Bloomingdale Real Estate Update





Neighborhood Standards Update

Staff Report

Code Enforcement Sweeps Through Bloomingdale

The county code enforcement department at the request of the BHA performed a sweep of the community's non-mandated neighborhoods on Feb. 16. The goal of the event was to inform, educate, warn and/or cite residents found to be violating county code ordinances and reinforce new enforceable neighborhood standards based strictly on those ordinances.

Neighborhood Standards Committee member Charles Woodcock said, "The goal of the sweep program is to regain and maintain the quality of life in the Bloomingdale area. By enforcing these standards, property values will improve and continue to keep our community a highly desirable place to live and raise our families."

To that end, Bloomingdale's assigned code officer Christine Zien-McCombs and 10 other officers canvassed the community for several hours, spoke with more than 100 residents about the county code enforcement program, issued warnings to several and wrote citations for more serious offenses. BHA board members rode with the officers and provided administrative support during the event.

One of the program goals was to establish a positive rapport with residents. "Programs like this give residents a clearer understanding of the Code Enforcement mission," said Code Officer Zien-McCombs. "We are not the enemy but rather an entity that wants to see Bloomingdale thrive." To that end, officers will recheck violators this month and additional "sweeps" will continue throughout the year.

The partnership between the BHA and the code enforcement department is a strong one. When asked to take on this project by the BHA, Code Enforcement Supervisor David Cansler readily agreed. "This tactic allows us to serve the community as a whole and better educate residents on a large-scale in a relatively short amount of time," Cansler explained. "Working together with the BHA, we can help the community maintain the quality of the life that the Association and its members want and expect."

AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between Jan. 21 and Feb. 22, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 127 traffic stops in the Bloomingdale and surrounding area known as J04 Zone. This large area includes the Bloomingdale area down to Lithia area. In Bloomingdale, there were two traffic crashes without injuries and one fatality involving a motorcycle, all preventable. Slow down, be a courteous driver and always watch out for motorcycles.

There was also one residential burglary. While this is great news, there is always room for improvement since the one burglary was due to a garage door left open! Two auto burglaries were reported. Of the two burglaries, one actually occurred outside our area, but was reported here and the other was due to another unlocked door.

We are still seeing a very large number of vehicle burglaries in the local area. In most cases, we find that the burglarized vehicles were left unlocked. Be vigilant, remember to lock your vehicles and report any suspicious persons walking around late at night with no purpose.

With aging wells as the source of Bloomingdale's water supply for irrigation, rust stains are a constant concern. Walls, sidewalks, utility boxes, and neighborhood entrances are the most obvious areas and can diminish the appearance of the community if not maintained.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTED TO FIXING BLOOMINGDALE SIDEWALKS!

As previously reported in the February Bloomingdale Gazette, Hillsborough County Commissioner Stacy White attended the Jan. 9 meeting of the BSTD Board of Trustees. At that meeting, Commissioner White committed to get right to work on the issue of unsafe sidewalks in Bloomingdale, and explore creative options for finding funding to fix the most critical areas. White further committed to working with the Risk Management department immediately to find a way to correct those areas that pose the greatest safety issues.

On Feb. 1, the Board of County Commissioners passed Option 3 of the County Transportation Work Plan that includes \$1,000,000 for the Public Works Department to repair the sidewalks over a 3-year period beginning in Fiscal Year 2018. A workshop to discuss the plan was held on Feb. 22, and a public hearing was held March 1. Commissioner White has requested that our sidewalks be put at the top of the repair list!


Many of these principles are used as part of the landscape evaluation process



Bending from the hips...

When we say you need to bend over to two o'clock or 45 degrees, how you bend over is critical to an efficient swing. By efficient, I mean a consistent and pain free swing getting your club head back to the ball.

Most amateurs bend from the waist (stomach-blue line) which causes your back to round out. Bending from your hips (shown by the red line) will cause your belt line to angle upwards (45 degrees) and enable you to have a straight or flat back (yellow line).

When your posture is aligned correctly, this allows your body to rotate around your spine more efficiently and pain free. This will help you play through 18 holes of golf without popping Aleve on the back nine.



Garden in a Terrarium...Small Wonders By Ramona Pettigrew and Gwen Graverson



Get a fresh view of nature with a terrarium. Terrarium gardening simply means growing plants in a glass container either closed or open. Terrariums create a snug self-containing environment for small plants such as ferns, strawberry begonias, pilea and mosses. Best of all, the plants flourish under glass with little care.

These charming plantscapes will be the smallest and simplest garden you will ever care for. When a garden is enclosed in glass, condensation forms, water droplets flow down into the soil, reducing the need to water. Choose dwarf plants that will tolerate high moisture, and low light. Glass container styles range from closed (as mentioned above, or one with a lid) to open; from small fish bowls to large fish tanks. Note: The opening should be large enough to put your hand in to plant your garden. One such terrarium is a glass cloche (enclosed terrarium).

First, select a container and decide if it will be open or closed. Then, look for plants at your local nursery or even in your backyard. A few great choices are ferns, aloe vera, snake plants (also known as mother-in-law's tongue) or possibly spineless prickly pear cactus.

Second, prepare your container for planting. Add an inch of rocks or gravel at the bottom, and then add a thin layer of charcoal to help keep your garden fresh and free from mold. Next, add potting soil and, depending on the garden theme, you may need specific soil, such as cactus potting soil for cacti or succulent plants. You can also find potting soil recipes online. Ferns and mosses do well in regular potting soil.

After adding the soil, the glass container should be about a third full. Start putting the plants in with the largest one first for positioning and providing room for others. Don't fret about empty spaces, add a small piece of driftwood or branch to your glass garden.

Finally, step back and enjoy your small wonder.

There are pros and cons regarding all phases of terrarium gardening from choosing the right plants to watering. Here's where experimenting and trial and error comes into play. Pinterest.com has quite a few "how-to" examples for air plant terrariums, and the VGC has posted an interesting article on a nearly 60-year-old terrarium as well as a "how to" video on their FB page.



Alafia Elementary School is bursting at the seams with military pride. Not only do they have an exclusive club, USS Alafia, for students of military families, but they also educate their students about our local heroes. This year, the school and USS Alafia have chosen to support Homes for Our Troops, a non-profit, that builds custom adaptive homes for veterans with life-altering injuries.

The driving force behind USS Alafia is Andrea Carver, the school's guidance counselor. 15 years ago, she noticed an influx of students with one or both parents in the military. These students have challenges that are unique to military families - frequent moves, adjusting to new schools, and the deployments of one or both

parents. Carver saw an opportunity to form a club that could meet those needs and thus USS Alafia was born. Today, USS Alafia has 60 members.

Addison Moore, a USS Alafia member, has a deeply personal connection to this year's fundraising effort. Her dad, Army Sgt. Carl W. Moore, III, was injured in Afghanistan and is partially paralyzed and wheelchair bound.

Their family is in the process of having a home built through Homes for Our Troops. The home will be adapted to meet the needs of Sgt. Moore including wider doorframes, bigger rooms, safety rails, and lower cabinets and cooking surfaces in the kitchen.

Addison is very excited to have a modified kitchen for her dad because, "He makes the best scrambled eggs."

Multiple fundraisers will be held to help with the cost of this home. One of the first fundraisers was yesterday at Alafia Elementary School's Spring Fling where the goal was to raise \$2,500.
