Your Special Taxing District Board of Directors haven't said much to you, the residents, in the past. Frankly, there hasn't been a lot to say. Since there have been very few residents attending the meetings, we feel there will be much to gain by a regular article. The Gazette has graciously allowed us space each month to bring you the STD news. We will periodicly restate our purpose for the new residents and keep you informed of the "going ons."

Most of our meetings have been dry, tedious, and quite honestly, boring. Just ask the two Gazette reporters that have sat through a few. But that is the way we must do business—slow, methodical, and exactly. We meet every second Monday of each month, and often every two weeks. The regular meetings are announced in the Gaz—

open to all. We always meet at the Bloomingdale Community Church on Bloomingdale Ave. If any resident would like to address the Board in formal meetings we ask that you contact any member with a brief idea of your presentation so that you may be placed on the agenda. This will greatly ease the flow of the evening's business and assure you time to talk.

In the last few months we have written job specifications for the mowing of the grass areas in Bloomingdale and the job description for the part-time property manager we expect to employ by the first of the year. The grass mowing also will start January 1987. We are finalizing the specifications for wall painting and another for landscaping. These last two will be ready for bids after the first of the year.

The mowing bids went out in early November to nine interested companies--seven of whom were taken on a pre-bid

tour of Bloomingdale. Five bids were then received and opened at a public meeting at the Church on November 24. One was rejected outright due to noncompliance with the bid specs. The Board will review these bids at the December 8 meeting, possibly awarding the contract.

The Board also has had the difficult task of sifting through and studying 22 applications for the job of property manager. We have

received some impressive applications and our task has not been easy! but, the field is narrowing. We will be scheduling interviews on December 8, and will, hopefully, fill the position by January 87.

We recently had a meeting with Criterion requesting that they make some repairs and do some of the maintenance that has been put off.

CRITERION RESPONDS TO MAINTENANCE REQUESTS

Susan L. Meitz, Executive
Vice President of Criterion
Properties, Inc., has responded "on behalf of
National Investors Life
Insurance Company (NILIC),
to the various requests made
by the Bloomingdale Special
District (STD) for information, action, etc. regarding
the turnover of maintenance
of Bloomingdale."

At a meeting attended by Gazette Reporter, Cheryl Ledford, and reported herein, the letter response dated November 7, 1986, from Ms. Meitz was read into the public meeting minutes of the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District by its President. In October (subsequently reported in the November 1986, GAZETTE, page 6) the STD had asked that various maintenance items, new and deferred, be attended to. The following is quotation and summary of the pertinent parts of the letter from Criterion:

"Effective January 1, 1987, NILIC will turn over all general maintenance duties of Bloomingdale to the STD to include, but not be limited to, general landscaping maintenance of all rights of ways and entrance ways, maintenance of the common walls, ponds and lakes and deed restriction violation enforcement.

"Prior to the turnover...the following issues will be acted upon on behalf of NILIC:"

1. "Entranceway sprinkler and lighting systems in existence will be repaired and operational with the exception of the lights at the John Moore entrance which will be disconnected and removed per your letter to me of October 20, 1986."

2. Repair of the following walls will be undertaken:

"Natures Way Blvd., south of golf course" "Springvale and Briarpark Way" "Greenhollow and Bell Shoals (wooded slats)" "Sandy Creek - 600 block" "Bell Shoals near Sandy Creek" "748 Fortuna"

3. Gulfland Homes "...will be painting the entire stretch of wall from Garnett south." (Upon replacement of the wall.)

4. "The concrete dumped on the right of way on Garnett near Bell Shoals will be cleaned up."

5. "Reponsibility for wall construction in the past has been that of the developer and the home builders. In some instances, the walls may not conform to the six foot standard; however there is no recourse to the builder or developer to have the walls changed as deed restrictions did not provide for specifics. Therefore, there will be no action taken by NILIC or Criterion

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The following is a summary of the General Membership Meeting of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association from Thursday, November 13.

A quorum of members was established with approximately 80 residents attending. Vice President Weiss

re-stated the purpose of the Fire and Disaster Fund. It is available at a minute's notice to any resident of Bloomingdale whether they have insurance or not. It is meant to give immediate funds to any family. This fund was offered to the Clark family, but not needed.

The following bylaw amendment was passed: "Alternates shall serve terms of office not to exceed one year in length."

