AN INVITATION TO OUR RESIDENTS

Public Meeting, June 10

First, I want to issue an open invitation to the public hearing for the FY2020 budget, which is scheduled for Monday, June 10, at 6:15 p.m., at the Bloomingdale Community Offices. In previous columns, I've laid out a new vision and the plans to achieve it. Our budget reflects an emphasis on revitalization and improvement with an eye toward future needs. If you want to see how we've prioritized our funding, the public hearing is where you want to be.



Re-branding and Landscape Design

Last month, I outlined the next steps in the re-branding and landscape design plan. Genesis Halff (no, not a typo) will deliver design options this month for Bloomingdale's eight external entrances. As of this writing, I am not sure if they can have the conceptual drawings ready for the June 10 meeting.

Once a design is chosen, one of our external entrances will be rebuilt using the selected design. This will serve as a model for the other seven entrances. As I mentioned before, the redesign will include new signage, lighting, and landscaping. The remaining seven entrances will be redone in phases, with those at Bell Shoals Road being done last due to the ongoing widening project.

The numbers remain on an upward trend and indicate the program is beginning to take effect. As a

result, the Trustees have incorporated this program into our FY2020 budget to continue addressing

Off-Duty Deputy Program

Our pilot security program continues to provide dividends. Last month, five off-duty deputies responded to over 100 calls. For the period of April 18 through May 17, 13 shifts were filled and the deputies performed the following:

- 23 traffic stops with citations
- One warrant arrest
- Engaged one suspicious vehicle

💐 Don't Delay Preparations; Hurricane Season Is Here

So, just how serious does the 2019 hurricane season look? Hard to tell, but the first named storm appeared in May, which was a little worrisome since hurricane season traditionally does not start until June 1.

As of May 22, Accuweather.com reported that storm forecasters expected between 12 to 14 tropical cyclones to appear between June 1 and November 30, with five to seven becoming hurricanes and two to four turning into major hurricanes that could hit the mainland.

Although impossible to confirm the accuracy of the predictions, County residents can start taking steps to be prepared.

Before the Storm

Get Prepped

Depending on the size of your family (and we're including animals), the list of disaster kit items can be quite thorough, but clean drinkable water will be the top priority. You'll need one gallon of water per person per day, with the minimum time of seven days (or 28 gallons for a family of four). Each gallon will be used for drinking, cooking, and sanitation, so rationing will become very important.

Additional items for the supply kit include food for seven days, fuel, cooking utensils, flashlights and batteries, clothing, sleeping gear, a fully stocked first aid kit, a radio, cash, and any special items like medications. The official list of suggested supply kit items can be found at FloridaDisaster.org.

Also, get several bags of ice and clean out the coolers; you may need them both to store food and supplies if the power goes out.

Know Your Evacuation and Flooding Zones

Check the County website to find out if your home sits in a flood zone, and verify where you can go in the event of a mandatory evacuation. Make sure you know where the shelters are located, which hospitals can be easily reached, and always have a travel plan, especially if the evacuation becomes widespread. The main highways and roads will become congested very quickly, so look into alternate routes but be prepared for slow traffic.

Check www.hillsboroughcounty.org for information on evacuation and flood zones.

Prepare the House

What's the most popular place to be just before a hurricane? Anyplace that sells water. The second place? The hardware store.

In addition to making sure the house has adequate insurance, take any precautions to fortify the home to lessen damages should the hurricane come ashore, such as boarding up windows and using sandbags to create temporary dams against rising flood waters. Even if you don't plan on staying home when the storm arrives, you can still take steps to protect the house.

During the Storm

Get Somewhere Safe and Stay Put

Once you've done everything you can to prepare, get inside and hunker down. If you've ever watched the news during a storm, there's always some reporter in danger of being blown away or drowned by the weather. Don't be like the reporter; they get paid to try and fight a hurricane, and you don't.

If the storm will definitely hit, take advantage of the appliances while you still have power. Do laundry if you need it, cook a lasagna in the oven, charge phones/tablets/devices, binge watch that show, whatever you want while you can. Things may get uncomfortable for a while if the power goes off, so take advantage of it while you've got it.

After the Storm

Assess and Report

Family okay? Good, now check the power. Still got electricity? Wonderful. Inspect the property. Property undamaged? Congratulations, you've survived a Florida hurricane!

However, if you weren't so lucky, get your family to safety and/or the hospital as quickly as possible. Check in with the water/power utility companies to find out when service will be restored. Finally contact your vehicle/home insurance agents and the Florida Chief Financial Officer to report any damage claims at www.myfloridacfo.com.

This Month: The Swallow-Tailed Kite Nature's Most Graceful Predator

The Swallow-tailed Kite has been called "the coolest bird on the planet." With its long, deeply forked tail and bold black-and-white plumage, it is unmistakable in the summer skies above swamps of the Southeast. After rearing its young in a treetop nest, the kite migrates to wintering grounds in South America.

Habitat and Nesting

Swallow-tailed Kites breed in swamps, lowland forests, and marshes of the southeastern United States, primarily in Florida and South Carolina. They require tall trees for nesting and open areas full of small prey to feed their nestlings. Typically, Kites place their nest near the top of one of the tallest trees available, more than 60' above ground.

Courtship may involve aerial chases by both sexes with mating occurring from March to May. The female will lay 2 to 4 eggs with incubation lasting 28 days. The young birds fledge (fly out of the nest) at about 5-6 weeks.

