# Let's Get Involved

## BHA seeks assistance

Dealing with county government, homebuilders and fund-raising events is a challenge for the few who dare.

In Bloomingdale, the handful are like rolling tumbleweed in an endless desert.

Some are directors of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association. Others are residents who conduct their own negotiations.

Some1,000 Bloomingdale homeowners are members of the BHA, said USAF Lt. Col. Russ Lembke, the group's president.

There are roughly 3,500 homes in Bloomingdale and Lembke said he would like to see community involvement strengthened.

"The problem is trying to find people to support the activities," he said. "On the board, the same people do all the work."

Lembke referred to such BHA-sponsored fundraising activities as the annual summer golf tournament and the October "Triple Header" and Roberts Bros, Circus.

The latter events are held at the two county parks in Bloomingdale.

The golf tournament cleared \$1,500 this year while the Triple Header-cycling, skating and running competitions--and circus held on successive days raised \$1,254.

Proceeds have gone toward the BHA scholarship fund and fire rescue fund.

The BHA awards college money to an outstanding senior at Bloomingdale Senior High School each year and maintains a reserve in its budget for victims of house fires in Bloomingdale.

The BHA, a non-profit association with 11 members, seeks greater participation from homeowners, Lembke said.

"The biggest frustration is getting (board) members to support activities and getting volunteers to come in and help," he said.

The golf tournament was successful. The Triple

Header suffered from a lack of volunteer coordination, Lembke said.

The circus sold out for one of two performances.

The ongoing membership drive is crucial to the survival of the 12-year-old BHA, Lembke said.

The six-month, \$10 fee per family goes into the activities which are designed as fund-raising ventures.

"Nobody is paid on the BHA board; we are in the same situation as everybody else is in," Lembke said. "Bloomingdale does have a reputation as a good place to live and it is so well maintained by the (Special Dependent Taxing District)."

BHA board members without fanfare negotiate with county officials for such amenities as increased street lighting and decreased speed limits.

Lights have gone up in the Erindale area; the county has scheduled the installation of traffic circles on congested Bloomingfield Drive; property code violations reported by residents are submitted to the county code enforcement board weekly by the Bloomingdale Community Office.

Copies of deed restrictions for all of Bloomingdale are available free of charge in the same office, 3232 Lithia Pinecrest Road, in the Royal Oaks of Bloomingdale shopping

Deed restrictions vary from builder to builder, Lembke said. The BHA has no enforcement authority.

"We can go out and look at (a reported violation) and report it to the county and the county can put warning notices on the home," Lembke said.

The county code enforcement officeis authorized to locate homeowners or mortgage holders who have abandoned their prop-

The BHA also battles builders whose construction and property lines do not conform to restrictions.





### Lembke asks support for BHA activities

Lembke was a ROTC graduate. U.S. Air Force programs appeared inviting to a young man with a B.S. degree in business administration.

The benefits that were offered were attractive. After serving 20 years you could have a pension and pursue another career. I had a desire to serve my country in some capacity,"

Lembke will retire from the Air Force Jan. 31 "after

27 years and five months of continuous active ser-

vice," he says. Lembke has also been president of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association for the past year. At press time, he was eager to serve a second term with the goal of increasing community involvement.

Support has wanted since 1989 when Lembke

joined the BHA's board of directors. Mobile Watch was strong with volunteers who scoured Bloomingdale each night to suppress illegal activities. Fundraising ventures were successful. The outlook was brighter.

\*Costs have gone up, everyone is worried about their job, people are less willing to donate their time," he says. A bad econ-omy produces an unhealthy bottom line. "It is more difficult to get volunteers and supporters."

Such BHA-sponsored activities as the golf tour-

nament, Triple Header and Roberts Bros. Circus are fund-raisers designed to replenish its coffers.

The BHA subsidized the Bloomingdale Gazette until funds ran dry. Now the Gazette is attempting to survive on advertising revenue alone. Non-payment of accounts may hammer the final nail into the Gazette coffin.

The BHA normally awards academic scholarships to three honors grad-uates of Bloomingdale Senior High School each year. This year only one student was honored.

