Tips for Holding a Successful Garage Sale

The Bloomingdale Neighborhood Association (BNA) will be holding its annual Garage Sale on Saturday, September 10. Participating may seem daunting, but there are multiple rewards to be had. You may earn anything from a few extra dollars to a few hundred, but having the opportunity to go through and clean out the closets can be the best motivator.

Where to start? Or a better question might be when to start. Give yourself as much time as possible to go through drawers, check under beds, inside cabinets, the garage and other nooks and crannies to find long forgotten items that maybe were once coveted or loved, but have outgrown their usefulness. Find an out-of-the-way spot where you can start storing these items.

Good organization is the key to keeping your sanity through the process. Sorting by type of item will be helpful. If similar, keep like items together and consider pricing them all the same. That way you don't have to make price tags for individual items, and it will be easier for you to remember the cost. For example, if you have a lot of baby clothes, you may price them all at \$1 or your costume earrings at \$2 a pair. Remember that a lot of people will try to bargain with you (it's part of the fun), so keep that in mind when pricing the items in the first place. Other homes will be participating, so you will need to be competitive with your pricing.

Work on pricing as you sort through your items. It will make it easier if you are not trying to do it all at once. Remember, just because the item meant something special to you doesn't mean it will serve the same purpose for others. If you really want it out of the house, price it to sell.

Have everything set up (preferably in your garage) ready to set out first thing in the morning. You can be sure your first customers may appear up to an hour prior to the sale start time, most likely before you are quite ready to begin. But you can make quite a few dollars early on if you allow the early birds access to your goods.

The BNA will take care of advertising the community Garage Sale, but it's important to make up signs to post in and around your neighborhood leading people to your specific sale. Don't forget to remove them when it's over.

Kudos to our Off Duty Police Task Force that routinely patrols our Bloomingdale East and West neighborhoods.

Recently, those task force patrols, led by Hillsborough County Sheriff's Officer Mark Buswell, led officers to more serious police action in Hillsborough County that resulted in two arrests, multiple weapons being taken off the streets and intelligence related to ongoing police investigations in the county.

Earlier this year one of our Bloomingdale East Home Owner Association's alerted the task force officers to suspicious activity at a house in their neighborhood and asked officers to include the house on their patrols. According to Officer Buswell, during one of his on-duty shifts last month, he conducted a traffic stop near Bloomingdale Ave and Gornto Lake Rd. and recognized the vehicle from that house in Bloomingdale East. In addition to traffic charges, two of the three occupants of the vehicle were arrested on concealed weapons charges and according to Officer Buswell are believed to be persons of interest in other crimes in the county. In all, four guns were recovered from the vehicle and two of the weapons were tied to crimes in the jurisdiction of the Tampa Police Department.

The Off Duty Task Force includes three police officers from the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office and they have been patrolling the area for more than a year. Their primary mission is to assist the community by conducting traffic stops, doing safety patrols, helping walkers, bikers and providing a visual presence in the area. In this case, Officer Buswell says "a direct result of working in the neighborhood had far reaching repercussions for the safety of all Hillsborough County residents."

Oak Crest Homeowners Take Action

We are a group of Oak Crest homeowners who are joining together to form a new voluntary neighborhood group, Oak Crest United. Our purpose is to preserve property values and the quality of life that we enjoy in our neighborhood. Our main goal is to stop the further expansion of corporate investors who are buying up Oakcrest homes and turning them into rentals.



We believe that the rapid increase of rental properties has had a negative impact on our neighborhood quality of life, and may have a negative impact on future property values. Our concerns:

- Corporate investors (like Progress Residential, Invitation Homes, and American Homes 4Rent, etc.) are not good landlords and neighbors.
- Corporate investor-owned houses have a documented history of neglected maintenance. When something breaks it is very difficult to get the absentee corporate landlord to properly fix it in a timely manner.
- Corporate investors are rapidly buying up mid-range priced houses throughout Hillsborough County, thereby reducing the opportunity for many families to own homes of their own.
- Interested homebuyers might be discouraged from buying a home in an area that is thought to be a "rental neighborhood."
- Corporate investors do not care about the community they buy into. Their only loyalty is to their investors, not their tenants or neighborhood.

