Hillsborough County's Pet Resource Center has the Right Pet for You



There has been a lot of recent county government activity that affects the Bloomingdale community.

I'm glad to see that plenty of road construction is under way. As frustrating as it is to deal with right now, I have no doubt that it will ease congestion in the area once completed. I am pleased to announce that I recently championed another \$1 million in impact fees from a nearby project to be spent on even more road improvements in the area!

After an arduous process with plenty of debate, the County Commission has decided to move forward

with a Tax Increment Finance (TIF) plan for transportation infrastructure improvements. I supported this plan and a close financial analysis tells me that it will allow the County Commission to plow approximately \$1 billion into our roads and other transportation needs over a 10 year period without raising your taxes! The analysis also shows that this can be done in such a way that other county services, such as parks, don't suffer.

Speaking of parks, I've received a lot of calls to the office asking if it's possible to have a dog park in the Bloomingdale community. In talking with county staff, it seems that there is a high likelihood that one of our existing parks in the Bloomingdale community can be partially retrofitted to accommodate a dog park component. I'll keep you posted on that!

Finally, I wish to thank all of the citizens that came out to my recent community office hours at Bloomingdale Library. I look forward to seeing you at future office hours or just out in the community in general.

INS & OUTS WHAT RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT HOME RAIN SENSORS...

Functioning Rain Sensors Conserve Water Paula Staples, UF/IFAS Extension Hillsborough County Public Education Program Coordinator

After sufficient rain has fallen, this important piece of irrigation equipment interrupts the electrical connection that turns your system on for the days and times you have selected on your irrigation controller. It prevents turf grass overwatering, which can stress turf grass and lead to disease.

The results of a University of Florida study reveal the cork-like disk inserts within the rain sensor fail after one to three years. These inserts can become moldy or begin to fall apart. This can prevent the individual disks from swelling, making them undetectable by the interrupt sensing switch.

As summer begins, check your rain sensor to make sure it is functioning. To inspect and test your rain sensor, you first need to locate it. The rain sensor is usually located along the roofline. If wired directly to the irrigation controller, it is often found on the outside wall of the irrigation controller that is typically installed inside the garage.

When located, turn on one of your irrigation zones. Select one that when on, is visible from the rain sensor location. Press the small button at the top of the rain sensor. The zone should turn off. After the release of the button, the zone should come back on and continue spraying water. If it does not, then your rain sensor is not working.

Repair or install a functioning rain sensor and save 2,541 gallons of water a year for every 1,000 square feet of pervious lawn and landscape area in your yard. If your monthly average water bill shows your household water consumption use at 15,000 gallons or more, call me at 813-744-5519 Ext. 54142, to see if a free irrigation evaluation will save you money and help conserve water for future use. THE COMMUNITY NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT: **BSTD TAX INCREASE SOUGHT**

Taxes - we all pay them. Did you know that every year Bloomingdale property owners pay a special tax of \$130 with their county property tax bills?



The tax, in place since 1986, has not increased in ten years. However, on Aug. 30, the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD) Board of Trustees is asking you, all Bloomingdale property owners, to rally and support the community with a "yes"

vote on a proposed special tax increase referendum on the upcoming primary ballot.

Should this referendum pass, property owners will see the increase reflected in their 2018 annual property tax bill under the ad valorem section. The referendum specifically requests a \$70 increase of the special tax from \$130 to \$200. The \$200 is a cap amount meaning that the board can raise the taxes all or just a portion of the \$70 increase. If the entire \$70 increase is not assessed to property owners immediately, the board will have flexibility to increase up to the cap in the future. Residents will be asked to voice their views on the specific amount of the tax increase at a future public meeting.

BSTD Chairman Dave West said, "The board is looking at assessing an increase of \$20.00 for fiscal year 2018 based on our current projections. We have asked for a \$70.00 cap to assist us in being able to replace and repair our aging infrastructure, which will include rebuilding our entrances once the Bell Shoals Road widening is finished."

The BSTD consists of seven elected trustees who one, are residents in the Bloomingdale community, and two, perform their management duties on an unpaid, strictly volunteer basis. Their job is to oversee the special tax funds, which are primarily allocated towards the maintenance of the community's common areas.

