Simple Updates Help Older Homes Sell

I was at a Tampa Bay Builders Association meeting last week. The focus was on the benefits of new construction. Benefits include new roof, air-conditioning unit and appliances. In addition, LOW E windows and a high Seer rating HVAC mean lower energy bills than a pre-owned home.

Builders also offer down payment assistance and/or free upgrades. Many mentioned that the average year of a pre-owned home is 1990, a good generalization for Bloomingdale's homes. However, Bloomingdale offers important benefits that most new construction does not offer, like established neighborhoods, highly rated schools, no CDD fees, a beautiful public golf course and our own YMCA, just to mention a few!

Keep in mind; while buyers are looking at homes in Bloomingdale, they are most likely looking at new construction homes as well. Updated paint colors, clean newly painted baseboards and other small updates will go a long way when competing with new construction in our area.

One very inexpensive way to update your 1980-1990 home is to replace your out-of-date light switches, add USB outlets and replace the discolored or oddly shaped switch covers. White and uniform colors are usually your best options. For do-it-yourself homeowners, remember to trip the breaker! Better yet, hire an electrician.

Neighborhood Snapshot - Chadd's Ford

Chadd's Ford is a non-mandated neighborhood boasting 48 homes, averaging 2,300 square feet located on Moondale Court, Turnbury Street and Rainbrook Circle. Most homes have private pools, some are two-stories and four of the homes, located on Rainbrook Circle boast views of a pond and the golf course. All of these homes were built in 1985-89 and boast two-car garages, except for one home on Moondale that was built in 1994 and has a three-car garage. Three houses sold over the past year at \$113.74, \$84.41 and \$119.92 a square foot.

PGM Store has the Answer

Have you ever looked at a construction site and wondered what was going on? No need to wonder any longer. Hillsborough County maintains an online document repository called the Plans and Permit Information (PGM) Store and it is open to the public.

On the site, you can search for plans, applications and permit files. County requires developers and others to submit Plans (blueprints) prior to any construction beginning for commercial and residential projects, while Permits are required to legally complete these (and other) projects

The main purpose of construction plans is to show what is to be built, where it is being built, and underlying zone restrictions. Zone restrictions include Commercial, Retail, Office and Residential; and restrictions that are more specific relating to size, height, density, setbacks and more.

Developers must submit site plans and blueprints for approval before any work may begin. And, if a building plan was submitted, it will be in the PGM store. Once a request is submitted, an application number is assigned which allows the county's development department to track ongoing work and enforce development-related code ordinances.

If you have ever had to replace your A/C, Roof, Garage Door, Exterior Doors / Windows, Water Heater, etc., a permit most likely was required. Either you or your contractor was responsible for submitting the application documents. Again, if a permit was submitted, you'll be able to find it in the PGM store.

There is an enormous amount of information on this site; it is eye-opening and a great way to know what is happening in and around our community. I look forward to sharing "what's new" in Bloomingdale and the surrounding area in future columns.



How to Access the PGM Store and Be "In the Know":

There is an online tutorial available at on the County's web site: www. hillsboroughcounty.org. Search "PGM" and follow the links. However, I have provided step-by-step instructions below.

First, turn off pop-up blockers before entering the PGM store. You will not be able to access any documents without taking this step. Then,

Step 1 Go to http://pgm.hillsboroughcounty.org:8080/optix-web-8/#. Input username: public and password: public, then click on the "Login" button.

Step 2 On the next screen, Highlight "Document Library" and then then click the "Query" box.

If you have the application number:

Step 3 On the next screen, Type the application number "##-####" (1st 2 digits = Year followed by a 4 digit application #) into the "Tracking ID." Then, press "enter."

Step 4 On the next screen, upper left you will see a folder named "##-####." It should match what you typed above in Step 3. Press the "Open" button on the upper left of the screen.

Step 5 You have arrived. All documents associated with this application are available for viewing.

Note: You can also search by inputting address, folio number, applicant name, etc. in the appropriate box rather than using application number. If you want to give it a try, look up Hero's Paradise, 733 Knowles Rd, Application number 17-0791. For one even closer to home, try the former Sweetbay, 1101 E. Bloomingdale Ave., Application number 17-0810.

Ayden's mom, Kim, reports seeing Ayden's self-confidence grow and her willingness to try new things expand. Once disabled children turn 18, often times they don't have anywhere to turn. As kids, they're dependent on their family, school and/or community adaptive programs. But as adults, they sometimes can feel lost and alone with the urge to be independent but no real means to do so.

