
Thomas will be running under the sponsorship of the Orlando & Mount Dora Railway, which also operates steam locomotive train trips on a regular basis.



Proposal Calls For Third Lane On Bell Shoals

Improving traffic flow in and around the Bloomingdale community continues to be a subject of major concern. The recently completed widening of Bloomingdale Avenue demonstrates how traffic can flow more smoothly when given the room to do so.

The county commission approved last month preliminary plans to allocate funds for a long list of road improvements, including several in the Bloomingdale area (see related story in this issue). According to Steve Valdez, county Community Affairs Director, "This includes \$18.6 million to widen Boyette Road into four lanes divided by medians, and \$3.4 million to add a third lane to Bell Shoals Road.


Adding a third lane to Bell Shoals should help improve the flow of both northbound and southbound traffic during peak hours.

The road will surely continue to face an increase in raffic due to the growth in FishHawk, River Hills and South County.

Depending on construction timetables, traffic could be significantly affected when the widening of Boyette Boad begins and the new Cimino School on Culbreath Road is finished.



Proponents of the long-awaited road widening of Boyette and Bell Shoals roads say a newly available bond funding option is very good news for the Brandon

For many years, residents eager for improvements to both congested, heavily traveled roads were told by county officials that project funding just wasn't available. Last month, the county outlined a plan to show taxpayers the money, and more than a few heads turned in pleasant surprise.

At the Jan. 9 county commission board meeting, four of seven commissioners voiced their support of a plan to use long-term bond financing to help pay for \$133 million worth of Hillsborough

road, intersection and bridge improvement projects, including the widening of Boyette and Bell Shoals roads.

The commission was scheduled to vote again on the plan at a Jan. 30, 6:00 p.m. public hearing, after the February Gazette press time.

A strong tax base increase projected by the county's property appraiser is expected to pump up community investment tax funds by at least \$10 million annually over the next five years. The projected windfall prompted commissioners to explore debt-based funding options. The availability of 1.98 percentage rate bonds made the plan even more attractive.

"It's not free money, but it's pretty close," said Audie Canney, aide to Commissioner Ronda Storms.

Canney said financing the projects with low-interest, long-term (25-year) bonds, instead of waiting for stages of funding to come online, would allow multiple proj-

- 2007 five year plan.

Three new public libraries are currently being planned, including the South Brandon library on Bloomingdale Ave. and a South County area library. In addition, four existing branches will be expanded or renovated.

Other projects planned include ongoing stormwater projects, parks and recreation facility repairs and

improvements, and solid waste service and facility improvements.

The community investment tax is a half-penny sales tax approved by voters in Sept. 1996.

About 25 percent of the revenue is generated by tourists and visitors. County officials said the program funds dozens of projects annually that might otherwise cost taxpayers millions of dollars in property taxes, while the CIT program costs the average resident just \$10 a vear.



Psst ... Let's Talk Trash

A Gazette Report

Hillsborough County provides solid waste collection services to all residents of detached single-family units, with limited exceptions. The charges for these services appear annually in November on your residential prop-erty tax bill. Two separate charges are assessed for solid waste disposal and solid waste collection.

Trash collection hours start at 6:00 a.m., so if you're on the beginning of the route, you must get your collection to curbside before 6 a.m. Ordinances prohibit homeowners from putting their trash out prior to 6:00 p.m. on the day before collection. If you have a complaint about a consistent violator, call the solid waste department at (813) 272-5680. According to department spokesperson Dave Ransom, county code violations will result in a citation.

As far as the weekly yard waste collection (grass clippings, leaves and tree and

shrub trimmings), you are allowed up to 12 30-gallon containers per week. For normal household garbage, the limit is three 35-gallon containers twice per week. Some of the items that cannot be put out for collection include furniture such as couches, tables, mattresses and box springs. Also prohibited are appliances like refrigerators, ovens, water heaters, and TV's, as well as non combustible materials like steel concrete, brick, glass, asphalt roofing materials, motor vehicles and vehicle parts, tires, machinery and equipment.

