Bloomingdale Real Estate Update

It's that time of the year again - pumpkins litter the yards as everyone scrambles to get their holiday shopping done early. As most would expect, there is a slowdown associated with the real estate market around this time of year for obvious reasons. Most people don't want to move around the holidays!

On the other hand, the buyers and sellers who are out there are very serious and ready to make a decision. If you're thinking about listing, it is a great time to capture buyers who are ready to act quickly - these buyers often prefer to take advantage of the school breaks during the season.

Generally, the market experiences a dip when school begins and starts picking up again around October. The same is true for this year. In September, there were only 12 new listings in Bloomingdale while that number more than doubled in October with 25 new listings. However, September saw residual effects of the summer months with 34 properties sold in September compared to 16 sold in October. With 42 properties currently under contract, the number of sold properties is expected to increase as we move into November and December.

Neighborhood Snapshot - Erindale Oaks

Erindale Oaks is the newest addition to the Bloomingdale community. It is located near the corner of Lithia Pinecrest and Erindale and is comprised of only five homes. These homes were built in the last five years and are all two stories with at least 2,600 square feet. It is a mandated deed restricted community with a mandatory homeowners association. Sale prices for the homes were \$278,000-\$300,000 at the time of original sale. There has been no change in the neighborhood since its completion.

BHA BRIEFS

October Board Meeting Highlights and Other Board News

General - Fall festival took center stage at the October meeting. The board sends thanks to all sponsors and volunteers who made the event on Oct 22. a success. Special thanks to Not Your Mother's Taxi for providing off-site shuttle support for attendees. During a meeting with Commissioner Stacy White, BHA President George May reported that White has asked county administrator Mike Merrill to make the widening of Lithia Pinecrest Road a priority. The board is currently reviewing association by-laws and articles of incorporation.

Updates

Speeding on Natures Way and Canoga Park Drive - President George May met with Hillsborough County Transportation Division Director Robert Campbell on Oct.27 to discuss the BHA's recent request to implement changes to curb speeding on two of the community's thruways.

The BHA's request was to install 3-way and 4-way On Canoga Park, a speed study order has been submitted. Bloomingdale East, intersections are Natures Way and to slow traffic along this designated 25 mph route. Again, article on parking, page 5.

Glen Haven, Natures Way and Green Hollow, and details will be shared when known. Natures Way and Springvale. In Bloomingdale West, intersections are Canoga Park and Bloomingfield/ Isleton, and Canoga Park and Garnet. According to Campbell, design engineering regulations governing stop sign approval and installation are not met at these intersections. However, he offered other alternatives.

After initial inspection of the requested intersections, county engineers will conduct a traffic study at Natures Way and both Green Hollow and Glen Haven intersections. Design options according to Campbell include stoplight installation, improved speed reduction markings, and/or the addition of roundabouts. He also stated a "the full road" approach would be used meaning engineers will look at ways to provide safer pedestrian flow and dedicated bike lanes, another area of concern. The study will not be completed until early 2017 and resident input will be solicited at a later date.

Campbell also shared the following:

- A new school zone will be established along Natures Way near Alafia Elementary by December. Reduced speed signs and flashing lights will be installed.
- Crosswalks near the bus stops along Culbreath by the YMCA will be enhanced with prominent markings and LED lighting.
- Directional signs will be installed on Bloomingdale Avenue for the Bloomingdale Library.

Parking in Bloomingdale - The number one resident complaint concerns parking issues. A meeting was held with the Neighborhood Standards Committee, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, County Code Enforcement and HCSO Citizens Patrol on Nov.1 at the BHA office to address the problems and provide options. THE SECUTS WHAT RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT BLOCKING SIDEWALKS...

While clearly, blocking sidewalks is a non-moving traffic violation, other factors make enforcement difficult and haphazard at best. AMONG THE PLACES NOT TO PARK: BLOCKING A SIDEWALK

"Is it legal to park in such a way as to block a sidewalk, even if it is in your own driveway? I am a frequent walker and I encounter this all the time. There is seldom anyone in the car to complain to. I am able-bodied and can walk around (sometimes into the street is the only path around) but many folks are not." Don Cunningham

The question of legality regarding blocked sidewalks comes up frequently, and as trifling as it may seem to some, it's a significant safety issue. It's also a liability concern for motorists who think nothing of blocking a sidewalk, so it's well worth devoting some time to this week.

