
#### PAPER LANTERN SALE PUMPED UP AWARD

# Community Asked To Help Stop Crimes, Vandalism

A wave of vandalism recently hit Bloomingdale and left, in its wake, more than \$4,000 in community property damage and a dubious gallery of graffiti. The upsurge in criminal mischief prompted Hillsborough County Sheriff's deputies and community groups to ask the public to help identify the culprits.

Al Devney, property manager of the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District, said vandals in November broke dozens of floodlights and spotlights at the entrances to Cambridge Cove, River Crossing, Bloomingdale Cove and Somerset. In addition, community directory signs posted on Culbreath Road at Natures Way and at Erindale Drive were destroyed.

A rash of graffiti also spread throughout Bloomingdale in early December. Devney and hired helpers spent weeks cleaning up and covering the graffiti, which was painted on block walls and buildings all over the community.

The \$4,000 repair expenses incurred by the taxing district were a big hit to its already tight reserves, Devney said. He hopes residents will come forward with any information they might have about the destruction.

"The taxing district, and ultimately Bloomingdale residents, pay to fix or replace damaged community property, unless the (vandals) are caught and restitution is made," Devney said.

The taxing district is one of several public entities asking for help from neighbors to stop the crimes.

Pete Maurer, Bloomingdale's community resource deputy, urged residents to report all acts of vandalism to the sheriff's office and the substation. Even if people have limited information, he said deputies want to hear from them.

In a heavily populated residential area like Bloomingdale, Maurer said someone had to have seen or heard something.

"We need to know what's going on out there to prevent this problem from continuing or escalating."

In addition to marking walls throughout the community, vandals used black and gold spray paint to deface buildings at Cimino Elementary School, Bloomingdale High School and Bloomingdale Regional Public Library.

Along with the letters "c" and "vc," the word "crip," the widely-known name of a gang syndicate prevalent in Los Angeles appeared in the graffiti. Letters on the marquee sign at Alafia Elementary School were re-arranged to spell out the gang moniker. The familiar tag alarmed neighbors who saw the markings before officials had a chance to remove them.

The incidents are still under investigation, but Maurer said deputies have no reason to believe the damage was done by anyone other than neighborhood kids.

"We've definitely seen an increase in these types of activities lately, but we don't see any evidence of organized, violent gang activity."

The spike in vandalism and criminal mischief was reported to the sheriff's office gang unit task force as a matter of policy, Maurer said.

"But at this point, we believe these are neighborhood kids, ranging anywhere from elementary school-age to teenagers, out looking for trouble."

A host of vandalism and criminal mischief incidents were reported in recent weeks, including a spate of outdoor holiday decoration thefts in December. Most of the acts occurred in the same general area of Bloomingdale East. However, it is not yet clear if some or all of the incidents are directly related

Clerks at the post office in Valrico in November received reports of mail tampering in Bloomingdale East. In addition, residents told the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association at least a dozen mailboxes in the Oakcrest section were destroyed the same week, in broad daylight, during school hours. In December, five days before Christmas, deputies discovered several dozen opened envelopes, cards and small packages dumped at a county park on Deepbrook Drive.

Some neighbors are also concerned about teens trespassing and loitering well after midnight in a wooded conservation area that backs up to Moreland Drive in the Oakcrest section of Bloomingdale. The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association determined in December the county-owned pond and surrounding property fall under the jurisdiction of the storm water division of public works. Homeowners association volunteers are working with county staff to determine if a fence could be installed to block access to the area.


The spate of illegal activity concerns BHA President Ted Grable, who called on the community to help stop the

As 2007 begins, Officer Capitano and I would like to wish each and every resident of Bloomingdale and the surrounding communities a very safe and secure New Year. Sandy and I would also like to thank those of you who provided support to us during this past year.

The safety and security of the residents of our community is the reason we're here at the substation. Working with concerned residents, we have been able to make Bloomingdale a safer and more secure place to live and work and enjoy life.

Those of us with the sheriff's office do our best to help keep you, your families, your homes and businesses safe and secure. But the one person who can do more than anyone to keep you and yours safe and secure is ... you.

Some recent incidents in our community bring this point out very well, including a serious early-morning fire that happened in December at a home not far from the substation. Several engines from Hillsborough County Fire-Rescue and numerous deputies responded. Damage to the home was very severe. Fortunately, no one was seriously injured in the fire, but one pet did not survive. Obviously, the family was emotionally distraught by the loss.

The outpouring of assistance and concern and offers of help were out-

standing. This shows the type of community we live in.

Several residents said it was a wakeup call for them. They said they were going to have smoke detectors installed, purchase fire extinguishers and have family members become familiar with how to use them, and to develop and practice an escape plan. All of these are critical steps that must be taken before a fire starts. These steps do save lives.

The holidays are over now, and residents are enjoying the nice gifts they received, everything from new bikes to new cars. Now is the time to take the steps to protect these special gifts and not let criminals take them. These steps include ensuring your garage doors are locked, outside vehicles are locked and all valuables removed from them, and

other valuable items like bikes are secured inside. They will walk away.

When you are away, make sure your home is secured. For extended periods of absence, make arrangements with a friend or neighbor to get your mail and paper, or have them stopped until you return.

We all hear these safety and security steps over and over every year. The simple fact is that until you take action and do them, you leave your family and your property open to tragedy and criminals.

Make 2007 a safe and secure year. Take personal responsibility for your property, your home and your vehicles. No one will miss them more than you. Also, be a good neighbor by watching out for your own neighbors.

County Hires New Director of Planning and Growth Management

Hillsborough County has hired Peter Aluotto as Director of the County's Planning and Growth Management Department. Aluotto has 30 years of experience in comprehensive planning, economic development and redevelopment.

Previously the director of Planning and Zoning in Escambia County, Florida, Aluotto also headed the Development Services Department for the city of Daytona Beach.

Aluotto has 13 years of experience in Tampa and Hillsborough County, in public and in private sector planning and development. He has masters' degrees in urban planning and public administration.

Aluotto will start with Hillsborough County on Feb. 19. He will manage a staff of 336 employees and a \$36 million budget for the county.

### Refusal To Pay Watering Fines Could Result In Steep Penalties

Under a new system adopted by Hillsborough County Dec. 1, homeowners who refuse to pay lawn watering penalties will be summoned to appear before a code enforcement special magistrate, who could impose a fine of as much as \$1,000 a day until the original penalty is paid. In extreme cases, the magistrate could choose to levy a one-time fine of \$15,000.Under the new system, fines are \$100 for the first violation, \$200 for the

second and so on, leading up to \$500 for the fifth and succeeding violations. The county also has the authority to place a lien against property owners who refuse to pay fines for violating water restrictions.

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


The neighbors purchased the lantern kits in December during the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association's luminaria fundraiser contest.



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


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

A variety of auction items and additional sponsors are welcome to join the fundraising effort. Autoway Nissan has donated a 2007 Nissan Altima. Chance draw-



The Hillsborough Choice application period for magnet programs and school choice began Dec 1 and lasts through Jan. 23.




plete an application.



#### \$5000 TO FIX DAMAGES
