

November Board Meeting Highlights and Other Board News

The BHA celebrated the completion of a wildly successful Fall Festival at their new venue, Bloomingdale High School, and finalized plans for tomorrow's Santa Visit and Food Drive.

Elections were held with a change in Treasurer from Sean Donahue to Grace Lewis. Lewis will take the position in January.

Expansion plans were finalized. Expansion plans include business memberships and the inclusion of several neighborhoods. The executive board met on Nov. 29 to discuss the 2018 budget. The board will vote to approve the budget at the December board meeting.

Finally, Gena Torres from Hillsborough County's Vision Zero, attended the meeting and provided a summary of the program which aims to reduce traffic fatalities and serious injuries to zero. HOLIDAY GREETINGS FROM YOUR BLOOMINGDALE COMMUNITY STATION!

Thanksgiving has passed and Christmas and the New Year are just around the corner. Time marches on and our busy lives just keep getting busier.

Making our holiday seasons safe and secure can be as simple as following some basic rules. When you are away from home, enjoy the excitement of the season, but stay focused and aware of your surroundings.

Lock up your valuables. Remember, in just seconds, a thief can shatter your car window, reach inside and remove any valuables in the open. Predators will watch you stow your purse and other items. It doesn't always have be to holiday packages - it can be as simple as some old CDs or pocket change. Thieves also gain access to any personal information left in your car. Take a little extra time to protect your car and then, enjoy the holidays with your family.


We also need your help to lower crime potential in our neighborhoods. You can help by closing your garage doors when you are not present. Do not think for one minute that predators will pass up your offer for free stuff from your garage and car if you just leave it open.

Just a few days before Thanksgiving around 1 a.m., an attempted burglary call came in on Culbreath near Erindale. With extra deputies and an Air Service chopper being in the area, one arrest was made for drug-related crimes. However, deputies also found several garage doors open around the same time in a nearby neighborhood. Morale of the story - if you are going to make it easy for criminals, they will take advantage of your generosity.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Another way you can help is by starting a neighborhood watch group. Deputies cannot be everywhere at all times. They may not even notice a car or truck that does not belong in your neighborhood. However, those who live in the community will know if strangers are in the area. Neighborhood Watch Programs are a great help to the Sheriff's Office. There have been many cases where good neighbors reporting unusual activities have been instrumental in catching criminals.

To be effective, a Neighborhood Watch



simply needs an alert group of people willing to call the Sheriff's Office when a crime or suspicious activity is observed. Being an alert group will send a message to strangers in your neighborhood that your community watches out for one another. AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between Oct. 18 and Nov. 20, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 63 traffic stops in Bloomingdale East and West. Those traffic stops resulted in 12 verbal warnings, 34 written warnings, 16 citations and one arrest.

At community entrances and within subdivisions, there were four crashes without injuries, one crash with injuries and a hit and run, which resulted in property damage. There were no DUI's'...let's keep it that way! Do not get behind the wheel if you have been drinking as the results can be devastating to more than just you!

Remember, slow down, stop at all stop signs and above all be a courteous driver. And, wear your seat belts at all times.

There were 11 vehicle burglaries, only two were locked. Let's be more diligent in protecting our property. The bad news is that one of those vehicles had firearms that were stolen. There were two residential burglaries. There were also two drug law violations and nine arrests for various crimes in the area.

BE ON THE LOOKOUT!

Remember to watch out for what is happening in your neighborhoods. If you see something, make sure to call Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office Non-Emergency number at 813-247-8200.

Remember to lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors, secure your guns and lock up your vehicles. This will significantly reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim.

District-Wide Landscape Improvements

At the direction of the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD) Trustees, landscape maintenance contractor Buccaneer has undertaken several large projects throughout the District during the fall months.

- The fall annuals rotation has been completed, bringing fall color to community entranceways.
- Mulching has been completed.
- Oak trees and palm trees have been trimmed.
- · Creeping fig on the walls that line the thoroughfares has been trimmed.
- Roses have been hard-pruned to re-establish full blooming.
- Landscape modifications to remove old plants and install new ones to fill in medians and other beds are in the planning stages.

