BHA SURVEY RESULTS

In October, 1987, the Bloomingdale Homeowner's Association included a community assessment survey in with the yearly statement of dues.

By December 31, 1987, 662 surveys had been returned and tallied. Each of the Board members participated in the tallying of the information with the majority of the work being done by BHA Secretary, Janet Holzman.

The results of this survey are presented for your information and

review. These results will be made available to other persons who will benefit from them. Also, the BHA Board will use them when making decisions concerning the community. 2400 surveys were distributed with a response of 662. This is a response rate of 28%

which is considered exceptionally high for this type of survey.

The Bloomingdale Homeowner's Association Board of Directors would like to thank every family who took the time to complete their survey and send it to us.

1. Residents were asked to rank the following 14 items according to importance with 1 being of most concern and 14 being of least concern. 228 residents said Crime Prevention was #1 and 280 said Social Functions were #14.

1. It should be an original design, simple but unique.

2. It should be bold.

3. It should not be finely detailed and difficult to reproduce.

4. It can have more than one color,

but not more than three. The colors should be basic and easily reproducible.

5. The logo should be recognizable from a distance of 50-100 feet.

A panel of judges, chosen from the BHA and STD, will choose the best design from the entries submitted. A prize of \$100.00 will be awarded to the person with the winning design; and, best of all, a special place in history will be reserved for the winner.



Letters to the BHA

Dear Editor:

HERE WE GO AGAIN - Just when you thought it was safe to leave the house, Hillsborough County starts their shenanigans with the Bloomingdale Sewage Plant.

The County has tried several times to perform a 3-month test to increase flow from 500,000 gallons of effluent per day to 8 or 900,000 gallons per day to see how the plant would work and to determine the plant's actual capacity. They're also adding different chemicals to see if they will aid in killing odor, but we know that has done nothing but changed the smell of the odor. The increase in flow poses odor problems; however, there have not been many complaints from residents regarding the odor. The increased capacity will most likely cause permanent odor problems. We have had odor problems for several months due to the County's test of increasing flow. We made repeated calls to the Department of Wastewater and was assured the problem would be remedied. However, when the situation persisted, we called the E.P.C. and was informed that the Wastewater Department never filed the odor

complaints with the E.P.C. Mr. Boostani of the E.P.C. recommends that any person being bothered by bad odors from the plant call his office 24 hours a day seven days a week at 272-5960 and leave your name, phone number, date, time and a description of the complaint. He also recommends that the DER at 623-5561 (Sandra Tippin) be notified Monday-Friday, 8-5, of odor problems. Even though the plant has been emitting strong odors lately, Mr. Boostani states that he receives only a few calls from certain people. Good weather is on its way folks. If you want to enjoy your pool, barbeque, etc., you better start calling when the need arises. It is the opinion of this writer (from my experience/knowledge of the situation for the past 2 years) that the Bloomingdale Wastewater Treatment Plant's capacity is ONLY 500,000 gallons per day. Any amount over this causes odor to emit. I cannot understand why the County after 2 years persists in wasting time and money to do studies, tests, etc. when the obvious is already evident.

If you do not want to become accustomed to the odors or have

developers convince the DER that the plant should stay indefinitely or have your children who attend the Alafia Elementary be exposed to odor and possible health problems, then you must call from now until the plant is closed. If only a few people care enough to complain as the need arises, then we have no one to blame but ourselves if the plant becomes a permanent nuisance and fixture in our community.



MOBILE WATCH REPORT

Last February, the Mobile Watch core committee met and developed a long range plan for the future. The plan was to be put into effect in stages. The goals were to have 1 car patrol the West, 2 cars patrol the East, and 1 car in Bloomingdale Oaks. The people manning the cars would live in the areas they patrol and each area would have to maintain sufficient manpower to staff the car 7 nights a week.

We put the plan into operation last April and for a few months everything went smoothly. Manpower, however, soon became a problem. First one area then the other didn't maintain adequate manpower to staff a car 7 nights a week.

We repeatedly asked for more volunteers but to no avail. As of this date, the East side does not have enough people so we are unable to put a car in the East 7 nights a week. The West side has barely enough and if we lose a few more without replacement, the same situation will result.

Our suggestion to run a car in the Oaks has resulted in about 8 volunteers; we need 40-50. We have no response from the eastern part of Bloomingdale near Lithia-Pinecrest Rd.

