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



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Vandals Torch Tot Playground

More than 25,000 of Hillsborough County taxpayers' dollars were hard at work in March - all to replace playground equipment destroyed by vandals.

Jeff Mauch, Hillsborough County Parks, Recreation and Conservation maintenance unit supervisor, said sometime during the evening of Jan. 3, vandals set fire to one of two play structures at Bloomingdale East Neighborhood Park on Natures Way.

"A resident reported one of the tot play structures was on fire and firefighters and police responded," Mauch said. Funds to repair the damage - which Mauch said exceeded \$25,000 - were allocated from county coffers.

Vandalism is an ongoing problem in many communities, and Bloomingdale is no exception. Repairs for the county-owned playground were accomplished through county monies, but funds to repair vandalism damage to Bloomingdale community property





residents pay annually to the Bloomingdale Special Taxing

All property owners in Bloomingdale pay a special tax included on their annual property tax bill for community maintenance and improvements. The tax, currently \$100 per residence or property, will

come directly from a special tax rise to \$130 a year for fiscal year 2008. Obviously, money would best be spent on community improvement projects and not vandalism repairs.

Mauch asked residents be vigilant and to supervise their children. To report vandalism or suspicious activities (non-emergency only) call the sheriff's office, (813) 247-8200.

Resident Proposes Neighborhood Skate Park

A grass-roots effort is underway to gauge community support for the construction of a skate park in Bloomingdale. Although a proposed site has not yet been identified, proponent Joe Bledsoe, a Bloomingdale resident, wants to determine if there is sufficient community need, desire and support to create such a park.

Bledsoe said more than 12 million people in the United States currently enjoy skate-boarding and the sport encourages more people of all ages to go outside and develop healthy, active lifestyles.

In addition, Bledsoe said, building a public skate park and including skaters in all aspects of the process - organization, fundraising, and design - would draw skaters into the civic process and cement their ties to the community. They would also learn that some things take time, and that patience and persistence often pay off.

Bledsoe is inviting residents to weigh in on the proposed skate park by sending an e-mail to him at bloomingdaleskate-park@verizon.net. Comments for or against the park are welcome, and writers may include contact information or choose to remain anonymous. Writers may also simply respond with "AGREE" or "DISAGREE" in the subject line.

Bledsoe said he will tally all the responses he receives and decide where to go from there.

Although the Blooming-dale Homeowners Association board has not formally been approached regarding a skate park and takes no position at this time, the board encourages residents to respond to Bledsoe's request with any opinions or comments they may have regarding the construction of a neighborhood skate park.

Report Broken Sidewalks

At a recent meeting of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, the board of directors was asked to address the deteriorating condition of sidewalks in our community. The main areas of concern are safety issues that could arise from broken and misaligned sidewalks, as well as the esthetics of "temporary fix" asphalt repairs.

The board agreed that asphalt

repairs to concrete sidewalks can suffice as a temporary fix, but the unsightly repairs are becoming all too common and seemingly permanent throughout Bloomingdale.

The homeowners association board in March contacted Hill-sborough County regarding the condition of and repair process for sidewalks. The great news is that the county has agreed to take a different approach to

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

repairing our sidewalks. Beginning immediately, county representatives said, sidewalks with joints that are less than 1.5 inches high will be ground down, and joints more than 1.5 inches high - as well as broken sections - will be replaced.

The board of directors asks neighbors to help identify sections of sidewalk that may require repairs or replacement. Residents are asked to e-

mail details about the sidewalk condition and location, including the number of the TECO power pole closest to the site, to BHA board member George May at gtiv@aol.com. Information provided will be forwarded to the county and will help to maintain and improve the beautiful community of Bloomingdale.

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
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Vandalism Damage Repairs Sap District Funds

Bloomingdale Special Taxing District Property Manager Al Devney oversees maintenance and improvements to community common areas such as entryways, landscaping and irrigation. Devney submits a report each month to the taxing district board of trustees. The following is a synopsis of the property manager's report for February 2008. To report a community maintenance need, contact Devney at (813) 684-6667 or bloomingdale.district@verizon.

