For the Bloomingdale area, 1998 saw the beginning of what was to be a very important program that would significantly improve the safety and security of its residents, families, homes and businesses. Then Sheriff Cal Henderson established the Community Resource Deputy Program. The deputy selected to serve the Bloomingdale community was Deputy Pete Maurer.

Deputy Maurer had served as a member of the sheriff's newly formed "Crime Fighters Squad," the foundation for the current Street Crimes Unit, and worked as an undercover narcotics investigator patrolling the Bloomingdale and Seffner areas. He had previously served as a reserve deputy in Idaho working with law enforcement and community members to improve safety and security. He had also served as a combat defense air policeman in the United States Air

Deputy Pete and Sandy, as they were soon to be called by area residents, worked with area volunteers to set up the Bloomingdale Community Station on Bell Shoals Road. The Bloomingdale Community Station continues to serve as a focal point for residents to obtain personal assistance and information on issues ranging from crimes, state statues, traffic problems, family issues, finger printing, safety and security. The station also serves as
a work area during evenings and on weekends for area deputies to rest and handle law enforcement issues.

Before you hit the ground running, Steve Dunn hopes you'll visit Hit the Trails, his running specialty store. For the past four years, Hit the Trails has carried running and outdoor gear from shoes to accessories to meet the needs of all types of walkers and runners, whether track, cross country, recreational or competitive. Passionate about running, store owner Dunn has competed in 11 marathons, including the Boston Marathon, and has completed nearly 150 races of various distances on and off road.

Dunn brings that same passion and experience into Hit the Trails. "We're not just a store," he said. "We get to know our customers. We offer free stride analysis. We put you on the treadmill and look at your stride to see if you're over or under-
onating." This process is de-
signed to ensure the perfect fit for any runner. Other factors to consider when purchasing a running shoe are weight, miles run per week and any knee injuries. Dunn says he offers the latest shoes at the same prices as the bigger chains, but says "at Hit the Trails you also get my expertise." Dunn is a certified RRCA (Road Runners Club of America) running coach, as well as a Newsome High. School track and cross country coach, and he has also worked closely with Bloomingdale's track and cross country teams.

He also offers that expertise as an individual or group coach, available for private instruction to help runners reach their specific goals. - Dunn opens his store to hold monthly clinics, bringing in speakers to address issues-concerning to-
"So many people today are running. It's a stress reliever," said Dunn, who averages 40 miles a week, both in his work as a coach and personal trainer, as well as the miles he runs just for himself. "I'm very competitive," he admits.

He's also a teacher to local running enthusiasts. To help others meet . their running goals, Dunn started the FishHawk Roadrunner's Club, where runners of every caliber gather several times a week to encourage and support each other's efforts. Dunn plans training regimens and workouts dèsigned to improve a runner's skill; speed and endurance.

Dunn is also very philanthropic, donating much of his time and energy to support charitable community events, helping plan fundraising runs for places like the Ruskin No-

Pediatric Cancer Society, raising thousands of dollars for them. He also funds high school scholarships for runners with good grades.
"I believe in supporting my community. I really donate a lot of my time and energy to raising money for a lot of different charities," he said. Dunri also helps local athletes improve $n$ their sport by offering speed and agility clinics, of great interest to football players, especially.

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## It's Doggone Cold: Show Compassion And Protection For Your Pets

Natural fur coats are not always enough to keep pets warm during extreme weather conditions. Cold temperatures can suppress a pet's immune system, making it more susceptible to illness. Pediatric and geriatric pets are especially prone to sickness as their bodies fight to stay warm.

Hillsborough County Animal Services offers the following suggestions to keep pets safe during cold snaps:

1. Have a heart - bring the animals inside whenever possible.
2. Be a pal and lead the pack. Accompany dogs on potty breaks because they, too, may resist "the call" to go out into the cold - which will lead to indoor accidents.
3. Insulate outdoor doghouses against the elements, including moisture. By law, a doghouse must provide such protection with three solid sides and a base, no bare ground or wire gratings. In severe temperatures, bed-
ding is also required.
4. Attempt to provide similar shelter for outdoor cats, even if just a temporary structure containing blankets.
5. Cats often seek shelter in the warmth of engines or wheel wells. If your vehicle is not garaged, check before starting the engine. The alternative could be tragic.
6. Keep you pet's ID securely fastened. Only your county registration tag lets neighbors know your lost pet is vaccinated and is safe to shelter until help arrives. Tags are a free phone call home and easily traced through the county Web site.
7. Consider a donation of clean even used - towels and bedding to your neighborhood animal shelter.
