


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Celebrating Civic Pride


Residents Rally For Relay

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
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A Colorful Contribution




Center Soon In Service

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


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


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For Speed

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



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Report Deed Restriction, County Violations Online

A big boat permanently anchored in the driveway next door. A streetlight on the fritz, flickering on a cracked sidewalk below. Knee-high weeds and a wooden fence in splinters right across the street. Who's responsible for public maintenance needs and enforcing deed restrictions and county codes? What's a neighbor to do?

For problems that exist on privately owned property, the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association recommends that residents first determine if the issues are in violation of Hillsborough County codes or ordinances by calling the code enforcement office, (813) 641-6946, or by inquiring online www.hillsboroughcounty. org/hcce. A complaint form to report violations is on the web site, and complainants may remain anonymous.

Residents may also wish to determine if private property eyesores or danger signs are in violation of neighborhood deed restrictions. A few sections within Bloomingdale have their own, mandatory homeowners associations with the legal authority to impose fines or liens on homeowners who refuse to comply with the rules. Most of the community's 40 sections, however, fall only the umbrella of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, which requires homeowners to get involved in the enforcement process.

Most of the community's covenants are posted on www. bloomingdalegazette.com under the "deed restrictions" tab at the top of the page. A complaint form is also available on the Web site under the same tab. Upon receiving a complaint, BHA volunteers will inspect the property in question, send a letter to the homeowner and follow up to help facilitate resolution of the complaint. A BHA committee stands ready to assist homeowners who wish to pursue mediation or legal action against violators if necessary.

Review Your Restrictions Online

Deed restrictions for most of Bloomingdale's 40 neighborhood sections are available to view on www.bloomingdalegazette.com under the "deed restrictions" tab at the top of the page. Copies are also available at the Bloomingdale Community Office. To request a copy by mail, call (813) 681-2051, e-mail bloomingdale.homeowners@verizon.net, or stop by the office 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. Monday to Thursday, 3509 Bell Shoals Road, in the plaza behind SunTrust Bank and the Citgo gas station.

HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY CODE STANDARDS SYNOPSIS

The following partial list of Hillsborough County Code Standards commonly addressed in Bloomingdale applies to all homes in Hillsborough County. Please note, however, that some neighborhood deed restrictions go above and beyond county requirements.

Vehicles

Vehicles must be operational (able to move under own its own power) and intact; no

more than two unregistered, untagged, or expired tag vehicles are allowed on each property; commercial vehicles over one ton may not be parked overnight in residential areas; boats or RV's limited to 20 feet in length (in some but not all cases) may be parked in front of a house; boats or RV's over 20 feet may be parked in rear or side yards but must be kept five feet from the property line; boats or RV's must be operational and may not be connected to utilities, except for battery charging; boats or

RV's cannot be parked on the right-of-way (area between the sidewalk and the road); boats or RV's may be parked anywhere for loading or unloading for a maximum of 24 hours.


Sheds

Sheds must be at least three feet from the property line.

Garage Sales

Garage sales are limited to one every six months, for no more than three days in duration.

Swimming Pools

Swimming pools must be screened or fenced to prevent access by small children, and must be maintained, sanitary and mosquito free.

Fences

Fences must be maintained, sound and sturdy.

Storage Pods

The use of temporary storage pods is limited to seven days, no more than six times per year.

Nuisance Conditions

Weeds, grass, or underbrush shall not exceed 18 inches; junk, trash and debris -- abandoned motor vehicles, furniture, appliances, rotten lumber, paper, trash, etc. -- are all considered nuisance conditions and are not permitted.

Structural Conditions

Roofs shall be maintained and have no defects which will admit rain; windows shall be maintained without cracks or holes; residences must be adequately painted so as to prevent the entry of water or pests.

Lawns and Landscaping

Weeds, grass, or underbrush shall not exceed 18 inches; dead or dying trees which may present a hazard are not permitted.

HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY **ORDINANCE STANDARDS SYNOPSIS**

Pets

Report violations to Animal Control, (813) 744-5660.

Pets are not allowed to stray from owner's property or owner's control; owners are responsible for the pick up and disposal of animal feces. Fines are: First offense \$50, second offense \$100, third offense requires a court hearing; person reporting offense must be willing to testify in court.

Vehicle Parking

Report to HCSO, (813) 247-8555.

It is illegal to stop, stand, or park under any conditions which leave less than ten feet of available access to roadways and streets, and in the following areas (vehicles may be ticketed for these violations): On a sidewalk, crosswalk, bicycle path, in front of a public or private driveway, within 15 feet. of a fire hydrant, within 15 feet of a stop sign, and on the rightof-way (grassy area between the street and sidewalk); Every vehicle stopped or parked on a two-way road must have wheels within 12-inches of the curb or roadway edge.

