# Bloomingdale Avenue, Bell Shoals - Lithia widening to begin

lans for the four-lane widening of Bloomingdale Avenue from Bell Shoals Road to Lithia Pinecrest

Road are in the final stages. County officials report that the selection of a contractor should be completed by the

end of February, with construction beginning shortly thereafter. Project completion time is estimated at fourteen months.

For those residents who frequently use this stretch of Bloomingdale Avenue, the changes will be extensive. TECO has begun installing new power poles on the south side of the road. A traffic light will be installed at Bloomingdale and Springvale Avenues. There are several areas of concern that we should pay extra attention to.

The construction will have an impact on already congested traffic. Now is the time for us to slow down and get accustomed to the inevitable driving time delays.

Both the construction and the completed widening will affect motorist and pedestrian safety at the intersection of Bloomingdale and Culbreath where the YMCA and Little League fields are located. Construction detours and increased traffic mixed with kids crossing from the YMCA to the ball fields may prove to be a serious safety issue, one that is being addressed by the Bloomingdale Area Community Council.

We as residents would be wise to pay

close attention to any requests by
Developers to build on the vacant lots
along Bloomingdale Avenue. Progress may
be inevitable, but we can have some say
as to what goes in, proven by the recent
successful protest against a shopping center proposed for the land next to
Bloomingdale High and the successful
negotiations between Developers and

John Moore Road residents (see story in this issue).

The majority of construction will take place on the north side of Bloomingdale Avenue, unfortunately necessitating the removal of the magnificent oak trees lining the road. Many Bloomingdale residents have enjoyed getting their fresh fruits and vegetables at the "old red barn" on Bloomingdale. Unfortunately, the produce stand sits in the path of the road widening, and will soon be relegated to a pleasant memory. Our community is growing and changing, but we can work together to achieve the end results that will produce an atmosphere and surroundings we can all be comfortable with and proud of.

# Bloomingdale Special Taxing District Property Manager's Report, December 1999

Submitted by AI Devney, DPMI Management, Inc.

Irrigation

1. Brandon Irrigation repaired a broken valve at Nature's Way and Elba.

2. The following items were replaced: 18 spray heads, 4 rotors, and 1 solenoid. Three zone lines and 5 risers were repaired.

Landscaping

1. Greenturf, Inc. mulched all the flowerbeds.

2. DPMI hosted the Lawn Maintenance Contract pre-bid meeting for next year's contract. Eight contractors attended.

3. DPMI determined the quantity of creeping fig plants required to fill in gaps along the perimeter wall. 300 plans will be required and have been ordered.

4. DPMI contacted three landscape companies for bids to install the new Petunias. Two companies responded with good bids, one did not respond.

5. County Forester Bob dir examined the root systems of three of our dead trees. His opinion was that the trees were root bound from planning, which did not allow for the development of the root system.

6. Environmental Horticulture Agent IV, Mrs. Sydney Park Brown, examined the St. Augustine grass around Greenhollow and Nature's Way to determine the reason for poor perform ance. Her opinion was that a combination of high PH, nematodes and other diseases could be the problem. Soil samples will be mailed to the county extension center and the USF to determine the soil content and the existence of diseases.

#### Other

1. DPMI identified and measured the walls to be cleaned this year (4,560 linear feet).

2. This Christmas season, the STD had 18 Poinsettias and 6 Christmas bows stolen, and 1 string of lights vandalized.

3. Chris Wurtzel repaired the broken wall on Bell Shoals.

4. ZK Construction will repair the broken Hickory Ridge entranceway.

5. In the land of eat, drink and pitch out the window, DPMI picked up the following: 18 bags of litter, 7 shoes, 3 dozen plastic forks, 7 CD's, 15 LP's, a sleeping bag, a hubcap, a windshield wiper, men's boxer shorts size 32, and \$ .82 cents. The beverages of choice were Coke for soft drinks, Ice House for beer and Black Velvet for distilled spirits.

