

💐 Are you Ready for Storm Season?

Less than a year since Hurricane Irma, residents are reminded to Have a Disaster Plan and Stay Informed. June 1 starts the official hurricane season; now is the time to check evacuation zones, develop a plan and build a supply kit, secure homes and businesses, and stay informed by signing up for real-time emergency alerts. Hurricane seasons runs through Nov. 30 and will be at its peak from mid-August to late October.

Here are nine tips every Hillsborough County resident should keep in mind when preparing a hurricane safety plan or checklist for their families, homes, and businesses:

1. Have a plan. Share your efforts with family members.

2. Register for alerts: HCFL Alert (http://hcflgov.net/residents/public-safety/emergency-management/hcfl-alert) is Hillsborough County's official mass notification system.

3. Know your evacuation zone: The Hurricane Evacuation Assessment Tool (HEAT) can tell you if you are in one of the five evacuation zones.

4. Pack an evacuation kit: Include, at least, water, food, medication, personal hygiene items, important papers, clothing and footwear, blankets or sleeping bags, a battery-powered radio and flashlight, a first-aid kit, and cash.

5. Prepare your pets: know where pet evacuation shelters are located and make sure you bring necessary supplies for your pet, including a pet carrier, food, medications, and proof of current rabies vaccination and registration tag.

6. Register for Special Needs Disaster Assistance: Residents with special needs, seniors, and those without transportation can register for Hillsborough County programs in place to help these individuals prepare and find safe shelter and transportation.



7. Get your property storm-ready.

8. Help your business weather the storm: Protect your business by taking advantage of nocost expert consultation form the Florida SBDC at Hillsborough County.

9. Stay Informed: Follow Hillsborough County's official social media accounts on Facebook and Twitter. Hillsborough County residents who use Nextdoor are encouraged to review their email, text message, and urgent alerts notification settings within the app to ensure they receive important weather-related messages.

They're Baaaaaack!! Signs are Up at Bloomingdale and Culbreath!

The beloved *Bloomingdale* signs at the Bloomingdale Avenue and Culbreath Road entrance to the community are back! After more than 2 years the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD) has re-installed the signs that were removed during that intersection's construction in 2016 thanks, in part, to a mini-grant awarded to the District by the Hillsborough County Office of Neighborhood Relations.

Over the last 2 years, the District has received numerous inquiries about the signs from residents who expressed concern over the loss of "identity" for the community. The District will hold a ribbon-cutting to celebrate the signs' return once re-landscaping and planting is completed.

Signs throughout Bloomingdale play a large role in the community's distinct look. Recently, the *Bloomingdale Ridge* AND *Bloomingdale Directory* signs at the intersection of Culbreath Road and Erindale Drive were vandalized. The cost of replacing just one sign - \$2,325. That is money that comes directly from your tax assessment dollars.

Speaking of your tax assessment ... the increase proposed in the Referendum that will appear on the August 28 Primary Election ballot will not only enable the BSTD to continue to repair and replace damaged signs but will allow aging signs to be repainted and refurbished in order to keep the community looking beautiful.

Within days of each other, the Bloomingdale Ridge AND Bloomingdale Directory signs were vandalized at Culbreath Road and Erindale Drive. This kind of vandalism costs residents thousands of dollars in tax money and puts an additional burden on the budget of the BSTD.

Continued sign maintenance and so much more—43 acres of mowing and landscaping, 17 miles of irrigation systems, trimming of 1,200 oak and palm trees, maintenance of trash and Dog-I-Pots, maintenance of entrance lighting, electric, and flag poles—are all at stake with the August Referendum.

With an increase, equal to just \$3.33 more per month per residence, the BSTD will not only be able to continue its current level of maintenance but also:

- ✓ Display holiday lights and decorations once again (approximately \$8,000 annually).
- Contract with off-duty Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office deputies to patrol our streets and provide additional security (approximately \$35,000 annually for 60 hours of extra patrols each month).
- ✓ Replace aging and deteriorated walls (approximately \$9,000 per 30 linear feet).
- Upgrade aging irrigation and wells, as well as landscaping, signs, and lighting (currently, cost estimates for landscape replacements for natural attrition and freeze damage alone is \$28,842 for this current fiscal year).
- ✓ Maintain new medians to be installed during the Bell Shoals Road widening project (approximately \$36,000 annually).
- Implement a new, comprehensive tree maintenance plan for our most-valued asset that will not only enhance the look of the community but will, over time, save annual tree-trimming costs (cost to be determined).

Questions about the tax assessment and need for an increase? The BSTD invites residents to attend the upcoming Fiscal Year 2019 Budget Public Hearing on June 11, 2018, at 6:15 p.m., at the Bloomingdale Community Offices, 3509 Bell Shoals Road. This is your opportunity to see the proposed budget and the impact the increased costs of maintaining an aging community have. Members of the public are allotted 3 minutes to make comment or ask questions per District policy. Hope to see you there!