So why the increase? Simple - The Bloomingdale infrastructure is aging and in many sections is over 30 years old. The costs of maintaining our beautiful community have increased significantly over the last ten years. Key increases have occurred in landscape maintenance, property management fees, irrigation repair and plant replacement.

While funds have been adequate in the past, community needs are at a critical stage. Hence the request from the BSTD to you, our residents, to support the upcoming referendum. Should the referendum fail to pass, residents will see a decline in the community and in services the BSTD is able to provide now. Possible cuts include plant replacement, trash pickup and the ability to maintain our office hours which we have cut in half this year already.

The BSTD is aware of resident perceptions stemming from the change of landscape contractors last year. This unforeseen issue created a backlog of area maintenance from which the new contractor is still working to correct.

According to President West, the BSTD will be more open to resident suggestions on community enhancements and work to form and strengthen a bond with those they serve. He explained, "We work for you [the resident]. Your recommendations will be honestly considered and implemented if funds are available."

The board asks for your trust and support. As fellow residents, their only desire is to see

Quinn's most popular menu item continues to be her Cuban sandwich. While it may seem odd that it is not a German dish, the secret to her success with the sandwich is the fresh roast pork that she prepares especially for the Cuban.

Over the last three years, the deli's catering business has continued to grow as well. When Lufthansa began its non-stop service from Tampa International Airport to Frankfurt last September, the airline asked Quinn to provide German desserts for its launch. For four weeks, the deli owner provided cheesecakes, apple strudels, and plum cakes to passengers to give them an Old World sendoff.

The Bloomingdale resident has lived here for 12 years. "My son and I love it here and are so happy," says Quinn. Opening the deli in the United States was a dream come true when she moved to this area—Quinn had owned her own deli in Germany as well as worked at the country's best deli in Munich where she often served the German President's wife. Now she has a loyal following here, and new customers are finding her every day.

Heidi's Gourmet Hut is open Tuesday through Wednesday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday and Friday 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Saturdays 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. The deli is located at 4322 Bell Shoals Road, Valrico.



Lean Left, Head Left... Great for Chipping

Has your golfing buddy told you to hit down on the ball so it'll go up? Or, has he told you to quit trying to help the ball get up in the air? Lots of advice, but no course of action.

A few simple adjustments to your chipping setup and both of the previous issues will be resolved – Lean left, head left. The great thing about this setup is it's so close to how you look like when you strike the ball in a full swing.

The goal is for your total weight to be more on your left side (80 percent). Having your left leg straight and right knee bent forward at address puts the center of your chest and head to the front side of the ball.

Move your hands, arms and shoulders back and through together. The club head will strike the ball first while the club head still going down.

CONSTRUCTION Update

Bell Shoals Road Widening Project Update Hillsborough County Public Works Brief

Last year we re-engaged community leaders in preparation for the beginning of a multi-year project to widen Bell Shoals Road between just south of the Alafia River to north of Bloomingdale Avenue. The project will widen this stretch, including the bridge over the river, from a two-lane undivided roadway to a four-lane divided roadway in order to accommodate high traffic volume, increase the level of service, and maximize safety along the corridor. Since the expected timeline has been delayed, we wanted to provide you this update on the project.

The County continues to focus its efforts on the needed land acquisition and easements to support the Bell Shoals Road widening capital improvement project. It is our goal to facilitate construction in an efficient manner and minimize impacts to residents by adhering to the projected 36-month construction duration. To ensure continuous construction without delays, the contractor will not start the project until sufficient land acquisition has occurred to eliminate possible conflicts with the construction schedule. At this time, we forecast land



acquisition will reach an acceptable stage to support a late 2016 construction start.

As a reminder from our earlier public outreach efforts, the County will conduct a formal Preconstruction Public Meeting, advertised at least three weeks in advance, before construction starts. Affected homeowners and neighborhood associations will receive updates, along with a dedicated point of contact for questions and concerns during construction.

Thank you for your patience and understanding regarding the timing of this critically needed project in your community.

