

#### Bloomingdale Special Taxing District: Fiscal Year 2000 Proposed Budget

n May 3, 1999 the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District held a special meeting to plan the proposed budget for the fiscal year 2000. The current budget, which expires on September 30, 1999, called for expenditures of approximately \$398,000. The proposed budget reflects a 15% increase, calling for expenditures of approximately \$468,000. STD board members agreed that although the budget calls for an increase, it could be implemented without increasing the \$80 tax that each resident currently pays.

Capital projects slated for the fiscal year 2000 include updating entryway landscaping and signage and more extensive underground irrigation lines.

The budget now goes to the Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners for their approval. The budget will be printed in its entirety in a future issue of the Gazette. Residents may direct any questions they may have to the STD at 684-6667.

#### Bloomingdale Special Taxing District Property Manager's Report — April 1999

Submitted by Devney Property Management, Inc.

1. Irrigation: Brandon Irrigation repaired three pump systems, two broken zone lines and replaced one timer. DPMI checked the 8.5 miles of irrigation and repaired or replaced 55 spray heads, 7 rotors, 1 solenoid, 1 quick disconnect, 1 30-amp breaker, 1 rain sensor, 7 lights, 2 light receptacles and 1 zone line.

2. Landscaping: Yardworks completed the St. Augustine grass plugging on Rosemead and Nature's Way. A & W Lawn Maintenance installed new flowers and enlarged the flowerbed at the corner of Greenhollow and Nature's Way. Greenturf mulched all the beds. DPMI conducted a joint inspection of all the property with a Greenturf representative.

3. Others: Hillsborough County removed a large dead tree on Springvale. DPMI photographed all the signs in the Bloomingdale area for presentation to the board. Phoenix Painting completed painting and DPMI inspected the wall on John Moore and on Nature's Way between Callista and Moondale. DPMI met with Cambridge Cove representatives about resuming responsibility for their area and provided estimates to replace the maintenance gate.

4. In the land of eat, drink and pitch out the window, DPMI picked up 24 bags of trash, 2 hubcaps, 3 Blockbuster videos, 5 tennis balls, 2 ashtrays, a car window, a muffler, a plastic ducky, a shirt, a bowling ball, a cat and a squirrel. 
#### **Bloomingdale Community Jubstation Notes**

#### "Nature's Speedway"

ou can't miss them; you just hope they miss you! You have to step back and wonder what motivates some people driving through a residential area like Bloomingdale to operate their vehicles as if the streets and roads were racetracks. What compels one person to put the lives and property of others at risk?

A member of our Bloomingdale Area Community Council has experienced the inevitable results of irresponsible driving firsthand. The Bloomingdale resident got the dreaded call at work that his son had been involved in an accident. The officer indicated that he was okay and that he was not at fault. It seems a couple of teens were in a hurry to go somewhere and ran the stop sign at Glenhaven Drive and Nature's Way.

No one was hurt, but our friend still had to wonder why it had to happen. What was so important that they couldn't just

'stop' like the sign says? The offenders lost their vehicle, and the victim lost the car he and his father had spent four years carefully restoring. The intersection the accident occurred at is near his home and he thinks of the accident every time he goes by it. He wonders what would have happened if his son had been in a newer, smaller car without the old heavy bumpers. He wonders, "Why?" Even with my many years of experience as a law enforcement officer, I have to tell him there is no sensible answer.

Special note from the Bloomingdale Area Community Council: To help prevent speeding related accidents, Hillsborough County Sheriff's Deputies have increased their patrols of the Bloomingdale Community. The BACC has obtained information on speed monitoring equipment that can be purchased for use exclusively in our community and utilized to help identify motorists exceeding the speed limit. The "Speed Monitor" would be used

around schools, recreation areas and other areas

identified as having speeding problems. The cost is

\$3000. Any business or resident interested in helping raise the funds to purchase this equipment is asked to call Tom Karpenske of CB Richard Ellis at 273-8437.