Our concerns are directed toward corporate landlords. We are not opposed to former residents who now rent their houses, and who keep up the maintenance and value of their property. And **no** ill-will is intended to our fine neighborly tenants who are in most cases paying too high rent to corporate landlords while being nickel-and-dimed by fees, fines, and theft of security deposits.

Already about 20 percent (at least 92 homes) in Oak Crest are rentals. Our goal is to keep this number from increasing any further. We believe that there is a way for a voluntary group of Oak Crest homeowners to legally discourage corporate investors from further taking over our neighborhood. The more homeowners join in our voluntary proposal, the more we defend our homes from becoming a "rental neighborhood." The details of how our proposal will work will be fully explained at a community meeting on Sunday, August 28, at 4 pm at the Campo Family YMCA on Culbreath Rd. This Primary Election, which takes place on Tuesday, August 23, will be an important time to vote. Below is information on the races that will impact our local community. Your voting choices in the primary will be dependent on whether you are registered to a particular party or are an independent voter, but Republican candidates for both the State Senate District 20 race and the Hillsborough County Commissioner District 4 races will appear on all primary ballots as these races only have two contenders. These races will be decided in the primary election.

There are three ways to vote: in person on Election Day, August 23 from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.; early voting, which runs from August 8-21 from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. or by mail- the ballots must be in the Supervisor of Elections Office by 7 p.m. August 23.

Florida has closed primaries, but there are nonpartisan races that all voters can vote on in the Primary Election. Voters will receive a Democratic ballot, a Republican ballot or a nonpartisan ballot, depending on their party affiliation. All ballots will include nonpartisan races for School Board and Judicial seats, and for Universal Primary Contests in which all candidates are affiliated with the same political party. The 2022 Primary Election includes Universal Primary Contests for State Senator for voters living in State House District 20 and Board of County Commissioner for voters living in District 4.

On Monday, June 13, the Bloomingdale Special District hosted Addison Davis, Superintendent of Hillsborough County Public Schools, at their monthly meeting. Davis shared information about the proposed property tax including that the \$146 million would be used in the following manner:

- About 16% of the total revenue would be shared with charter schools proportionate to enrollment.
- Assuming a 96% collection rate and subtracting the charter share, this would provide the district with about \$116 million annually.
- 80% of the district share of funds would be used to increase compensation for instructional positions (teachers, counselors, media specialists, etc.), bus drivers and transportation assistants, classroom assistants, and other non-instructional support staff.
- This could enhance the average instructional salary by \$4,000 and the average non-instructional salary by \$2,000.
- About 20% of the district's share of funds would be used to protect and expand art, music, PE, and workforce education.

SCHOOL BOARD REFERENDUM

This property tax would levy an additional \$1 on every \$1000 in assessed property value. The Referendum is meant to enhance teacher pay to help retain good teachers as well as help maintain art, music, PE and workforce education classes. If approved, the tax would bring \$146 million annual additional revenue to the county public schools for a four year period beginning July 1, 2023 and ending on June 20, 2027.

With regards to the proposed school board referendum, Patti does not believe the additional revenue will reach our students. She is not in favor of additional tax increases.

"I am not in favor of the tax because, Number one—It is a time limited tax. When it ends, how will we fund what we have been using it for? Number two—Why are teachers paying for their own raise? They will have to pay the tax to fund their raise. Additionally, look at our inflation. At the end of the day, none of us can afford to pay more in taxes," Patti said. Patti believes the school board needs:

- Leadership
- A restored public trust
- A continuation moving forward with the Financial Recover Plan with a decision to make difficult budgetary decisions, regardless if the proposed referendum passes
- No additional tax increases
- Expanded Opportunities for career and workforce programs for all students
- A focus on serious transportation issues
- An Improvement on Special Education

Patti looks forward to being on the board and helping students:

"I would like to improve our employment program for the ESE students and expand our career-based programs throughout Hillsborough county schools. These are positive things we can do for our kids," she said.




also the businesses that donate towards raffles!" Hill said.

