

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

Unveiling a canvas of possibilities, All Spun Up, a cutting-edge art studio, now resides within the walls of Bury The Hatchet - Axe Throwing, located at 939 Oakfield Drive, in Brandon. These spaces include two hand-spun rooms, one bicycle-spun room, a playful splat room, and the free-flowing pour zone. Conceived by owner Chris Hawkins, All Spun Up was born from a simple realization, "after the excitement of axe throwing at Bury The Hatchet, visitors weren't ready for the night to end." For those eager to embark on the Double Down Adventure, the cost is \$64.99 per person. This includes one hour of painting in the All Spun Up, Art Studio, followed by an hour of axe throwing at Bury The Hatchet. This clever combination not only keeps the night alive, "it also gives your artwork time to dry, ensuring you leave with a tangible memory of your creative journey," explains owner Chris Hawkins. The package includes two 16X20 canvases, six paint colors per person, and, most importantly, an abundance of laughs and memories.










### **Local 95-Year-Old Veteran** Still Serving

Ralph Abenante has had a lifetime of service. Ralph served in the United States Navy for 30 years, retiring as a Chief Warrant Officer (CW4) in 1975. These days, at 95 years young, Ralph can be found serving at the pickleball courts every morning at Bloomingdale East Park.

Ralph is a good sport, sometimes going easy on beginner pickleball players. Everyone has a smile and a hug for Ralph. Ralph especially appreciates hugs.

"Let me tell you, hugging is science. When you hug someone there's a release from your brain that gives you pleasure and makes you feel good. Your brain releases endorphins. Hugging really does that," Ralph said.

Ralph will tell you over and over again that he has had a wonderful life.

"I'm extremely happy. My whole life - I'm lucky. I have great kids. I have my health. I can't tell you how many times people come up and ask me what do I do, what do I eat? I don't have a secret. I lift tough at times. I eat well. I sleep well," Ralph said. "The thing is, if there is something that is why I am who I am. It's because I exercise every single day. I have never ever stopped. I love it. It's like eating breakfast. I have my coffee, do my crosswords - then I start exercising."

Exercise has been part of Ralph's entire life. He started playing tennis when he was young and didn't stop until he was 90. He was tennis champion in the over 40 division in the Navy. In his 70's he was the #2 ranked tennis player in Florida.

It makes sense that most people who meet Ralph think what is most outstanding about him is how active he is at the age of 95. Many, if not most, of his friends are unaware of where his life has taken him and what he accomplished in the Navy.

His long military career includes serving in the Korean War and Vietnam war. He was in the 2% of the Navy selected to be an Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD) Officer. Ralph's EOD job took him all over the world. His division of the EOD department handled everything all over the eastern hemisphere.

Ralph wrapped up his Navy career assigned as secret service for President Nixon. He was awarded The Secret Service Directors Honor Award, the highest award given to a secret service member for saving the lives of 11 secret service members that were trapped in a helicopter that crashed in the ocean.

Although he enjoyed all of it, he doesn't like attention for what he did in the service. "I loved what I did. I'd have done it for nothing. It was exciting and dangerous. I am a civilian now."

He believes it is important to be in the present moment.

"If you live in the past, you will never make it in the present." Ralph said. "I am not the originator of that but it is very true. People have a tendency to say I wish it was this way or that way. If you live that way, you're not going to make it."

Ralph started playing pickleball two years ago at the age of 93. He credits the friends he plays pickleball with for reinvigorating him after his wife Trudy passed away.

"I love the people that are down there (at Bloomindale East Park). More than the game itself, that's what I like. They made a tremendous difference for me. I felt like I was alive again," Ralph said.








# Lithia Author Kaliym Islam Holds Book Signing at Chill Cawfee

On September 23, local author Dr. Kaliym Islam held a book signing for his new book, Pickleball Leadership: Lessons from the Court to the Board Room at Chill Cawfee in Valrico. Islam spoke and shared lessons he learned on the pickleball court. In his book, he parallels the lessons with real-life stories from his friends in the FishHawk Pickball Club, many of which were able to attend the signing.

Sports has a way of teaching unexpected lessons. Dr. Kaylim Islam found a new perspective on leadership when he took up the sport of Pickleball a couple years ago. Just a few weeks after learning to play the game, Islam had what he calls a lightbulb moment after a conversation with another player.


"We were playing a game of mixed doubles. My friend Amber was just hitting the ball right in my chest. I said, 'Amber, I thought we were friends. She said, 'Well, we are friends. But if you don't want the ball hit at you like that, don't put it where you put it. That was a lightbulb moment for me. Wait a minute, I control this. I didn't start thinking of it from the perspective of pickleball. I started thinking about it from the perspective of leaders. For leaders, a lot of times things happen largely because of what leaders do or don't do," Islam said.

Islam realized the fast pace of Pickleball and the strategies in the game mirror the everyday challenges leaders encounter. In his book, Islam shares life lessons from the skills needed to play pickleball. Individuals who want to improve relationships and professionals wanting to hone their business skills will both find useful tools in the book Pickleball Leadership.

With all the practical life skills Islam has gained from the sport, surprisingly he will tell you that the best part of how Pickleball transformed his life is with relationships.

"The thing that I enjoy most about pickleball is the people that I have met. They have been strangers who have become friends. They've become like family," Islam said.