If we can get \$1,500 to \$2,000 in the scholarship fund, we will award two or three students next year,"



### STD works minus fanfare

The Dependent Special (Taxing) District works without fanfare in Bloomingdale.

But, if the sevenmember board vanished tempers might flare. Community walls would fall into disrepair. Signs leading to various subdivisions might fade. Weeds would reach for the skyline. In their bulk, rodents would

The Bloomingdale STD is one of 32 countyapproved districts authorized to provide community maintenance with budgets funded by taxes assessed on each housing unit. The annual fee is \$80

per housing unit.

The local STD was established six years ago.

Projects completed this past fiscal year which end-ed Sept. 30 included edging and mowing of rights of way, fertilization and pest control of rights of way, weekly entranceway maintenance and the repair of several irrigation sys-

Also, pressure-washing and painting 33 percent of community perimeter walls, installation of overhead lights at John Moore Road and Gamett Drive, replacement of frame fence with masonry wall along Natures Way in Bloo-mingdale East and repainting of entranceway signs at John Moore Road, Rosemeade, Green Hollow, Garnett, Chad Ford and Windsor Woods.

Property administrator Bobby Cole oversees and contracts out for all work approved by the county

The STD shares a problem afflicting the Bloo-mingdale Homeowners Association, Mobile Watch and the Bloomingdale Gazette: lack of community

Mabe said the STD has not faced an election in her 2-1/2 years on the

"We've never had enough people to have an election," she said. "It is a quasi-governmental agency. We have to obey rules of the county. The meet-

ings get cumbersome.
"But there is satisfaction in knowing that in our area money is being spent well and not being wast-

Still, Mabe criticizes the absence of community involvement at meetings held the second Monday of the month, 8 p.m., at the Bloomingdale Community Office at the Royal Oaks of Bloomingdale shopping center.

I would love to have more people coming to the meetings," she said. "We are spending money and no one is watching us." Mabe won a seat on the

board when a mid-term

vacancy arose. Peter Aluotto, immediate past president, said the STD allows local decision-making "not made by the county commission. There is a great deal more certainty things will hap-

The STD net budget for 1990-1991 in tax assessments totaled \$203,000, Mabe said. The projected assessment for this fiscal year is \$205,000.

The gross figures would be some \$10,000 higher, but Mabe said county officials warn each STD that not all fees will be paid.

The county tells us not to expect five percent," Mabe said, "because of bankruptcy or someone does not pay.

The county collects and deposits the fees in the STD's money market ac-

Cole said projects for this fiscal year include replacement of a frame fence with a masonry wall along Springvale Avenue, upgrading and enhancing landscaping at seven entranceways, installing four irrigation systems, re-placing sod at eight entranceways

Also, planting trees on two central median strips, pressure-washing, repairing and painting perimeter walls in five areas, replacing 150-foot sunken wall section along Bell Shoals Road, continuing to mow, edge, fertilize and trim atrees along all rights of way and pressure-washing "approximately" 2/3 of Bloomingdale's pe-

rimeter walls, Pest control is also an

ongoing project.

The STD is in charge of public maintenance for all areas of Bloomingdale's 5,500 homes except in The Greens, Fox Run and River Crossing and other areas where major home building remains underway, Mabe said.

The three areas are controlled by master community associations.

The STD agreed to take over maintenance for the 80-plus Windsor Woods subdivision last year when the developer and lender declared bankruptcy.

The funding for maintenance came from a \$10,000 line item originally offered to Hillsborough County on a matching bases for improvements to two parks in Bloomingdale East and West.

The proposed allocation was returned to the budget when the county, locked in funding cutbacks, refused

the offer. The Windsor Woods tax base generates only 52 percent of the funds required for upkeep of the common areas on an annual basis. The subdivision is not built out enough to

generate a larger tax base. What was the key to grabbing a tiger by the

Community involvement. Several Windsor Woods home owners saw the potential for a crisis if the public areas were ignored. The STD, with a budget surplus, agreed to shoulder the responsibility.



### STD to consider 'circle' proposal

Bloomingdale's Special Dependent Taxing District may finance the landscaping of three traffic circles Hillsborough County has approved for congested Bloomingfield Drive.

