# Our Times We Need Classroom Space...And Lots Of It

In 1971, when forced busing to achieve desegregation first came to my high school, the result was overcrowding. Separation of church and state was ignored when overflow classes had to be housed in the Methodist church Sunday school classrooms across the street. My graduating class numbered 745, and the next year my high school was placed on double sessions.

Ironically, as the county eliminates forced busing and implements its cluster plan in our area, Bloomingdale High will be on double sessions with an anticipated enrollment of over 3,000 in the 96-97 school year.

The only relief in sight is still a long way away. Right now, eastern Hillsborough County needs three new high schools. Although Durant will open this fall without a senior class and an enrollment of over 1500, the following year it will be up to capacity. Property has been located for one high school in the Boyette Springs area. Another elementary school and middle school are also hoped for

None of it will be possible, however, without passage of a 1/2 cent sales tax, a referendum for which is needed but which first must have legislative approval. This tax would generate some \$63 million a year for capital improvements and new construction.

Putting things into perspective, the new Durant High School cost \$30 million to build and another \$5.3 million to equip. The funds generated by the 1/2 cent sales tax could conceivably fund two new schools a year.

In 1979, Brandon High School was the largest high school in the state. With an enrollment of over 4,000 students, the school survived with overlapping triple sessions. Members of the Greater Brandon Chamber of Commerce lobbied the state legislature in the grains of 1980 for funds to build two new

efforts were Armwood and Bloomingdale high schools.

What I remember most about those triple sessions was how unfair it was that the football players had to attend the earliest session because of afternoon practices. Some students were getting home from school later than their parents from the workplace. Participation in clubs and extracurricular activities was difficult and almost nonexistent. Seniors didn't know juniors, and sophomores didn't have upperclassmen to look up to.

The county says double sessions will save them money. Two high schools will be carried on under one roof with only one set of administrators, and no duplication of materials or equipment. But the county also admits that it is not a benefit to the students. I was glad to miss out on double sessions. It is inevitable for all who will remain at Bloomingdale after next year.

Bloomingdale is not the only school that will suffer the effects of overcrowding. Already, Alafia Elementary exceeds capacity, its play yard lined with portable classrooms. In the fifth grades, classroom numbers exceed 35. With all the sixth and seventh graders due to return to our area year after next, Burns will surpass the 2,000 mark. Shifting boundaries will not accomplish anything, because Lithia Springs and Boyette Springs are already overcrowded and Durant will have a full load of 9th-12th graders.

With 13 new schools already built or under construction, Hillsborough County can still not keep up with the 3,000 new students it receives each year. It is in our area of rapid community growth - not in Tampa or the inner city - where the county will be strapped for classroom space over the next decade, adding some 125 new portables each year.



# Making Strides Against Cancer

Members of the Brandon Unit of the American Cancer Society held their sixth annual "Making Strides" Walk for Cancer last month at Bloomingdale Park East. Over 300 Brandon residents assembled at 8 a.m. to register for the 4.2 mile walk around Natures Way and Culbreath.

The society hopes to realize over \$15,000 in pledges, according to Brandon Unit director Melissa Snow. Proceeds from the event will fund the Cancer Society's survivor's support system which provides transportation, pain medication, wigs and medical supplies, education, and support groups to area cancer survivors.

Local radio station Q105 was on hand to emcee the event, and several restaurants and distributors provided food and drinks for participants. Local businesses and individuals made financial contributions, the largest of which was made by an anonymous individual who wishes only to be known as "A Friend of Brandon."

Entertainment was provided by local high school groups, including the Bloomingdale High LEO Club, and a touching moment occurred when the dancerettes from the Brandon School of Dance Arts performed in honor of classmate Kelly Mitchell, a 14-year old who was diagnosed with bone cancer earlier this year.

The event's honorary chairperson was Laurie Walsh, a young mother whose cancer was diagnosed during pregnancy. She is now in total remission and doing very well.



## **Meet Joyce Uphoff**

There are many levels of community service within each neighborhood. One major area is the improvement of the physical community, such as park restoration, Homeowners' Associations, and the beautification and general maintenance of the area. However, few people are willing to go out into the community and give direct assis-

tance and help to those in need.

Joyce Uphoff is one of those few unsung heroes who has been donating unselfishly her time and unlimited efforts for the past eight years. She is heavily involved in the Emergency Care Help Organization, most commonly referred to as ECHO.

It is a nonprofit organization that is operated only by volunteers. All money and donations are collected by

volunteers, and it receives no outside funding. ECHO gets no government or United Way help. So far this year ECHO has taken care of 1,029 people and 5,066 total people for 1994.

