

The area has added new developments, shopping centers, restaurants and a new hospital. Well, kind of. A CAUTIONARY TALE

On Jan. 19 the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (BSTD) property manager, Rick Pitrowski, conducted an inspection and found a large amount of tree debris in the right-of-way along Bell Shoals Road.

Upon further inspection, Pitrowski found that a resident on Eastridge Drive had cut down three oak trees in their back yard and threw the cuttings over the District wall and into the Hillsborough County right-of-way.

Our property manager promptly reported his finding to the County. On Jan. 25 Pitrowski was notified that by County Code Enforcement that the resident was cited for accumulations on the property due to the substantial amount of debris. Additionally, the tree cutting and debris were reported to the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) and the Environmental Protection Commission (EPC)

of Hillsborough County.




Anyone wanting to remove trees of a certain type and size on residential or nonresidential properties in unincorporated Hillsborough County needs a tree removal permit. Information on trees that require a permit, and steps to acquire a permit, are available at www.hillsboroughcounty.org.

Yard waste of any type MAY

NOT be disposed of by throwing into the County right-of-way. If yard waste exceeds the curbside pickup limit, residents may dispose of yard and wood waste at the Falkenburg Road Yard and Wood Waste Facility at 346 North Falkenburg Road, Tampa. Residents may dispose of up to 5 tons of yard and wood waste per year for free. More information is available at the county website above.

This is a cautionary tale about what NOT to do when it comes to tree maintenance in Hillsborough County. It also is a reminder that the BSTD inspects the District weekly for maintenance and landscaping issues, and will report situations where residents have thrown trash and/or debris into the right-of-way or common areas to the proper authorities.

Recycling Tips for Your Pirate Party Castoffs

Follow these tips to clean up after Gasparilla weekend. Once the crowd moves on and it is time to clean up after your big Gasparilla party, you may be tempted to toss common party leftovers into the recycle bin. Follow these tips to avoid turning the recycling treasures already in your cart into rubbish:

Walk the Plank (into the trash):

- Bead necklaces even plastic beads aren't recyclable in curbside carts and tossing them in waterways or storm drains harms wildlife
- Disposable cups these containers break apart easily and don't successfully make it through the recycling sorting process
- Foam food trays and takeout containers these items can be taken to special collection bins at your local grocery store
- Pizza boxes, paper plates, and napkins items generally soaked in food residue
- Plastic bags, packaging, and film these tanglers damage recycling sorting equipment and can be dropped off in special bins at your local grocery store

Recycling Treasure (toss in cart loose):

- Clean and empty plastic bottles and containers
- Clean and empty aluminum cans
- Clean and empty glass bottles and jars
- Clean and empty metal food containers
- Clean and empty milk and juice cartons
- Dry flattened cardboard
- Dry Paperboard boxes
- Dry paper, newspaper, and junk mail

A good rule of thumb is: when in doubt, throw it out. Residential trash in Hillsborough County is processed into energy at the County's Resource Recovery Facility, so nothing goes to waste.



Do's and Don'ts

How to Live Alongside Urban Coyotes

Did you know coyotes are an important part of the landscape in Florida? According to Florida Fish and Wildlife (FWC), they help maintain healthy ecosystems by managing populations of rodents, insects, and other small animals. Did you also know that they are very intelligent and adaptable? Their adaptability is why more are being spotted throughout the United States, including in Hillsborough County, in both rural and urban areas. Due to increased sightings in the Tampa Bay area, Hillsborough County Pet Resource Center teamed up with FWC to provide information on coyotes and curb problems before they become a community issue.

Do:

- Keep trash cans secure and put them where coyotes can't get into them
- Clean up pet food and fallen fruit around your house
- Protect pets by keeping them in a yard with a fence at least 6 feet high
- Walk dogs on a short leash
- Close off crawl spaces under porches and sheds to remove places for them to rest/
- Haze coyotes continuously if they are near to scare them off. Learn how to haze here
- Share tips with neighbors

Don't:

- Feed coyotes it is illegal, and they will lose their fear of humans
- · Run if you see a coyote. Instead, stand your ground and haze them
- · Allow pets to roam freely
- Walk pets during early morning or evening hours (dusk and dawn) when coyotes are usually the most active

Be aware of unusual coyote behavior. Unusual behavior could include a coyote that has lost its fear of humans and is approaching people, chasing joggers and bikers, or attacking leashed pets. To report unusual coyote activity, call the FWC at (863) 648-3200.




According to Chris, "We just want to share and teach the love of nature."

Using the railroad track analogy to aim correctly...

When your golf buddy says "aim for the target," most of us aim our body to the target. Great for bowling, pool and shooting guns. Not so great for golf.


In bowling, pool and shooting guns, our body is aligned behind the target. In golf, our body is aligned alongside the target, i.e. the golf ball is a few feet in front of you. See photo.

As a result, if you align your body to the target (incorrect), with a good swing the ball will go right of where you aimed.

The outside track (red arrow) in which the ball travels is the target line. The inside track (yellow arrow) is the body/ stance line; which consists of feet, knees, hips and shoulders all square and parallel (railroad tracks) to the target line.

When aimed correctly, your left shoulder (and body) will be aligned left of target. The next time you buddy says you are aiming wrong; tell him about the railroad tracks and how this train is staying on for 18 holes!

Azaleas Can Be Showstoppers under the Right Conditions



This time of year, Azaleas are the Prima Donna of the South. A member of the Rhododendron family, this landscape star comes in shades of lavender, red, pink, white, yellow and orange. Adding to the interest, azalea flowers can be solid, bi-colored, freckled, streaked and/or edged.