While most of the items fall under the landscape maintenance contract, additional landscape modifications will cost approximately \$6,000. This investment is in addition to the \$26,000 invested in fig planting, and \$11,000 invested in landscape replacements that took place in August and September.

Bloomingdale residents, as always, are invited to attend the next BSTD meeting on Dec. 11 at 6:30 p.m. at the Bloomingdale Community Offices, 3509 Bell Shoals Road. iFLY Will Blow You Away

With air soaring through a vertical chamber and speeds averaging 100 mph, you fall from a doorway and drop into a tunnel only to be propelled back up and into your first flight. The wind pushes your body upward as you attempt to correct yourself into the perfect flying position. You watch for the hand signals from your Instructor who is in the tunnel with you. Straighten the legs, chin up, and finally, thumbs up! You're flying!

iFLY is an indoor skydiving experience for ages 3 - 103. On check-in, you receive flight training, suit up and then you wait for your moment. Your group takes turns "falling" into the chamber to fly.

Customer Service Representative Kylie Rhoads said, "It [iFly] is not to be missed. You get to experience the thrill of flight, something that most of us have wanted to do since childhood."

A typical package consists of two separate one-minute sessions and an option of a "high flight" which is well-worth it because your instructor flies you to the top of the tunnel and back down again. Flight photos and videos are also available for purchase. Packages vary but average \$60 for 2 one-minute sessions. Discounts are available at some retailers like Costco.

The indoor skydiving experience is not only a great time for family and friends, but it also helps those with fears of flying. Flight Instructor Drew Hansen said, "My favorite experience as a Flight Instructor is seeing someone who may be timid or slightly apprehensive about flying, confront their fear and realize the bliss that exists outside of one's comfort zone. They light up!"



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

From Natures Way to 'Raceway:' Residents Worry About Speeding on Neighborhood Boulevard

It's a sound that many residents living along Natures Way Boulevard say is all too familiar.

Engines revving and then the sound of motorcycles and cars flooring the gas pedal on a 30-mile-per-hour roadway often wake up residents in the middle of the night.

The theory, according to some residents and homeowner association presidents, is the practice is an attempt to light up the road's flashing signs with the highest speed possible, although a Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman said deputies had never heard of the situation or any other complaints about speeders.

The two flashing speed signs are located at each end of Natures Way Boulevard.

"It's a game with the kids. It's been going on for years," said Kit Werremeyer, president of the Bloomingdale Village Homeowner's Association.

But for the people who live in the neighborhoods along the 3-mile road that loops off of Culbreath Road, there's no game.

"Almost every night, between 9:30 and 11 p.m., some people (are) on racing motorcycles with loud exhaust, speed and race up and down the road at very dangerously high speeds. It wakes us up, is annoying and dangerous," said Cheryl Hill of Cypress Reserve.

Since 2012, there have been 90 crashes, two fatal, on Natures Way Boulevard, according to Debbie Carter, the sheriff's office community relations coordinator. Twelve of those crashes happened this year.

One of the most memorable crashes among residents happened in 2010 when Nicole Petracci was killed on Nov. 10 after the 2007 Chevrolet HD 3500 pickup truck in which she was a passenger left the road and slammed into a tree on Natures Way Boulevard, north of Havenstone Way. In 2011, law enforcement charged a 20-year-old Brandon man with vehicular manslaughter in the case, saying speed was a factor in the crash.

But it's not just at night that the engines start revving.

"There's also a problem during the day as well," said Teresa Capps of River Crossing. "I'm a daily runner and on most occasions feel pretty certain that they are not doing 30 mph. There's also a large number of walls, trees and property damage that seems to reoccur due to the crashes. I have seen some patrolling of the area but not enough to contribute to a possible solution."

One of the two biggest complaints the Bloomindale Homeowners Association receives each week concerns speeding on the road, according to George May, president of the association.