The prohibited items can be disposed of at no charge if you bring them to one of five community collection centers. The closest one to Bloomingdale is the South County facility on US 41 just north of Big Bend Road. The phone number is (813) 671-7706.


Len Jasczak, president of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, presided over the meeting.



Gazette reporter Mack Austin followed up on Mr. Quade's suggestion by contacting Hillsborough Transportation Division Director Thomas Thomson. Excerpts of Thomson's written response are as follows:

"Time restrictions on truck traffic have been considered in the past. The transportation division does not support such restrictions for truck routes, as they would be difficult to enforce, would increase the average number of trucks in the traffic stream during the hours they are permitted, and may place hardship on retailers and others that depend on deliveries and service calls. Speeding trucks on Bloomingdale Avenue should be called to the attention of the Sheriff at (813) 247-0402. Changes to the truck route resolution are approved by the Board of County Commissioners. The next scheduled update of the truck route plan is in 2004. If you have any further questions, please call me at (813)

Clarification

Bloomingdale Community Resource Deputy Pete Maurer requested a clarification of a letter published in the January issue of the Gazette.

A resident of Sandy Creek Drive in Bloomingdale West wrote that a representative of the sheriff's substation had advised his neighbors to start a petition in order to enact speeding and traffic enforcement on their street. Deputy Maurer said it is not necessary for residents to petition the sheriff's department for traffic enforcement. nor does such a petition exist.

Maurer said he met with the Sandy Creek neighbors last month to discuss possible traffic enforcement measures, and has in addition referred the group to the county's residential traffic calming program for further action.

Maurer added that the county's traffic calming process does involve the need for residents to gather signatures to show a consensus for permanent measures like speed humps or new signage. "The neighbors may have misinterpreted the county traffic calming requirements as being the sheriff's department requirements, but that's certainly not the case," Maurer said. "If anyone in the Bloomingdale area is experiencing traffic or speeding problems on their street. we are here to help, no petition necessary!"

The doors of Said and Sue Hamada's Bloomingdale restaurant had yet to open when their Buffalo wings were declared the best in Brandon.

That's because the Hamadas, owners of the new Munchies restaurant at 118 E. Bloomingdale Ave., just east of John Moore Road, entered their wings in the Greater Brandon Chamber of Commerce's Ho-Ho-Hoe-down All-Tel Rib Fest & Wing Ding in December.

An illustrious panel of judges including Tampa Tribune columnist Steve Otto, known for his discerning palate when it comes to spicy foods, sampled the Hamadas' wings and promptly declared them the winner of the Wing Ding. Munchies also received a first-place trophy for its wing sauce.

It was an auspicious welcome to the community the Hamadas have called home

Said Hamada honed his cooking talents at an Italian restaurant in New York City for 11 years before he and his wife of 21 years opened their first Munchies restaurant in Jersey City, N.J. But warmer climes eventually beckoned them to Florida. and the Hamadas opened their second Munchies at 901 W. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., near St. Joseph's Hospital.

In the meantime, the couple, who settled in Brandon with their two children, Kari and Tarik, both students at Bloomingdale High School, kept their eyes open for a prime spot closer to home.

"I knew I wanted to be in Brandon, but I could never find the right location," said Said.

That changed a few months ago when a space became available in a strip shopping center on Bloomingdale Avenue, literally minutes away from the

December to rave reviews from residents in the area for not only the wings but also for their hand-tossed New York-style pizza and eclectic takeout and delivery menu.

Although the restaurant has four tables for dining in, the bulk of their business so far is from busy families seeking an easy alternative for dinner and business people needing a quick lunch.

For hungry patrons, the menu includes a bit of everything, from Italian and Greek specialties to American favorites and even a Mexican chicken quesadilla.

Sue Hamada said they wanted to offer residents an alternative to the usual delivery selections of pizza and Chinese food. Customers were thrilled when they discovered they could have fried clams, shrimp poppers, ribeye steak on a roll. Texas wieners smothered with onions and chili, a ham and cheese sandwich or a bacon cheeseburger delivered.