#### Cars, Kids and Keys

Tragedy was narrowly averted due to a close call that occurred recently at the Village Center Plaza in Bloomingdale East. An unattended vehicle was left

running with an unsupervised child left waiting in the vehicle. The child managed to put the car in drive, and it rolled over 300 feet straight into a neighboring building. Only a miracle saved the child and anyone else from being injured. Deputy Maurer would like to remind all drivers and parents that it is illegal to leave an unoccupied vehicle running,

particularly one with an unsupervised child in it, "It only takes a heartbeat for a serious situation to develop and turn into a critical one."

#### Bicycle Helmet Enforcement

Since January 1998, Hillsborough County Sheriff's Deputies have investigated over 106 traffic crashes involving bicyclists under the age of eighteen. Only nine were wearing helmets.

According to the Florida statute on bicycle regulations, "A bicycle rider or passenger who is under sixteen years of age must wear a bicycle helmet that is properly fitted and is fastened securely upon the passenger's head by a strap, and that meets the standards of the American National Standards Institute."

Hillsborough County Law Enforcement personnel have been instructed to issue citations or warnings to anyone violating this regulation.

#### Bloomingdale's King of the Smoothies

ave Gregory, owner of Bloomingdale Square's Smoothie King shop, practices what he preaches; good nutrition, an active lifestyle and an honest, up-front approach to one's personal and professional life. The store, which features the popular blended drinks known as Smoothies along with vitamins and nutritional supplements, was recently honored as the national franchise's "Number one Smoothie/Vitamin store" in the country. "To have those kind of results out of an 800 square foot facility is pretty amazing," Gregory says. "I would like to personally thank the residents of Bloomingdale for supporting our store for the past 6 1/2 years and relate what a pleasure it has been for us to serve this community, my hometown."

Gregory, 35, was born and raised a few short blocks from his store, off Bryan Road. He graduated from Brandon High School in 1982 and headed off to Loyola University in New Orleans. While at Loyola, Dave frequented the first of the now 300+ Smoothie King stores and liked what he saw. He watched as the founders of Smoothie King grew their company.

After graduating, Gregory returned to Brandon with a degree in Marketing and Management, and joined the corporate world as a pharmaceutical representative. Aside from his store's prime location and the continued patronage of local residents, Gregory credits his success with the quality of his products and his commitment to providing personalized attention to

the customer. "I really strive to make sure that people get the product they need for the results they are after, and weight gain powder. Be careful with that one I will not, and my employees will not, sell you something you do not need." With all the controversy in the media about herbal remedies and supplements, of which the store carries many varieties, Gregory is insistent. "Before I put a new product on the shelf, I research it. I keep up with the latest findings, and will pull the product if it's safety or effectiveness becomes questionable."

His intent to help customers make informed choices about supplements and remedies is apparent in Gregory's manner with customers. His nutritional expertise, garnered through his experience in the pharmaceutical industry and through his own evolving fitness programs, is impressive. He explains popular products such as ginseng, creatine, ginkoba and chromium to inquiring customers, helping to separate the hype from the facts. He takes the time to discuss patrons' nutrition and exercise routines, to learn their health, weight loss or bodybuilding goals, and steer them to the appropriate supplements or remedies to use. No hype and false hope here, just facts and straight- forward advice from a man who believes in his products and wants to help others reap the same physical benefits he has.

And let's not forget the drink that has contributed to Gregory's success - the Smoothie. A basic Smoothie features fresh fruit blended with various add-in ingredients, made fresh to order. The shop offers an endless variety of the nutritional drinks with ingredients such' as protein powder, egg protein and a mixture referred to as "immune stimulating nutrients." The "Light & Fluffy" Smoothie contains banana, honey, strawberries, orange juice and turbinado sugar cane. There are Smoothies for energy, Smoothies for weight reduction (the new 'Slim and Trim' variety), even "The Hulk", which contains banana, wheat germ, honey, milk, pure vanilla, turbinado, (continued on next page)

Gregory has watched in amazement as his little hometown has grown up. "The growth of this town has been just incredible," he says. 



