Neighborhood Snapshot - Bloomingdale Village

Bloomingdale Village is a gated community that shares an entrance off Natures Way with the Bloomingdale Golfers Club. It consists of 57 homes located on Ballybunion Way, Bellerive Place, Crooked Stick and Cypress Point Place. 14 homes boast views of the golf course and most of those have private pools. In November 2017, I reported that four pool homes sold over that year at an average square foot of \$124.45. From November 30, 2018 - November 30, 2019, 1528 Crooked Stick Drive sold for \$310,000 or \$114.81 square feet (private pool) and 1538 Crooked Stick Drive sold for \$285,750 or \$121.75 square feet (no pool).

MLS statistics were based on rough property lines. Sales not entered into MLS did not count in these statistics.

AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between Nov. 1 through 24, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 83 traffic stops in Bloomingdale east and west. Those traffic stops resulted in 68 written warnings, five citations and three arrests. There were 15 total crashes and three DUI arrest at various Bloomingdale entrances and within the subdivisions. Also, 14 arrests were made for various crimes in the Bloomingdale area.

DRIVE SAFELY

Drive safely isn't just a saying or slogan. Look at the signs you see along the roadway. They mark intersections and roadways where loved ones have died as the result of a crash. These memorial markers are a reminder to drivers and pedestrians alike.



Distraction are everywhere these days and can be difficult to avoid. Drivers and

Pedestrian: set aside the smartphones, electronics devices and headphones. Your eyes and ears are your best tools for keeping safe.

Stay alert and watch out for each other. Take time to slow down and look at what others are doing around you. And, if you can't put your phone down while driving you better get ready to pay your citation. Starting January 2020, citations can be issued if you are holding the phone while your vehicle is moving. Up until now mostly warnings have been given to create awareness.

Here are some of the basics:

 Starting January 1, 2020, drivers can be pulled over just for being on their phones while driving. They will face fines of \$30-\$100 plus court costs and three points on your license, which can be eliminated by passing a safe driving class.



• Police must get your permission to check your phone, otherwise they need a warrant. They cannot check your phone records through your mobile provider unless there is a crash where someone is killed or hurt.

Next Bloomingdale Area Community Council Meeting (BACC)! Don't Forget Our New Time!

Get involved; attend our monthly meeting as a neighborhood representative. Our meetings are on the third Thursday of each month. **NO MEETING IN DECEMBER**, see you next month. The BACC works directly with the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office to identify community concerns and find solutions to all types of problems. For information, call the Bloomingdale Community Station at 635-8040, or come by the station.

- The law does not apply when your vehicle is stopped.
- The law does not apply when using maps or navigation.
- There are exceptions for using your phone for safety alerts, like traffic and weather, or for using your phone to call.
- You are also excepted from the law if you are using your phone to call police or report an emergency.
- When driving in school and work zones, you cannot be on your phone at all, and must use a hands-free device.

Drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists need to know and follow all traffic signs and signals. Learning to anticipate other's actions will help increase everyone's safety. Never assume someone is going to give you the right of way. Making eye contact between people on the road will let you know that you see each other. Decrease speed limits in school zones and in neighborhoods where children are present.

Drivers! Wear your seat belts at all times and do not get behind the wheel if you have been drinking. The results can be devastating to more than just you! Remember, cyclists have all of the same rights and responsibilities as a motor vehicle and must obey the same rules when travelling on the road.

Finally, slow down, stop at all stop signs and above all be a courteous driver.

Construction and expansion work on Bloomingdale Square continue at a furious pace.

No updated information has been released on the opening date for the new Publix on the official Publix website. Sources indicate a December opening, but in the meantime, the existing Publix will remain open. L.A. Fitness is slated to occupy the former Publix spot sometime next year.

Located next to the new Publix is Home Centric. The home décor and gift store opened to great fanfare and is enjoying grand opening festivities through this Sunday.

Perhaps the biggest addition to the Square is the independent storefront next to McDonald's. The standalone structure occupies the plaza's parking lot space best recognized as the spot where fireworks tents appeared in the summer and Christmas trees were sold during the holidays.





Nine players have been named to the All-Conference – Federal Division.



The Christmas Tree at Rockefeller Center: Behind the Scenes By Gwen Graverson

This year marks the 87th anniversary of the Christmas Tree at Rockefeller Center. The tradition started during the Great Depression while the center was under construction.

The Tree, along with the holiday decorations, stands as a holiday beacon for New Yorkers and visitors alike. In December 2001, people from around the world came after 9/11 to see the Tree decorated in a patriotic red, white and blue. That year, the Tree was 81 feet tall and was from Wayne, NJ.

Today, more than half a million people pass by the Tree every day, making Rockefeller Center the epicenter of New York City's holiday celebrations.

The trees over the years have been Balsam Fir, White Spruce, Bruce Fir, with the Norway Spruce being the most popular. The first tree was 33 feet tall, and the tallest on record was 100 feet tall from Killingworth, CT, displayed for the 1999 Holiday season.

This year's Tree is a 77 feet tall Norway Spruce from the Village of Florida (Orange County), NY. The tri-state area has been the main hub for the trees. At least one tree came from Ohio.

This year's tree is a gift from Carol Schultz, who planted the tree in 1959. "I always said, 'You're going to be up in Rockefeller Center someday' and...when I see the tree lit up, I'm probably going to cry."

The tree was transported by a flatbed truck and erected at Rockefeller Center Nov 9; the lighting ceremony was on Dec 4. It requires at least 45,000 multicolored LED lights and 5 miles of wire to illuminate the Rockefeller Center Christmas tree. The Christmas tree lights are powered by 300 solar panels that are installed on the roof of One Rockefeller Center.

Back in 2004, a 550-pound Swarovski star first adorned the top of the tree. It featured twenty-five thousand crystals and one million facets and was nineand-a-half feet in diameter. The following year, the addition of LED lights made the star look as if it were radiating light from its core to its tips. That same year, the tree selection was a Norway spruce, at 71 feet tall, from Suffern (Rockland County), NY, my childhood hometown.

What happens to the tree after the Holiday season is over...

For the thirteenth consecutive year, the 2019 Christmas Tree will be donated to Habitat for Humanity. Once the holidays have passed and crowds have dispersed, the tree comes down and is milled, treated and made into lumber that is used for home building. Each year, the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree continues to be a symbol of hope, and was an inspiration the children's book, "The Carpenter's Gift," written by David Rubel and illustrated by Jim LaMarche in collaboration with Habitat for Humanity. 


