## MOBILE WATCH IN JEOPARDY!

The Bloomingdale Mobile Watch program may be disbanded on August 31st due to lack of volunteers, according to the Mobile Watch Core Committee. Beginning July 19 an open letter went out to all of Bloomingdale explaining the need for more involvement from the community. According to a Core Committee spokesperson, the current number of volunteers are not enough to handle the constant growth of this subdivision. This handful of volunteers are having to spread themselves thinner and thinner in an effort to cover all of Bloomingdale. "That the Mobile Watch is a deterrent to crime, there is no question. The problem is lack of residential volunteers," said Hal Labkon, Mobile Watch Coordinator.

The Bloomingdale Mobile Watch was founded by the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association in 1980. At that time the residents were experiencing a heavy rash of burglaries, as many as 15 in one week's time. It was found that there was a good response to the idea of a Mobile Watch and the idea took hold. There were approximately 200 residents and the Mobile Watch was totally staffed, but now, with more than 1,550 homes (and over 3,000 residents) the Mobile Watch is grossly understaffed and unable to cover all of Bloomingdale the way they would like.

When the Mobile Watch was first established, it took one car 20 minutes to cover an area. This meant that every twenty minutes you could count on someone looking at your home to make sure everything was OK. But now, it takes two cars over an hour to cover the area and they can only do it 4 nights a week.

They need HELP! If the Mobile Watch is worth keeping, then it's worth your 3 hours of time once per month. In many communities with active Mobile Watch Programs, it is a requirement of every homeowner that they participate in the Mobile Watch Program.

So...Do you have a few minutes? Give them to the Mobile Watch, they could use them.

# THE NEWCOMERS PAGE

In an effort to help our new neighbors make their transition to Bloomingdale a little easier, the BLOOMINGDALE GAZETTE would like to provide you with facts and information about your new home.

In the beginning, Bloomingdale was farm and pasture land. Sometime during the mid 1950's parts of this area were reforested (which is why the pine trees line up in straight rows). In the '60's - '70's, Criterion Corporation purchased the land over a five-year period with an eye to future development. There was a ranch where the Suarez model is now (in the East) and beyond was a very large farm. After the land acquisition, it took another 5-6 years for it to become a PUD (Planned Urban Development) which was redesigned 3-4 times.

In the fall of 1978, Bay Homes (the building arm of Criterion) built five furnished models and 10 spec homes in the East. They sold all 10 in the first week. Later, Bay Homes was bought by Pulte. Suarez was the second builder and from there came the builders you see now. Once the builders have finished here in Bloomingdale (in 5-10 years) our subdivision will have 6,853 dwelling units.

The first families moved into the East in May and June of 1979. One of these first families was Fred and Joyce Uphoff. Fred was instrumental in founding the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, Inc., and the Bloomingdale Gazette.

The Bloomingdale Homeowner's Association, Inc., (or BHA as it is known) was founded to give a unified voice to the residents of Bloomingdale.

Over the past seven years, this unified voice has accomplished many things such as: The stop light at Bell Shoals and Bloomingdale Avenue; the street lighting districts; parties for children; the Bloomingdale Gazette; the Mobile Watch; and the Fire and Disaster Fund as just a few examples. But most recently the BHA put the Special Taxing District into place.

The Special Taxing District (or STD as it is called) was established January 1, 1986, for the purpose of maintaining the common grounds of Bloomingdale. (Currently the grounds are being maintained by Criterion Corporation until STD monies are collected starting in November of 1986.) This year on the Hillsborough County Property Tax statement which you will receive in October-November, there will be a notation of \$80 for this STD. (If you closed on your home after January 1, 1986, this won't appear on your tax bill until November 1987.) The STD, though founded by the BHA, is a separate entity and is run by a different board of directors. (See page 2 for a list of names.) The County collects the STD money through our taxes from all the residents and then the STD Board of Trustees apply it to the maintenance.

On the other hand, the BHA is funded totally by volunteer dues (\$5) paid one time per year in November.

The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association Board of Directors meets monthly in the home of one of the directors. The time, date, and place are always announced in advance in this paper. Interested observers are invited to attend.