ECHO was started eight years ago by the Ministerial Association, but broke away five years ago, and is now a separate entity. Presently, it has no religious affiliations. On occasion, some churches lend support, but most help comes from individual donations

ECHO has one yearly fund raiser,

which is an annual golf tournament. This year it is going to be held on April 21, at Summerfield Golf Course, at Big Bend

ECHO not only organizes canned food drives, they also distribute clothes to those who are in need. They limit people to one donation session every six months, and they are entitled to receive help four times

> total. In each trip, an individual or family receives seven full days of groceries. Each member of the family is entitled to pick out five outfits, plus shoes, if needed. Each child in the family also receives two new pairs of underwear.

**ECHO** heavily depends on the Boy Scouts for additional fund raisers. This year, two Bloomingdale High School clubs were involved with

gathering much needed items for the organization. At one point, ECHO was running short of food and other supplies. Learning this, the Leo and Key clubs of Bloomingdale High School organized a canned food drive. This was greatly appreciated by Joyce and the other members of ECHO. The students actually went door-to-door and collected what they could. Fortunately the clubs were very successful.

Every community in Hillsborough County should be as fortunate as ours to have a resident like Joyce Uphoff.

## Tia's Serves Up Real Tex-Mex

I know it has been a while since I've visited a local restaurant and I apologize for the long interruption. During this extended hiatus, I planned many activities revolving around restaurant reviews, but alas nothing fruitful developed.

Meantime, it seems like some exciting and interesting restaurants have opened in our backyard. Tia's, Bedroc's, and Mozzarella's are just a few. As of this date, we have tried just one, and I couldn't be happier to share our experience with you.

Tia's Tex-Mex Restaurant at 144 Brandon Town Center Drive is an authentic Tex-Mex Cantina style restaurant. There are differences between traditional Mexican restaurants and honest-to-goodness Tex-Mex food. Having moved to the Brandon area from Texas, we have had very few opportunities to enjoy authentic Tex-Mex until Tia's!

My wife settled in on the steak fajitas. There are five different fajita selections starting a \$7.45 for the veggie fajitas to \$7.95 for steak fajitas. These prices are certainly a welcome treat for your dining out budget and my wife agreed that it was "just like back in Texas" and the guacamole was darn good also. Other entrees include grilled chicken dishes, chile rellenos, Texas sizzler (mesquite grilled sirloin) and the rib/shrimp combo. These entrees start at \$6.25 and go up to \$14.95.

The unique entrees, of course, are the Mexican combinations. You can choose from the Presidente which is two chicken enchiladas with sour cream, one chicken taco al carbon and one tamale with chile con carne. How about Tia's dinner which includes guacamole salad and chile con queso as an appetizer, with one cheese and one beef enchilada topped with chili con

carne and sprinkled with chopped green onions. There is also the Juarez, the San Antonio, or the Matamoros as well as many others.

I chose the enchilada plate served with rice, Charra beans (these are not refried, they are served in a cup). There are also three cheese or spinach enchiladas. Also an array of chimichangas and burritos are available for an entree selection. I chose the cheese. With the Mexican combinations, enchiladas, burritos, or chimichangas you also get your choice of a special sauce. Choose from Chile Con Carne, Spanish, Sour Cream, Green Chile, Chile con Queso or Caliente. And if these are not spicy enough, just ask for the special hot sauce selection.

Yes, they are open for lunch, 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, and they do have a child's menu (under 12) for \$2.50 with a soft drink included. Incidentally, if I forgot to mention it, the iced tea is served in 32 oz glasses, so you won't run out after swigs, and the chips are served within one minute of being


Our total including tax and gratuity was less than \$22 for a very good meal.

## Student Numbers Create Class Crunch School Official Pushes Sales Tax To Parents

They came expecting answers. They left without them. They came knowing that their school was filled beyond capacity. They left worrying that their children's educational future would be compromised by overcrowded classrooms, a lack of instructional materials, and schools on double sessions. They received a sales pitch for the 1/2 cent tax referendum, and they left wondering where all their tax dollars are being spent.

Weeks before area school director Larry Martin was scheduled to visit with the Alafia PTA last month, he was sent a list of questions that the parents wanted answered. The hope, said PTA president Suzie Wiesenhart, was that Martin would have answers to these questions rather than be caught off guard and "tell us he'd have to look into it."

The most pressing question was the issue of overcrowding at Alafia. Parents wanted to know what, if anything, the school system had planned for accommodating the children of Bloomingdale East with the addition of nearly 1,100 new homes over the next five years.

Already at 1,250 students, Alafia's enrollment could reach a staggering 1,500 over the next two years. Some classes already exceed 30. Martin said the numbers would be worked out through attrition of students and the addition of portable classrooms.

When Bloomingdale's cluster plan goes into effect in the 1996-97 school year, Alafia will not be affected, but Burns will receive sixth and seventh graders who were previously bused, and Bloomingdale will take on the ninth graders from Burns, resulting in double sessions for the high school.

"We're bringing all the sixth and seventh graders back into Brandon without a place to put them," said Martin.