Funding for a permanent bronze plaque was approved in the amount of \$67. This plaque will be made by Brown's Trophies and installed

in the new sidewalk as a thank you to The Paragon Group. A framed letter, also expressing our appreciation, will be sent to the main offices. One resident expressed a concern about the sidewalk being close to the road. The Board will look into the feasibility of installing a guard railing next to the sidewalk.



BLOOMINGDALE TO LOOSE WATCH PROGRAM

Bloomingdale is about to loose its Neighborhood Watch status and signs according to a spokesperson with the Sheriff's Department.

To maintain our status. Bloomingdale will have to meet the following qualifications:

- 1. Coordinator or their representative must attend at least one general meeting of the Neighborhood Watch Association per year.
- Coordinator or their representative must attend at least one meeting held in their district by the directors from Neighborhood Watch Association per year.
- 3. Coordinators must Chold at least two meetings in their own Neighborhood Watch area per year.
 - Must keep their block captains list updated with the Sheriff's Office.
 - Telephone communication chain must be kept up to date by coordinators.
 - Failure to comply with these qualifica-



tions will result in the area losing it's Neighborhood Watch status with the Sheriff's Office and the Neighborhood Watch Association and being removed from the mailing list, and Neighbor- phone communication hood Watch signs will be removed from County right of way.

Currently, Bloomingdale has failed to comply with all of the above. To be in compliance will require the help



of many residents.

The Neighborhood Watch progam is NOT the Mobile Watch. These are two separate items.

The Neighborhood Watch is based on resident alertness and a telesystem for emergencies. Signs are posted at the subdivision entrance warning burglers to keep out. It is officiated by the Sheriff's Department.

resident-volunteer automobile patrol that cruises the area and reports suspicious activities back to its Base Station and the Sheriff's Department. It is officiated by residents of Bloomingdale and has no official status with the Sheriff's Department. The BHA Board of Directors will be discussing this issue of the Neighborhood Watch problem and it will be reported in future issues of the Gazette. -SD

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

Errol Whitfield will attend the November 12 meeting of the President's Roundtable.

Deed restriction violation notices are to be put on hold temporarily while the legal ramifications are sorted out. This Board will be getting with the STD Board to determine their next step.

The agenda for the General Membership meeting was written.

Commissioner Jim Selvey will be contacted regarding the wall on Bell Shoals. The Zoning Enforcement Board gave Gulf Land Homes a 15 day warning notice in September and to date has not enforced the violation.

The use of a free mail box from ISC Mail Room was discussed. The Board appreciated the gesture from residents Donna and Vince Laverghetta, but need to decline. Changing the post office box would require changing pre-printed stationery, which is costly.


The Board meeting was adjourned at 10 p.m.

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LIVING HOLIDAY DECORATIONS

Living plants can add special charm to your home for the holidays. Live trees can be decorated and later planted. Poinsettias are beautiful and it is hard to imagine decorating without at least one plant. Natural decorations can be found in wooded areas and used to compliment your usual ornaments.

Norfolk Island pines are probably the first trees that come to mind for a live Christmas tree. After the holidays you can continue to grow them in a container near a sunny window or outdoors. Protect them from severe cold as they are a fairly cold-sensitive plant. Florida Red cedars, or

other junipers in the shape of a Christmas tree, can be used indoors and later planted outside. To care for a live tree indoors try to provide as much light as possible, though my Norfolk pine did very well for two months near a north facing window. Allow the soil to dry but not remain dry for any length of time before watering. Some browning may occur if the tree stays too dry or too wet.

For a truly unique tree a Ficus Benjamiora, weeping fig, can be strung with miniature lights and decorated with shiny red apples. An attractive basket or bright red foil around the pot completes the look. See DECORATIONS, Page 15

Poinsettias, properly cared for can stay in color for months. The colorful leaves are called "bracts" which come in a variety of colors such as: red, white, marbled pink and white, red and pink spotted (jingle bells) and solid pink. Keep your plants evenly moist. If the soil remains completely dry for more than a couple of days the lower leaves will shrivel and drop. Also, the colorful life of the plant


will be shortened. Remember that most plants don't like to be soggy either. Poinsettias need to be handled carefully because they are extremely brittle. If you do break one, seal the end of the stem in boiling water and place in a vase. Poinsettias can be planted outside in a sunny location. Prune about one third of the plant no later than September 1 for December

color.

Florida has an abundance of native materials for decorating. Pinecones placed in a basket with baby's breath or mixed with red; silver, or gold ornaments make an interesting centerpiece; chairside or fireplace decoration. Grapevines can be shaped into wreaths and decorated with a variety of items. A bow, some greenery and a bird can complete your

homemade wreath.