#### It's 10 o'clock... do you know where your children are?

he City of Tampa's curfew ordinance\* does not affect Bloomingdale and other areas outside Tampa city limits. There are, however provisions for Homeowner's Associations or individuals to bring proposals for a county-wide curfew before our Board of County Commissioners. Do conditions exist in Bloomingdale to warrant our community considering such a proposal?

Bloomingdale Community Substation Sheriff's Deputy Pete Maurer says that the curfew issue is generally a complicated and unpopular topic. "During my various assignments in other area communities, the subject of curfews has come up," says Deputy Maurer. "I have in the past spoken with officials including a County Attorney as to what provisions were available for individual communities to enforce neighborhood curfews. The officials I have spoken with indicate that there is not a lot of support for this type of restriction and that people in general do not want more laws and more restrictions imposed upon themselves and their communities." Does Deputy Maurer see any situations in Bloomingdale that would warrant opening discussions about a community wide curfew?

"We generally don't have a problem with kids being kids," Deputy Maurer says of the inevitable handful of minors out 'exploring' on the weekends. Of key problems that would indicate a need for a community wide curfew, he says, "Thankfully we currently do not have any major gang violence issues, and most of the kids out there are just 'hanging out' and are not involved in any criminal activity." But is there unsupervised juvenile mischief that parents and residents of Bloomingdale need to be

crime," warns the Deputy, "as are the theft of yard ornaments and signs." The perpetrators may see this activity as a small act of defiance, but theft and vandalism are real crimes with real consequences. Deputy Maurer expresses his concern, not only for our community and personal property, but also for the safety of the children themselves. "We don't need our kids out walking the streets of Bloomingdale after dark," he says. "Aside from the resident's concerns about possible criminal activity, there is the real possibility of these kids being hurt or abducted."

Bloomingdale Mobile Watch Coordinator LaWayne Thris Hart and Audie Bock, Commissioner Ronda Wyatt reports, "Thankfully, things have been pretty quiet and Mobile Watch has received very few calls this year." Wyatt indicates there has been some trespassing activity reported at new home construction sites, with evidence of underage drinking. Mobile Watch members are continuing to patrol these areas in an effort to assist the Sheriff's office in discouraging and gathering information about the encroachers, so that appropriate measures can be taken.

Bloomingdale residents concerned about unsupervised minors congregating or traveling through their neighborhoods late at night are encouraged to call the Sheriff's Office dispatcher at 247-8200. Nonemergency calls are handled through the dispatcher, and the Bloomingdale Community Substation investigates repeated or unresolved complaints. Residents are encouraged to call the Mobile Watch Coordinator at 685-2072 after calling the Sheriff's Office. Mobile Watch is available to observe and

record any suspicious or criminal activity until the responding Deputy arrives at the scene. ®

recent "Neighborhood Partnership Meeting" to discuss projects and issues of concern to Bloomingdale Community rea residents was held at Brooker Elementary School. ust over thirty residents were in attendance along with fifteen staff members from several Hillsborough County offices. Commissioner Jan Platt, Commissioner Storms' aide, were present. The meeting was opened

prior to the Community Meeting open to residents. Several residents asked for additional publicity for future meetings. Both Commissioner Platt and Hart answered questions on concerns about the need for more comprehensive and effective planning, zoning and the current status of impact fees. Engineers addressed concerns about the need for more sidewalks. One specifically mentioned was the sidewalk on Canoga

Park near the Bloomingdale West Recreation Center.

The response was that "those sidewalks are funded and will be constructed very soon."