Conservation Areas - In

designated areas and wet lands, no maintenance or disturbing of the area is allowed, and the area may not be used for any other purpose.

Mailboxes

The U.S. Post Office requires boxes to be sturdy, operational, at least 42-inches in height, and free of obstructions, including branches.

Trash Collection

Report violations to (813) 276-2927.

In Bloomingdale, regular trash and recyclable materials are picked up on Tuesday; regular trash and yard waste are picked up on Friday; trash may

not be set at the curb before 6 .p.m. the night before pick-up; trash and waste/recycling receptacles may not be left at the curb after 8 p.m. on pick up day; all regular trash must be contained in trash cans, bags, or boxes to prevent access by animals; yard waste is limited to 12 bags per pick-up, 50 pound weight limit per bag.

Pot holes in streets; street signs damaged or missing; storm sewers full of trash or not draining; sidewalks, trip hazards, overgrown branches

or branches blocking passage; street lights inoperable -- report directly to TECO online at www.tampaelectric.com or call (813) 223-0800.

Trash on streets or rightof-way, signs on right-of-way, etc.; sprinkler system problems (broken or inoperable sprinkler heads, sprinklers on at wrong times); graffiti on walls, damaged walls or entryway fixtures and landscaping; inoperable entryway lights.

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Don't Be Driven To Distraction This Holiday Season

During the holidays, the volume of travel and the number of drivers on our roads increases dramatically. Many of us will be out traveling, either locally to do some shopping or attend parties, or heading out of town to visit family. Make sure everyone in your car is buckled up and that you direct 100 percent of your attention to driving. Don't be distracted. It's very dangerous out

Making our holiday season safe and secure can be as simple as following some very basic rules.

Secure Your Vehicle

When you are away from home, enjoy the excitement of the season but stay focused and constantly aware of your surroundings. Lock up your valuables, and remember the 30-second rule: in less than 30 seconds, a thief can shatter your car window, reach inside and remove any valuables left out in the open. Thieves can also gain access to any personal information you leave in your car. So slow down, take the time to protect your car and your belongings, and then enjoy the holidays.

Keep Your Eyes Open

According to the National Sleep Foundation, more than half of the nation's drivers admit

to driving while tired or drowsy, pushing themselves too far. Most of us have done it. In the group of drivers ages 18 to 29, nearly onequarter reported they had actually fallen asleep at the wheel. These drivers are also impatient, drive faster and feel more stressed. Watch out for them. They usually speed up, then slow down or weave back and forth, just like a drunk driver.

Put Down The Cell Phone

With cell phones and other portable electronic devices now the norm, more drivers are distracted. Motorists who use such devices while driving have become a very serious problem. There are fines for driving while distracted, and law enforcement officers may now note "driver distracted" on accident reports, opening the door for your insurance company to increase your rates for those types of charges.

The types of distractions noted could fill a book and many are just plain crazy. They cover everything from cell phones, eating, putting on makeup, changing clothes, talking to passengers, reading, shaving and now even watching videos or working on a laptop computer.

Concentrate on your driving like your life depends on it, because it does.

Citizens Patrol Readies To Roll

Keeping our community safe and secure is a never-ending challenge, increasingly so due to growth in our area and tightened county budgets.

Hillsborough County Sheriff David Gee and his dedicated team of deputies and volunteers, committed to fulfilling their responsibilities and duties, continually seek ways to improve their plans and increase their resources.

Towards that end, Blooming-dale is now the third Hillsborough County community to be included in the Volunteer Citizen Patrol Program, which aims to utilize the talents, skills and concerns of residents willing to become volunteer members of the sheriff's crime prevention program.

At a community meeting held in November at Blooming-dale West Park, Deputy Faith Madell said citizen volunteer programs have proven to be very effective.

"No one knows their neighborhood better than those that live in it," Madell said. "Knowing what is normal and what is not normal can make the difference."

Citizen Patrol volunteers must apply for the position and go through a special screening process to ensure their safety and the safety of all residents. Volunteers receive more than 50 hours of training in crime prevention, first aid, traffic control, community policing and radio communications. Training is offered in the evening over a period of three weeks and includes three evenings and two Saturdays.

Once training is completed, volunteers become the extra eyes and ears of the sheriff's office. They receive official uniforms and use marked vehicles to perform patrols. Patrols cover six hours shifts that cover seven days a week. There are two volunteers assigned to each vehicle.
