Per My Florida Regional Multiple Listing Service (MLS), the supply of homes for sale is down 10.8% and home prices are up over 11% compared to a year ago in Hillsborough County. Neighborhood Snapshot Cambridge Cove

The gated community of Cambridge Cove is located along Natures Way just west of the Bloomingdale Golf Club entrance. Sixteen homes in this upscale subdivision line a pond that hugs the 10th fairway.

Homes were built between 1985-2006 with a couple new construction homes built in 2015 and 2016. This neighborhood boast 69 homes with three sales over the past year priced at \$358,000, \$411,000 and \$479,400. The average square footage is 3245 and the average number of bedrooms is four.

Annual Community Clean-Up



A Look Back at a Year of Change in 2016 By Miriam Leech, BSTD Staff

New years usually bring about changes...and for the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD), 2016 was no exception.

In February, the District brought aboard a new landscape maintenance company, Buccaneer Landscape Management, to keep Bloomingdale looking beautiful. Under the leadership of owner Chris Witherington, Buccaneer is a premier West Central Florida landscape service provider tasked with keeping our common areas and irrigation system maintained and repaired.

In July, the District said farewell to its long-time office manager, Derry Wilson, who decided to enjoy retirement with her husband. Taking over office duties was Miriam Leech, a Bloomingdale resident and also a writer for the Bloomingdale Gazette. Office hours changed from 7 to 11 a.m. to 8 a.m. to noon, Monday through Thursday.

In August, the District once again welcomed a new partner when it brought aboard Rick Pitrowski of Merit, Inc., as the new property manager. Pitrowski adds experience with his management of the three other largest special taxing districts in Hillsborough County.

The new manager immediately replaced trashcans and dog-i-pots throughout our common areas, and recently completed a report on the unsafe conditions of common area sidewalks throughout the District. The report is in the hands of County officials and was shared with the District's partner, the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association (BHA).

Additionally, in August, the Primary Election was held with a ballot referendum that would have increased the BSTD tax assessment amount an initial \$20 per year, with a potential

increase up to \$70 over coming years. By a margin of 81 votes, the referendum did not pass. The Trustees were forced to make difficult decisions moving forward on the use of funds. And, sadly, this meant that there were no Christmas decorations displayed at Bloomingdale's entrances in December.

Finally, in November, the BSTD welcomed a new Trustee to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Trustee Mike Chanen. Jay Kittle, a resident of Windsor Woods, will now fulfill a 4-year term.

2017 is sure to mean more changes. Be a part of that change and attend a BSTD Board meeting held the second Monday of every month at 6:30 p.m. at the Bloomingdale Community Offices, 3509 Bell Shoals Road. The next meeting is Jan. 9, and Hillsborough County Commissioner Stacy White will be attending.



Arbor Day is for Everyday

Most states celebrate National Arbor Day on the last Friday in April; others like Florida observe Arbor Day based on the best tree planting weather in their area. For the Sunshine State, Arbor Day is always the third Friday in January and this year that date is Jan. 20.



Arbor Day is all about tree planting and care. The National Arbor Day Foundation website at www.arborday.org/has links those wanting to organize an Arbor Day event or volunteer at one. Checklists are available to help you stay on track as well as free forms to build custom, print-ready PDF flyers for your Arbor Day event. Forms can be tailored for businesses, schools, clubs, churches, or civil organizations.

You also can become a part of the Arbor Day Foundation with memberships starting as low as \$10. With your \$10 membership, you may choose one of three gifts: Get 10 free trees for yourself or someone else; Plant 10 rain forest trees and get a free t-shirt; or Plant 10 trees in our nation's forests.

Some families may want to plant a tree on their own property instead. If so, contact the Tampa Electric Company first at 811, or go to sushine811.com at least two full business days prior to digging to get underground utility lines marked at the dig site. The slogan "Call Before You Dig" may serve as a reminder, but there's also a Florida state law that property owners and excavators must abide by. And always...safety first.

This year, Arbor Day may impact more people than ever before, especially with the news coverage of the November forest fires in Gatlinburg, TN. This area of Tennessee, which is part of the Smoky Mountains, is also part of Dolly Parton's back yard. She has started a web-based fund at www. DollywoodFoundation.org to aid families who lost their homes due to the wildfires. The Dollywood Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and 100 percent of your donation will go directly to the families affected by the wildfires.

You can also mail your tax-deductible donation to: The Dollywood Foundation, My People Fund, 111 Dollywood Lane, Pigeon Forge, TN 37863. Please include the following "My People Fund" on the memo line and provide a return address for a tax receipt. For updates, there's also a Facebook page "The Dollywood Foundation."

Hearing about forest fires is one thing...seeing the aftermath in person is something else. Last year in March, my husband Scott and I went on a short hike through the Black Forest near Colorado Springs. Let's just say, it was a very sobering experience to realize that it will be decades before the forest will be fully restored. June 2017 will make the fourth anniversary of the Black Forest Fire. The Colorado Springs Pioneers Museum has an area dedicated with items donated or recovered from the forest fires.