The main topic of discussion was, as expected, traffic. Traffic issues and concerns included speeding on Natures Way, Bloomingdale Avenue and other residential areas such as Oak Crest; the use of Bloomingdale Avenue as a truck route; improvements with existing traffic lights and additional traffic lights; traffic flow and congestion in and around Bloomingdale High School; the need for a "crossover" between the new YMCA and Bloomingdale Little League Park; students cutting through Bloomingdale Oaks, and drivers passing school buses.





According to the National Traffic Safety Board, the most common cause of these crashes is the fact the drivers do not maintain uniform reduced speeds during times of limited visibility.



The journey consisted of many onestep forward, two-steps back maneuvers due to shifting winds. The balloon came to rest about 10 miles shy of its target, in a field a few short yards east of I-4, just north of Seffner. The passengers

experienced a bumpy and slightly off-the-mark ending to a reportedly "awesome" flight. But the 12-year-old passengers were not exactly overcome with the beauty of their surroundings or this rare opportunity to participate in an event they will remember for the rest of their lives. In addition to the inevitably jarring and precarious landing (which they relished), Sean and Will relayed their amazement with the craft's 'torch', the propane device that forcefully shoots blazing hot air into the balloon to keep it afloat. "The flame-thrower was the coolest," the boys agreed. Even 500 feet in the air, it's all a matter of personal perspective! 🕲

#### Summer Home Security

eighborhood Watch Programs are very effective, especially during the summer months when many families take extended vacations. But there are other steps that homeowners must themselves take to improve the security of their homes and property. Some simple but effective steps can be taken to keep from returning to a vandalized home.

One of the first is very simple; if you are going to be gone, lock it up. This means your home as well as any cars you may leave in the driveway. Many burglaries occur in broad daylight. Even when you are at home, if you are not going to be in your garage or working in the front yard for a long time, close your garage door. Many thefts of bicycles and other garage items have been by 'grab and run' type thieves.

Let a neighbor that you trust know you are going to be gone. Have them retrieve your newspapers and bring in your mail. If necessary, arrange for someone to mow your yard. Use timers on lights and radios to give your home a "lived in' look.

Perhaps the most effective tool we have is to watch out for each other. If you notice unusual activity around neighborhood homes, call the Sheriff's office at 247-8200 (non-emergency) or 911(emergency). Be prepared to give as much detail as you can, including clear descriptions of people, cars with tag numbers, correct house numbers, street numbers and the nearest intersection.

A 'Vacation Watch' service is available for all Bloomingdale residents. Vacation Watch forms are available at the Bloomingdale Community Substation. Under this program, a deputy is assigned to monitor the homes of vacationing residents during their absence.

Enjoy your vacation time; you've earned it. But before you go, take the time to secure your home properly.

ANSWER: Concentrate lighting in the reading and working areas - reduce lighting in the other areas. Use one large bulb rather than several smaller ones. One 100-watt bulb produces more light than two 60-watt bulbs. Use clothes washer, dryer and dishwasher only when fully loaded. Wash clothes in cold water. One 100-watt bulb burning around the clock for one year adds \$30 to your electric bill. Finally, a 40-watt fluorescent gives more light than a 100-watt incandescent one. It last 10 times as long and uses half the energy.

#### **FUTURE FOR SMALL HOMES**

QUESTION: We don't need anything larger than a twobedroom house, but wonder if this makes financial sense. Will there be a market for smaller homes in the future?

ANSWER: Buy the home that fits your needs and your pocketbook. You don't have to worry about selling a small home in the future. Single-person households now number 20% of the home buying market. At the same



#### Hurricane Preparedness "If only I had..."

housands of residents in Oklahoma endured many terrifying hours last month as tornadoes tore through their state. Many returned to destroyed homes to find their precious mementos and possessions broken and missing. Countless Florida residents also spent many anxious moments during Hurricane Andrew's wrath. It's an experience many of us could share if a natural disaster hit our area.