The short answer is no, it's not legal in Florida to park in such a way that a sidewalk is blocked, however, literalists may want to argue the language in the state statute, which defines a sidewalk as "that portion of a street between the curbline, or the lateral line, of a roadway and the adjacent property lines, intended for use by pedestrians."

Although blocking a sidewalk or parking across a sidewalk is not explicitly referenced in the law, parking a vehicle "on a sidewalk" is. Specifically, here's what section 316.1945 of the

chapter of the state statutes that deals with motor vehicle law says regarding stopping, standing, or parking prohibitions in specified places: "Except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic, or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or official traffic.

in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or official traffic control device, no person shall: stop, stand, or park a vehicle on the roadway side of any vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street; on a sidewalk; within an intersection; on a crosswalk."

Obviously, from a safety perspective, a blocked sidewalk is problematic for all pedestrians, bicyclists and people who rely on motorized vehicles to get around. Too often they find themselves forced from the relative safety of the sidewalk into the street because sidewalk access is blocked due to a vehicle parked overtop the sidewalk. The Doc recently witnessed such an incident in which a visually impaired pedestrian using a cane to navigate was forced to step into a busy street because a parked delivery vehicle was blocking the sidewalk.

By the way, it's also not legal to stop overtop a sidewalk when waiting to pull out into traffic, no matter if a motorist is entering a roadway from private road or private driveway, or emerging from an alley or the parking lot of a business. Motorists must stop short of a sidewalk — this means no creeping onto a sidewalk area that extends across the alley, building entrance, road or driveway. Even if there is no apparent sidewalk, vehicles have to stop at the point nearest the street that allows the driver a view of approaching traffic and pedestrians.

The bottom line is that parking a vehicle on a sidewalk constitutes a noncriminal traffic infraction in Florida, which is punishable as a nonmoving violation.

Florida laws permits each municipality or county to adopt ordinances regarding the specifics of parking rules as long as they aren't in conflict with state laws, and the clerk of the court or the designated traffic violations bureau collects and distribute the fines, forfeitures, and court costs assessed. Citizens may report vehicles that are parked on sidewalks by contacting the local law enforcement agency's non-emergency phone number.

What's Popping Up Around Bloomingdale

Bloomingdale residents love their pets! So residents who walk their dogs may have noticed new Dog Waste Pots have popped up around our community!

Most of the previous Dog-I-Pots, installed in 2012, had broken lids, which was allowing rain water into the waste container. This was making for an unpleasant mess! Property Manager Rick Pitrowski brought a proposal before the Board of Trustees in September for new, aluminum pots that would better keep out the water. With unanimous Board approval, 22 new waste pots were installed over the last few months.

Popping up soon will be new trash receptacles to replace the 15 various-styled cans currently located throughout the District. The new cans will have anchored lids for security, and removable black plastic liners with built-in handles for easy removal. Both TECO and Frontier have been contacted and asked to address the appearance of their boxes. Frontier will not clean boxes unless they have graffiti on them; however, TECO is usually responsive.

BLOCKING SIDEWALKS AND MAIL BOXES

Residents are reminded that it is illegal to block sidewalks next to their property. The regulations that cover these rules come under both Federal and State Government (The Americans with Disabilities Act- ADA), Florida Statute Section 316.1945 and County Code Enforcement ordinances. Also, U.S. Postal Service rules state that any time a personal mailbox is blocked by a vehicle the postal carrier is not required by USPS to deliver mail to that address.

AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between Sept. 18 and Oct. 18, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) conducted 131 traffic stops in the Bloomingdale and surrounding area known as J04 Zone. J04 zone encompasses not only Bloomingdale, but also down to the Lithia area. Please be patient when you are requesting a deputy for a non-emergency incident.

In Bloomingdale, there were five auto burglaries and two residential burglaries. The fact that only two homes were burglarized is great news, but still, that is two too many. Remember to secure your home and garage doors and lock your vehicles. Reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim!

VANDALISM UPDATE

There were seven cases of vandalism investigated in Bloomingdale. Vehicle windshields and back windows, along with mailboxes were damaged. No property was taken. Anyone with information is asked to call HCSO at 247-8200. Homeowners with security cameras in the areas where vandalism occurs are asked to check their cameras for possible evidence and report it to HCSO.

REMEMBER: If you see suspicious activity, call and report it to the HCSO Non-Emergency Dispatch Line at 247-8200. In an emergency, call 9-1-1.