"The response has been excellent," said Sal. "We're really happy. Everyone who's come in has come back again."

But the hands-down favorites at Munchies, said the Hamadas, remain the wings and pizza.

The Hamadas prepare the wings using fresh chicken and a recipe handed down from a friend in the business. The recipe remains a closely

"We don't skimp on anything," said Sue.

Each day Munchies offers a different specialty pizza that can be purchased by the pie or the slice.

Prices at Munchies range from \$16.35 for 40 wings, \$7.25 for a fried seafood combo of cod filet, scallops, shrimp and curly fried or \$15.95 for a 16-inch stuffed pizza to \$1.50 for a slice of cheese pizza or \$1.75 for a wiener.

The Hamadas also offer daily specials including a large pizza and 30 wings for \$19.75 on Monday and two large pizzas for \$11.99 each Wednesday.

If you've ever lived in or traveled the Gulf Cost or delta country, you've probably experienced the wonderful taste of meaty catfish and deep-fried hush puppies. But in these parts, if you're like me, you'll settle for anything that comes close when the desire for catfish is at hand.

Well, Brandon finally has attracted a catfish restaurant that brings to mind the old, Deep South. As their menu proclaims, Catfish Country offers "relaxed seafood dining with a Cajun flare." If you've never experienced Cajun cuisine, this quaint little restaurant is the place to start. And when

you review the menu, you'll notice they can nicely accommodate non seafood eaters too.

I picked from the quick lunch portion of the menu and ordered the two-piece fried catfish fillets for \$5.45. It was served with homemade hushpuppies and your choice of two sides including coleslaw, cheese grits, baked beans, turnip greens, blackeyed peas or French fries.

The fillets were light and just-right crispy, not too crunchy. I took the coleslaw and baked beans. Both were good and southern style; sugar, molasses, etc. I also had a taste of the cheese grits... very good! The only down side was the hush puppies; good but very doughy and not light enough.

Other menu selections include fried or broiled gulf shrimp and sea scallops for \$6.25 and sirloin steak.

chopped steak, chicken tenders, clam strips or BBQ ribs for \$5.65. Sandwiches offered for \$4.95 with a choice of two sides include catfish, grouper, steak burger, chicken breast and BBQ beef.

Like any good southern

catfish restaurant, they have the "all you can eat" catfish platter all day, every day, for \$9.95, with all the extras including homemade coleslaw, hush puppies, fresh green onions, buttermilk biscuits and your choice of one of country fries, baked potato, black eyed peas, turnip greens, cheese grits, regular grits, baked beans or baked sweet potato. Other dinner selections include stuffed crab, oysters, alligator, frog legs, pasta dishes and landlubber entrees including New York strip for \$12.95. rib eye for \$11.45 or BBQ ribs for \$8.95.

"Starting nibblers" appe-

tizers include fried dill pickles, Louisiana style gumbo, Buffalo wings, corn fritters or stuffed crabs. "Tummy ticklers" desserts include Mississippi mud pie and peanut butter pie. There is a children's menu and they also offer beer and wine. Catfish Country is open Monday through Saturday from 11:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and until 8:00 p.m. on Sunday. great board, four of whom are brand new members. This board has a lot of great ideas and a desire to get things done," he said.

Snelling said an active community assures that it remains a vibrant, safe. attractive and appealing place to live. He added that although government support of neighborhoods is very important, "Government does not have the resources or the ability to create a good neighborhood and a great place to live. That's up to the residents."

Originally from Cleveland,

Ohio, Snelling moved with his family to Bloomingdale Estates in 1994.

"Bloomingdale was and is attractive to us because it is a stable residential neighborhood. It has a fair degree of human diversity, and there are lots of kids," he said.

Special Taxing District FAQs

By Laura Frazier

The Bloomingdale Gazette and Bloomingdale Homeowners Association often receive questions from residents about the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District. Here we address some of the most frequently asked questions.

What does BSTD stand for?

The Bloomingdale Special Taxing District.

What is a special taxing district?

