

Homegrown Hillsborough: Strawberries

HC Press Release

Hillsborough County farmers grow more than 60 crops. Each month, on the Hillsborough County website, a seasonal crop, grown locally and available fresh in area groceries will be showcased.

Harvest: Strawberries

When are fresh Hillsborough County strawberries available at local groceries and farm stands?

The harvest begins in November and continues through late March or early April.

What type of strawberries are grown commercially here?

Varieties including Radiance, Sensation, Winterstar, and Festival.

Where are strawberries most commonly grown in Hillsborough County? Plant City

How many acres are planted with strawberries?

About 10,000 acres are planted for the 2019-'20 season.

How many pounds of strawberries are harvested?

Generally, 25,000 to 30,000 pounds per acre. Weather lately has been great for strawberry planting, and the yield is fantastic.

Fun fact: The Florida Strawberry Festival is held each spring in Plant City, the "Winter Strawberry Capital of the World." This celebration of everything associated with the bountiful fruit has taken place annually since 1930, except for a six-year hiatus during and immediately after World War II.

Local insight: Strawberries will stay fresh longer and taste best if you keep them in the container, place the container in a refrigerator, and wash the berries just before eating them.



AREA LAW AND ORDER

Between December 2019 and January 22, 2020, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office conducted 125 traffic stops in Bloomingdale east and west. Those traffic stops resulted in 24 citations.

There were 5 crashes with injury, 13 without and 4 DUI arrests at various Bloomingdale entrances and within subdivisions. Also, 17 arrests were made in the Bloomingdale area – Two arrested for burglary, four DUI, four warrants, one personal robbery and other various crimes.

Remember to watch out for what is happening in your neighborhoods and if you see something make sure to call Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office Non-Emergency number: 813-247-8200.

Lock the doors to your home, secure your garage doors, secure your guns and lock up your vehicles. This will significantly reduce the opportunity for you to become a victim.

NO EXCUSES, DRIVE SAFELY

Texting while driving will get you a citation! FSS 316.306, No texting while your vehicle is moving and no touching your phone while in a school or construction zone. This new law was enacted back in July 2019 and warnings have been issued to create public awareness. Billboard signage was also used around school areas, so there is no excuse.

Here are some of the basics:

- Drivers can be pulled over just for being on their phones while driving. They will face fines of \$30-\$100 plus court costs and three points on your license, which can be eliminated by passing a safe driving class.
- Police must get your permission to check your phone, otherwise they need a warrant. They cannot check your phone records through your mobile provider unless there is a crash where someone is killed or hurt.
- The law does not apply when your vehicle is stopped.
- The law does not apply when using maps or navigation.
- There are exceptions for using your phone for safety alerts, like traffic and weather, or for using your phone to call.
- You are also excepted from the law if you are using your phone to call police or report an emergency.
- When driving in school and work zones, you cannot be on your phone at all, and must use a hands-free device.

TIP411: SIMPLE AND EFFECTIVE

Keeping our community safe is our top priority. Tip411 helps us in that endeavor. All you have to do is download it to your smartphone or tablet. tip411 is simple yet effective.



You can find the app through the Apple App store or Google Play. Just type in "HCSOSHERIFF" (no space). Download it and keep it handy.

tip411 is easy to use. To send us a tip, press "New Tip." You can also include a photograph or video. Just touch the camera icon at the bottom.

All tips transmit instantly to our Communications Center, where the information is directed to the appropriate area, i.e. patrol, narcotics, warrants, etc.

We monitor tip411 twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. And all tips are anonymous.

Remember: in the event of an emergency, always dial 9-1-1.

MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

Just like weeds in your garden, we have to get rid of drug dealers, criminals and would be predators in our communities before they spread! Alerting law enforcement is something residents can do to help remove criminals from our neighborhoods and put them in prison where they belong. Call HCSO at 247-8200 or 911. REPORT!

- Talk to your neighbors. Work together. They may have noticed things you haven't.
- Watch for suspicious activity. Look for warning signs like excessive foot traffic and lots of cars coming in and out of homes.
- Keep an eye out for drug paraphernalia. Users can be careless.
- Record as much detail as you can. Stay safe and don't approach potential criminals.
- Take note of license numbers, car models and types and colors. Write down descriptions of suspicious people- race, sex, height, build, and any identifying features. Be careful.
- Contact law enforcement. Call from a safe place.
- Start a Neighborhood Watch Program. Work with community councils and local deputies.

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Together we can help each other make a difference.