And, that's where the Y steps in. The Tampa Y is committed to developing strength in spirit, mind and body for all-regardless of physical or mental challenges. The Tampa Y's various adaptive programs help children, teens and adults of all abilities benefit from physical activity and group interaction.

Congratulations, BHA and Gazette! Top Honors Awarded at Neighborhood Conference Hillsborough County Press Release Excerpt

Thirteen groups and individuals across Hillsborough County, including the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, took top honors in Hillsborough County's annual Neighborhood Recognition Awards program, recognizing those whose efforts go above and beyond to make a difference.

Hillsborough County Lawn Watering Returns to Twice a Week Hillsborough County Press Release Excerpt

As of Aug. 1, Hillsborough County residents have two days a week to water their lawns instead of one. The Southwest Florida Water Management District's Governing Board has voted to allow the Phase III Water Shortage declaration to expire Aug. 1, returning the region to year-round restrictions.

The schedule for watering established lawns and landscaping in unincorporated Hillsborough County, as well as the City of Tampa, is:

- Addresses ending in 0, 1, 2 or 3 Mondays and Thursdays
- Addresses ending in 4, 5 or 6 Tuesdays and Fridays
- Addresses ending in 7, 8 or 9 Wednesdays and Saturdays
- Locations with no address (common areas) and locations with mixed addresses (such as office complexes and shopping centers) - Wednesdays and Saturdays

Watering must be done before 8 a.m. or after 6 p.m., and only once on your designated days. Hand-watering and low-volume irrigation of plant material other than lawns or turfgrass may be done on any day and at any time.

There are no restrictions on decorative fountains, car washing or pressure washing.

The restrictions apply to all residents - not just customers of public utilities - and most water sources. That includes private wells, and ponds or lakes that are used as alternate irrigation supplies. Reclaimed water customers are exempt from the water restrictions, although these customers are encouraged to use only what they need.

This closure will impact traffic. Motorists are encouraged to seek other routes. Those who must drive through the area should observe all barricades, directional signs, and detour routes.

Commissioner White Tours the Community

During a recent meeting with Hillsborough County Commissioner Stacy White, BSTD President Dave West invited the Commissioner to go on a drive through Bloomingdale. During that drive, President West discussed numerous items with White regarding the upcoming Bell Shoals Road widening project impacts, and thanked him for assistance in ensuring that Bloomingdale is made whole again after construction.

Although outside the mission of the BSTD, President West pointed out road surface conditions in the community in desperate need of addressing. Additionally, he discussed with White the need for an increased police presence in Bloomingdale to address speeding drivers on our major thoroughfares.

The Commissioner remains engaged and committed to our Bloomingdale community. The BSTD Trustees will continue to work with White and his staff to improve and maintain the District.

Hillsborough County Mini-Grant Application

The BSTD Trustees are currently filling out an application for a mini-grant from the Hillsborough County Office of Neighborhood Relations to replace the Bloomingdale signs at the entrance to the community on Culbreath Road. Those signs were removed during the construction that took place at the intersection of Bloomingdale Avenue and Culbreath Road in 2016.

The mini-grant, up to \$2,500, would cover the cost of refurbishing the olds signs, new sign posts, installation, and small landscaping around the signs. If approved, the work would begin after Oct. 1 of this year.



Property manager Rick Pitrowski, of Merit, Inc., has already secured written approval from the Campo Family YMCA, and has submitted an application to the County for a right-of-way permit. This will allow signs to be installed on property on either side of Culbreath Road.

The Trustees plan a ribbon cutting ceremony for the entire community and County officials upon completion of the sign installation. Keep checking this column for updates on the grant and sign project.

MYSTERY FLOWERING PLANT IDENTIFIED

Two years ago, a Bloomingdale neighbor and friend, Dina Williams, was trying to identify a plant in her back yard. I decided to help by posting a picture of the flowering plant on the Valrico Garden Club's Facebook page, hoping that someone could identify it...to no avail.

However, in recent months, I have seen this flowering plant at both Lowe's and Busch Gardens. It's a Clerodendrum or Quadriloculare, better known as Starburst, Shooting Star, or Glorybower. Starburst is a sub-tropical plant, native to Africa and Asia (Pacific Islands).

The plant is well-suited for our area growing best in Zones: 9 - 11. It is fast growing, likes full sun to partial shade and can grow in bush form to 10 feet or more. Starburst's pink and white blossoms show themselves along with inedible berries beginning in January.

