#### **The Commissioner's News**

(Editor's Note: Commissioner Stacy White represents District 4, which includes our Bloomingdale community. He was elected to the Board of County Commissioners in 2014. A Valrico native, White seeks to improve communities like ours. Prior to his election, he served the county as a member of the Hillsborough County School Board.)



You may have heard a lot of talk about the idea of chickens coming to neighborhoods in Hillsborough County. At the July 20 Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) meeting, a fellow board member requested that county staff bring back a report regarding rules that the board could enact to allow chickens on property zoned for residential use. Currently, this is not allowed under the County's Land Development Code (LDC).

This report will be brought back to the BOCC at the Sept. 13 Land Use meeting. As it stands right now, there are several possible outcomes when the Board is presented with the report:

- 1) Nothing is changed; or
- 2) A commissioner makes a motion to have language drafted for a Land Development Code (LDC) change.

If an LDC change is recommended, it could result in either:

- 1) the BOCC moves to adopt the change, which requires public hearings; or
- 2) it could fail, resulting in no changes.

I would like to stress that I am **not** championing an effort to allow this or to prevent it, but I would like to ensure that you are well-prepared for any possible changes.

While we cannot know at this time what the eventual outcome will be, I wanted to ensure neighborhoods are fully prepared for any change that could be coming, and encourage you to contact the attorney for your Homeowners Association in order to review your covenants. It is my understanding from talking with County legal staff that even should the LDC change, allowing chickens on residentially zoned property, it will not prevent HOAs from disallowing them under your own covenants and rules.

Now is the time to make sure your HOA covenants are clear on the topic. I will also keep HOAs apprised of developments, including any potential public hearing dates, on this important issue.

#### **BHA OPPOSES "CHICKENS" IN BLOOMINGDALE**

On behalf of the community, the BHA board thanks Commissioner White for clarifying the land use change proposal to allow chickens on property zoned for residential use.

If the proposal passes, this is what it will mean for Bloomingdale residents. Our 16 mandatory HOAs consisting of nearly 1,700 homes will be able to control whether or not they want to allow chickens in their neighborhoods. They will do this through their enforceable deed restrictions.


Our 16 voluntary HOA neighborhoods consisting of nearly 3,300 homes will not be able to affect this proposal should it pass. Residents in these neighborhoods have no mandatory board and no enforceable deed restrictions. All of west Bloomingdale and portions of east Bloomingdale would be affected.

The BHA board does not support this proposal for many reasons. Our property lots are too small to keep chickens from offending other neighbors, and chickens will attract insects, rodents and predators. Whether you are for or against this proposal, please attend the Sept. 13, 9 a.m., BOCC Land Use Hearing at County Center in Tampa to let your opinions be known. The "chickens in residentially zoned neighborhoods" proposal will be on the agenda. It is a public meeting.



#### **BSTD Welcomes New Property Manager**

The Board of Trustees of the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District is pleased to welcome Rick Pitrowski, President and owner of Merit, Incorporated, as the new property manager for the Bloomingdale community. Pitrowski brings not only a wealth of experience in property management, but also a special affinity for Bloomingdale as a onetime resident.

For over 15 years, Pitrowski lived in the Bloomingdale community, moving here in 1992. He quickly became involved with the BSTD and served as its President from 1992 until 1998. During his tenure, he was involved in all aspects of the property management and also developed the Board's landscape maintenance contract.

Since 1998, Pitrowski has been involved in property management as his business. He currently manages the three other largest special taxing districts in Hillsborough County-Logan Gate Village since 1998, Northdale since 2002, and Westchester since 2006. Additionally, he manages two local homeowners' associations—the Estates at River Crossing and FishHawk Trails.

The new property manager hit the ground running on August 19, meeting with the community's landscape maintenance contractor, Buccaneer. 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# THE RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE NEW NEIGHBORHOOD STANDARDS AND PARKING...

#### Provided By The Neighborhood Standards Committee (NSC)

Our residents' #1 **complaint** is parking. There are many misunderstandings about parking regulations. The BHA Neighborhood Standards released in August are based on Hillsborough County Ordinances and address, among several property issues, some of the most commonly violated parking regulations. The Standards are enforceable by County Code Enforcement or the Sheriff's Office. Violations can result in fines, court hearings, and even impounding the vehicle.

Motorcycles, automobiles, and pick-up trucks, under one-ton capacity - in a clean, usable condition and displaying current registration at all times - may be parked within Bloomingdale residential areas.

Parking on public streets is allowed; unless restricted by a lawful organization or noted below. Parking on county property is **prohibited** unless authorized.

Parking commercial vehicles/trailers over one-ton capacity or altered for commercial use is **NOT** allowed, unless loading or unloading.

