

# **College opens in Bloomingdale**

#### **By D'Ann Lawrence White**

Whether they're embarking on their first career or changing careers, Bloomingdale residents now can train at a college in their own back vard.

Southern Technical College recently opened at 608 E. Bloomingdale Ave., offering career training for students looking to enter electrical or medical office and billing fields.

At the 22,000-square-foot college campus, students can earn. associates of science degrees in medical assisting, medical billing and coding, electrical trades, technology and applied electronics technology, including heating, ventilation and air-conditioning repair. The campus is undergoing a three-phase remodeling project that will include state-of-the-art computer, electronic and medical labs along with a library and administrative offices.

"This is for the nontraditional student who wants to start a career in a shorter period of time," said Southern Technical College Dean Walt Wilfong, "people who've already been out there working and want to start a new career or get ahead in the career they're in. It's for the high school graduate who's had to put his college on hold or for the older worker looking for a career change."

And, in this unstable economy, Wilfong expects to attract a number of students who have been laid off from jobs and are looking to start new careers.

The age of the students at the college will range from recent high school graduates to the 60s, he said.

"We researched programs that were needed in the area that employers were looking for and came up with these offerings," said Wilfong.

He said there is a high demand for medical assistants in doctor's offices, clinics and hospitals as well as a need for medical billing specialists to handle insurance Wilfong and claims.