Special taxing districts are groups of county taxpayers with a common interest that requires special funding. Special taxing districts allow members in any given district to share common expenses equitably by adding a special tax assessment to the property tax bill of each district member.

Why does Bloomingdale have a special taxing district?


The purpose of the BSTD is to maintain a reserve of funds to pay for community repairs and improvements.

How long have we had a special taxing district?

A group of Bloomingdale residents petitioned the county in the mid 1980's to create a special taxing district for the Bloomingdale area. The Board of County Commissioners approved the petition and the BSTD was formed.

What area does the BSTD encompass?

The BSTD area includes every home in Bloomingdale East and West, with the exception of River Crossing

Property manager Al Devney and his little green truck are a familiar sight in Bloomingdale. Devney coordinates community repairs and improvements and performs dally inspections of our common grounds and irrigation system.

How much does the BSTD cost residents?

The taxing district assessment is \$80 per year; the amount has not changed since the district was created. The assessment is added to each homeowner's annual property tax bill. With over 4,200 homeowners currently in the district, more than \$330,000 will be added to the taxing district's coffers this year.

The STD is a non-ad valorum district; every property owner pays the same \$80, regardless of the value of their residence.

Who decides how to spend the money?

A volunteer board of trustees manages the expenditure of BSTD funds. The trustees, all Bloomingdale homeowners living within the district, hold open meetings once a month to plan maintenance and improvement projects. There are currently seven members serving on the BSTD board.

Each May, the board

invites all Bloomingdale residents to attend the taxing district's annual budget meeting.

The meeting is advertised in local newspapers including the Gazette and on our community web site at www.BloomingdaleGazette.c om. Resident input is taken into consideration in deciding which projects are to be included in the upcoming budget.

Once the budget is approved by the Board of County Commissioners, it is put in line for capital expenditures approval, a process that can carry over into the next fiscal year.

Who oversees maintenance and improvement projects?

Bloomingdale's property manager, Al Devney of DPMI Property Management, Inc., serves as a project coordinator for maintenance and improvement projects approved by the board of trustees. Devney also provides regular inspections of Bloomingdale's common areas, entryways and irrigation systems.

What are the responsibilities of the BSTD?

The taxing district is responsible for the maintenance of and improvements to the community's common areas including landscaping along our feeder roads (Natures Way, Culbreath, Bloomingfield, etc.), perimeter walls, all major and most minor entryways, landscaping, irrigation, etc. The taxing district's area of responsibility does not include county-owned property such as roads, parks, sidewalks, street signs, etc.

Is the taxing district a division of the homeowners association?

The Bloomingdale Special Taxing District and Bloomingdale Homeowners Association operate independently of each other. For more information about the homeowners association, call (813) 681-2051 or visit www.BloomingdaleGazette.com.

How can I report a maintenance or improve ment need to the BSTD?

Bloomingdale residents are invited to attend special taxing district meetings on the second Monday of each month, 7:00 p.m. at the Bloomingdale community office, 3509 Bell Shoals Rd. Residents can call the BSTD at (813) 684-6667, send email to BSTD@BloomingdaleGazette.com or fax to (813) 684-2358.

* River Crossing Estates was built in the mid 1990's on a parcel of land that was not identified on the original Bloomingdale plats used in the 1980's to determine the taxing district area.




The No. 1 rule is don't make it simple for a criminal to ruin your day.

Another current safety issue in our community involves the increasing popularity of motorized scooters.





Just over two years ago, the Greater Brandon Chamber of Commerce donated an estimated \$500,000 five-acre parcel of property in Bloomingdale East to the MacDill Air Force Base Education Council. The property is on Erindale Drive near Lithia Pinecrest Road.

In addition to the five acres, the chamber also donated \$15,000 to the education council, a program that provides continuing education programs for MacDill personnel.

The chamber's generous donation helped form a mutually beneficial relationship between MacDill and the communities of Brandon

d Valrico, where so many dilitary personnel and retirees live. There was some initial speculation that the property might become convenient home to a new MacDill Family Outreach Center.