# Special Taxing District pproves new projects

The following projects, as proposed by Devney Property Management, Inc. (DPMI), have been approved by the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District (STD) Board of Trustees. Bids are being solicited for the following projects. Work is expected to begin within 30 days.

1. Install palm tree groupings on Erindale. Estimated cost: \$4,000.

2. Dig the Greenhollow well deeper in order to eliminate the rust stains on some of the Nature's Way walls. Cost: approximately \$3,000.

3. Pressure clean about 4000 linear feet of privacy walls. Estimated cost: \$2,000.

4. Install a new irrigation system on Callista to allow planning and watering more St. Augustine sod in the Callista area. Estimated cost: \$30,000.

Many Bloomingdale homeowners have requested information about Deed Restrictions and enforcement procedures from the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association (BHA). Although the restrictions are included with each homeowner's closing documents, this stands out as the most frequent request received by the BHA.

Through the efforts of BHA President Ted Grable and director Rodney Biddle, a complete version of Bloomingdale's Deed Restrictions will soon be available on the BHA web site. Bloomingdale is comprised of nearly 40 individual sections (Fox Run, Suarez East, Rivercrossing, etc.), each with its own Deed Restrictions. Many of the sections and their individual restrictions are currently posted on the web site. The listing is expected to be complete by May 1, 2000.

If you would like a copy of your Deed Restrictions but do not have access to the internet, please first refer to your closing documents to verify the name of your section, then call the BHA at 681-2051.

The restrictions listed on the web site are based upon the BHA's 1998 records, and should be used for reference purposes only. For legal purposes, residents can contact their individual neighborhood association or call the Hillsborough County Courthouse at 272-5314.


# Magazines and volunteers needed for Reading Program

# Residents reach agreement with Developer

For over two years, a local group of residents actively voiced their opposition to Developer Dimitri Artzibushev's bids to rezone 71 rural acres off John Moore Road. Residents of Bloomingdale, Dogwood Hills, Hickory Creek, Hickory Ridge, Wooddale Drive, Hickory Highlands and Camelot Woods were concerned that the proposal to replace the pastureland with high-density residential development would be incompatible with the rural character of their neighborhoods

and further impact existing drainage and traffic problems on Bloomingfield Drive. Three times the Developer offered revised plans to the residents and the Commissioners: three times an agreement could not be reached.

Minutes prior to a final County Commission hearing scheduled on January 11, the Developer and the residents were finally able to find common ground. Residents accepted Artzibushev's modified plans, which include reducing the number of planned homes from 135 to 82, replacing a planned perimeter wall along John Moore Road with wrought iron railing, and limiting the number of homes built along the boundaries of the existing Hickory Highlands and Hickory Creek subdivisions. Dogwood Hills resident Jeanette

Figari acknowledges that it would not be possible to please 100% of the residents, but says, "On the whole, everyone was satisfied. We believe that this will be a project we can live

Figari is a member of the resident's group, UNDO -United Neighbors, Dedicated Opposition, credited for successfully negotiating with the Developer, County Commissioners and the County Planning and Growth Management Department. The group organized shortly after the developer's initial proposal, at first holding meetings and conducting research, later collecting contributions door-todoor and hiring expert professional help. "We were fortunate to have had some residents in our group who helped us get started, including a Planner and a Civil Engineer. We hired a Land Use Attorney to educate us on the legal process and an Urban Design Architect to provide us with options," said

The group estimates expenditures of over \$15,000. Members found the process "extremely frustrating, not userfriendly." One change to the system the group would like to see is the availability of a Citizen's Advocate at the County level to help guide the taxpayers through the legal maze of protecting their rights, their investments and their communi-

The Architect hired by UNDO, Harvard graduate Randy Hollingworth, summed up the resident's viewpoint precisely, stating, "Urban infill should fit seamlessly into the existing neighborhoods." Artzibushev has indicated that construction will commence as soon as he is able to obtain permitting. Undoubtedly, neighboring residents will be watching to see that those seams are neatly hemmed in.