Pam Mabe, president of the STD, said the support likely will be included in next year's budget which goes into effect Oct. 1.

The county must ap-prove all STD budgets be-

fore they are valid.

Bobby Cole, STD administrator, said three cost estimates suggest the STD might approve an initial expenditure of \$7,500 to landscape each island with native, drought-tolerant

Maintenance for plant replacement, weeding, fertilization and pest control would be budgeted at \$120 per month, Cole said.

The overall cost is "just an estimate," he said. "It could be \$1,000 more or Iess.

Installation of the traffic islands is scheduled for eight to 10 weeks be-ginning in late summer, said Wayne Kirby of the county's traffic gineering department.

Traffic circles-or roundabouts--have been a source of speed and traffic control in Europe.

The installations are scheduled for Paddlewheel Court, Sweetleaf Drive and Rosedale Drive roughly 1,000 to 1,200 feet apart at a cost of \$36,000 to the county.

Traditional controls

such as speed humps, traffic diverters and stop signs were considered before the decision was made to install traffic circles at each of the three intersections with Bloomingfield.

Traffic circles simply move motorists in a circle to the north, south, east and west exits.

Kirby said stop signs will be installed for six months to familiarize motorists with the European system that is enjoying success in other areas of the United States.

Installation of the traffic circles on the 28-foot wide roadway should not de-mand the seizure of additional rights of way, said county traffic engineering manager Greg Prytyka. Radius of the traffic circles is expected to be 19.5 feet.

Where sidewalks are not presently at the rights of way, they may moved back," he said.

The county would plant grass or build a concrete cap for each traffic circle if the STD does not choose to absorb the cost of landscaping, Prytyka said.

But as I understand it, there is a desire to have it landscaped," he said. School bus drivers should have no trouble ne-

gotiating the 8.5-foot-wide roadway around the traffic circles, Prytyka said.

The busses will enter and exit on Bloomingfield without traveling the full

The speed limit is slated for 10 miles per hour.



Bloomingdale residents who survived the 1991 year without an incident of vandalism can give much credit to one group-the Bloomingdale Mobile Watch.

Made up of 174 residents who volunteer free time year 'round, the Mobile Watch can be seen patrolling the streets seven evenings a week.

According to Mobile Watch Coordinator La Wayne Wyatt, "Mobile Watch is extremely valuable to the community. We act as a deterrant to keep crime and troublemakers out of the area."

Mobile Watch, a committee of the Bloo-

mingdale Homeowners Association, is regulated by a core group that sets policy and operating pro-

Financially subsidized by Mailboxes Etc. in Bloomingdale Square, Mobile Watch is able to purchase such needed items as radios, car signage, antennae and administrative materi-

Unfortunately, what Mobile Watch needs most can't by purchased with

Out of 174 volunteers, 120 of them are active," Wyatt said. "We need a to-tal of 200 people to over all of Bloomingdale effectively.

Mobile Watch currently is divided into three zones with three cars on patrol each night, seven days

weekly, Wyatt said. While most home owners are security-conscious, Mobile Watch urges all residents to follow a few simple tips:

· Close garage doors after dark.

· Be aware of crime and suspicious activities in your neighborhood.

· Telephone the Sheriff and Mobile Watch (685-2072) to report suspicious "Vandalism to mail

boxes and car windows, construction thefts and suspicious cars are the most common logged activities by the patrol watch,"

Wyatt said. Youngsters entering the two parks after dark also is

a frequent occurrence. Wyatt said maintaining a good working relationship with local law enforcement officials helps keep a handle on crime.

Wyatt, a Bloomingdale West resident since 1985, worked his way up through the Mobile Watch ranks starting as a member of the

patrol watch. From there, he served on the core committee, then was nominated and elected coordinator.

Wyatt, a native of California, is retired from the U.S. Army and currently works for the Hillsborough County Board of Educa-

When asked why he chose Bloomingdale to be his home, he answered quickly, "I liked this area," then added with a chuckle, "My youngest daughter also had an interest in attending the local high school."