The Mobile Watch will continue to operate to the best of its' ability in the future. We must, however, come to terms with the obvious lack of interest of the community in general. We will put cars on the road as many nights as possible with our limited manpower. The entire West side will be patrolled on those nights as the West is basically built out.

We have no choice but to establish strict boundaries on the East side due to lack of participation. All occupied areas along Natures Way south to Augusta Village will be covered and we will cover the areas East along Natures Way to the Fairway Manor area. No section east of the wastewater treatment plant will be patrolled, nor will Bloomingdale Oaks, at this time.

We still hope to establish coverage for these areas in the future if the residents desire it. This would require a third car per night staffed by people living in the area. We welcome any suggestions or volunteers. Call Chris Pheils at 681-9026 or Hal Labkon at 681-6853.

The Mobile Watch extends best wishes to George Ball on his pending move and thanks him for all his help as a base station, mobile volunteer, and core committee member. He will be missed by all of us.

In the S.T.D. report in the January gazette, a suggestion was made that the S.T.D. hire security for Bloomingdale during the nightime hours. As the sole purpose of the Mobile Watch is to help protect the community, we are in complete agreement with this suggestion. Any additional security for our neighborhood would be welcome. The cost of this would be shared by every homeowner in Bloomingdale. With enough volunteers to enable the Mobile Watch to continuously operate 7 nights a week, perhaps paid security wouldn't be needed during our operating hours, thereby saving the S.T.D. (our tax dollars) some expense. THINK ABOUT IT. VOLUNTEER!!!







BHA Membership List: The motion was made and passed to designate the BHA Membership List as confidential information. The motion was made and passed that the BHA Membership list


cannot be used for commercial purposes.

Where Does All The Money Go?

A Special Taxing District Monthly Report

The Special Taxing District board met January 11 at 8 p.m.
Attending were Russ Thompson, Frank DeVito, Errol Whitfield, Joe DeLuca, and Fred Uphoff. Hugh Golletz was absent. The following items on the agenda were discussed:

1. After presenting his report, treasurer Joe DeLuca suggested that the board invest \$100,000 in a Jumbo CD for 30 days with the option to roll it over for another 30 days. He advised this due to the better rate of interest received as opposed to the money market

certificate now held. The board agreed.

2. Bids for the mowing contract were opened and read at a special December 17 meeting. Property Manager Lynn Wagner gave a report on the interviews he did with the top bidders. He told the board that the low bid STD contract. He felt the company can provide the necessary services as well as insurance. The board voted unanimously to have the contract drawn up by the STD attorney and awarded to Fox Mowing. The contract will run from February 1 through September 30, 1988. (All new contracts will follow the fiscal year from now on, rather than the calendar year.) Mark Reoch, Paragon's property manager for the Met Life properties, was attending the meeting to get information

about the mowing contract. He will notify other Bloomingdale developers and a decision will be made about hiring the same contractor to mow those properties. Met Life and other developers will pay for their own mowing.

3. Landscape architect Tom Sheppard presented his blueprint for landscaping the Garnet entrance. This will also serve as the basis for landscaping other entrances in the future. He recommended stucco over concrete retainers instead of railroad ties for longer life and less maintenance in the long run. Lynn Wagner will give him more information on the present irrigation system at Garnet. He would also like some direction on the entry signs to be designed, recommending one sign placed in the center island instead of signs on each side of the entrance. The board agreed to have Mr. Sheppard begin writing bid specifications with options for signs, lighting, and irrigation to be ready by the board's February meeting.

- 4. One lawsuit has been settled, one is still pending. These involved accidents causing damage to walls.
- 5. Attempts are still being made to get the Kindercare Corp. to paint the concrete wall on their property on Glenhaven. The regional office in Jacksonville is being contacted by corresponding secretary Hugh Golletz.
- 6. Fred reported no progress with communications with Home America. Lynn said they destroyed an entire line of sprinklers and the control box for the system at the corner of Rosemead and Bell Shoals. This happened when the concrete sidewalk was poured over it
- 7. New contract for property manager--see accompanying story
- 8. Lynn's contract as property manager expires January 19. Frank moved to extend the contract 30 days at the same rate of pay (see story on new district administrator's position). It passed unanimously.
- 9. Under new business Fred presented a report on the status of the development. This was the number of tax assessable units in each plat section of Bloomingdale. This is determined by a count of metered residences as of December





Guide for Plant Care in February

The weather is unpredictable and frosty nights with freezing temperatures may still occur. These are just the kind of conditions that cause uncertainty about what to plant and how to care for existing plants.