Regional Law Enforcement K9 Memorial Dedication Held on June 29

On a sunny Saturday in 2018, members of the Valrico-based Westside Chapter of the Nam Knights of America Motorcycle Club (NKMC) took a ride throughout Hillsborough County to visit local law enforcement agency memorials. During the ride, one detail became evident to Travis "Rodeo" Wright, Westside Chapter President. There were no memorials to fallen K9 officers at any of the agencies the bikers visited. Wright, a former US Marine and current local law enforcement K9 handler, has a special place in his heart for working the four-legged working K9 partners. From this Saturday adventure, the Westside Chapter members formed the idea of building a Regional Law Enforcement K9 Memorial in Hillsborough County. The sole intent of the memorial would be to honor the region's law enforcement dogs, especially those who had fallen in the line of duty.

Wright is known for his creative ideas and never going about them in a subtle manner. The Westside Chapter members immediately embraced the concept, despite knowing that getting the memorial started was going to incur a roughly \$40,000 price tag. The Club began getting the word out, created artist's concepts of what the finished memorial would represent, and raising the necessary funds for the memorial. An artist to cast a life-size working bronze K9 was selected, and as soon as funds were available, the 12-month process to create the dog was begun. Wright explained, "The Westside Chapter of the Nam Knights Motorcycle Club has a long history of providing assistance to Military Veterans and Law Enforcement in the Bay Area. Each time we take on a project, we hope to make a difference and have a positive impact in the community."

The Nam Knights Motorcycle Club began in the summer of 1989 as a small group of Harley-Davison riding combat Veterans of the Vietnam War, who were also Police Officers. The club was founded by Jack Quigley, now retired Undersheriff of the Bergen County Sheriff's Department in New Jersey. To quote Jack, our founder, "The club was formed to recapture the brotherhood its founding members shared while serving in Southeast Asia, and to help other veterans of all wars who are unable to physically or financially help themselves."

Since that time, the Club has grown to 78 Chapters in 18 states, Washington D.C., and one Canadian province, with hundreds of members that comprise veterans of all eras, as well as Law Enforcement personnel, plus a special dedicated number of patriot members.


The mission of the Nam Knights is to honor the memory of American Veterans and Police Officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty, to assist Veterans and Police Officers in their time of need, and to promote community awareness through sponsorship and participation in various community and fund-raising events.

Wright provided this background on the chapter. "The Westside Chapter of the Nam Knights began in 2006. Since our inception, we have stood fast to the core values of the club. Our accomplishments over the years are a testament to those values of the founder's original intentions. We have donated tens of thousands of dollars through various fundraising events to local charities to include, the Haley House, the Special Operations Warrior Foundation, and the Lynn Sowers Memorial Foundation, just to name a few. We have also held multiple fundraisers for Veterans and Law Enforcement Officers who were suffering from Cancer and other ailments. Approximately six years ago, we started our 'Quarterly Law Enforcement Appreciation Luncheon' where we have provided hundreds of meals to Deputies and Police Officers who tirelessly protect us every day. Many of our accomplishments have no monetary value, but more sweat equity than anything else, such as helping a wounded warrior move into a new home or just providing friendship to a Veteran or Law Enforcement Officer in need."

As only befitting of Florida, on another hot, sunny day, the Regional Law EnforcementK9 Memorial dedication was held at the Temple Terrace Police Department on June 29, 2022. Speaking to the testament of the K9 Memorial that day were Temple Terrace Mayor Andy Ross, Temple Terrace Police Chief Kenneth Albano, and NKMC Westside Chapter President Travis Wright. 38 bricks honoring fallen and deceased K9 officers were unveiled that day, as well as the monument featuring the life-size bronze K9 statue. Numerous law enforcement officers, both active and retired, from agencies around the Tampa Bay, area were in attendance. During one interview, Wright said, ""This memorial will be an important place for people to come and pay respect to all Law Enforcement K9's. I am a local Law Enforcement K9 Handler so there is no doubt this memorial will hold a special place in my heart."




BSHS 2022 Graduate Holds First Art Exhibition