Bloomingdale Traffic Annoys Deputy Cliff Fletcher, Too

A 22-year veteran of the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, Master Deputy Cliff Fletcher has to deal with traffic slowdowns just like everyone else in the Bloomingdale area.

"It can be a problem," Fletcher said. "It makes it difficult to handle calls and presents a bigger challenge to responding to them."

Fletcher said the biggest challenges faced by his office include handling complaints and concerns called into the office in a timely manner, a challenge that gets harder when dealing with rush hour traffic.

"We do get calls from citizens complaining about the traffic, and we have to tell them that we don't have any control over that. That's not our role, but it can be hard to tell people that."

While Fletcher encourages citizens to contact his office with any concerns they have about community safety, he also advised some community traffic concerns can be addressed by contacting County Public Works at 813-635-5400. Fletcher added any call to that number will be addressed by the appropriate department.

"That's the number we call with our concerns," Fletcher said.

Still, Fletcher says he's enjoyed his posting in Bloomingdale, which has been his area of coverage for several years. At one point, his area of responsibility stretched from Lithia Pinecrest Road to John Moore Road, but with the population increase and area growth experienced in Bloomingdale over the last few years, that area of responsibility has since stretched past John Moore Road all the way to Highway 301.

When he's not patrolling the area, Fletcher enjoys participating in community activities and events like the Bloomingdale Fall Festival or Riverview's Trick or Treat Street.

UF/IFAS Helps Serious and Casual Gardeners Succeed

Holiday season is over! It's time to get out in your garden and attend to those chores you have been meaning to do.

Thanks to the University of Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences Extension Service (UF/IFAS) accomplishing those tasks is made easy through their *FLORIDA GARDENING CALENDAR*. The Gardening Calendar gives Florida gardeners a monthly guide for what to plant and do in their gardens and includes links to useful gardening websites, all based on University of Florida research and expertise.

Know your location and zone and weblink: http://sfyl.ifas.ufl.edu/lawn-and-garden/florida-gardening-calendar/. ...and the rest is simple!

We are part of Central Florida, zone 9b. Our "to do" list for February includes:

What to Plant

Annuals/Bedding plants: Good performers in South Florida's mild winter include impatiens, verbena, dianthus, strawflower, and lobelia.

Bulbs: Many bulbs can be planted now. Divide large, crowded clumps. Provide adequate water for establishment. Some examples include Amazon lily, crinum, and agapanthus.

Groundcovers: Consider replacing areas of grass with drought-tolerant, low-maintenance groundcovers.

Vegetables: Winter vegetable gardening is in full swing. Last month to plant cantaloupes, cucumbers, eggplant, lettuce, peppers, spinach, and tomatoes for a late spring harvest. Protect crops in the unlikely event of a frost or freeze.

What to Do

Lawns: Fertilize lawn grasses to improve color or coverage. Choose a fertilizer (not a "weed and feed") with no or very little phosphorus unless a soil test indicates the need for it. A fertilizer with controlled-release nitrogen provides longer-lasting results.

Roses: Prune roses this month to remove damaged canes and improve the overall form. After pruning, fertilize and apply a fresh layer of mulch. Blooming will begin 8–9 weeks after pruning.

Shrubs and palms: Fertilize shrubs and palms by spreading fertilizer evenly over the soil surface and watering it in. Follow with a fresh layer of mulch to conserve moisture and reduce weeds. Delay pruning any cold-damaged branches until new growth starts.

Lawns: Apply a preemergence weed killer (not a "weed and feed") to lawns late this month to prevent germination of warm season weed seeds. Apply when temperatures rise to 65°F for 4–5 days. Timing is important for good control.

Avocados and mangos: Disease-susceptible varieties of avocado and mango may require applications of copper fungicide.

Citrus: Fertilize now if not done in January. Frequency and amount of fertilization depend on the age of the tree.

Watering your Lawn and Garden

Check the Hillsborough County website for watering days and times. You also have the option to sign up to receive water restriction notifications and water news. The county website: https://www.hillsboroughcounty.org/en. Phone: 813-663-3251.

The UF/IFAS Extension Service has links to other online resources which includes in part: publications, state/federal agencies, organizations and associations, mobile web apps and plant hardiness zones. There's also a monthly e-newsletter that you can sign up for, called The Neighborhood Gardeners...for homeowners and Master Gardeners. It's filled with Florida-Friendly gardening tips and success stories and is distributed on the second Friday of every month.

Do's and Don'ts How to Live Alongside Urban Coyotes

Did you know coyotes are an important part of the landscape in Florida? According to Florida Fish and Wildlife (FWC), they help maintain healthy ecosystems by managing populations of rodents, insects, and other small animals.