The BHA General Membership meetings are held for all residents of Bloomingdale (members or not) five times per year: September, November, January, March, and May. The time, date, and meeting place are announced in advance in this newspaper.

We strongly encourage you to become a member of the BHA. Your donation of \$5 per year to this non-profit organization will ensure the continuance of a homeowner's association placed there for your benefit. So won't you take a minute now and fill out the application below....

## AND THE WALL CAME TUMBLING DOWN

Have you noticed lately that there is now a gaping hole in one of the buffer walls on Bell Shoals? The Stanley's noticed. They live next door to it. "I was never so shocked in my life as I was the day I came home from work and found the wall was gone from the lot next door. My husband was just livid!"

A new builder in the area, Gulfland Homes, purchased 17 lots from Criterion Corporation and are currently building on six of them. At 713 Sandy Creek Drive, Gulfland Homes leveled the lot, put up small fences, and turned the lot into a parking lot. On this same property they have a temporary construction trailer. Next door to the parking lot are two recently built Gulfland homes. It was the lot where they constructed the parking facilities that they tore down the wall from. Approximately 50 feet of the buffer wall that faces on Bell Shoals was taken down and a driveway access leading out from the residential area was put in place.

This paper contacted Dan Baychok who is the Job Supervisor with Gulfland Homes on July 16. He says that the homes on Sandy Creek are not meant to be a "model center," but that they do have a salesman on staff there. He says they took down the wall on purpose to allow their construction crews to have access to a parking area that will not annoy the established residents with

excess vehicles in the area. He also stated that when construction work was done, they would be moving over to Section BB in the East. At that time they would rebuild the wall and paint that section from Garnett to the southern end. He stated that they had posted a bond with Criterion for this work. Mr. Baychok couldn't be specific as to how long they expect the wall to stay down. According to Mr. Baychok, they had received all of the necessary permits to tear down the wall and put in a drive-way access onto Bell Shoals Road. He also said that an individual had been out that morning and had done an inspection.

This paper then contacted Dave Trent in the Hillsborough County Engineering Department. He stated that no permits had been obtained from his department and referred us to Tom Thomas of the Building Department. We spoke to Mr. Thomas Friday morning the 18th and within an hour's time he called us back with this answer: "The only permit on record is one for a temporary construction trailer on site." He stated that they would make a field inspection over the weekend and let us know their findings on Monday, July 21, by 10 am.

Precisely at 10 a.m. on July 21, Mr. Thomas called to say the area had been field inspected over the weekend. As a civil engineer he agreed with what the builder was doing as a practical matter, but

Gulfland cannot do what they've done without the proper permits from the County. Having permission from Criterion to tear down the wall did not constitute what the County considers a proper permit. Gulfland Homes was given until 5 p.m. on Monday, July 21, to prove they had the proper documentation. If they did not, the entire matter was going to be turned over to the Zoning Enforcement Board.

Myles Standish, Vice President of Criterion, stated that he was the one that gave Gulfland Homes the permission to tear down the wall. He confirmed that the builder did post a bond for an amount estimated to be appropriate to rebuild and paint the wall. Mr. Standish stated that obtaining the proper permits was the builders responsi-

bility. He stated that from a marketing and architectural standpoint, it made sense to have an access through the wall. Mr. Standish also stated that this would alleviate the traffic coming through the already occupied residential areas.

Meanwhile, the residents on Sandy Creek are upset. Their children now have direct access to a 55 mph road that was once firmly blocked off. The access area is also unlighted which means that anyone can now pull a car up at night and get into the backyards of those residents without being seen.

As of this printing the GAZETTE has not heard from the Zoning Enforcement Board. We hope to bring you more information in the September issue.