Around the Tampa Bay area, many organizations dedicated to helping animals have sprung up over the past several years. 4 Lucky Dogs Pet Rescue, a pet rescue committed to "providing compassionate support services for the abandoned, abused, neglected and suffering, as well as those left behind in kill shelters" is one such organization.

Seeing so many Tampa dogs dying in shelters was the inspiration behind the organization according to 4 Lucky Dogs founder Robin Marsh. "My partners and I had been involved in various rescues and we wanted to start our own rescue with our own philosophy," she explained. Their goals include taking a little more time with dogs, specializing in herding/working dogs and dogs that need mental stimulation. Ultimately, they want to find the "best fit" for their rescues in a new home based on their mission to "RESCUE, REHAB, REHOME, REPEAT."

One particular dog, Sammie Girl, has a particularly fascinating story. She arrived at 4 Lucky Dogs with a lump the size of a grapefruit that required medical attention. She is about to have her third surgery and the organization is actively looking to find her a loving home.

Founded in 2016, the rescue has made a significant impact on the community in just a few short years hosting numerous rescue events weekly. Their newest community partnership is with Bullfrog Creek Brewing Company at 3632 Erindale Dr. on most Thursdays. Yappy Hour Thursdays is a pet-friendly venue where dog owners can enjoy social interaction with other owners and their pets.

On May 10, Hillsborough County Sheriff Chad Chronister and Hillsborough County Public Schools Superintendent Jeff Eakins announced the school security plan for our schools. New state laws require an armed, trained, individual on every school campus during the school day beginning in the 2018-2019 school year. In middle and high schools: you will continue to see a school resource deputy or officer from the Sheriff's office or Tampa Police Department. Starting new this fall, there will be an armed school security officer at every elementary school.

Hillsborough County Public Schools has had school security officers in our schools for 49 years. We are expanding that security team, to place one officer at every elementary school. Two-thirds of our district's current security officers are current or former law enforcement officers and one-third are current or former military service members.

"I'm confident the district's security officers are ready for this responsibility, because they have already been handling that role very well for years," said Sheriff Chad Chronister. "I can say, from first-hand experience, these school security officers work well with our law enforcement agency. Our relationship with Hillsborough School Security is almost half a century strong. They are professionals and this is the right solution for Hillsborough County."

Unfortunately, at this time, the School District does not have enough officers

To get there, the school district will be expanding their security team but it is going to take some time. HCSO will fill in the gaps where there are currently not enough officers until school security officers can be hired and trained. As the new officers come on board, those HCSO personnel will be replaced.

Needing to find 61 deputies almost overnight presents some challenges. In an effort to minimize the impact on our duties and service to the community, we are hiring certified law enforcement personnel on a contract basis for the school year to serve as newly formed School Security Deputies. These new positions will help minimize taking current Deputies out of the field. We anticipate the hand-off from law enforcement officer to Hillsborough Schools Security should take approximately two years.

Area Law and Order

Between April 12 and May 12, Deputies responded to 620 calls in the Bloomingdale area. Many of these calls were self-generated, and not all were criminal reports. Some of the calls were traffic stops, civil issues and disturbances. Natures Way and Culbreath Road continues to have issues with traffic crashes. Slow down, Bloomingdale! There were 12 arrests for DUI, Hit and Run, Road Rage, Warrants, and one Burglary charge. HCSO conducted 35 traffic stops with 10 citations written.

🝰 Local Schools Increase Security This Fall

By Wendy Knipp

In the wake of the recent school shootings, the State of Florida passed a law requiring each public school to have a trained and armed first-responder on campus each school day. Local schools will be affected.

Currently, elementary schools share a rotating School Security Officer (SSO) who already has an extensive background in safety. Superintendent Jeff Eakins says, "Two-thirds of our district's current security officers are current or former law enforcement officers and one-third are current or former military service members."

SSO training will now require at least 132 hours of active shooter response, crisis intervention and defensive tactics. Local schools welcome the changes and want all children to have a safe environment.

Cimino Elementary School Principal Joanne Griffiths said, "At Cimino, we remain focused on making safety our first priority. We continuously evaluate our procedures and take necessary steps to reinforce their effectiveness."

Each middle and high school already has a dedicated Hillsborough County School Resource Officer (SRO) onsite and that will remain the case. Master Deputy Roger Bradley is the SRO at Burns Middle School and he is confident that SROs will continue to keep our kids safe.

Bradley said, "Our number one goal is the safety of the students and staff on every campus in Hillsborough County. The Sheriff's office that I've worked for over the last 26-plus years has always been ahead, in my opinion, with training and preparedness. The new law will just ensure that even more."

According to HCPS, the State of Florida has increased our district's funding by approximately \$6 million to pay for the additional SSOs and supervisors. The initial cost will be about \$7 million for the first year and then \$5.3 million each year thereafter.

In today's age of electronics and social media, the end of year concerts were a breath of fresh air. Kudos to Director Neel for teaching a love of music these students will never forget.




