Karl to speak at author event

Attorney and public servant, Fred Karl, will be the featured speaker at the first annual "Breakfast with an Author" event hosted by the Friends of the Library of Tampa-Hillsborough County, Inc. at the University Club, 38th floor, One Tampa City Center in downtown Tampa Friday, April 9, from 7 to 9 a.m.

Mr. Karl's career in law and public service spans more than 50 years. He has led several of Florida's major public institutions, serving as a Florida Supreme Court justice, state representative, state senator and state public council. Locally his career has included positions as county administrator, county attorney, city attorney and CEO of Tampa General Hospital. Hillsborough County recognized his leadership by the naming of the Frederick B. Karl County Center in hi honor.

Mr. Karl's book, "The 57 Club: My Four Decades in Florida Politics," has just been published by University Press of Florida. His story portrays a group of Florida legislators and their political friends and enemies in a time of intense turmoil that marked the late 1950s and '60s in Florida. The book has the potential to become an important part of the literature about Florida's rich political history.

An individual ticket to the event is \$50 and a patron ticket which includes a copy of the book is \$100. Table sponsorship opportunities are also available. 
Spicy Jalapeno Shrimp and Pasta

12 ounces fresh or frozen peeled and deveined large shrimp 8 ounces dried linguine or angel hair pasta, preferably whole grain or whole wheat Nonstick cooking spray 1 or 2 fresh jalapeno peppers, seeded and finely chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 2 cups cherry tomatoes, halved or guartered, or chopped tomatoes 1/4 teaspoon grated fresh ginger 1 teaspoon lime juice 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper Finely shredded Parmesan cheese (optional)

Thaw shrimp, if frozen. Rinse shrimp; pat dry with paper towels. Meanwhile, cook pasta according to package directions.

Coat an unheated large nonstick skillet with cooking spray. Preheat over medium-high heat. Add jalapeno peppers and garlic to hot skillet; cook and stir for 1 minute. Add shrimp; cook and stir about 3 minutes more or until shrimp are opaque. Stir in tomatoes, freshly grated ginger, lime juice, salt, and black pepper; heat through.

Drain pasta; toss with shrimp mixture. If desired, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.