Homemade Water Fountains - In All Shapes and Sizes By Gwen Graverson

What intrigues me most are homemade items especially when the homemade items are made with someone in mind for a gift or as a family project. In doing so, we nurture our ingrained talents with time, effort and lots of imagination... and realize

that anything is possible, whether it's building a birdhouse, birdfeeder or a homemade water fountain.

Homemade water fountains can be made in all shapes and sizes for either indoors or outdoors. My interest in making one started last June when my husband Scott and I were visiting his brother Russ in Jamestown, N.C.

Over the years, Russ, along with his wife Joyce, have transformed their backyard into a tranquil sanctuary where everything is in harmony. Accentuating the relaxed feeling are the gentle sounds of the homemade water fountains.

If you should decide to start this project, one word of advice is patience. Something may go wrong...better yet, it will go wrong as you learn how to build your first water fountain.

My husband Scott's water fountain, pictured, is comprised of terracotta pots in different sizes to create a tiered look. The terracotta saucers should fit closely to the same size as the pots. The base pot/dish is the largest in order to hold the water, especially when the pump is off. Electric pumps are preferred over battery operated ones. Tubing is required to help direct the water flow upward, and last, but not least, large pebbles or river rocks. Scott purchased a base pot/dish that had an opening at the bottom, which had to be sealed by using a small saucer and silicone. He also recommends soaking the remaining terracotta pots/saucers in water prior to drilling holes large enough for

the tubing to fit through. There's a degree of assembly required to ensure everything fits prior to sealing the terracotta pots to the saucers. Don't seal to the base (pot/dish), as this will need access to the pump when necessary.

To achieve the tier effect: start first with be largest pot at the bottom and last, the smallest one at the top. **NOTE: Place the largest one upside down and remaining ones right-side up.** Saucers are sealed on top of the pots in the mid-section of the tier. Drill a small hole in the back of the large pot at the water line, as this will help with the water flow. Place the stones in such a matter as not to be in direct contact with the pump or tubing. Notches were carved out at the different levels of the terracotta pots/ saucers to create the desire effect for water flow.

Maybe the next water fountain will be made using our wine bottles (hint-hint), since we make our own "homemade wines" as a hobby and give as gifts.

What to Plant in July

Bedding Plants: Coleus, crossandra, ornamental pepper, and tropical milkweed planted now should last until November. As the heat continues, keep annuals evenly moist.

Bulbs: Butterfly lily, gladiolus, and society garlic are bulbs that can be planted during the middle of the summer.

Vegetables: Watermelon, pepper, okra, southern pea, and eggplant can be planted now as long as water is provided during dry spells. Watch for caterpillars and aphids on leaves and fruit.

Palms: Continue planting palms while the rainy season is in full swing. Support large palms with braces for 6-8 months after planting. Nails should not be driven directly into a palm trunk.

Area Law and Order

Between May 22 and June 15, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) conducted 131 traffic stops in the Bloomingdale and surrounding area known as J04 Zone. Our District IV deputies who work in the J04 zone have a very large area to respond to. J04 zone encompasses not only the Bloomingdale area but also reaches all the way down to the Lithia area.

In the Bloomingdale area, there were five auto burglaries and three residential burglaries including one armed burglary, meaning a firearm was stolen from that residence. There was one robbery of a person, which was cleared by arrest, and one robbery of a business.

There was also a large number of criminal mischief incidents involving smashed vehicle windows. Remember to lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors and lock your vehicles. This will significantly reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim.

Remember: lock your doors and never leave valuables in plain sight.

Grow House Busted

On May 19, deputies executed a court-authorized search warrant in Bloomingdale. During the search, detectives discovered two rooms converted for the sole purpose of cultivating marijuana. TECO responded and discovered an illegal electrical connection providing unmetered electricity to the residence. The estimated theft of electricity was over \$9,000.

The seized marijuana weighed approximately 345 pounds, which carries a street value of \$690,000. A person was arrested and charged with Trafficking in Marijuana, Cultivation of Marijuana, Grand Theft-Electricity, Own/Lease/Rent for Purposes of Trafficking and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. This is the 20th marijuana grow operation that has been eradicated in 2016.

