Better Safe Than Sorry

On February 21, 2001, administrators at Bloomingdale Senior High School ordered the evacuation and lock-down of the school in response to a threatening phone call. Students were held outside the school while the authorities searched and secured the buildings, from 11 a.m. until buses arrived at the usual 2:50 p, m, dismissal time. The threat thankfully turned out to be a false alarm.

Some students and parents criticized the school administration for exposing the students to prolonged beat, thirst and waiting, and for denying some students' requests to walk off campus or to contact their parents. Students were also forbidden to use their cell phones, since cellular waves can trip electronic devices.

The writer, Howard Raymond, is a Bloomingdale resident and volunteer reading tutor at Bloomingdale High.

I arrived at Bloomingdale High School at about 12:45 p.m. on Wednesday, February 21. The front of the campus was eerily quiet and almost devoid of any students or faculty. I saw two or three Security Patrol cars parked in front of the campus, and a Sheriffs Deputy vehicle parked in its assigned place.

A Security Patrol officer informed me that I could not enter the school because of a bomb threat and subsequent lock down of the campus. The students and faculty had been moved out of harm's way to the athletic field while the authorities conducted a search of the buildings. I was invited to go home or join the students and faculty.

I decided on the latter. Discretion never has been the better part of my valor.

The students and faculty had been sent to the athletic field

at 11 a.m., and were told to stay there until the "all clear" order was given. By the time I arrived, the weather had turned very hot for a February day. The students were getting thirsty and impatient.

Some enterprising cafeteria staff members gave out cans of soda pop and bottles of water to satisfy the student's thirst. But, life being basically unfair, there was not enough liquid to

> Much to the dismay of the students and faculty alike, buses were not available to take the students home until the usual 2:50 p.m. dismissal time. Some students asked to be allowed to walk home, and their request was denied. In the interest of safety and order, it was decided that the entire student body would be held until the buses arrived on campus.

The overriding factor in the administration's reluctance to allow students to walk home was the possibility of harm coming to them. Certainly the construction on Bloomingdale Avenue right in front of the school was another mitigating factor in the decision to hold the students until the buses and other transportation arrived.

The students and adults involved in the lock down on February 21 will undoubtedly

remember the heat, thirst and impatience they endured that day. Fortunately, we will have no tragic TV pictures to remind us of something worse than temporary discomfort and incon-

Using 20/20 hindsight, it does not matter whether this instance was a false alarm or not. Strict precautionary measures must be taken to ensure the safety of our students and faculty in any situation deemed to be unsafe, threatening or potentially disastrous. In my opinion, the actions of the school's administration were totally appropriate. After all, if I had been there at 11 a.m., they would have been protecting my life as well.

New school site purchase approved

The Hillsborough County School Board approved the \$955,000 purchase of 21 acres of land for a new Bloomingdale elementary school at a March 13, 2001 meeting.

The multiple-parcel property is situated on the east side of Culbreath Road, just south of Natures Way Boulevard, within the community of Bloomingdale East.

The board also approved a plan to model the new school

after McKitrick Elementary, presently under construction by Howard and Associates Architects on Van Dyke Road in north Tampa.

County documents indicate that construction costs are limited to \$7,487,594 derived from county impact fees. Impact fees re countymposed levies

designed to support emerging communities with needed facilities and services.

Batson-Cook Company will serve as construction manager for the project.

School Board officials anticipate opening the school for the 2002-2003 school year. New school boundaries will divide the main Alafia attendance area in Bloomingdale East, and are likely to include satellite groups from Bloomingdale West and the northern Lithia Springs Elementary attendance area.

Public meetings to determine boundaries for the school will be announced this fall.

Controlled School Choice approved in federal court

A federal court in March approved a new plan that will allow Hillsborough County families to choose which schools their children attend, and eliminates busing "satellite groups" of students to meet race ratio requirements.

The Unitary Status Plan, approved by the Hillsborough County School Board in 2000, will be gradually phased in over the next three years, giving parents "controlled choice" within one of seven choice zones. The district's current 18 school clusters will be divided into seven regions or choice zones.

Making a difference

Many people go through life hoping to make a positive difference in the lives of others. A lot of those people chose the very respectable and challenging profession of teaching. Many of us remember a teacher or teachers who made a difference

I recently met one such person. Her name is Ruth Dean. Miss Dean was born in Kentucky, met her husband at Camp Campbell, and moved to Eustis, Florida, where she began a thirty-seven year career teaching elementary students. At 83 years young, she is still full of energy and eager to make a difference in the lives of young children.

Not long after moving here where two of her sons live, Ruth dove right in and volunteered to work with at-risk elementary school children. She began her volunteer work with a teacher at Kingswood Elementary who had thirty-seven third grade students, some reading at the first grade level.

After admitting defeat, Ruth says, "I took them on one-byone and began to really understand each child. They began to trust me and many told me their sad, almost unbelievable stories. Many have home situations most people could never understand."

"What was so impressive to me," she said, "was how they ecepted their mixed-up lives as normal, and how their spirit

to live and learn, up to this point, was unconsumed."







For the residents who let their pets use the landscaping area as a latrine, their residue is killing the plants.