## TRUSTEES ELECTED

Without so much as a whimper or a bang, the residents of Bloomingdale have elected four Trustees to the Board of the Special Taxing District and they didn't even know it. At noon on July 18 was the filing deadline for any individual who wished to serve on the Board of the STD. There were four seats to be filled as provided in the STD ordinance adopted by the County and Bloomingdale on December 18, 1985. It provides for 1/2 of the Board of Trustees to be (re)elected every year with the first election being held on September 2, 1986. Four individuals filed as candidates and there were only four positions open; therefore, it is considered an unopposed election by the Hillsborough County Supervisor of Elections. By virtue of their having completed the proper paperwork and obtaining enough signatures on petitions, they have been duly elected to serve two-year terms. Besides the current board members of Christopher Pheils, J. Christopher Deem, and Robert Knott, the four re-elected Trustees are:

THOMAS CALCATERRA, CPA

Tom is a Certified Public Accountant with the accounting firm of Arthur Anderson. His accounting background will help the board in providing maintenance in a fiscally sound manner. His goal is to ensure that we plan for future capital expenditures such as new walls, rather than tax and spend for today only. Tom and his wife Beth have been residents for three years with their two children Joseph and Jennifer. He also serves as the Treasurer on the Board of Directors of the Suicide and Crisis Center.

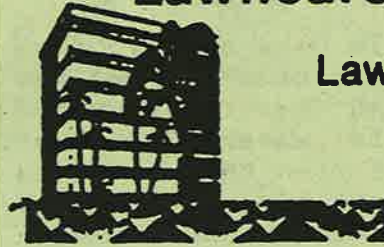
JOSEPH D. DELUCA, JR., CFP

The purpose of the STD Board is to carry out the STD Ordinance which provides for the maintenance of the common areas of Bloomingdale. This includes, walls, mowing, landscaping, entrance ways, and general maintenance. The funds come from our tax money and then are administered by the board of Trustees. The seven volunteer individuals who make up the board share one common interest--to maintain Bloomingdale in such a way that property values are enhanced in the most economical way possible. We are indeed fortunate to have seven individuals of such diverse backgrounds and talents to undertake this task.

## **THE BATTLE CONTINUES**

### **RESIDENTS SEEK SMELL CEASE**

The residents of Bloomingdale Oaks are fighting an up-hill battle against "City Hall" to get rid of the noxious odors being emitted from the Bloomingdale Interim Waste Water Treatment Plant. Recently, the petition that they had sent to the DER (Department of Environmental Regulation) requesting an abatement of the odor came back to them stating that the wording was incorrect and would need correction. These official notices were sent to the Oaks residents by third class mail on the 26th of June which meant that no one received them until Monday the 30th. They required a response within 10 days and the tenth day was Sunday the 6th. Add to that, Friday the 4th was a holiday. They called Tallahassee seeking help in modifying the petition and ran into a stone wall. They asked whether Monday, the 11th day would be acceptable as the 10th day was a Sunday. They were told "I can't answer that." They asked if a postmark later than 10 days would be acceptable because of the 3-day holiday. Answer--"I can't answer that." Then they asked if everyone who had been sent a notice had to respond to make it legal. Response--"No comment." Realizing that they were getting into an area they did not have expertise in, they sought the professional advice of Jack Holsonback, an attorney that lives in Bloomingdale West. The first thing he did was to file for an extension of time. (The County Commissioners have filed an objection to the request contending that it should not be granted because the 10 days response time has expired.) Then Jack not only reworded their petition, but he also created a counter proposal to the current "Consent Order." (See the June 1986 issue of the GAZETTE for more details.) In this proposal he requested:

1. A formal administrative hearing.
2. Penalties of up to \$10,000 be levied against the Board of County Commissioners for violations.
3. The plant not be allowed to expand.
4. The plant not emit odors and not dump effluent into the wetlands.
5. That no new sewer hook-ups be allowed.
6. That there be a phone number anyone can call 24 hours a day in case of problems at the plant.
7. That the plant close entirely if 10+ violations occur within a 6-month period.
8. That the plant be shutdown and dismantled by January 1, 1990.

On July 22, attorney Holsonback received a reply from the DER. In answer to his drafted proposal was another proposal from the DER greatly reduced in length from Jack's. As of this writing, the Oaks residents and attorney Holsonback are submitting another proposal for the DER's review.

BUT...