"We've been working on it for months," May said. "We've had a proposal into the county to try and solve the problem, but it would be something that would be a tremendous change for Natures Way Boulevard."

Proposals have included constructing traffic circles at the intersections of Greenhaven Drive and Greenhollow Lane and taking the small section of road that converts into two-lanes down to one lane and install bike lanes.

"The whole point is how do you slow down the traffic?" May said. "If the road is a one-lane road and the person in front of you is going 30 mph, there's nowhere to pass. You'll have to do 30 mph."

Other residents suggested simply taking the "game" for motorists out of the equation.

"They should just change the signs from displaying numeric speed to flash 'reduce speed' only when over limit," said Ryan O'Laughlin, who lives in The Greens community.

May said he has noticed there's been a lot more wrecks on the road since Hillsborough County Public Schools started the new school year. Two elementary schools, Cimino and Alafia, sit on each end of the road.

"Take a walk down the road and you'll notice the nicks and the bark missing off many of the trees," May said.

Rosemarie Hope, of the Augusta Village/Stratford Trace community, said she called the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office as early as two weeks ago to complain about the speeders. She said she was told there are not enough deputies to patrol the area.

Werremeyer said he's also spoken to deputies on several occasions about the problem, but received the same answer.

"The cops told me they could sit out there and write tickets 24 hours a day," he said.

Dennice Vogel, who's lived in the Spring Lake community since 2013, said she also has noticed that the speeding is getting worse.

"Sadly, the vast majority of drivers around Natures Way are not responsible drivers and I even get tailgated, honked at or shown the middle finger if I drive the speed limit," Vogel said.

May said he expects the problem to get worse as construction work begins early next year on nearby Bell Shoals Road and build-out into the area continues.

"We've got a problem coming. A big one. And, we've got to do something about it," he said.

Car-Sized Hole from Broken Water Pipe Closes Road in Valrico

A large hole that opened in Valrico's Bloomingdale neighborhood on Thanksgiving Day was caused by a broken water pipe, not a sinkhole, county officials said.

The hole swallowed a Mini Cooper-sized chunk of Natures Way Boulevard, at the Elm Grove Lane entrance to the Spring Lake neighborhood, just before 7 p.m. on Thursday.

Hillsborough County spokeswoman Ana Mendez said the break was the result of a "system failure." No homes or sewer lines were affected, and no boil-water advisories have been issued, she said. Hillsborough County Road Maintenance crews evaluated the hole Thursday night and, as of this afternoon, there are no signs it could grow larger, Mendez said.

Maintenance workers are working to repair the hole, which has blocked most of the heavily traveled thoroughfare. Until then, Natures Way Boulevard will remain closed from Eastridge Drive to Moondale Court.

Local motorists driving through the neighborhood should be mindful of additional barricades, directional signs and detour roads, Mendez said.

Hillsborough County has contracted an outside agency to handle the large repair. An evaluation is ongoing. It is unknown at this time if the new repair is related to an April repair at this same location. The April repair was caused by an 8" gravity main collapse. The gravity main was about 12 ft. deep. Pavement was removed and well points were installed to dewater the dig site. Repairs took approximately two weeks. This time, it will take 3-7 days just to clear the hole of mud and water and for the area to dry. Once dry, a camera will be inserted to find the break location. Worst case scenario- the manhole could be involved which would cause a longer repair time, possibly through December. The area water supply is not affected as this is a wastewater system failure. Monitor the BHA Facebook page for updates.)

For your information: on April 21, an emergency repair was begun at this same location due to an 8" gravity main collapse. The gravity main was about 12 ft. deep. Pavement was removed and well points were installed to dewater the dig site. Repairs took approximately two weeks. Monitor the BHA Facebook page for updates on the current situation.)

Bloomingdale Veteran Receives Operation Code Vet Assistance





The catch-can test is the best calibration method to check that your irrigation controller/time clock is applying the correct amount of water, uniformly, to your turfgrass. Your sprinkler system should be calibrated yearly to apply ½ - ¾" of water on turfgrass during each watering event.