**NOT** allowed, unless stored in an enclosed structure are:

- 1) Inoperable vehicles; those needing one or more parts, in disrepair or invalid registration,
- 2) Spare parts or pieces of vehicles, boats, trailers, or even aircraft.

With restrictions, recreational vehicles, hobby vehicle, private pleasure craft and utility trailers are allowed:

- 1) **Under twenty feet in length,** same as automobiles; though only one trailer and one other of above is allowed outside of an enclosed structure,
- 2) **Over 20 feet in length,** must be in an enclosed structure, or parked on your property in the side or back yard with a minimum setback of five feet from side or back property lines.

There are **some exceptions** to these restrictions. Complete details of exceptions and other requirements for parking may be found online. Search for "Hillsborough County Codes." The complete BHA Neighborhood Standards List may be found online on the BHA Home Page at www.blomingdalehoa.com.



In September, a team of Code Enforcement Officers will conduct a "Blitz" blanketing various Bloomingdale neighborhoods and issuing Violation Notices to residents, not just violating parking codes, but all County Codes. Follow-up inspections will verify if violations have been corrected or if additional action will be taken.

Code violations are publicly posted on the Hillsborough County website at www. hillsboroughcounty.org. To submit a complaint or search active cases, search the site using "Register Complaint / Search Active Cases." Or, submit a complaint through the BHA at bloomingdale.homeowners@gmail.com.

#### **Bloomingdale Real Estate Update**

During a real estate transaction, there are a couple steps that all parties can agree are stressful. In today's market, the biggie is the appraisal. An appraisal is an estimation of value and is usually required by the lender when a loan is involved. In order to prevent another real estate bubble, lenders want to ensure they are not lending more money than a property is worth.

Obviously sellers want to get the most they can from the sale. The buyer hopes it will appraise so they don't have to come up with additional money out of pocket to make the deal work. If a buyer doesn't have the additional funds, they stand to lose the home altogether.

When going through the process, it is important to remember an appraisal is not an exact science. It is based on the homes sold within the same area with the same attributes including, similar square footage, lot size, age, bedrooms, bathrooms, etc. Special consideration is given for items such as pools and fences. One mistake many sellers make is overspending on upgrades, which may help the home sell faster, but does not add any real value to the property.

#### Neighborhood Snapshot - Bloomingdale Trace

Bloomingdale Trace was developed in the mid-1980s and is comprised of Carrie Wood Drive, Ellenville Place, Havenstone Way, Lorenwood Drive and 1201-1314 Monte Lake Drive. This area has experienced less turnover than other areas of Bloomingdale with only 7 homes sold in the last year. The average sales price for homes sold in the last year was \$241,000 at an average of \$105 per square foot.

\*MLS statistics were based on rough property lines for individual neighborhoods and included homes sold August 21, 2015 through August 21, 2016. Sales not entered into the MLS did not count in these statistics.

#### **Making more putts with better aiming...**

By J.D. Carino (Bloomingdale CC campus)

Most missed putts from a short range (4-6 feet) are often a result of incorrect alignment of your body during the putting set up. We make similar mistakes of incorrect alignment during our full swing set up.

Here are a few guidelines for better aiming to make more putts:

Red Line - The line the ball travels on is your target line.

Yellow Lines - The other line we call the body line; consisting of your feet, knees, hips and shoulders. They need to all be square or even.

Both red and yellow lines are aimed parallel to each other like a railroad track.

If you aim your body incorrectly (right at the hole), you will compensate by rotating your body or putter face to get the ball back to the left and get it in the hole.

Compensating is the main reason why your score varies from round to round. Aim better...putt better...no compensation.


"Meet the Bulls Kick Off" Introduces Fall Activities



## Homegrown Pineapples in Bloomingdale? Who Knew? By Patti Philipsen

Cube it, slice it, shred it, juice it, grill it, cook with it – Pineapples are a delicious treat or complement to any dish. Many people think of Hawaii as the pineapple capital of the United States. However, pineapples were cultivated first in Florida before Hawaii was even a U.S. territory.

The temperatures in our area are provide a good growing platform for this tropical plant. A member of the bromeliad family, it grows well in Zones 9-11 and can reach 4 feet in height and 6 feet in width. Watering needs are few – water them when you remember, but just don't over water them. As with many of our tropical plants, cover your pineapples when a freeze warning is announced. And, unlike some of our garden beauties, pineapples like full sun or dappled shade...shade that has sunlight peeking through.

The flowers are the most important part because this is what eventually develops into the mouth-watering fruit. Ranging from purple to pink-red on a stalk, the pineapple flower blooms during late winter to early spring. From time to time, a fertilizer boost may be necessary. Stay away from the center leaves and fertilize around the bottom of the plant. Pests can be an issue too, take care to use a method that is safe for birds and good insects.

