I will be up north for about three weeks and unavailable for calls but after August 12th would welcome an onslaught of volunteers, information, ads, etc. The next deadline is 25 August at 6pm--and, hopefully, the September issue will be on

each front door by the first...if not sooner.

Florida Checklist for

- Azaleas and camellias—Since these ornamentals are developing flowerbuds for next year's blooms, be sure to keep them well watered. Otherwise, the buds may drop or develop improperly.
- Citrus—Lemons, limes, and calamondin oranges sometimes develop a rot at the blossom end of the fruit during the summer. The problem first appears as a water-soaked discolored area, but it may spread over the entire lower half of the fruit. Later, the area softens and decay sets in. This condition is related to moisture level and fertility of the soil. So avoid too much fertilizer and water.
- Houseplants—Here's how to help houseplants survive while you're on vacation. Water them well, and let drain. Then cover the plants with clear-plastic bags, and place away from direct sun. Do not seal the bags; just let them fall loosely around the base of the pots. Since the bags help decrease the amount of water that evaporates from the soil and foliage, your plants should stay moist for at least two weeks.

■ Roses—Frune roses late this month or in August to encourage a good crop of fall flowers. Don't delay past the middle of August, as pruning too late will delay flowering. To prune, remove 4 to 6 inches of each main stem. Then feed with rose fertilizer according to label directions, or apply 1/4 cup of 10-10-10 per plant.

■ Vegetables—Nights with high temperatures may cause blooms to drop from bush beans, peppers, and tomatoes. When the heat breaks, the plants will again hold their blossoms. In the meantime, reduce some of the effects of the heat by watering regularly and applying a 3-inch layer of mulch.

■ Mower injury—Tree trunks nicked with the lawnmower need immediate treatment. Remove the damaged bark with a chisel, scraping down to healthy wood. Then to protect the wound from insects and diseases, paint the exposed wood and edges of the bark with several coats of orange shellac.

■ Mulch—Since mulch rapidly decomposes in the warm, humid Florida weather, it needs frequent replenishing. For effective weed control, the layer should be about 3 inches thick. Good mulching materials include pine straw, shredded pine bark, and compost.

Summer Lawn Care

Hot weather takes its toll on lawns. Your best defenses against damage are proper watering and mowing.

Watering: Florida lawns need about an inch of water each week. During those times when rainfall doesn't supply this amount, you'll need to do it. Weekly watering is a good guide, but grass that shows signs of water stress needs more frequent watering. If the sides of the grass blades fold or curl in late afternoon and footprints remain after you walk across the lawn, water within 24 hours even if you did only 3 days before. As with weekly watering, supply an inch with each application.

Sandy soil absorbs water quickly, but if you apply too much water all at once, it will run off. The same conditions may occur on steep slopes. In these special situations, you may need to water at 15minute intervals spaced 45 minutes apart.

Mowing: Raise the cutting height of your lawnmower 1/2 to 1 inch during summer. The longer blades will provide a little extra shade for the roots of the grass. Thick turf also acts as insulation, helping retain moisture. Maintain common St. Augustine at about 3 inches tall, hybrid selections at 2 to 21/2 inches. Keep common Bermuda at 2 to 21/2 inches and the hybrids at 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches. LBT.

Lawns—This is the month in all portions of the state to fertilize Bermuda grass lawns. South Florida gardeners also need to feed St. Augustine. For both types of grasses, apply 6 pounds of 16-4-8 or similar fertilizer per 1,000 square feet of area. Apply when rain is predicted, or thoroughly water the lawn after feeding. Use a drop-type spreader to ensure even distribution.



Drain and chill oranges. Slice green onions, using good tops. Wash and drain bean sprouts. Layer spinach, sprouts, oranges, onions and bacon at time of serving. Pour on dressing and toss.