They need help. YOUR HELP. Why? Because your elementary school children are going to be attending Alafia Elementary as of April of next year. Know where that new school is? RIGHT NEXT DOOR TO THE WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT! When the kids go out to recess and they get water on their shoes from walking through the puddles, are you going to wonder whether or not that puddle contained sewage dumped there from the plant next door? As of right now, there's a good chance of it. Linda Arevelo and some residents in the East recently had the County Health Department out catching mosquitoes to see what kind we have. They found that out of one night's catch of 190 mosquitoes, 170 of them were the type that breed in sewer water. So not only are the folks affected in the Oaks area from the smell, but your children's health and safety can be adversely affected by that plant as well if the Board of County Commissioners continue to operate it in a negligent manner.

How can you help? MONEY. That's the bottom line. It's needed to cover attorney's fees. Even though Jack Holsonback has agreed to cut his fees drastically in an effort to assist his own community, there are still costs involved. The residents of the Oaks are each being asked to donate \$30-\$50 toward fees. Mary Ann Abbate, a Bloomingdale resident in the new Pulte East section, will also be taking donations from our residents. Even though it's only the East that's actually affected by the smell right now, all those children of ours that will be attending the new school can be adversely affected, too.

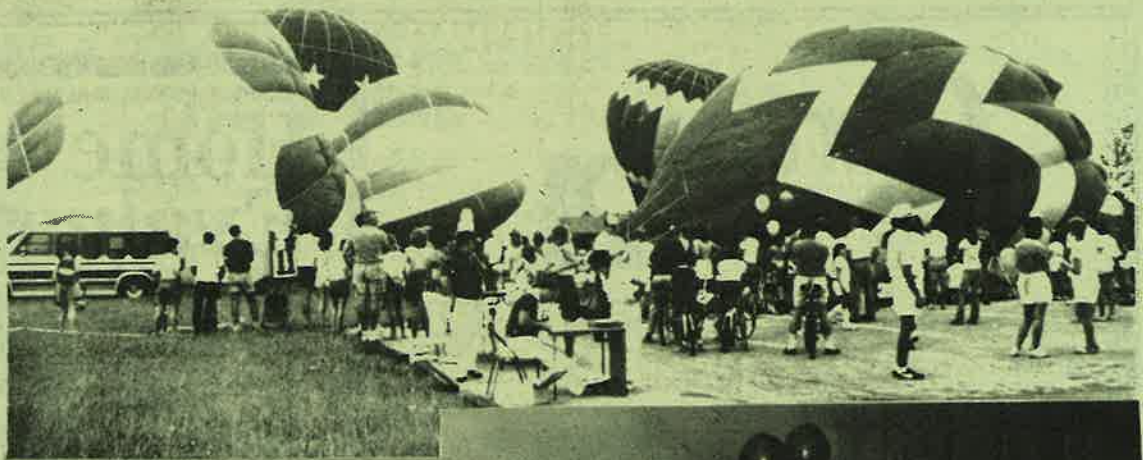

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## SCHOOL INFORMATION

Hillsborough County Schools start Monday, August 25. Following is general information on the school system and specific information on the schools the children of Bloomingdale attend.

### AGE:

All children who have attained the age of six years or who will have attained the age of six years by February 1 of a given school year or who are older than six but who are not yet 16, are required to attend school regularly.

### KINDERGARTEN:

Children who are five years old on or before September 1, may be admitted to kindergarten any time during that school year.

### FIRST GRADE:

Children who are six years old on or before September 1, 1986, and who have completed a successful year of kindergarten (public or non-public) may be admitted to first grade any time during the 1986-1987 school year. (Please note, parents/guardians: If your child is six years old after September 1, 1986, but on or before January 1, 1987, and has had a successful year of private kindergarten and you desire him/her to be enrolled in public school first grade, then the child must be enrolled in public school kindergarten to be eligible for testing to be administered during the first three weeks of the Fall 1986 term of school; if the child meets the established criteria, then he/she can be placed in public school first grade.)

### IMMUNIZATION:

Children must have a physical examination (completed within 12 months prior to attendance) prior to admission to school and be immunized against these diseases: Diphtheria, Pertussis (Whooping Cough), Tetanus, Polio, Measles, Mumps, and Rubella.