However, think carefully before deciding to add this beautiful species to your landscape. The National Gardening Association and fellow gardeners strongly recommend planting Starburst in pots vs. the ground, due to its invasive nature. One gardener noted, "They [the plants] grow almost overnight and are difficult to dig up. They will travel long distances…suckers were showing up 30 feet away from the mother plant."

For my efforts to identify this plant, I received a Starburst as a gift from Dina. It is in a pot and located in a shaded spot on my lanai. It flowered during the month of March and shed most of its leaves shortly thereafter. New leaves have since replaced the old ones.

How far away should I stand from the ball?

The length of your clubs and your posture should dictate how far away you stand from the ball. There is one constant: the distance between each club and your body is about the same.

Easy measure: The width of your hand is how much space there is between your left thigh and

between your left thigh and the butt end of your club.

If you stand too close or too far away from the ball at address, your swing will automatically adjust to find a more natural and comfortable swing path and plane.

In either case, it will very often cause you to strike the ball out on the toe (hands too far away) or on the heel (hands too close)...shanks.

SCHOOL STARTS AUGUST 10!

School will be back in session in a few days. Be smart and do your part...or, it could cost you more than you think. Last year, in the first weeks of school, 25 traffic stops were conducted at three schools in our area. Let's obey the law and cut this number to zero.

- Look out for school zone signals and always obey the speed limit.
- Watch out for children near schools, bus stops, sidewalks, in the streets, in school parking lots, etc.
- Watch out for your school crossing guards and obey their direction.
- Always buckle up in the car, and follow the pedestrian rules.
- Be a good role model for our children. Your children are always watching and will mirror behavior they learn from you.
- Be safe out there.

Florida Law. 316.172

Drivers should know this Florida Law. 316.172: Traffic to stop for school bus.

- (1)(a) Any person using, operating, or driving a vehicle on or over the roads or highways of this state shall, upon approaching any school bus which displays a stop signal, bring such vehicle to a full stop while the bus is stopped, and the vehicle shall not pass the school bus until the signal has been withdrawn.
- (b) Any person using, operating, or driving a vehicle that passes a school bus on the side that children enter and exit when the school bus displays a stop signal commits a moving violation.
- (2) The driver of a vehicle upon a divided highway with an unpaved space of at least 5 feet, a raised median, or a physical barrier is not required to stop when traveling in the opposite direction of a school bus, which is stopped in accordance with the provisions of this section.

AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between June 19 and July 19, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 40 traffic stops in Bloomingdale East and West. Those traffic stops resulted in 26 verbal warnings, 7 written warnings, 5 citations and 1 arrest.

The Bloomingdale area is still experiencing traffic crashes at community entrances and within subdivisions. We have had three crashes without injuries and two with injuries. Remember, slow down, stop at all stop signs and above all be a courteous driver.

There were five vehicle burglaries and again some of these vehicles were unlocked. One of the vehicles burglarized ended with a juvenile arrested in possession of a gun. Rounding out the month were two residential burglaries, seven criminal mischief and five theft reports.

BE ON THE LOOKOUT!

Remember to watch out for what is happening in your neighborhoods. If you see something, make sure to call Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office Non-Emergency number at 813-247-8200.

Do your part to reduce crime. Remember to lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors, secure your guns and lock up your vehicles. This will significantly reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim. If you make it easy for criminal, they will take advantage of you and your family.


For peace of mind, now that the FAA is cracking down on passenger behavior, it seems to me they could turn their attentions elsewhere. For instance:







Yes, it's back to school time already! Did you know that the Hillsborough County Extension Service has a School and Community Garden program coordinator? Well, we do!

Lisa Meredith fills this role and is the person to contact. She has a list of resources that will help teachers and community garden leaders investigate available grant funding, can meet with you to evaluate your site conditions, make recommendations on what and when to plant, and provide you with materials to make the process easier to manage and navigate. We are an educational institution and don't provide labor, but we can provide the name of other organization(s) that may be able to assist you.

School gardens are great because they help build self-esteem, encourage learning, provide interactive lessons, teach life skills, provide a sense of ownership, allow youth to learn where food comes from, and enhance science and environmental knowledge.

Community gardens are beneficial because they provide access to fresh food, promote exercise and nutrition, work well for people with limited yard space, revitalize neighborhoods, decrease crime and stress, provide an opportunity to connect with others, and control food production.

Lisa has been involved with dozens of school and community gardens. Each one is unique and tailored to the style of the gardeners and serve the purpose of teaching how food is produced. Teachers are very innovative in using plants and gardens as teaching tools. Whether container gardening or utilizing the landscape around the school, these gardens show students how important plants are to butterfly populations and to us as consumers of what we grow.