So how can you grow your own fresh pineapple? Start with a fresh mature pineapple that has healthy, firm, green leaves (not yellow or brown) and with a fruit skin that is golden brown (not too green). You can find one at any grocery store.

1. You need the pineapple's leafy crown. While you can remove the crown yourself either by twisting or cutting off the crown, I have gotten several cut at Publix for free. The crown is the part of the pineapple that makes more pineapples Cut or twist about one inch below the leaves. Trim any adhering flesh and strip off three or four basal leaves.

- 2. Place the crown upside down in a dry shady place for a few days. This lets the cut end harden and doing this will prevent rot. Once dry, you can plant the crown in a pot or in the ground.
- 3. Planting in pots. Plant the crown in a good 12-inch pot in a rich potting mixture. Make sure there is god drainage because pineapples don't like wet feet. **Gardening tip:** If you're worried about soil washing out of the bottom of your pot, put a paper coffee filter, a piece of screen, or a shard of pottery over the drainage holes before adding dirt. I prefer to place gravel or small rocks at the bottom of my pots...this keeps them from easily tipping over.
- 4. Planting in in the ground. Pineapples grow best in moderately fertile, sandy loam soils just like we have here in Florida! So, simply plant the pineapple in the ground.
- 5. Tap the soil firmly around the base of the crown. Be sure not to get any of the soil into the leaves or the crown.
- 6. Water it in, then water once a day for the first two weeks and after that, once a week till you see new growth. Then as I said before, when you think about it.

#### You just planted a pineapple!

Now comes patience. Your ready-to-eat pineapple won't happen overnight...try about 780 nights. But, it is worth the wait. Pleasant things happen while you

wait for the fruit. In about 16 months, an inflorescence bud shoot will form in the center. Two months later a red cone appears. Then, the flowers appear and open in about two weeks' time. As the last flower dies, your fruit will begin to develop. When your fruit is about six months old, it becomes sweeter. When the fruit changes from green to a rich gold halfway up your pineapple, it is ready to be picked.

Twenty-six months is a long time to wait for anything, even a pineapple. But, they are so good and they are made all the more sweet because you grew them yourself. Happy gardening!

#### Hillsborough County Press Release

The Hillsborough County Property Appraiser sent out nearly 450,000 of the Truth in Millage, or TRIM, notices last month letting property owners know how much their property is worth and information about what their taxes are likely to be. This year, through an agreement with the County Parks & Recreation, the notices also tell property owners how to take an important survey on parks.

Parks & Recreation officials are in the midst of a major survey designed to gather residents' input on facilities, programming, and recreational needs throughout the county. The information will be used for the Parks & Recreation Master Plan.

The survey is available through PlanYourParks.org. In addition to the TRIM notices, the County is sending postcards with information about the survey to 20,000 households. The County also held a series of meetings throughout the county to solicit residents' opinions on parks earlier this summer.



#### AUGUST BLOOMINGDALE AREA COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING (BACC)

The August BACC meeting on Aug. 18 was well attended. Major Robert Bullara, District IV Commander, was present, along with Master Deputy Curtis Warren to introduce the newly assigned Community Resource Deputy Luke Hussey. Discussions included the traffic issues around Alafia and Cimino Elementary Schools, concerns with the new medians installed at the Bell Shoals and Bloomingdale intersection and the area crime statistics.

#### **AREA LAW AND ORDER**

Between July 18 and Aug. 14, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 95 traffic stops in the Bloomingdale and surrounding area known as J04 Zone. Remember to obey all traffic laws! School Zone enforcement will be a priority for our Traffic Enforcement Unit, as well as the patrol deputies assigned to the J04 area. District IV deputies who work in the J04 zone/area have a very large area to patrol, respond to calls for service and enforce traffic laws in. The J04 zone encompasses not only the Bloomingdale area but also reaches all the way down to the Lithia area as well. Please be patient when you are requesting a deputy for a non-emergency incident.

In the Bloomingdale area, there were only one auto burglary and one residential burglary in the last month, a significant decrease. Please remember to lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors and lock your vehicles. These small steps will significantly reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim. Roughly 80 percent of our crimes are considered crimes of opportunity, beginning with unsecured vehicles. During the same time frame, there were also two criminal mischief incidents, one involving a vehicle and one where lights in a subdivision were damaged. Always report suspicious activity to the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office.

#### **ESTABLISH GOOD HABITS AND ROUTINES**

We are all creatures of habit. Try to train yourself and your family to get into the habit of always securing all doors and valuables. "Smart-Homes" and garage door monitoring systems make it easier to secure your garage and other doors in the event you forget. If you find yourself forgetting regularly, it may be worth the investment to purchase some security items that are currently available on the market today. Check online, with your current cable or internet providers or at any of your big electronic stores for ideas or details. Remember, you can never be "too" safe.

