





Churches Join Forces To Help Local Needy Over The Holidays

With these economically challenging times leading the news every day, 19 local churches decided to join forces, unifying their efforts to stock local food banks and help care for those in need.

Bay Life Church of Brandon started Feed the Bay in 2007 to help feed the hungry of Tampa. But this year, they would not have to do it alone.

In May, Bell Shoals Baptist Church lost their pastor, Forrest Pollock and his 13 year old son, Preston, in a plane crash, only to suffer the loss of music minister, Simeon Nix, three months later to a heart attack. Area churches came together to help Bell Shoals during this process, providing volunteers to man guest books, help in the parking lot and nursery during the funeral services as well as the receptions afterwards. Across denominations, they ministered to a hurting church. It was that tragic time that spurred the ministers to once again realize that coming together produced powerful results, and they decided to join Bay Life to help Feed the Bay.

During worship services Sunday, Nov. 23, congregations in East Hillsborough County were released early and given a shopping list, which they were encouraged to take, along with their family, to area Sweetbay and Publix supermarkets. The goal was to collect and deliver 250,000 pounds of food to area food banks before the holidays.

It is estimated that every day 40,000 families in the Tampa Bay and surrounding communities do not have enough food to feed their families, and this year, more than in recent years, the need is great. Shoppers crowded the aisles at local stores, list in hand, and loaded carts with pantry staples like flour, sugar, canned meats, dry milk, pasta, sauce and breakfast foods.

Trucks were positioned in the parking lots to collect the donations, and when loaded, pulled out to deliver the food to America's Second Harvest of Tampa Bay, Beth-El Farm Worker Ministry, Bread of Life, Cynthia Pinckney Ministries, Daystar Faith Center, ECHO, Everyday Blessings, Good Samaritan Mission, Inc., Life Center of Brandon, Manna on Wheels



Sweetbay Supermarket at the corner of Bloomingdale and Bell Shoals was one of many donation sites for Feed the Bay. Though final tallies are not yet available, estimates are that about 269,650 lbs. of food was. donated, 756 volunteers came out to help and about \$18,000 was spent at each pariticipating Sweetbay. Cash and gift cards were donated as well, with estimates at around \$5,000.




I know we all hear these same safety and security steps ties can then spend more time over and over every year. "The

Drive safe, obey the traffic laws and please buckle up! Have a great 2009!




Williams Brings Folk Music **To Brandon Regional Library**

The Walgreens Pharmacy at the corner of Bell Shoals Road and Bloomingdale Avenue offers flu shots on a walk-in basis anytime during their regular pharmacy hours. The general recommendation is that anyone who wants to reduce his or her chances of getting the flu should be vaccinated, but you must be over the age of 18. Walgreens offers two types of influenza vaccines - the injectable influenza vaccine, commonly known as the "flu shot" and the nasal influenza vaccine, FluMist. The cost is \$24.99. For the past four years, The Palmetto Club at FishHawk Ranch has become a sort of minicasino resort, as the members of the Moms Offering Moms Support (MOMS) Club, a national support group for stay-at-home moms, get together to raise money to help fight blood cancers.

As part of the fundraising night, the mothers and some grandmothers pay \$20 each to play in games of Bunko. Bunko is a parlor game played in teams of four with three dice. With a time limit, players take turns rolling the dice to get as many twos, threes, fours, fives and sixes until a bell is sounded. A winning throw in Bunco is to throw three

of a kind of a specified number and each team tallies their points to determine the winner.

"I got one two, that's me. It's a good start," said Carolyn Aguiar, as she played against moms Tracy Hennemann and Karin Ciulla. "Do I go again?"

Although some of the women were having their first go at Bunko and were just learning the rules, the enthusiasm for the game was high. About 80 of the women were from the MOMS Club of Lithia chapter and about 35 were members of the Brandon chapter. The rest of the women were moms, mothers or friends.