Another Arbor Day option is donating to Penny Pines. The Valrico Garden Club has donated to Penny Pines during the past few years. The National Garden Clubs, in partnership with the USDA Forest Service are saving forests at \$68 per donation. Anyone can participate in this program by donating in multiples of \$68. You may make donations in honor or memory of one individual, organization or theme. For information on how to make a donation or other details about the program, go www.gardenclub.org/.





Using the railroad track analogy to aim correctly...

By J.D. Carino (Bloomingdale CC campus)

When your golf buddy says "aim for the target," most of us aim our body to the target. Great for bowling, pool and shooting guns. Not so great for golf.

In bowling, pool and shooting guns, our body is aligned behind the target. In golf, our body is aligned alongside the target, i.e. the golf ball is a few feet in front of you. See photo.

As a result, if you align your body to the target (incorrect), with a good swing the ball will go right of where you aimed.

The outside track (red arrow) in which the ball travels is the target line. The inside track (yellow arrow) is the body/stance line; which consists of feet, knees, hips and shoulders all square and parallel (railroad tracks) to the target line.

When aimed correctly, your left shoulder (and body) will be aligned **left** of target. The next time you buddy says you are aiming wrong; tell him about the railroad tracks and how this train is staying on for 18 holes!

THIS MONTH: "ROGUE ONE: A STAR WARS STORY"

"Rogue One" is a must-see movie for "Star Wars" fans, new and old. I saw the movie at the AMC Regency Brandon in Dolby Cinema format, which creates a spectacular visual and sound experience.

Director Gareth Edwards takes the helm on this intense addition to the "Star Wars" franchise. He has created the darkest film ever shot in the Star Wars universe. Bringing his vision to life are the film's rebel heroes Felicity Jones as Jen Urso and Diego Luna as Captain Cassian Andor.

This movie is the prequel to "Episode IV: A New Hope" and the rebels are on a mission to steal plans for the Death Star. While a Disney movie and still PG-13, this was the first "Star Wars" movie not directed towards children. In my mind, a completely new side of Disney filmmaking was exposed and nothing about this film felt "disney-fied."

The action-packed film features through-the-roof performances by a stellar cast. In true "Star Wars" fashion, the comedic relief provided by K-2SO, a reprogrammed Imperial droid fighting for the alliance, lifted the darkness of the film. Actor Alan Tudyk was fantastic in the role.

On the other hand, I was not a fan of character Saw Gerrera played by Forrest Whitaker. This is the second film appearance for this character, the first coming in "Star Wars: The Clone Wars." As a rebel leader in this film, I found his character unnecessary to the overall story.

To keep from ruining the movie for you, all I'm going to say is that the third-act of this film is potentially the best third-act in movie history. That is all.

AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between Nov. 27 and Dec. 27, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 167 traffic stops in Bloomingdale and the surrounding area known as J04 Zone.

During the same period, there were fifteen auto burglaries in the Bloomingdale area, which is a huge number! There was a large amount of property stolen, including two guns, one being an AR-15 style rifle, all taken from unlocked vehicles. This number reflects only the Bloomingdale area, but many more burglaries occurred in Regal River, Shetland Ridge, Lithia Ridge and Buckhorn. Arrests have been made in connection with these burglaries spanning parts of Hillsborough and Pinellas counties, but only a small amount of property has been returned.

There were two residential burglaries, both occurred due to unsecured areas. There were also five criminal mischief incidents reported, with three cleared with no report due to no damage. Please remember to lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors, secure your guns and lock up your vehicles.

DON'T BE A VICTIM

Due to a rapid and disturbing increase in thefts from unlocked vehicles and open garages, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office is asking that residents reduce the potential of becoming victims of criminal activity by doing the following:

- Remove valuables from your vehicle and lock the doors when you leave or park your car. Purses, Laptops, GPS and cell phones are common items that are being left in plain sight in these unlocked vehicles. If possible, park in the garage with the door secured.
- Secure your firearms. Conceal carry if you have the proper permit or leave them locked up at home. Leaving a firearm in an unlocked vehicle is not acceptable.
- Never leave your vehicle unattended with the engine running. This is State law and opens you up to being a victim.
- Secure your garage doors anytime that you are not in your garage. Too many times, residents become victims simply by leaving these doors and the rest of their home wide open for anyone to enter and take what they want, usually bicycles and tools.
- Record your serial numbers and take photos of your valuables. Having your serial number on file will assist
 in the possible return of your property should you become a victim. A perfect time to record the serial
 numbers of the newly purchased items received at Christmas is NOW!



Use your resources: Know your neighbors and their habits, which will allow you to spot something out of the ordinary. Be aware of what is going on in your neighborhood without invading anyone's privacy.