Know your neighbors and their habits, allowing you to spot something out of the ordinary. Be aware of what is going on in your neighborhood without invading anyone's privacy. Observe and report ANY suspicious activity to law enforcement.

#### REMINDERS

Make sure vehicles are locked and never leave valuables in plain sight.

We reminded everyone last month but it requires another mention: do not leave your firearm in your vehicle overnight. Bring your firearm inside and store it safely.

Schools are back in session so pay attention to school zones. The fact that we need to slow down and obey the speed limit in the school zones is not negotiable. The fines for speeding are very expensive. So slow down and obey the speed limit! Drive as if your kids walk to and attend those schools. Be careful!

Record your serial numbers and take photos of your valuables. Having your serial numbers on file will assist in identification of your property and make it possible for you to get the property back if it is ever stolen.

As of Aug. 1, I became the new Community Resource Deputy for the Bloomingdale and Gibsonton communities. Deputy Luke Hussey wants to hear from you, Bloomingdale! As the new Community Resource Deputy (CRD) for the Bloomingdale and Gibsonton areas in District IV, he sees two-way communication as his number one job to keep our community safe.

Deputy Hussey took over his duties at the Bloomingdale Community Station on August 1, replacing long-time CRD Curtis Warren. "I plan on continuing the same great service Deputy Warren gave to the Bloomingdale community. From Sheriff Gee to the newly-hired Deputy-Recruit, our agency as a whole believes in the value of community service, community relations, and giving back, all while protecting and serving our great citizens."

He joined the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) in 1999 as a Digital Communications Dispatcher. After graduation from the University of South Florida and the Law Enforcement Academy at Hillsborough Community College, Hussey became a Law Enforcement Deputy in 2002 and began patrol in District I.

Since that time the new CRD has worked undercover as well as patrol throughout the County, and in 2009 was selected as part of the first Intelligence Led Policing-District Intelligence Unit for District IV. In 2013, he was transferred back to patrol and worked primarily Gibsonton with short stints in the Bloomingdale area.

At the community meeting held August 18 to introduce Deputy Hussey, District IV Commander Major Rob Bullara described the Bloomingdale Community Station as "one of the busiest substations in District IV." He assured residents in attendance that Deputy Hussey's assignment to both Bloomingdale and Gibsonton does not mean service will diminish.

Said Hussey, "I see my role as in between patrol [deputies] and the community. I want information from you so that I can get it to the proper place to make a difference in crime statistics." He noted that he is impressed with how involved the residents of Bloomingdale are in the community—not just with their own individual homes.

Deputy Hussey is married with three children and four step-children, and resides in Riverview. He is looking forward to working in the Bloomingdale community, and will be contacting businesses, business owners, homeowners' associations, and neighborhood watches to assist in solving crimes and most importantly, preventing them. "Two-way communication will make my job easy," said the new CRD.

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

#### Easiest Mushroom and Rice Casserole Ever!

Weekday dinners during the year can be exhausting. To be nutritious, they are usually more work than you want to put in after a long day. Or, they're quick but not always healthy.

With school back in session, parents are juggling not only their busy schedules but those of their kids too. For many, your high schooler has a meet to attend, your middle schooler needs help with their homework, your preschooler is roaming the house on an adventure and your newest addition to the family needs a diaper change – and by the way, everyone is hungry.

If you ever feel like this, I have the perfect recipe to help reduce the stress of your after-school or work routine. Mushroom and Rice Casserole...It can either be a side, or, like my family makes it, a main dish by simply adding a protein, and/or vegetable. Just prep the protein whenever you have time, and pop everything else in the oven. Be sure to set the timer then do whatever you need to do in the meantime.

#### Mushroom and Rice Casserole: Serving size: about 4

1 cup rice (dry)
1 to 2 cans mushroom stems and pieces
1 can beef consume
½ -1 stick butter
1 can French onion soup

#### **Optional:**

2/3-1 lb. ground beef, fully drained (or any protein you would prefer to make it a main dish). A small bag of frozen peas (or any vegetable you would prefer).

#### **Directions:**

Combine all of the ingredients in a casserole dish except for the optional ingredients. There will be a lot of liquid in the beginning. Cook for 1 hour to 1 hour and 15 minutes at 350°F. About 15 minutes into the cooking time, stir in the cooked ground beef. There will still be a lot of liquid in the dish. It will thicken as the rice cooks. Let cool. Serve with the cooked peas either mixed in or as a side.

#### Tips:

- Place casserole dish on a cookie sheet in the oven to prevent spills.
- A 13 x 9-casserole dish is perfect for tripling the recipe.






#### Inside The Locker Room - New Year, New Team, One Dream