Vandalism increased in February. Two trash can inserts were stolen on Canoga Park Drive (\$26); 12 light bulbs, two light receptacles, three rotors and three holly bushes were broken or damaged at the Treeline Drive entrance (\$126); and nine aluminum pickets and a 9-foot section of aluminum fence were stolen on Erindale Drive (\$600). In addition, two lights, six irrigation risers and five sprinkler heads were destroyed at the Clareside Drive entrance (\$315). Total damage repair costs due to vandalism for the month were \$1,067.

There were three accidents involving community property damage in February, including

on Erindale Drive and Garnet Drive and one car versus brick wall crash on Groveway Drive. The first two accidents were repaired and billed. At the time of this writing, the TECO power pole and damaged wall has been fenced off. Proposals to repair extensive damage to the electrical and irrigation systems have been received. Proposals to replace damaged landscaping, reinstall the sign and rebuild the wall are in progress.

According to the plans to widen Bell Shoals Road from Glenhaven Drive to Rosemead Drive (which engineers said are about 60 percent complete), work should begin in 2009 and sleeves will be installed in the medians in case there is a future need to irrigate them.

Flags Unlimited installed a new flag and pole in the Erindale Drive median. Morningstar Electric replaced the outlet boxes destroyed in accidents in the Erindale and Garnet Drive medians. The landscaping was set to be replaced in late February or early March after the last chance for cold-kill.

To correct a line-of-sight problem at the Tyndale Drive entrance, Davidson Landscaping moved a palm tree and bush grouping from the Windell

two car versus median incidents Drive entrance on the south side of Erindale Drive to a location across the street.

The Tampa Tribune was called to request removal of their abandoned newspaper box at Bloomingdale Avenue and Culbreath Road, and the box was removed the next day.

A line-of-sight problem at the corner of Culbreath Road and Bloomingdale Avenue was researched at the request of a concerned resident. A sign at the intersection was determined to be a potential safety hazard for motorists trying to make a right-hand turn to go east on Bloomingdale Avenue. Deputy Pete Maurer was notified and concurred; he will address the problem with the appropriate



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
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Contest **Promotes Buff, Healthy Bodies**

match; and proportion, wherein no one body area is more developed than others.


The senior class fundraising event netted \$3,000 for this year's prom, and all contestants received gift certificates for their efforts.

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Citizen Cops Converge **On Community**

Brandon Knight was among 20 Bloomingdale area residents who graduated from a classroom training course that aims to put citizen volunteers on neighborhood streets to act as extra eyes and ears for sheriff's deputies.

Knight, who has lived in Bloomingdale for about three years, said the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office Citizens On Patrol program is a great way to help deter neighborhood

After completing field training this month, volunteers will monitor Bloomingdale area neighborhoods in marked patrol cars. Knight was among the numerous volunteers who graduated from classroom training in February.

"The patrol vehicle alone is enough to get people to slow down in our neighborhoods," he said.

Three weeks of classroom

training began in January and included basic law enforcement guidelines, radio procedures, first aid, traffic control, and scenariobased role play.

"The training was extensive and we had a wide array of people of all ages in class," Knight said.

"Every step of the way there was a dedicated deputy whose job was to ensure your success," said graduate Evan Blicker.

The recent graduates are currently undergoing field training under the supervision of seasoned volunteers from the Apollo Beach Citizens On Patrol program. Training consists of patrolling with instructors during three six-hour shifts in specially marked and outfitted vehicles. During patrols, new volunteers receive hands-on direction and advice concerning patrolling techniques and procedures, routes, and standards. From there, the new "cops" are required to complete a minimum

of one six-hour shift per month.

Deputy Lorraine Jordan, program coordinator, said, "I saw a tremendous amount of heart and dedication from this group. For all of them, it was about taking back their community and getting out there to be a crime deterrent."

One field training officer, Bloomingdale resident Kathy Samuelson, said she joined the Apollo Beach group about a year ago is excited the program has begun in her neighborhood.

"This is a fantastic program that helps bring neighbors together," Samuelson said. "The more volunteers we get, the more residents will see us out there patrolling the streets in their neighborhoods."

Deputy Jordan said there is no limit to the number of volunteers who may apply for the program. Interested applicants can contact Jordan at (813) 247-