Roll for a Cure 2008 raised almost \$3,000 for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, which goes towards leukemia research, said Caitlin Wray, special events campaign coordinator for the society's Suncoast Chapter.

Wray said last year, \$8,500 was raised and support from groups like the MOMS Club of Lithia has helped the survival rate of those with leukemia – a blood or bone marrow cancer – go from 3 percent in 1960, to about 90 percent today.

"This is an incredible turnout; one of the best I've seen," said Wray. "I think this shows the great involvement in their community and whatever they raise, goes back to our mission of fighting leukemia."

The event, sponsored by the Brandon News and individual sponsors, began at 7 p.m. with a buffet dinner and silent auction. As she helped coordinate activities, Roll for a Cure chairwoman Danielle Triplett said the Roll for a Cure events are dedicated to Jeanie Camm, a MOMS Club member who died of Hodgkin's lymphoma Sept. 8, 2004.

Triplett said it was a night of fun, fellowship and frivolity for a serious cause.

"I think it's a fun night out for the women," said Triplett, who lives in FishHawk with her husband, Steve and daughters, Avery, 4 and Emma, eight months. "This supports not only the FishHawk neighborhoods, but those in the greater Brandon area."

While a disc jockey played popular tunes from the 1980s and 1990s, the Bunko continued and MOMS Club past-president Mags Oldman reminded players to switch tables every two minutes, giving them a chance to meet other members.

As she took a break, MOMS member Meredith Johnson of FishHawk said it was "great" to have an evening that was both entertaining and worthwhile.

"We all have fun and give back at the same time," said Johnson, mother of Braxton, 4 and Sydney, 1. "You meet different mothers in the community. You sit, you play, then move and get to meet someone new."

The couscous literally takes 7 minutes from start to finish. Now it's time to prepare the fish for pan-searing.

Pan-Seared Whitefish

½ lbs. whitefish fillets (I prefer Tilapia because its mild)
 Salt, pepper, flour (I use whole wheat to make it healthier)
 c. chopped almonds
 Drizzle of olive oil
 Tablespoon of butter

Heat olive oil in large skillet over medium high heat. While pan is getting hot, salt and pepper one side of each fillet, then dust each fillet with flour. When pan is hot and oil is moving and thinning, place each fillet seasoned side down in the skillet, being careful not to move it once you do. When all fillets are in skillet, repeat the salt, pepper and flour process. Let fillets cook 3-4 minutes on each side. Once that's done, move them to one side of a serving platter and add another drizzle of olive oil and the butter to the same skillet. When butter has melted, add chopped almonds and toast them in the pan. This will only take a couple of minutes. Once they're toasted, place them on top of the fillets.

Plate the couscous aside the fish fillets and top with the roasted vegetables for a really attractive entrée and side dish! Simple. Satisfying. Savory ~ and slimming! That's this month's dinner @ 6! Until next month





Challenging Yoga

For some people, the thought of yoga brings up visions of sitting in a lotus position and eating bean sprouts, while listening to a meditational CD of waves crashing on the shoreline.

But a local yoga center and its owner-instructor want to help change those stereotypes and show students the long-term benefits of the practice, in a more challenging way.

Traditionally, yoga refers to traditional physical and mental disciplines originating in India; to the goal achieved by those disciplines; and to one of the six orthodox schools of Hindu philosophy.

Over generations, it still incorporates those principals, but some of its forms have changed to impact modern, daily lives.

To help to make lasting lifestyle changes, Sherry Smith, owner of Serenity Stream Yoga & Wellness Spa, Riverview, has developed a special fitness program – "The Extreme Get Fit, Stay Fit Challenge," a \$400, eight-week program which begins Jan. 19.

Besides getting the benefits of traditional yoga and wellness classes, Smith said her goal is to get the community to "take control of their health and change their lifestyle."

During a recent yoga session at her studio, Smith prepared for her first evening class. Since opening last June in Boyette Executive Park, 11954 Boyette Road, she has held classes there seven days a week, for about 400 yoga devotees from FishHawk Ranch, Riverview and Apollo Beach.