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# Striking Debut for Alafia Elementary School Drum Ensemble

Alafia Elementary's drum ensemble performed October 21 at the Winthrop Pop Up Market. The ensemble is new this school year, meets twice a week after school, and features twenty eight 5th grade students who auditioned to be part of the group.

Music teacher James Hemphill created the ensemble to give students a chance for expression through performance, which builds confidence.

Students play one of four types of Tubano drums and the rhythms are a combination of high and low sounds as well as claps, taps, and movements. The rhythms played at the October performance were merengue rhythms inspired from Caribbean music. The four drums learn different rhythms that interlock and create a piece of music. Teamwork is required as the group sings and plays together as a unit.

"The kids are hard workers and songs can last up to 12 minutes long as they cycle through different parts. Students get up and solo during the pieces and cheer each other on. Every time we play the song comes out a little different. Maybe it goes on longer or more students solo or even stop playing and chant the words to the rhythms. The challenging part is to keep their part going while the other parts come in. Teamwork is a must where the students have to look and communicate while playing to keep their part going," Hemphill said.

"It has been beautiful to see our students celebrate one another, celebrate and honor our diverse cultures and backgrounds, while aspiring to be part of a group who brings music and joy to others," Jackson said.

OASIS Opportunities works closely with school social workers. The social workers identify students in need and ensure they get the necessary resources to overcome barriers for attending school daily.

Flossie Parsley, Bloomingdale High School's social worker, has utilized OASIS Opportunities on a routine basis to ensure students have clothes to wear to school. She is thrilled that Bloomingdale continues to partner with OASIS.

"Prior to the pandemic, Bloomingdale personnel wanted to start their own clothes closest which was way out of the school's scope, so I reached out to OASIS to partner as being a drop-off site so that we could help them fulfill needs," Parsley said.

Donations for OASIS can be brought to Bloomingdale's front office. The most needed items include:

- New or gently used clothing (uniform and non-uniform styles, including youth sizes 2T-Adult 5X)
- Tennis Shoes
- New socks and underwear (youth and adult sizes)

### Three Bulls Inducted Into Bloomingdale Athletics Hall of Fame

On October 13 before the football team's homecoming game, three Bloomingdale Bulls were inducted into the high school's Athletic Hall of Fame. The class includes current major league baseball player Richie Martin, former Lady Bulls soccer player Marissa Kazbour, and former Bloomingdale head baseball coach KB Scull.

Martin, a 2012 graduate, is currently a major league baseball free agent, and spent the last season with the Washington Nationals organization. He was selected by the Seattle Mariners out of high school, but decided to attend the University of Florida instead, where he was a three-year starter at shortstop. He was later selected 20th overall in the first round of the 2015 MLB draft, by the Oakland Athletics. Martin made his major league debut in 2019 with the Baltimore Orioles after being drafted by the organization number one overall in the Rule 5 draft. He is the only former Bloomingdale player that has made it to the major leagues. Martin was nominated by Bloomingdale baseball Head Coach Kris Wilken.

"I felt honored and very blessed," said Martin. "I felt very excited to get back and come and see everybody and just take it all in. When I was playing in high school, I just wanted to help the team win and be the best player and person I could be. I think things like this come as a byproduct."

Kazbour, a 2007 graduate, was a two-time County Player of the Year for the Lady Bulls. She led Bloomingdale to the 2006 state championship game and was a member of the U17 National team. She went on to play soccer for the Florida State Seminoles, where she helped lead her team to the national championship. She twice went on to become the Polk County Coach of the Year at George Jenkins High School and coached her team to a 2012 state final appearance. Kazbour currently coaches her daughter's U11 West Florida Flames team. She was nominated by her former high school head coach, Sue Peet.

"It means a lot. It's great that the school has this," said Kazbour. "I think it's great to be a role model for the kids growing up to say, 'hey, I want to be better than her.' I think it's wonderful. It's awesome for everyone to have a goal and see where the standard is."

KB Scull served as the Bloomingdale baseball head coach for 12 seasons, after being the head man for the Armwood Hawks the previous 10 seasons. In his 12 seasons at Bloomingdale, he led the Bulls to two state final fours and three district titles. He is the winningest coach in Bloomingdale history with 330 career wins. Scull continues to work as a teacher at the school, and can be seen at all athletic events as the Athletic Business Manager. He was also nominated by Kris Wilken.

"I was pretty shocked. I came in one morning and they said they wanted to see me and then they gave me an envelope and I opened it up and it was pretty cool. This is great," said Scull. "I got to see a lot of my former players and they were a big part of this."

Scull thanked former Athletic Director Donny Peek for starting this program several years ago. It was recently brought back after Covid. The inductees were selected by a panel of coaches, athletic boosters and administration.

"This is the first year having the Athletic Hall of Fame back since Covid. Dr. Peek started this tradition when he was the APA here, and I have the privilege to continue this great tradition! It was a great night celebrating our inductees and it was really special to see how many former coaches, players, and administrators came out to support them. When you talk about the hall of fame, it's not just about their amazing athletic accomplishments but also about the impact they have made on Bloomingdale as a whole. We have such a strong culture of community here and that is only possible through people like Marissa, KB, and Richie. It was truly an honor to recognize them.

I also have to say a big thank you to our Athletic Booster Club for all their work behind the scenes to organize this event!" Bloomingdale Athletic Director Sara Bogue




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