Did you also know that they are very intelligent and adaptable? Their adaptability is why more are being spotted throughout the United States, including in Hillsborough County, in both rural and urban areas. Due to increased sightings in the Tampa Bay area, Hillsborough County Pet Resource Center teamed up with FWC to provide information on coyotes and curb problems before they become a community issue.

Be aware of unusual coyote behavior. Unusual behavior could include a coyote that has lost its fear of humans and is approaching people, chasing joggers and bikers, or attacking leashed pets. To report unusual coyote activity, call the FWC at (863) 648-3200.

Do:

- Keep trash cans secure and put them where coyotes can't get into them
- Clean up pet food and fallen fruit around your house
- Protect pets by keeping them in a yard with a fence at least 6 feet high
- Walk dogs on a short leash
- Close off crawl spaces under porches and sheds to remove places for them to rest/raise pups
- Haze coyotes continuously if they are near to scare them off.
- Share tips with neighbors

Don't:

- Feed coyotes it is illegal, and they will lose their fear of humans
- Run if you see a coyote. Instead, stand your ground and haze them
- Allow pets to roam freely
- Walk pets during early morning or evening hours (dusk and dawn) when coyotes are usually the most active

The Angel Foundation was founded in 2003 by a group of individuals who saw the need to aid people in the Greater Brandon area. The Angel Foundation's mission is to partner with businesses and individuals, to be a caring resource for families and to help ease some of the burdens placed on them by temporary crisis due to a life-threatening illness or a catastrophic event.

Realizing that money is not the only thing needed during a time of crisis, the Foundation steps up to do so much more. They match local business owners and individuals with available resources to help meet needs at a reduced cost or as a donation to the Foundation. During crises, ordinary things that are usually done and taken for granted often go undone, such as lawn care, household maintenance, meals and taking a family to and from treatments.

Liz Brewer started as a volunteer with the Angel Foundation in 2004 because she wanted to give back to the community. Her first volunteer assignment was the annual Golf Classic, which was in its second year. Liz stated that "watching the community come together and support such a worthy cause changed her life". At the time Liz didn't realize that she would come to need the help of the foundation. 

Being a high school senior is difficult. This is not to say that life in general is not difficult, but being a high school senior is a very specific kind of difficult. This "difficult" is the result of the sudden pressure to become an adult, and to make adult decisions. I am, of course, referring to the college application process which is currently plaguing me and my fellow seniors.

For those of you who are high schoolers, or have high school aged children, I can offer a fair bit of advice on this topic. The first thing the high schooler should do is download the RaiseMe app. This is a micro scholarship service which works with colleges to grant students money at universities they are interested in by putting in classes, grades, and standardized testing scores. It is real, and it helps. I personally have greatly benefitted from this app, and USF, where I will be attending, has confirmed the funds I earned with it.

The next step is working on SAT and ACT scores and logging community service hours. If a high schooler even briefly considers attending an in-state University, Bright Futures is an amazing opportunity. Next year's seniors will have a requirement of a 1320 SAT score and 100 community service hours to get the 100% paid tier of Bright Futures. For more information, FloridaShines.org or school guidance counselors are the best resource.

Once senior year rolls around, it is time to start applying. I highly recommend the early admission process if the high schooler knows exactly where they want to go. I did this for USF, and was accepted without even having to write the dreaded college essay.

If writing is not a strong suit, I suggest writing three essays before you begin applying, one about community service, one about your future, and one about an obstacle you have overcome. These will be applicable to college and scholarship applications.

A lot of my friends found the most efficient option was completing the Common App, which included the applications of several in-state universities. Make sure to check in often on college websites for due dates, deadlines, and the status of applications already submitted, if something is awry it will often show up on the student's application account.

Finally, after the colleges have been applied to, it is time to search for scholarships. I have applied to just under 30 scholarships this year. The task is daunting and I do recommend lots of research and advice from a high school counselor before beginning. Make sure to focus on local scholarship or genuine national scholarships.

Any scholarship that you have to pay to enter, or does not require you to submit a transcript, SAT score, resume, or letter of recommendation, is probably not a genuine scholarship. Do not waste time completing the "5 Minute Scholarships" as they are not likely to be genuine.

Do lots of research! There are scholarships everywhere, local ones, scholarships from fast food chains, clubs you are a part of, even scholarships as specific as those for people who are left-handed.

The college process is daunting, but remember to take a breath and remember that you will end up where you are meant to be, with the people you are meant to be with. Happy applying!


