizens, improve the quality of life within Hillsborough County and allow community members to become active participants in the process of crime control and prevention.

Volunteers donate their time to patrol while driving specially marked Sheriff's Office vehicles. Volunteers receive training in areas such as crime prevention, firstaid, traffic control, and community policing. The VCPP consists of three shifts per day, patrolling up until midnight, seven days a week. Each VCPP vehicle will patrol with two volunteers per shift."

# **Mini-Grant Awarded for Replacement Entry Signs**

The Trustees start 2018 with the announcement that the District was awarded a Neighborhood Mini-Grant for \$2,500 from the Hillsborough County Office of Neighborhood Relations! The Trustees applied for the grant in August with the specific goal of replacing the Bloomingdale signs at the entrance to the community at Bloomingdale Avenue and Culbreath Road. These signs were removed during construction at that intersection in 2016. Keep reading this column for updates on the new signs and ribbon cutting ceremony planned for the community once the project is completed!

# 2018 Tax Referendum

Also in 2018, the Trustees plan to have a tax assessment increase referendum on the ballot in August. The proposed increase is set at \$40, which will increase the current assessment of \$130 to \$170 annually.

So why the increase? Simple. The Bloomingdale infrastructure is aging, and in many sections, is over 30 years old. The costs of maintaining our beautiful community have increased significantly over the last 10 years—the last time the assessment was increased was in 2006. Key increases have occurred in landscape maintenance, property management fees, irrigation repair, and plant replacement.

Already in Fiscal Year 2018 (FY18) the District has earmarked \$28,195 in wall repairs (with a budget of only \$5,000 for the fiscal year) deemed necessary because of safety issues. Last fall, \$26,302 was spent on planting and replacing the creeping fig that lines the walls of our community. In addition, an electrical inspection and resulting repairs of irrigation pumps and timers cost \$3,000. And with the pending increased maintenance that will come with the completed Bell Shoals Road widening project, the Trustees find it necessary to ask for the increase.



On Thanksgiving Day, a large hole literally stopped traffic on Natures Way. This was the second pipe issue to occur in the same area; the other pipe repair took place in April. Both issues occurred due to pipe collapses in the sewer drain lines. This month, the temporary repair on the second collapse will be reopened and a permanent fix installed.

Also in November, a Tampa Bay Times article highlighted speeding issues on Natures Way. Between 2013 and 2017, County, at the BHA's request, has conducted three traffic studies on Natures Way and one on Canoga Park Drive. 
# **Florida's Aquifers and Irrigation Maintenance**

Paula Staples, UF/IFAS Extension Hillsborough County Public Education Program Coordinator

If you want to learn how Florida's aquifers were formed, view this video titled Florida's Aquifers – The Treasure Below at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=O6A5AZ-yveA. You'll see it takes a long time to create an aquifer and store fresh, potable water.

Fifty percent of water withdrawn from Florida's aquifers is for lawn watering. Use a mild winter day to "wet walk" your turfgrass and look for easily, correctable maintenance issues. As a Hillsborough County resident, you are allowed to turn your irrigation system on any day or time, once a week, as long as there is an attendant outside. Each zone can be run for ten minutes to find and correct irrigation inefficiencies. Use this time to clean filters, adjust nozzle arcs, raise sunken spray heads and make sure they are upright and spraying on pervious surfaces.

Managing your irrigation system saves water for the future. Making sure the system is applying water efficiently makes good economic sense as well.

# HOW TO PROTECT YOUR PLANTS FROM FREEZING


Even in Florida, a freeze is possible. Most of us don't think about it until it's almost too late. Last week's cold weather made many residents worry about the weather's impact on their plants.

Our area, zone 9b, averages annual extreme minimum temperatures of 25 to 30 degrees. A Frost Advisory can be issued when temperature is expected to fall to 36 degrees down to about 32 degrees. A Freeze Warning is issued when there is at least an 80 percent chance that the temperature will hit 32 degrees or lower. Finally, a Hard Freeze occurs when the temperature falls below 28 degrees.

Now that cooler weather is here, it's best to relocate potted plants closer to your home or bring them indoors (house or garage) when a freeze is forecast. For plants in the ground, keep a supply of fabric, old bed sheets, quilts, burlap, or plant coverings that can be purchased at local nurseries. After draping plants, use rocks or bricks to hold the coverings in place.



I have even used leftover plastic drop cloths with no damaging side effects. I recommend



only using it to cover plants that

are not in direct sunlight. Also, don't leave coverings on all day. Condensation can build up and freeze under the covering, which will damage the plant.

Protect the base of your plants with mulch, leaves, hay, or even pine needles...remember to clear the area during the spring as the pH of your soil can affect plant growth and health. Watering early in the day warms the soil and helps the plant survive the cold.

Don't fret if you notice some damage to your plants after a freeze (leaves turing brown, or shedding) and avoid the impulse to prune them. Those brown leaves will help protect the interior of the plant from future freezes.

# What can I do in the tee box...?

I always ask my students two questions about the tee box. What is the playing area of the tee box? And, if during your waggle, you knock the ball off the tee does it count?

The first answer is a tee box consists of the leading and side edges of the tee markers going back two club lengths (driver). Any ball hit that is teed up outside the marker has to be rehit with a two-stroke penalty.

The second answer is in the tee box, a waggle isn't considered striking the ball and the ball is re-teed. Outside of the tee box, the ball is considered in play and having moved the ball while waggling is a stroke penalty.



# **Growing Cimino's Character Programs**

For years, Cimino Elementary School has prided itself not only on its academic success, but also building core values such as respect, honesty, and patience. In fact, it's been designated a "National School of Character" by the Character Education Partnership since 2012.

Cimino's character building programs are the result of teamwork and Principal Joanne Griffiths is "thrilled to support the work that has been an ongoing effort at Cimino."

Perseverance and Honesty. Students have always logged 30 minutes of nightly reading. Griffiths recently created "10,000 Hours of Reading" which is based on the premise that if you practice a skill for 10,000 hours, you will master it. She explained, "Our goal is to promote the importance of reading by challenging our students to collectively read for 10,000 hours this school year." Griffiths also implemented a new program called "Reading with Hope." Hope is a service dog that visits the media center weekly for students who need reading intervention.

Respect and Gratitude. The Great American Teach-In allows parents and community volunteers to come in once a year and share their careers with the students. Griffiths has expanded this program to be year-round and will include speakers connected to Florida's Standards that teach life skills. For example, a Master Gardner will help 5th graders better understand life-science.



# Art Students Give Back Through "The Memory Project"

Burns Middle School is bursting with talented art students who are donating their talents to create smiles around the world through The Memory Project.

In 2004, Ben Schumaker, an American college student volunteering in Guatemala, noticed that many underprivileged children had no special belongings to take with them into the future. 