I was able to personally see the aftermath of a disaster of this magnitude when I deployed to Miami with a special military communications team the morning after Hurricane Andrew hit. With sunrise came sights, sounds, smells and sensations that words can't fully describe. It was as if we were in a war zone. We saw firsthand the true power of destruction contained in a hurricane and the tornadoes it spawned.

Once our communications systems were up and running, we worked with other organizations providing security and assistance to the victims in the communities during the recovery operations. Everywhere we went, we heard the same comment over and over, "If only I had something...or If only I had saved...or If only I had thought to..." This phrase stayed with me during the entire recovery operation and afterwards.

Most had done all they could to prepare themselves for the hurricane to hit, but not much to prepare for what was to follow. When it was over they were very grateful to have survived. Many had gained "a new outlook on life," "a new realization of how trivial possessions are" or "a renewed value for family and friends." But many still dug through the rubble trying to find some memento of their past as well as proof of their existence. Most had only the before the hurricane hits for the recovery time.

While we're busy planning for our physical needs during and after the disaster, we should also prepare for our spiritual and emotional needs, especially for the sake of the children. Some of the things that Hurricane Andrew victims mentioned might seem trivial, but any thing irreplaceable or of special significance, such as treasured photos, special gifts or favorite toys, can mean even more when it's all you have left. Most "things" can be replaced, but there are some we've saved over the years that simply can't. They connect us to our past and give us hope for the future.

One way to prepare these items is to store them in heavy plastic bags in a sturdy, watertight container. You can bring the container with you if you evacuate, or secure it in an inside closet. Be sure to put your name, address and phone number on both the outsid and inside in case it does get blown away. Hopefully, it'll be returned.

Having these precious items to hold after the disaster may not seem important now, but they can carry a tremendous healing power. It helps the children realize that all is not gone or destroyed, and gives them some degree of hope.

We saw so many precious memories broken and ruined by the hurricane. If only they had been protected. If only someone had taken a few more minutes to prepare. If only...

good here as it is at the original location. Now Villa Rina Too! Can cater to the businessman and shopper in Brandon, as well as the general population of Bloomingdale.

Years ago, I reviewed the original Villa Rina and commented that it was the first truly authentic New York Pizza restaurant in Brandon. This could become the "in" place for an evening slice of pizza. They are open from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. most days, and intil midnight on Friday and Saturday. They even have livery and take-out.

I chose the linguine with shrimp in the red sauce, while my wife selected the chicken parmesan. Both entrées were accompanied by salad and bread. The salads were chilled and had ample quantities of lettuce, tomato, pepperoncini, olives and onions. The house dressing was a tasty Italian, but there were certainly others to choose from. The Italian bread was fresh and warm, served right from the oven.

The linguine portion was large and delicious with miniature shrimp scattered throughout, giving it the seafood flavor I was looking for. The chicken parmesan consisted of two large and tender breaded breasts with red sauce and mozzarella cheese, and an ample side of spaghetti. It was a wise selection, one we would opt for again.

The dinner prices are quite reasonable for a neighborhood type restaurant. The chicken parmesan was only \$6.70, and the shrimp linguine was only \$6.95. Salad and bread were included in the price.

Other dinner entrées offered include veal or eggplant parmesan, lasagna, manicotti, stuffed ells or spaghetti and broccoli, and a selection of dinner salads.

For the less adventurous, there is the standard baked ziti or the

spaghetti and meatballs. In addition to authentic New York style pizzas, the restaurant also offers Calzones. Strombolis and stuffed pizza. Hot and cold subs are available all day. You can choose from a large variety of sandwiches including vegetarian subs, Philly steak sandwiches, sausage and pepper or meatball subs.

Roast beef sandwiches, grilled marinated chicken and

eggplant parmesan subs are also available. Also on the sandwich board are Italian deli subs consisting of ham, salami, provolone and capicola. Chicken wings and cheese sticks are offered as starters or snacks. Original Italian desserts such as cannolis, tiramisu and Italian rum cake are featured.

Children's selections are available, and beer and wine are offered.