Diet and Feeding Behavior

Flying with barely a wingbeat and maneuvering with twists of its incredible tail, it takes much of its food by swooping low over trees or lower growth. Favorite foods include a variety of bugs, insects, and frogs, lizards, and snakes.

Conservation

Destruction of habitats is chiefly responsible for a decline in population numbers. A key conservation area is the Lower Suwannee National Wildlife Refuge in Florida. As of 2016, populations have seemed to stabilize and even show increasing trends. Successful habitat restoration and management has allowed these birds to reestablish nesting populations in areas of Georgia, Florida, and South Carolina.

Swallow-tailed kites are not listed as endangered or threatened by the United States federal government. They are listed as endangered by the state of South Carolina and as threatened by the state of Texas and are listed as "rare" by the state of Georgia.

Butterfly Garden - Build it and they will Come

Riverview Garden Club member Jenny Roberts' love of gardening began as a child. Her initial inspiration came from her father's love of growing roses. Today, her Valrico home is a Butterfly paradise featuring many of the 180 butterfly species found in Florida.

Over the past 30 plus years, her yard has evolved. The grass is long gone replaced with flowering plants, bushes, shrubs and walkways. Visitors, including her former mailman, enjoyed the peace and tranquility her garden has offered them through the years.

Jenny's advice: do your research before starting a butterfly garden. Learn which butterfly species are native for Central Florida, zone 9b – our zone. You can do this research online, by reading butterfly books/butterfly field guides, talking to local garden nurseries and viewing You Tube videos. Nectar plants along with hosts plants are a must for attracting lots of butterflies to your garden.

Two common predators of butterflies and caterpillars are wasps and lizards. Other predators include ants, parasitic flies, birds, snakes, toads, rats, dragonflies, frogs and spiders. Additional ground cover will help protect the early stages of the butterfly life cycle.

Using native plants saves time, money, energy and contributes to the ecological balance. Jenny likes Sweet Bay Nursery at 10824 Erie Road in Parrish. They also have a website and Facebook page. They emphasize using native plants as they are less likely to be affected by insects and disease. Do not use pesticides in or around your garden.

6 Plants to Set Your Garden Aflutter

With spring's arrival, there's no better time to make your yard, or neighborhood, an oasis for these appealing creatures. Many Florida-Friendly plants attract the insects, and they're easy to grow.

Flowering plants draw butterflies with nectar. Other "host" plants, such as native milkweed, have leaves that provide food for their caterpillars. Plants also provide shelter, resting spots, and protection from intense weather and predators.

Here are a few plants you might consider adding to your landscape to attract butterflies:

- 1. Firebush: A hearty Florida native with tubular red flowers from late spring until early winter. Monarch and zebra longwing butterflies love it.
- 2. Blue porterweed: A host plant for some butterflies, this evergreen groundcover also attracts insect pollinators with its bright-blue flowers.
- 3. Beach sunflower: Another favorite of many butterflies, this showy, drought-resistant groundcover blooms throughout the year.
- 4. Pentas: An upright perennial with star-shaped flowers that are extremely popular with butterflies.
- 5. Native milkweed: The many varieties are known for attracting butterflies and bees. It's a larval host to monarch and queen butterflies.
- 6. Passionflower: Some butterfly gardeners plant two vines. In sunny areas, they lure gulf fritillary butterflies. In shade, they invite zebra longwings.

Many have seen the Crimson Guard perform during halftime at Bloomingdale's football games. They are an important part of the school's award winning Rajun' Bull Marching Band program. The talented group uses choreographed dance moves incorporating colored flags, rifles, and sabers to enhance the visual interpretation and presentation of the shows.

The Crimson Guard does not rest in the spring semester, however. The members instead learn new routines and perform in local and statewide indoor competitions through Winter Guard International (WGI) and Florida Federation of Colorguards Circuit (FFCC).

This spring the Crimson Guard varsity and junior varsity teams successfully competed in seven competitions across Florida. The varsity team were finalists at the WGI Tampa Regional for the 8th year in a row, and achieved their highest local show score ever. They finished their season placing second in the Scholastic A division at FFCC Championships. The junior varsity team placed in the top three in most of their competitions and placed third in the Scholastic AA division at FFCC Championships.

The teams' accomplishments are due to 10 years of hard work and excellent leadership under Director William Sullivan, a performing veteran of high school, college, drum corps, and independent winter guard teams. "The guard is successful

due in large part to their director; he is a master teacher, dancer and artist," said Jon Sever, Bloomingdale's Band Director. "Furthermore, he pushes the team with a "no excuses" policy that prepares students for life."

Sullivan credits the teams' successes to the many hours of practice and the dedication of students and their families. The teams hold three-hour practices twice a week, and attend three camps to learn show design and choreography, all while working, attending demanding classes and trying to navigate the world as teenagers.

He said, "I hope that they enjoyed their time on the performance floor, but more so I hope they walk away with more life skills than anything else. I hope they've learned how to be pushed past what they thought their limits were. I hope they learned that they can do more than they originally thought, and I hope they walk away with memories and friendships to last a lifetime."

Sullivan will be taking on a different role for the Crimson Guard in the coming year. He will be filling the role of Artistic Director, designing the shows and choreographing. His instructional and administrative duties will be now be fulfilled by Erin Parke, who has been an important part of the Crimson Guard staff. Focusing on the design aspects of the show will allow Sullivan to pursue his Master's degree and concentrate on his career as an elementary school teacher.