In order to get some color into your yard there are many varieties of blooming plants to choose from. Petunias, pansies, dianthus and snapdragons are some of the annuals that thrive in cooler weather. Unlike northern climates where you would wait to plant annuals, these annuals tend to dieout as soon as the summer heat arrives. By planting these annuals now, you will have a longer season

to enjoy them. Woodbine and Carolina Jasmine are two vines that are blooming profusely this time of year. Perennial Gerber Daisies and the colorful foliage of Joseph's Coat are thriving in February.

Remember to remove faded flowers on annuals and perennials for optimum flower production. Fertilize with an all-purpose, water soluble fertilizer or a granular fertilizer such as 6-6-6.

Wait another couple of weeks to do any serious pruning of shrubs.

New growth that would form from pruning would be susceptible to cold damage. Roses may be pruned at about the end of February or the beginning of March. Spray roses weekly with a fungicide and check for infestations of spider mites.

Rose sprays work well on annuals and perennials, too. Keep all trees, shrubs, and annuals watered regularly during dry periods.

Fertilize your trees and shrubs now with a good quality fertilizer containing minor elements.

Even though it may be cold outside, keep watering, feeding and spraying your plants.





STD Revamps the Property Manager's Contract and Increases Duties

With the current property manager's contract expiring in mid-January, Special Taxing District Board member Fred Uphoff was given the task of preparing to renew or change the document. He reported to the STD board at their January meeting that he asked the present manager, Lynn Wagner, to make suggestions that might be considered in the new contract. Fred then presented the job description for a new position, adapted by Lynn, to be called district administrator. (See Job Description immediately following this article.) This full-time employee would replace the independent contractor property manager. The salary would be taken from the contract labor portion of the 1988 budget. Taxes and social security would be deducted from his paycheck. The board may have to pay workmen's compensation. This employee would file expense forms and be reimbursed, and accounts would be opened at most frequently used stores (such as hardware). Fred said this type of position would give the employee the authority as well as the responsibility to carry out the wishes of the board. Russ Thompson agreed, adding that it could ease the agenda and move business along quicker than in the past. Concern was expressed by Trustee Frank DeVito, who asked if this wasn't giving someone else work that ought to be done by board trustees. Russ responded that the board would always retain certain jobs such as writing checks and certain letters. He felt that the job description could be fine-tuned as needed.

The STD board unanimously passed the motion to change the position of property manager from sub-contractor to full-time employee with the title of district administrator. The board then voted to extend Lynn's present contract for 30 days. This

would allow time to consult the STD attorney on whether the board can hire Lynn for the new position or must advertise or go out for bids for the job. This will be on the agenda for the February 8 meeting.

When Lynn was asked by the Gazette how the new job would be different, he said that there has been a great deal of responsibility on the trustees, who also have full-time jobs and families. STD work is done in their free time. "This will consolidate a lot of the responsibility into one position." He also explained that part of the job will be to draft the annual budget based on a yearly guidance written by the board president. The administrator would also be required to present a five year plan every October. The president would then set annual goals based on the plan, to be implemented by the administrator.

Below is the Job Description as prepared by Fred Uphoff:

Job Title: District Administrator

Reports to: President of the Board of Trustees or his designate

Duties: Responsible for the daily operation of all matters pertaining to the district. Supervises all employees and subcontractors hired by the district. Establishes the annual budget for the district for approval by the Board of Trustees. Writes all bid specifications for the district for those items to be bid and conducts all pre-bid meetings as

required. In conjunction with the President of the Board, sets the agenda for all Board meetings. Provides a monthly report to the Board, both written and oral, of the status of all contracts in force, status of special projects as assigned by the Board and updates the Board on items which need to be attended to with Board approval to be given. Verifies all billings for Board approval of work done by subcontractors. Performs miscellaneous maintenance work as determined by the Board or on his

own initiative. Provides the required liaison between the district and all County Agencies (police, fire, water and sewer, etc.) and public utilities (TECO, GTE, SWFWMD, etc.) as required. Responsible for the maintenance of all real property owned by the district. On October 1 of every year, will present a five year plan for the district to be revised and updated annually thereafter.

Salary: To be determined by the Board.