Burns, already at 1,500 students, may not be able to house the incoming sixth graders. Should that happen, the new elementary school "I" on South Miller Road would become a Burns satellite school and home to those sixth graders.

Martin announced this area's need for a new elementary and middle school, funds for which have been earmarked should the tax pass, and said that property has already been located for a new high school in the Boyette Springs area.."

If passed by the legislature and then by the voters, the tax would generate \$63 million a year. The current cost of building a new school is \$25 to \$30 million and rising. In the last eight years, the south Brandon area has received six new schools, more than any other single area of the county.







# Garber Legacy Should Keep Bulls On Top

A state championship is the only honor that has eluded Jo Garber during her tenure as coach of the Bloomingdale girls' soccer team. And just when it looks like next year's team might be the dream-maker, Garber will not be there to enjoy it.

After 20 years of coaching soccer, the last eight at Bloomingdale, the revered coach is hanging up her cleats in order to spend time with her children. A job transfer for her husband means the couple is moving to Sarasota, but with a hiring freeze on in that county, Garber hopes to land a teaching job in this area. Her position as health instructor at BHS was tied into the coaching slot.

She leaves behind a team that will see 10 to 12 seniors returning next year, a bittersweet outlook for Garber, who in the past, has had only four or five seniors return each season.

"I'm happy to be turning over such an experienced team full of strong seniors," she said. "I know whoever comes in will change things but they will be taking over a program with a strong reputation. We are respected statewide."

A trophy case full of soccer accolades earned that respect through seven district titles, four Western Conference championships, four regional wins, one sectional honor and a stint as state runner-up. Garber proudly adds that every senior who has pursued a college scholarship has received one.

"The pleasure for me has been in watching the players mature not only as athletes but as individuals.

For the past four years, Garber's players have held clinics and worked with youngsters in the Brandon Area Youth Soccer League (BAYSL). "It was really neat to see my kids teaching younger players the things I have taught them. That's the greatest compliment a coach can receive."

Garber, mother of three, was recruited into coaching youth soccer when her oldest son began playing in a recreational league nearly 20 years ago. By virtue of her physical education degree, it was assumed she would be the most qualified coach. She taught phys ed for 16 years at Mann and Turkey Creek Junior High schools, before joining the faculty at the new Bloomingdale High when it opened eight years ago.

weekend tending to and playing with the rabbits. Pat reports the rabbits seem to find this quality time sufficient.

"Our children will put the harness and leash on the bunnies, and they like to hop around the backyard," she

Bunnies are intelligent animals and require mental stimulation in the form of toys, exercise, and social interaction (from people, other rabbits, or other animals). Pat often finds the children and various combinations of pets playing happily together.

The rabbits, Mama Bunny, Daddy Bunny and Pumpkin, live in a comfortably sheltered bunny hutch in the backyard. At one time, the Boodys did have a full time house rabbit.

"Leo was litterbox trained, slept on the bathroom floor, and was a really special member of the family," Pat recalls fondly.

"A common misconception is that bunnies bite and scratch and must be kept in their cages at all times. Through their experience with many breeds of different temperaments and personalities, the Boodys have found that most rabbits can be domesticated and taught appropriate behavior,

much like a puppy, if they are given the opportunity to interact regularly with the family.

Debbie Taylor, supervisor of the Humane Society of Tampa Bay, says that rabbits need regular daily exercise and socialization. "A bunny does need a hutch for sleeping and for when he cannot be attended," said Taylor, "but should be taken out and played with and socialized as a part of the family, just as you would do with a dog or a cat."

The cage should be large enough for them to hop around a bit and stretch out in, and although they may be kept outside, should be sheltered from direct sunlight. The House Rabbit Society, whose primary consideration is the welfare of house rabbits, stresses the importance of protecting rabbits from temperature extremes, predators, electrical cords, rough handling and poisons.

House rabbits should be fed a diet of commercial rabbit chow supplemented by carrots and occasional treats. Breeders caution against providing lettuce or cabbage as a snack since leafy greens can cause digestive problems and even death in pet rabbits.

Karen Cheeks, operations supervisor of the Humane Society, encourages anyone looking for a pet rabbit to call the society, which does have available for adoption a small number of rabbits each year, most commonly (and sadly)

after the Easter holiday.

"We hope that people will take the time to be certain that any pet being considered for adoption will fit into their lifestyle," said Cheeks. "It is not fair to adopt a pet if you cannot keep it for the remainder of its life." Rabbits may live to be seven to 10 years old depending on health, living conditions, and stress.

Rabbits are inquisitive, sociable animals that are well suited to the indoors. Indeed they are lovable (did you know they can purr?) and with patience and attention can be trained. Parents who decide to bring a real Easter bunny home this spring, may find it to be a very gentle, enjoyable addition to the family.
