New Fiscal Year

October 1 marked the beginning of fiscal year 2019 (FY19) for the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD). At the first regular board meeting of the Trustees for the new fiscal year, officers will be elected for a term of 2 years, and any members of the public interested in filling the trustee vacancy will be considered for appointment to the Board.

For consideration to become a trustee, residents must reside within the boundaries of the taxing district, be registered voters in Hillsborough County, and submit a financial disclosure statement to the State. If you, or anyone you know, are interested in joining the Board, please attend the October meeting (see below)!

Auto Accident Claims

Since March 25, six auto accidents have racked up over \$58,000 in wall repairs throughout the District. Every time there is an accident that results in property damage, the BSTD submits insurance claims—as long as the incident is not a hit and run. To date, the BSTD has received \$29,873 in claim settlements for three of the six accidents.

In some cases, drivers may be insured but do not carry enough coverage for the District to receive a settlement for the entire amount of repairs. However, the trustees continue to make every effort to make sure as little taxpayer money as possible goes toward accident repairs.

New Website!!

The BSTD has launched a new website! To meet State requirements in Statute 218.32(1)(g), known as the Special District Accountability Program, the District has teamed with its property management company, Merit, Inc., to provide a fully accessible website to meet the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines 2.1, which defines how to make web content more accessible to people with disabilities.

To access the new website, visit mydistrictwebsite.com and search "Bloomingdale." There visitors will find information regarding the District as well as meeting schedules, budget and financial audit documents, and meeting minutes. Visitors to the old website will be directed to the new one.

We need your help. We need your children's help. There have been over 138 vehicle crashes within the Bloomingdale community this past year. You can see signs on all the trees – Old scar marks on almost every tree and several walls have had to be rebuilt. You know, only you (vehicle operators) can prevent these crashes from happening. We need you to slow down, stop driving distracted, and watch where you are going.

Texting and driving distracted is not just a teenage problem. It seems that everyone is getting in on the act these days. Did you know that just last month vehicles hit two pedestrians? Area Law and Order

Between Aug. 13 and Sept.13, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 22 traffic stops in the Bloomingdale area. Those traffic stops resulted in five citations, two verbal warnings and 11 written warnings. Six arrests were made for DUI. There was one business burglary and seven reported vehicle burglaries. We had one incident of criminal mischief and three thefts.

Bell Shoals Road Widening Project Update; Public Meeting Oct. 23

Bell Shoals Road will start seeing heavy roadwork in October 2018 as workers start transforming the two-lane road into a four-lane road.

According to the County website, the project will extend approximately 3.1 miles from just south of the Alafia River to north of Bloomingdale Avenue. Once started, planners expect the \$65 million project to last 42 months.

During that time, area residents can expect heavy equipment usage and excavation, traffic lane closures, and general noise.

The new design aims to increase the level of service along Bell Shoals Road by accommodating higher traffic volumes while increasing safety precautions along the corridor. The right of way and utility construction will start at Boyette Road and move north towards Bloomingdale Avenue. The corridor will also feature two 12-foot lanes for vehicles, a four-foot bike lane, and sidewalks in both directions.

The proposed design also includes widening the existing bridge over the Alafia River and improving the traffic signals at Glenhaven Drive, Rosemead Lane, and Bloomingdale Avenue.

Phase 1 of the project includes a 20-month bridge widening project north of Boyette Road, while Phase 2 will focus on the widening of Bell Shoals Road and additional features including bike paths, irrigated/landscaped medians, and improved stoplights.

Project manager Tommy Rawls said he expects at least two lanes of Bell Shoals will remain open at all times during the widening efforts.

A public meeting on the project will take place on October 23, 2018, at the Bloomingdale High School cafeteria at 6:30 p.m. For more information on the meeting or the project, contact Public Works at 813-635-5400.

¥ For Our Schools - Vote YES on ½ Penny Sales Tax Referendum

We all know that awful feeling when the air conditioner breaks. Whether it was a devastating hurricane, a power surge, or just an aging unit, we've all been there and we've all had to decide what we can afford to fix. Sometimes it's just so expensive that we "put a Band-aid on it" and hope that it lasts a few more years.

Sadly, something similar is going on in our schools. Buildings are aging, a/c units are breaking, and some classroom temperatures are climbing toward 90 degrees. Students are getting sick from the heat and teachers are doing their best to open doors and bring in fans. There's not enough money in the School District's budget to properly fix or replace these units so they get a Band-Aid, which is just not enough.

It's become a crisis. Burns Middle School is 32 years old and Principal Matthew DiPrima is constantly dealing with a/c issues and said, "I have an aging system and it needs maintenance almost on a daily basis."



On Sept. 17, Principal Matthew DiPrima provided information about the Referendum and answered questions at an information meeting. Air conditioner repairs have become routine at Burns and our other local schools



Over just the next five years, 63 schools need major A/C repairs or full replacements, 28 are in need of new roofs, and other schools have urgent needs to provide the right environment for teaching and learning.

You might think that a school could just move those

students to cooler areas, but that's not an option. Principal Sue Burkett from 31-year-old Bloomingdale High School stated, "When a system goes down, it affects so many rooms that there's just not enough space to relocate those students and teachers."

On Nov. 6, voters can solve this crisis by voting YES on the Referendum to increase the sales tax from 1/8 penny to ½ penny for 10 years, resulting in \$131 million/year. This money would be used exclusively for a/c repairs and other necessities including maintenance, technology, security, and new schools.

To ensure proper spending, an independent Citizen Oversight Committee will watch over the funded projects. Detailed information including a "wish list" of items to be fixed at each school can be found at www.sdhc.k12.fl.us.

The time for action is now, Burkett explained. "There's been a lot of debate about who should be responsible for the funding of basic necessities like paying for a/c repair in our schools, but ultimately, these are our kids and they are suffering. We have to take responsibility as adults and voters, for the kids in our own community, and if the only way to do that is to pass this Referendum, then we need to stop debating and pass the Referendum."

Tips to Help with College Applications By Jon Alfano

For many high school students, the beginning of senior year ranks as one of the most stressful periods in their life. Juggling a rigorous class schedule, dual enrollment classes, a part-time job, and extra-curricular activities like sports and clubs, can be incredibly daunting. If all of that wasn't enough, many students are also applying to college.

Time spent at a university serves as a vital transition from high school into the real world, so it is crucial for students to find a university that is a fit for them. The application process can be intimidating and

It takes time to self-report grades and scores, assemble a resume, write essays, and get letters of recommendation. The earlier an application is completed, the better.

This summer the eSports team from Bloomingdale competed in the High School eSports League Summer Open, for opportunities to win scholarships and to play for college recruiters. The league consisted of 100 players around the nation. Two BSHS students made it to the top 35, Gio DeCarvalho (DAICONEROC) and Dan Thomas (Purrplex). They played every week for the entire summer, one match Monday thru Wednesday and another match on Thursday thru Sunday.

Dan and Gio rose to the top to play each other for the first-ever high school national championship. After five intense matches and a Victory Royale, Dan was the last man standing and the first-ever Fortnite Game Xbox1 Summer Open HS national champion, while Gio was the national runner up!

Dan's grand prize was a Respond Gaming Chair. This is a customized chair that provides comfort and back support for serious gamers. Dan plans to major in Computer Engineering after high school and his major seems to fit him well.