However, just recently I loaned him a pair of binoculars to use and didn't know the eye cups were latex. He had a classic allergic response consisting of itchy red swollen eyes. Carried to the extreme, latex allergies can be life threatening. Even inhaling the powder from the latex gloves can cause asthma like symptoms.

If you suspect that you are allergic to latex, please inform your dentist so that he or she may select another type of glove for your treatment. Lastly, if you suffer with symptoms such as low blood pressure, nausea, labored breathing, hives, tingling sensations or itchiness, following exposure to latex, let your dentist know immediately.

County proposes four possible sites for new library

Plans for a new South Brandon public library branch are on fast-forward.

Hillsborough County staff and Library Advisory Board members are working closely together to expedite the project. Their goal is to have a site selected by October of this year and open for business in 2004.

All four sites under consideration meet cost, development and expansion potential requirements. Location factors taken into consideration include convenience, visibility and proximity to existing branch locations.

"We are moving very quickly with the South Brandon branch compared to other similar projects," said Stines. "The South

County area is experiencing a tremendous amount of residential growth and is in great need of additional library services."

"If Brandon were incorporated, it would be a bigger city than Tallahassee."

Mike Kelly, County Real Estate Department Director,

announced in March four potential sites for the South Brandon branch.

"We identified four sites that meet our preliminary cri ria," said Kelly.

All four sites under consideration meet requirements for site cost, location and convenience and development and expansion potential. Visibility and proximity to existing branch locations were also taken into consideration.

Site 1 is adjacent to Lithia Springs Elementary School within the community of River Hills in Lithia.

Site 2 is west of and adjacent to Bloomingdale Senior High School on Bloomingdale Avenue in Valrico.


Site 3 is northeast of the Lithia Pinecrest and Bloomingdale Avenue intersection in Valrico, behind Albertson's Supermarket within the community of Buckhorn.

Site 4 is located within the community of Bloomingdale East, off Natures Way Boulevard, just west of Alafia Elementary School.

Preliminary plans call for an initial 10,000 square foot library, designed for future expansion to 25,000 square feet. The facility will eventually include several innovative features,

including meeting rooms and a state of the art computer lab. The size of the library property will vary depending on the site chosen. Some of the sites include multiple-owner parcels and surrounding areas of wetlands. The property will be in the range of 4 to 5 acres, not including wetlands.

Springvale rezoning request

Bloomingdale resident John Yake noted that the owner of the 11.2 acres on Springvale Drive is facing a "procedural discontinuance because he did not follow correct procedures." The "Notice of Public Hearing" sign is posted, and residents should continue to contact Commissioner Storms' office and express their objections.

New elementary school

The Hillsborough County School Board approved the purchase of a 21-acre site at the southern intersection of Natures Way and Culbreath Road. (See related story in this issue).

Lights and sidewalks

Lights and sidewalks needed near the new elementary school site will be included in the contract for construction of the school.

Abandoned dogs

Hillsborough County Animal Services will work with residents to trap the dogs running loose in the vicinity of the south intersection of Natures Way and Culbreath Road.

New library

Detailed drawings showed four several proposed sites for a new library (see related story in this issue). No mention was made of the property on the east side of Bloomingdale High School.

Glenhaven/Bell Shoals Road traffic signal

Several residents expressed concerns about the need for a traffic signal at this intersection. Standard traffic studies will be conducted and evaluated.

Proposed Publix at Lithia

Pinecrest/Bloomingdale Avenue

Reviewed by the B.O.C.C. and postponed for further changes requested by the B.O.C.C. and in coordination with Publix Corporation.

Canoe Launch

Recommendation for the proposed Bell Shoals Road canoe launch by Parks and Recreation was presented to the B.O.C.C. Residents with objections should attend the budget meetings on May 14th and 21st. Check the Hillsborough County website for details or contact Phil Evans at 903-2258.

Speed humps

County will consider changing the current rule that requires 60% of residents on a street to sign approval and 90% of neighborhood to sign "yes or no", to just the 60% approval requirement."

Drug problem task force

Resident Ellen gates called for a joint task force to be developed that would study the problem of drug use and work to reduce the demand. Commissioner Storms said she would be glad to facilitate this project.

Deputy for Park West

Jeff Mauch from Parks and Recreation stated that the site has been selected, funds were received in November and the required permits are being processed as fast as possible. One of the most critical elements of the process is finding the right person to fill the position

Growth management

Commissioner Storms said.

"Growth is not an issue. [Growth] is due to people having babies and people moving into our area, things that can't be controlled. Moratoriums on growth can't be used because they would seriously affect too many people like those who work for subcontractors."

Erindale /Lithia traffic signal

Several residents expressed concerns about the dangerous Erindale Drive/Lithia Pinecrest Road intersection. Growth in the Fish Hawk area and other areas east on Lithia Pinecrest Road has significantly increased traffic at this location. It will be evaluated.

Trash

Several residents mentioned problems with the waste management contractor. They were advised to contact the waste management contractor and Hillsborough county Solid Waste Management. Commissioner Storms expressed serious concerns about the roadside trash problem. There is currently no specific department task with covering this problem. Commissioner Storms indicated that she is looking into contracting with a private company to handle it.