# MONSTERS UNDER THE BED: Dealing with childhood fears

Alone. It's dark. Your heart's racing. What's that noise? The call goes out — "Mom-meeeee!"

I can still remember that feeling. Mother would come and hug me, then crack the bedroom door open "just so." Childhood fears, often trivialized by adults, may have lasting effects on an individual. Every child goes through them to some degree, and when your child experiences them you may wonder what is normal, what to do to help ease the anxiety, and how to teach your child to cope.

According to John Gottman, Ph.D., & Joan DeClaire in their book The Heart of Parenting: Raising an Emotionally Intelligent Child, parents can be "Emotional Coaches," who, like athletic coaches, teach children strategies to deal with life's challenges. Gottman & DeClaire list 5 steps that parents can use in Emotional Coaching:

- 1. Be aware of the child's emotion
- 2. Recognize the emotion as an opportunity for intimacy and teaching
  - 3. Listen empathetically, validating the child's feelings
  - 4. Help the child verbally label emotions
  - 5. Set limits while helping the child problem-solve

A multitude of anxieties peak in early childhood according to Gottman & DeClaire, such as the fears of abandonment, eath, parental conflict, powerlessness, imaginary creatures ad darkness. Parents can help children discern legitimate fears from imagined ones and learn to respond appropriately.

Fear of abandonment is a focal concern of most children under age seven according to Jonathan Kellerman, Ph.D. in Helping the Fearful Child. Because this childhood fear is so real and pervasive, Gottman & DeClaire warn parents against using this as a way to discipline or even "joke" with their children. Instead, reassure them that their needs will always be met and that they will be loved and well cared for.

The dark may represent the "great unknown" - where all the child's fears and monsters lie. According to Gottman & DeClaire, it is perfectly reasonable that young children should seek the comfort of light.

Steven P. Shelov, M.D., FAAP, in Caring for Your Baby and Young Child: Birth to Age 5 assures parents that security (transitional) objects such as blankets or soft toys are necessary parts of a child's emotional support system and are not signs of weakness or insecurity. Shelov also notes that thumb and finger sucking is a normal, natural way for children to comfort themselves. Eventually they will give up both the transitional object and the sucking as they mature and find other ways to cope with stress.

While childhood fears may be normal, parents can teach their children coping skills, as well as provide emotional support. The ability to bounce back from stress can serve hildren well throughout childhood and beyond.

We noticed a restaurant ad in the December Gazette offering "light breakfasts, luncheon specials beginning under \$5, plus the finest gourmet chocolates, novelty candies and sugar free chocolates." That was all the temptation we needed to try The Chestnut Tree, a restaurant and shop in LaViva Plaza off Lumsden Road. What a splendid experience! The Chestnut Tree is open for breakfast and lunch. We chose the former and, based on our breakfast, I plan on returning for lunch very soon.

We entered the quaint restaurant and sat in the rear dining room. It was a charming setting, with lattice ceiling and room dividers, tablecloths and flowers. Coffee and tea are served in fine china sets, adding to the charm. We made our breakfast selections from a menu board, each ordering the bacon and egg sandwich on a Kaiser roll (\$1.95) and sharing a 1/2 order of biscuits and gravy (1/2 order \$2.25, full order \$3.25). Other selections included 2 poached eggs and rye toast (\$2.00), veggie sandwich made with cucumber, onion, cream cheese and sprouts on toasted pumpernickel (\$2.95), plus various bagels, pies, cakes and Cuban toast.

The lunch menu includes a gourmet tuna salad sandwich with celery, olives, carrots and homemade low-fat dressing (\$4.50). The white turkey sandwich is made with 97% fat-free turkey, served with lettuce, tomato and mayonnaise (\$4.50). The Ohio style Coney Island dog is a 1/4 pound all-beef hot dog with homemade Sloppy Joe sauce on a hoagie bun (\$2.95). The "Untidy Joseph" features homemade Sloppy Joe sauce on a fresh Kaiser bun (\$3.75). There

are many more selections including soups, salads and daily hot lunch specials. All sandwiches are served with potato chips and a pickle.