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### TRANSPORTATION:

Free bus transportation is provided for students who live more than two miles from their assigned school.

Approximately one week prior to the start of school, you should receive information in the mail concerning your child's teacher, bus stop location, and time.

## PARKS TO BE DEEDED

### AUGUST 6

A tentative date has been set for Parks East and West to be deeded to the County and the deed restrictions have been finalized.

#### PARK DEEDING

Criterion Corporation, as authorized representative for the developer NILIC (formerly NIPIC), have in their possession signed deeds turning the Park properties over to the Hillsborough County Parks and Recreation Department. According to Susan Meitz, spokesperson for Criterion,

they are currently awaiting notification that the park item will appear on the August 6 Board of County Commissioners meeting. At this meeting, the Parks Department will recommend to the County that they should accept the land and the County Commissioners will then vote their final approval. After the vote by the County, Criterion will issue a check to the Parks Department in the amount of \$24,083.91 which will accompany the conveyance of the property. By August 7, once the deed is offi-

cially recorded, the County will own the Parks.

#### PARK DEED RESTRICTIONS

Accompanying the deed to the County will be the deed restrictions as established by the residents here in Bloomingdale and The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, Inc. The restrictions which were agreed to by the County are as follows:

1. No lighted ball-fields except security lights with the exception of possibly multi-purpose court lights. In that case, timers are to be used on multi-purpose court lights so the lights are not on after 10 pm.
2. No exterior chain link fencing shall be installed.
3. No organized adult league activities.

4. No permanent park security without prior consent from The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, Inc. And, any residence for permanent security personnel must conform to existing deed restrictions or have the approval of The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, Inc.

5. Establish a buffer zone 25' from any adjacent private residence contiguous to park property.

6. Conservation areas as currently exist within the park property, are to be preserved and maintained.

7. Any new construction plans must be approved by The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association, Inc.

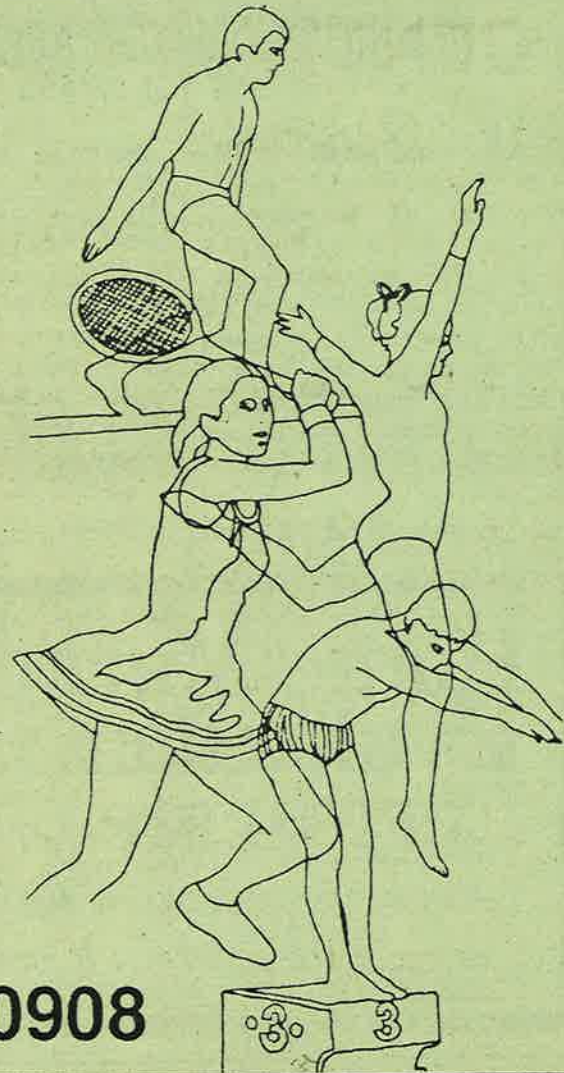
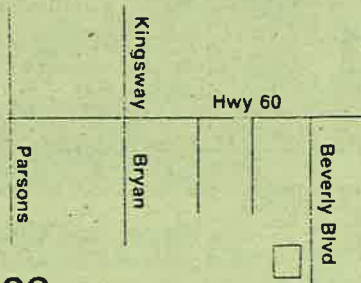

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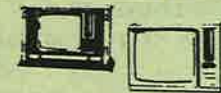

## CHILDREN AND HEAT

Summer in Florida is a hot season. Below are two common heat-related problems and what to do about them.