Pick a great fall day to get motivated and do the catch can test for each zone. At the very least, do the front yard zone. Follow the catch can directions from this link http://miami-dade.ifas.ufl.edu/pdfs/fyn/Catch_Can_Test_for_Irrigation.pdf.

Remember, your calibration is not complete until the minutes for each zone are adjusted to apply ½ to ¾ inch of water.

An irrigation system evaluation can reduce high water bills if an inefficient sprinkler system is watering your yard. To see if you qualify for a free evaluation that could save you money, call 813-744-5519 Ext. 54142. FLORIDA INVASIVE PLANTS: PART 2 - PLANTS IN OUR COMMUNITY By Gwen Graverson

In a previous column, I discussed invasive plants in general and whether or not it is a problem we should be worried about. This article takes a look at three plants in our community considered invasive – the Chinese Tallow tree, Brazilian Pepper and mistletoe.

If you spot a tree that has seeds that look like popcorn, you have just discovered the invasive Chinese Tallow tree. Other common names include popcorn tree, chicken tree and Florida aspen. First introduced into the US from China as an ornamental tree in the 1700's, this tree ranges throughout the south and as far away as California.

The tree matures within 3 to 5 years, remains productive for 100 years and produces up to 100,000 seeds annually, which spread by wind, water, and birds. The US Department of Agriculture has an online plant guide that reads in part, "The ability of this species to drastically modify natural landscapes has earned it a spot on The Nature Conservancy's list of "America's Least Wanted -The Dirty Dozen." In addition, this plant has toxic properties. Contact with the milky sap can cause dermatitis, and ingestion causes gastrointestinal side effects.

In our community, the prolific grower has been spotted on Bell Grande in Fairway Park.

Another invasive plant, this one spotted on the Bloomingdale Golf course, is a scrub-like tree with red berries known to many as the Brazilian Pepper. Other common names include the Florida Holly, Christmas Berry and Pepper tree. According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission website: MyFWC.com, "possession of said plants with the intent to sell, transport or plant is illegal in Florida." You would need a special permit to grow a Brazilian pepper plant here in Florida.

A native plant of South America, it was introduced into the US in the 1800's as an ornamental. It readily invades residential and urban landscapes, roadsides, ditches, fallow farmland; and also hardwood hammocks, mangrove forests, and pinelands. The Brazilian Pepper is a relative of poison ivy and poison sumac. The sap may irritate skin and pollen may cause respiratory irritation. Since other shrubs may look similar, you can identify it by crushing several leaves...if they smell like turpentine, the plant is a Brazilian pepper.

Finally, mistletoe. Look up in your trees, particularly laurel oaks. If you see large clumps, different in color from the host tree, most likely it is an invasive weed known as mistletoe. It is a parasite, which starts off as a small seedling, roots into the bark/wood of a tree and absorbs both water and mineral nutrients from the host tree. Poison Control states on its website, "American mistletoe doesn't deserve its highly toxic reputation...but, as with any plant, keep it out of reach of curious children and pets! If you think someone might have swallowed mistletoe, call Poison Control right away at 1-800-222-1222." Mistletoe has been spotted throughout our community.



Lateral Water Hazards - Go Back as Far as You Want

When most of us lose a ball in a lateral water hazard, we simply drop another ball within two club lengths of where the ball last crossed the hazard margin. Most of the time when you drop the ball that way; it will end up on a bad lie - in the rough or a side hill lie. Both of these shots require you to make adjustments in set-up and club selection.

There are two additional options added to a ball lost in a lateral water hazard. The one I'm writing about is the option of dropping the ball on a line, going as far back as you want.

Simply, keep the point of where the ball last crossed the hazard and the flag and imagine a straight line between the two points. Your goal is to find a spot along the extended line which gives you a flat area of the fairway and a yardage you are comfortable with.


