November Board Meeting Highlights and Other Board News

Elections and By-Laws topped the list of agenda items during last month's board meeting. Re-elected officers are President George May, Vice President Dann Berkowitz, and Secretary Suzy Watts. The treasurer position was tabled until the Nov.29 special committee meeting where Director Sean Donahue received the nod to replace current treasurer Mary Galin. The officers and directors will begin their duties on Jan.1.

By-laws were reviewed and after much discussion the By-laws Committee agreed to rework several items. The By-Laws were again put forward for approval at the special committee meeting and were approved. Residents wishing to review the By-laws can come by the office for a copy.

Also at the special meeting, the budget committee reviewed the current budget and proposed a 2017 budget. The document will be voted on at the Dec. 13 board meeting and will be implemented on Jan.1.

BEFORE AND AFTER:

On Nov. 13, the BHA received a resident complaint with picture (see below) of a bankowned property in the area. BHA staff contacted the Bloomingdale County Code Officer Christine Zien who in turn contacted the County's Rapid Response Team. Bottom Line: Within 3 days, the mess was gone. While turn arounds are not always this quick or always successful, the BHA works hard to act quickly on behalf of residents.

Unsafe Sidewalks are a Growing Concern

Residents of Bloomingdale take great pride in our beautiful streets, walkways, and thoroughfares. Walkers, runners, and cyclists all call our community home. However, with our aging infrastructure one of the most used paths throughout Bloomingdale is becoming unsafe—our sidewalks.

Not only are the sidewalks often slippery from the buildup of mold and mildew, but they have become uneven because of the roots of the mature live oak trees that line our streets. And our residents are getting injured as a result.

While Hillsborough County is the responsible party for the maintenance of our sidewalks, the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD) and the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association (BHA) are working together to gather information on the worst sidewalk areas, take pictures, and report them to County officials.

It is the BSTD's belief that it will take the efforts of both organizations as well as the residents to make Bloomingdale's voices heard on this matter.

VOLUNTEER CITIZEN PATROL PROGRAM; ANOTHER GREAT WAY TO GET INVOLVED HCSO Website

The Volunteer Citizen Patrol Program (VCPP) is based on the concept of utilizing the talents and skills of volunteers from within the local community as partners in public safety. Citizen patrol volunteers are specially trained by the Sheriff's Office to respond to many non-emergency and routine calls for service that do not require law enforcement or regulatory authority.

The VCPP was created to reduce crime, improve the safety of our citizens, improve the quality of life within Hillsborough County and allow community members to become active participants in the process of crime control and prevention.

Volunteers donate their time to patrol while driving specially marked Sheriff's Office vehicles. Volunteers receive training in areas such as crime prevention, first-aid, traffic control, and community policing. The VCPP consists of three shifts per day, patrolling up until midnight, seven days a week. Each VCPP vehicle will patrol with two volunteers per shift.

Only by working together will we address and resolve community problems and affect lasting change in the communities where we live and raise our families. Sheriff Gee needs volunteers who want to help keep our county safe.

Ferns are the answer...

Bare spots in your landscape look like an unwelcome black eye that you don't want anyone else to see. You feel certain that's what everyone notices first when passing by your otherwise lovely yard. Being from the north, I never thought much about ferns other than seeing them as ground cover in the woods, while going on childhood adventures to state parks in or near Rockland County, New York. Now that I'm a Floridian and have encountered a number of bare patches in my own landscape, where nothing seems to want to grow – ferns have been the answer.

I have at least two types of ferns growing in the back yard: leftovers from one of the Valrico Garden Club's annual yard sales and some donated to me by Ramona Pettigrew, a former club member. While I want to share insights about ferns, I also want to tell you a little about Ramona.

Ramona passed away in June of this year and had a passion for "all things green." A Life Member of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. and a longtime member of the Valrico Garden Club, she wore many hats while serving the club from President to Club Historian...and everything else in-between. She was also the Horticulture Chairperson and as part of her duties submitted articles to the Bloomingdale Gazette.

To honor her memory, I would like to share one of her articles about ferns.

"Ferns are among the world's oldest living plants and lower on the evolutionary scale than seed plants. They are popular because of their graceful foliage and ability to grow in low light or dense shade. In Florida landscapes, they are grown for decoration both in and outdoors.

Ferns became popular indoor plants during the Victorian era. Today they are used extensively in green houses, patios, apartments, and homes where their quiet, graceful beauty softens landscapes. They are non-flowering plants and number about 9,000 plus varieties.


Some of the more easily grown ferns are Birdsnest, Rabbits Foot (does well in baskets) Boston, Leatherleaf (florist fern) Sword, Maidenhair, Button, Holly, Fishtail, Petticoat, Elkhorn, Fuffyruffles, Staghorn, Mother, and Cinnamon, just to name a few. These are available in most nurseries.

Growing ferns inside is a challenge. They need light, moisture, and air circulation; bathrooms make an ideal place, as most of their needs are found there. Ferns do grow well outdoors. Boston ferns grow exceptionally well, as they require little care, form large beds, and make great ground cover. And, ferns are great additions to dish gardens and large planters.

The Bottom line: Ferns are easy to grow, rewarding and will give you many days of beauty and enjoyment."

Finally on a personal note, thank you, Ramona! You are missed.



Liven up your holiday conversations with a few facts regarding one of our more enduring symbols of the holiday season, ... the Christmas tree.

Did you know that ...

- * Trees are grown in all 50 states, including Alaska and Hawaii.
- 25 to 30 million Real Christmas Trees are sold in the U.S. every year.
- The average growing time is 7 years.
- Oregon is the leading producer of Christmas trees.
- The top selling Christmas Trees are: balsam fir, Douglas fir, Fraser fir, noble fir, Scotch pine, Virginia pine, and white pine.
- * The official White House Christmas Tree this year is a 19-foot Balsam-Veitch fir from Wisconsin.
- Christmas trees have been sold commercially in the United States since about 1850.
- In 1856, Franklin Pierce, the 14th President of the United States, was the first President to place a Christmas tree in the White House.
- President Calvin Coolidge started the National Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on the White House lawn in 1923.
- Thomas Edison's assistant, Edward Johnson, came up with the idea of electric lights for Christmas trees in
 1882.
- An acre of Christmas trees provides for the daily oxygen requirements of 18 people.
- In 1984, the National Christmas was lit on Dec. 13 with temperatures in the 70's, making it one of the warmest tree lightings in history.
- In 1978, a live 40-foot Colorado blue spruce became the National Christmas Tree. A new tree was planted in 2012 and was officially lit on Dec. 1 It is located on the Ellipse, the grassy area south of the White House.