Plants and a little imagination will brighten your holidays. Every year I look forward to bringing out my antique wicker doll carriage and placing poinsettias and some greenery in it and attaching a large red bow to the handle. Live Holiday decorations don't have to be fancy to be attractive. Their beauty lies in their simplicity.



INCORRECT TAX

A lot of homes in Bloomingdale Caks were hit with our Special Taxing District assessment, according to Daks resident Mark Chapman. The notation "SD \$80" appears on as many as 60 bills that were sent out two weeks ago.

It is not suppose to be there, it was an accident by the Tax Assessor's Office which they are correcting by sending out new bills. Unfortunately, it has probably added to the confusion in that area regarding the BHA and the STD.

To clarify matters, let us explain for the benefit of the Bloomingdale Caks residents and any new residents here in Bloomingdale.

The Special Taxing District (STD) is set up to maintain Bloomingdale Subdivision--not Bloomingdale Oaks or

anywhere else. This is a one-time per year item on the tax bills of residents in Bloomingdale East, West, South, and the Estates. They pay \$80 as noted on the bills received in November. 1986.

The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association (BHA) is a non-profit, volunteer organization that oversees everything within Bloomingdale. The BHA created the STD, but they are two separate Boards and have different functions. The BHA was created to give unity in voice to all residents of Bloomingdale. The dues are \$5 per year.

The residents of Bloomingdale have both things in place and functioning. The residents of Bloomingdale Oaks have neither. A petition drive, spearheaded by Mark Chapman, is for the Durpose of asking Daks residents to join the BHA at \$5 per year or start their own homeowners association. If the Oaks residents choose to form a STD at a later date, it would be independent of any homeowners associations.

If you are still confused. call any of the BHA Board members listed on page 2 of this newspaper. They would be happy to help.





The current deed restrictions that are being prepared for the new areas that are or will be developed require a six foot high masonry wall constructed similarly to existing walls in Bloomingdale and that prior to construction. plans must be submitted to and approved by NILIC. On the specific question regarding the perimeter wall surrounding the Hooker Barnes development in Section F-F (corner of Bell Shoals and Glenhaven), upon review of the contract and deed restrictions, there was no requirement in either document for standards of wall construction or maintenance of the walls. There will be no action taken on the part of Hooker Barnes or NILIC for the repair and repainting of these walls."

6. "During this past year, we did determine that the south wall on Greenhollow Lane should be repaired and painted because of the extensive cracks and mildew. This was done in March. After receiving the request by the STD board on October 7th to contribute to the painting of the walls throughout the District, we reviewed the issue and determined that NILIC could and would

STD, From Page 5 The meeting was attended by a Gazette reporter and is reported elsewere in this issue. We were successful in getting Criterion to repair much of the broken walls, some of the grounds. and even paint over 1 1/2 miles of walls. The exact cost of this is not known. The wall painting alone is saving the STD almost \$9,500. The people at Criterion realize that what is good for Bloomingdale is good for their business as well as for us, and are showing a willingness to help the STD.

Very soon we should see the repair of the entrance way sprinkler systems by Criterion.

only be interested in painting those walls that directly affect their sales effort."

"Bell Shoals east from the northern most point south to the beginning of section FF" and "Greenhollow Lane north side from Bell Shoals to Natures Way Boulevard" are the two walls that Criterion will be spending \$9,474.30 to repair, pressure clean, trench 6 inches below the wall line, and paint. (Work has already started and should be finished soon.)

"No other walls in the District will be painted by NILIC or Criterion nor will a donation be made by NILIC or Criterion towards future wall painting."


The STD Board of Trustees decided to respond to this letter. The Gazette will report their response at a future date.

Another item discussed at this STD meeting:

Street Light Relocation -- A member of the Board is looking into the possibility of additional street lights at the intersection of John Moore and Bloomingfield Dr. as the entry lights are no longer operational.

The lighting system at John Moore will be removed at this time. Since those lights have been vandalized so often and to such a cost, we felt we could not afford to keep replacing them and keeping the corner safe from electrical hazzard. This does not mean that we cannot put in safer lights later as the budget allows. We are looking into alternate use of the street light.