Smith, who got into yoga about 10 years ago while working as a corporate travel manager in Rhode Island, said the Stay Fit Challenge is designed to teach and maintain healthy eating habits, cooking techniques, weight training, yoga postures and cardiovascular exercise techniques. She said what makes the program unique is that it's programmed to help students carry what they learn into their daily lives, rather than just attending classes and leaving what they gained at the studio door.

"My mission is not only to be just a place that offers yoga classes. It's to build community and educate about making healthy lifestyle changes," she said.

To do that, Smith is offering the Stay Fit Challenge, which includes weekly classes on healthy living (nutrition, cardiovascular, weight training, stress management, cooking, and selfacceptance); a two-month, private gym membership; private yoga, Pilates and personal training sessions, mentoring throughout the program and unlimited classes at Serenity Stream. Smith also said it includes

Zumba, a Latin dance-based fitness program, and will be run by Serenity Stream instructor and certified personal trainer Abby Eastman, who twice led a similar program in Virginia.

Eastman, who holds masters degree in exercise physiology, said the Stay Fit Challenge program is a "makeover" for a healthy life.

"It is for people who are ready to get real and stop making excuses and start working and seeing the results," she said. "The program is a lifestyle makeover, teaching you the tools to be healthy for life."

Smith participants in last year's program are still seeing results. She said the 125 Stay Fit Challenge participants last year lost almost 900 pounds – over 3 million calories.

It's those results that Smith hopes will draw at least 40 people to the Challenge, like yoga devotee Tracey McPherson of Brandon. A yoga student for two years, the sales marketing manager for the Tampa Bay Performing Arts Center said she may enroll in the Challenge.

"I found this place and it's great for stress relief at the end of my day; I've enjoyed all the classes and the instruction has been great," she said.

Florida's Arbor Day Is Jan. 16

Attention all Bloomingdale tree lovers, it's time to celebrate Florida's Arbor Day! Many states, like Florida, celebrate Arbor Day earlier than National Arbor Day which is held in April. The January date allows for residents to take advantage of the state's mild winters and best tree planting weather. This year's celebration is on Jan. 16.

Whether observed in January or April, Arbor Day is a day to celebrate the beauty and value of trees by planting and caring for them. Created in Nebraska in 1872, the mission is simple; plant trees. To get the most out of this year's Arbor Day, Steven Kale, a Bloomingdale resident and certified arborist (that's tree expert to us simple folk) offered his advice for tree selection and planting.

Kale is the vice president and general manager of Gulf Coast Tree Care and has been with the company for nine years. "Arbor Day benefits are many,"

he explained, "Trees help control soil erosion, they clean our air, and they provide shade and lower electric bills. They also harbor our wildlife, and they add beautification and value to our homes, neighborhoods, and cities."

To the greatest extent possible, Kale recommends planting native trees, and a variety of them."Diversity in our tree population is key; if you only plant one species, you potentially open the door for a disease that could wipe out the whole population," he said.

"Many Bloomingdale home lots are small and do not lend themselves to having a tree with a large footprint like our many oak species," he explained. Magnolia, red maple, sycamore, and pine are a few native tree species Kale suggested for Bloomingdale planters. "These trees can be planted close to homes, they grow fast, and they are beautiful "

"Also, I like and can recom-

mend some of the really pretty "ornamental" trees for small footprint properties: crape myrtle, bottlebrush, Chinese elm, flowering dogwood, mimosa, holly, Hong Kong orchid. All of these do very well in our area," he added.

His number one tree planting tip: plant the right tree in the right place. There are many information sources to help with tree selection and planting location including web sites, landscape architects, and local plant nurseries.

As for the arborist's role, he offered, "We are "the tree doctors. We primarily care for and maintain trees that are established." For issues concerning tree health, removals, and general maintenance, contact Gulf Coast Tree Care at (813) 681-8016.