Blooming often begins in late February or early March and can continue through the fall. In our area, growing zone 9b, conditions

are right for this hardy gem. The only problem – shrubs in our area can be sporadic flowerers.

Could it be due to the soil ...?

If you are considering planting azaleas this year, have the soil tested at the local county Extension office or by prepping the soil first during the fall (then plant the following spring) by adding organic matter, such as peat moss, compost, or pine bark.

The acidic level in the soil should range between ph 4.5 - 6.0. A good location for planting is where the azalea receives morning sun and light shade in the afternoon, in well-drained soil.

For those who already have established azaleas, the best time to fertilize is right after the spring bloom by using a well-balanced, slow release, granular azalea/camellia fertilizer. Apply the 2nd application, mid to late July. All sources indicate not to fertilize after Aug. 1.

Or could weather be a factor?

Based on my research, weather is the culprit. For maximum blooming, azaleas need 4 to 8 weeks of temperatures below 50 degrees Fahrenheit. This year, we may have come close to that bloom yardstick.

Sporadic flowering is more common in Central than in North Florida because of milder winter temperature fluctuation. An alternative would be to grow dwarf azaleas as a houseplant, which are perfect for containers. They need moist soil and indirect light. Note: these plants are considered poisonous and should be kept away from pets and children.



Pruning Trees Reduces Storm Damage Robert Northrop, Extension Forester

The Tampa Bay area is well known for it's strong storms during the long summer months. These storms produce heavy rains and strong winds that can spell trouble for open grown trees in parks, roadsides and around homes.

A survey conducted by Hillsborough County Extension documented that area homeowners perceive a high risk from trees during strong storms. Yet, few property owners recognize that trees can be managed to significantly reduce risk.





Experiments were conducted on live oak trees using sustained wind speeds up to 120 m.p.h. These experiments demonstrated that removal of 33% of a tree's foliage, through structural or thinning pruning, significantly reduced the likelihood of tree failure by hurricane force wind.

Thinning pruning removes small branches (1-3" diameter) from the middle and outside portion of main branches, not from the interior. It allows more air to pass through the canopy and receive less damage in storms. The effects of thinning are short lived because the tree quickly grows back to fill the canopy with new foliage.

A more economical and efficient practice is structural pruning. Structural pruning for mature trees reduces the length and weight of overextended limbs. This form of pruning retains small-diameter interior branches for health and vigor (fig 1).

When improperly performed, pruning can harm a tree's health, stability, and appearance. Professional pruning that follows industry standards can prevent damage to property and injury to people.

People need trees. Managed properly trees are long-lived; provide numerous benefits including cleaner air and water, beauty and shade. They should to be managed professionally by ISA Certified Arborists. Don't trust your safety to someone untrained and inexperienced in tree management. 'Chuck With a Truck' who knocks on your door wanting to trim you trees is not an inexpensive alternative to a professional arborist, but an invitation to a serious problem.

Happy Anniversary! 21 years and Going Strong



As of this month, it has now been 21 years since the Sheriff's Bloomingdale Community Station opened in Bloomingdale back in 1998. HCSO success in this area is due largely to the overwhelming cooperation and support provided by residents in Bloomingdale and surrounding

Groups like the Sheriff's Bloomingdale Area Community Council (BACC) have continued to work directly with us in identifying critical concerns and working with us to find solutions. There is more room on the council for those interested in representing their homeowners' associations. Residents interested in information on the council can call the Community Station at 635-8040 or come by the station at 3622 Erindale Drive (Intersection of Erindale and Lithia-Pinecrest Road).

Programs such as the Sheriff's Volunteer Citizen Patrol Program have provided outstanding assistance to those of us in law enforcement and improved our ability to provide Bloomingdale's residents with secure home and work environments you want and deserve.

Area Law and Order

Between Jan. 1 to Jan. 22, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office worked three non-injury traffic crashes and four injury crashes in our area. Additionally, there were five DUI arrests. During this time, there were four vehicle burglaries, one residential burglary and two business burglaries. There were nine reported thefts, ten shoplifting cases and nine drug cases.

Tax time is here.

File early to prevent your tax return from being compromised. In lieu of using your social security number, you may request an IP PIN number from the IRS. Go to the IRS website for further information on the IP PIN. This is also a good time to run your credit history. Simply go to annualcreditreport.com.

You are entitled to one free credit report a year from each of the credit reporting agencies. You can pull all three reports at one time or spread it out during the year.





Be a Part of the Solution

The first line of defense against crime in our community is the homeowner. There are not enough deputies to patrol the community and ensure that your homes and your vehicles are secure. We rely on Citizen Patrol and neighbors like you watching out for one another and reporting suspicious activity. Keep records of your property for future identification if you want to increase the chances of getting your property back.

Criminals have techniques they use to look for open homes and vehicles. It only takes them a few minutes to walk away with televisions, money, jewelry, GPS systems, credit cards and even dangerous guns. Make sure your vehicles are not only locked but that all valuable items are removed and secured inside your home!





That is where his great love of football started and now he's continuing that love for the sport at Bloomingdale High School. Starting in 2009, Coulson held multiple coaching positions at four different Texas high schools. He's been a Passing Game Coordinator, Defensive Coordinator and the Assistant Head Coach for Special Teams.

At Bloomingdale, he was named Defensive Coordinator, a position that earned him Defensive Coordinator of the Year honors this past season. Thankful to former Head Coach Max Warner and the Bloomingdale Administration for the opportunity to lead the Bulls, Coulson said, "I have worked my entire life for this moment, and it means the world that the staff has confidence in his abilities to lead this team."

Noting the great season and the performance of Coach Warner, Coulson stated, "We plan on making some small changes but for the most part [we will] keep the train moving." 


Bloomingdale High School Football Players Sign Letters of Intent