### HEAT EXHAUSTION:

(Heat collapse) This is the most common heat-related illness. It usually occurs during vigorous exercise in a hot, humid environment, and is due to excessive loss of fluids.

Symptoms may come on gradually - headache, dizziness, irritability, weakness, cramps, muscleaches, nausea and vomiting, and diarrhea. The child may be mildly disoriented but is usually alert. The body's temperature-regulating system keeps functioning, and sweating is heavy. Thus body temperature is normal or only slightly elevated, and the skin is moist and clammy. The pulse may be rapid, and the child may faint.

Treatment consists of getting the child to a cool place - shade, air-conditioning - and sponging with cool wet towels. If the child is alert, drinks should be given. If not, IV fluids may be necessary.

### HEATSTROKE:

This is a much more serious condition. The body's temperature-regulating system has failed. Temperature is 105 degrees or more. Heatstroke occurs during or just after exercise in very hot weather. Agitation and confusion may rapidly progress to coma and convulsions.

The skin is usually dry, though profuse sweating may be present. The pulse is

left alone in a car, even for a brief time. A car with windows half down can reach 106 degrees within fifteen minutes.

This syndrome can also occur if an infant with fever is wrapped up. Acetaminophen (Tylenol, Panadol, Tempra, Anacin-3, etc.) is the appropriate treatment

for a child with fever from illness - but not for temperature elevation from heatstroke.

Common sense ---- lightweight clothing; avoiding strenuous exercise in the sun in the hottest part of the day; drinking well in hot weather (water is best) are all helpful measures to prevent heat illness.



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## CRITERION TO MOW GRASS

A LETTER TO ALL RESIDENTS

The following letter was received by The Bloomingdale Gazette on July 15, 1986, to be published as an open communication to all residents of Bloomingdale from Criterion.

To the Residents of Bloomingdale:

As you all know, the grass and weed growing season is upon us and has been for at least a month. I have received numerous phone calls regarding the problems occurring in Bloomingdale, west of Bell Shoals Road, due to the decision by the developer NILIC (formerly NIPIC) to discontinue maintenance of rights of ways that they no longer own. The

decision was based on the fact that the County in accepting deeds to these rights of ways also accepted the maintenance of the rights of ways. Relying upon the County to maintain these areas was an interim measure that would be used until 1987 when your Special Taxing District would have funds to pay for the maintenance needs.

I have recently received a letter from Fred Uphoff, President of the STD, stating that the County disavows responsibility for the maintenance of subdivision interior rights of ways. Therefore, we have implemented a maintenance program along the rights of ways in Bloomingdale West at no

cost to the homeowners. During the current growing season we will be mowing, edging and trimming the rights of ways on a bi-weekly basis. We will continue to maintain the rights of ways until December 31, 1986, at which time the STD will contract for the work to be done. We are also mowing Park West every other week until the County acquires it (anticipated to happen in August).

Two of your neighbors, Mary Odum and Cheryl Ledford are organizing a group of concerned residents to get together and maintain the entranceway at John Moore Road and Bloomingfield Drive. They

and their neighbors deserve a big thank you for their efforts on this matter.

It is our desire at Criterion to see that all of Bloomingdale remains a first class area for the homeowners to be proud of. You have done your part by organizing a governing body to take care of future needs and we want to do our part during this interim period.

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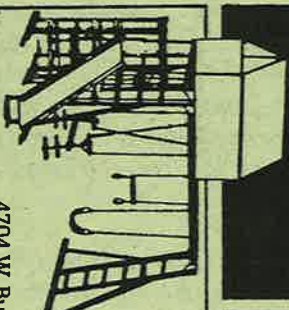