A Scam is only a Phone Call Away

There has been an increase in scams in the area so beware. Within two hours on June 16, two residents reported scams to the Bloomingdale Community Station. The victims lost two thousand dollars each, one a "Grandparent" scam and the other an "IRS" scam. Please remember your first defense – If you do not know who is calling, let the call go to voice mail.

Things you should know about scams and scammers:

- The Internal Revenue Service WILL NOT CALL you to advise you of your arrest or a lawsuit and will NEVER ask for payment with any sort of gift card.
- If someone asks you to pay with gift cards such as Amazon or ITunes gift cards, it is a **SCAM**. Once you give the scammer the card number, it is next to impossible to track. The person could be outside of the United States.
- A scammer will play on your emotions to victimize you: fear, worry, love, excitement, joy, embarrassment and they induce great stress. Grandparent scams play on all of these.
- Do not respond to unsolicited telephone offers or e-mails.
- Banks will **NEVER** call or email you to update your information.
- If someone wants to sell you something you didn't plan to buy, say no and hang up.
- **NEVER** give out personal information over the phone; never "confirm" personal info, it is a trick to get it from you. Never press anything to "remove" yourself from the call list: Just hang up.
- NEVER deposit a check sent to you for "payment," deposit it and then wire or deposit the funds to an account that is not yours. The funds might be available in 3-5 days but in 10-12 days the check might very well be returned as a fraudulent check. If that happens, it is debited from your account.
- Scammers also spoof their phone numbers so your caller ID will show a government agency or a company phone number. This way, when you research it, you find the number actually does belong to an agency, and drop your guard.
- Report anything suspicious to the police.

• You can research common scams at sites such as the Federal Trade Commission at www.FTC.gov. You can find the National Do Not Call Registry on the site and get information on the many different scams that are out there.

Burglary Facts

- Burglary is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. A person can be convicted of burglary even if nothing was actually stolen.
- A burglary occurs approximately every 15 seconds in the United States.
- On average, a burglary results in a dollar loss of about \$1,600.
- About 30 percent of all burglaries are classified as "unlawful entry", meaning the burglar was able to gain entry without using force, often through an unlocked door or window.
- Nearly 66 percent of all burglaries are residential, and of those, 62 percent occur during the daytime. Most burglaries occur between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., when no one is likely to be at home.
- Renters are more likely to be victims of property crime than homeowners.
- Only 13 percent of reported burglaries are solved, or "cleared," by the police.
- Only about 15 percent of property stolen in burglaries is recovered.
- The highest percentage of burglaries occur during the summer months of July and August, when many people are away from their homes on vacation, or have left windows open for ventilation.
- About 30 percent of private homes have security systems. Homes without security systems are two to three times more likely to be broken into.

Home Burglary Prevention

- Know who your neighbors are and what type of vehicles they drive.
- Call law enforcement when you see something that is suspicious in your community.
- Start a Neighborhood Watch in your neighborhood and be an active member.
- Make sure your neighborhood has an effective e-mail and/or telephone tree in place.

Gas Station Thefts

Where can you find a place where people leave their wallets, purses, cell phones, navigation systems, or cars unattended and ripe for theft? Your local gas station or convenience store, of course. Most of the time, gas station customers leave their car doors unlocked. This enables a thief to drive up next to the victim's car, open an unlocked door, and grab any valuables within reach. Then, the thief quickly drives off. It's a crime of opportunity that takes only a few seconds to commit.

Gas station thefts can be easily prevented. You can keep from becoming a victim of gas station theft by keeping the following tips in mind.

- Always remove car keys, close windows, and lock doors while pumping gas.
- Pick gas stations that have good lighting and have video surveillance cameras at the pump.
- Pay attention to your surroundings and don't let your cell phone distract you.
- Keep valuables out of plain view in your vehicle and lock the doors even if you are going inside for just a moment.




"Finding Dory" is a great movie experience for both young and old. I give it 4 fishes out of 5.

The account was established to support the shooting victims and their families at the Pulse Nightclub tragedy that killed 49 people and injured 53 others in Orlando on June 13.

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Jump, Shout and Yell! BSHS Cheer Try-outs Bring Out School Spirit