We encourage attendance from all Bloomingdale residents to bring to our attention your special concerns for our neighborhood. After the first of the year, we will start work on the 87-88 budget and we would like to hear your input. After all, we're spending your money.

family with a gross income of \$50,000 could have sufficient deductions to have an adjusted gross income that still qualifies them for some, if not all of their IRA deduction.


In the last paragraph the author begins talking about alternatives for those individuals who receive only partial or no deduction for their IRA contribution because of income levels. There was an omission which should be corrected. Regardless of an individuals' income level, all interest in an IRA is tax deferred and therefore unaffected by the recent tax law change. Only the deductibility of the initial annual contributions is at question.

The insurance products mentioned by the author are made with after tax, not tax deferred. dollars. Life insurance does not qualify as an IRA, primarily since the IRS does not accept insurance as an acceptible investment vehicle. Your readers should be wary of the interest sensitive life insurance products, especially UNIVERSAL LIFE.

My primary objective in this letter is to have the IRA issues clarified.

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


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BETHLEHEM from page 1

After long centuries of sorrow, sin and strife in the world, God did indeed cut himself down to our size for a short while--in the form of Jesus Christ.

Wi a marvelous definition of christmas! God on earth, cut down to our size. And now we can talk to Him.

Luke would not be popular today. He speaks of Christmas in terms of rough, humble shepherds and angel voices and royalty born among cows and donkeys. Luke indicates that Christmas is not a matter of possessions but of recognizing a Person. Christmas is not activity, but attitudes--like peace and good will. Christmas is not another gift--it is the coming to earth of the Giver of all good gifts.

It is time to go "Back to Bethlehem" for a long look at the real Christmas. The Bible records the words of / shepherds, who were the fl. at to hear about the Christmas event, and they are appropriate words for our time: "... let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come

to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us" (Luke 2:15) .

Christmas emerges as a story of opposition and adversity. Mary brought forth her Child in a stable, of all places. The Holy Child, God's own Son, lay in a manger. The weary parents were denied a room in the inn that night. Thus the inspired author, Dr. Luke, captures a graphic scene. Here is a picture of disappointment. There is a quality of adversity and opposition in the experience of Joseph and Mary on that first Christmas night.

Christmas is a story of evangelism and missions--"...they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child." The most natural result of experiencing what Christmas means is to tell about it. It affects people that way. The shepherds went "glorifying and praising God, and the people marvelled at what they heard. The story of Christmas is clearly a story of joy and praise. It is seen in the message, and it is seen in the messengers.

In going back to Bethlehem

we see the birth as a fulfillment of Isaiahs prophecy concerning the coming of the Messiah in Isalah 7:14. "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son and shall call his name 'Immanuel.' Indeed, to go back to Bethlehem is to be moved by the Messiah's birth even as George Frederic Handel was moved to write the "Messiah." Here is his true story:

The composer was in despair. Struggling to earn a living in London, he knew days when he could not afford to buy meals. One night in 1741, depressed and defeated, he wandered the lonely streets: it was almost dawn when he returned to his shabby room. On a table was a thick envelope. It was from Charles Jennens, the man who wrote his librettos. Examining the pages, he found them covered with Scripture texts.

Wearily, he tossed the pages aside and crawled into bed. But he could not sleep. The words he read returned to him:

"Comfort ye, comfort ye, my people, saith your God ... The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light ... For unto us a Child is born ... Glory to God in the highest ... Hallelujah! Hallelujah!

Too stirred to sleep, he got up and went to his piano. The music flowed from his heart--rich, majestic, triumphant. He began to write.

Night and day for three weeks, he wrote feverishly. He forgot sleep, food, rest. He refused to see anyone. At last, on the day the work was finished, one friend managed to gain entrance.

The composer was at his piano, sheets of music strewn around him, tears streaming down his face. do believe I have seen all of Heaven before me and the great God Himself." he exclaimed.

Millions of people have been able to believe that. The first audience to hear the composition, in Dublin in 1742, gave it the greatest ovation in the city's history. Weeks later London heard it for the first time and again it was a triumph. The King was so impressed during the Hallelujah Chorus that he rose to his feet -- a custom that still prevails.

Why should Christmas be anything but a time for joy and praise? We miss the real spirit of Christmas if we allow the cares of this occasion to overburden us. This is not time for trudging wearily in search of something for "that person who has everything." It is not a time for gloomy complaints or grumpy moods. It is a time to sing with Isaac Watts 'Joy to the World, the Lord has Come!"

This year--let's go back to Bethlehem for a true understanding of what Christmas is all about.

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
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
