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## Students past and present sing praises of retiring choral director

When Beverly Sutherland started teaching, teenagers were still spinning music from vinyl records and trying to find their way into adulthood in hip-hugger, bellbottom jeans. As she retires 35 years later, she looks out on fresh faces that may be framed by green or purple hair and punctuated by piercings. For many students, separation anxiety means living without an I-pod or cell phone at their ear during school hours, and almost any tune they want is available at the touch of a computer mouse. The world has changed, but Sutherland's main achievement as a music teacher, sounded over and over again at a farewell concert last month, remains the same: "They helped us grow as people. They taught us confidence," said Kristen Richardson, an officer in Bloomingdale High School's beginning chorus, as she thanked no during a standing-room-only concert May 12 at Bloomingdale High School. "And Ms. Sutherlaṇd taught us not to fidget."

Over and over, students and colleagues reminded Sutherland that she had taught them more than how to round their vowels, sound their consonants and stand still during performances. Her legacy to thousands of students is increased poise, discipline and a sense of teamwork to get the job done.

The concert marked the last time the longtime choral director would conduct hundreds of voices in song on a very familiar stage. She tried in vain to focus the program on the outgoing class of seniors embarking on college or career adventures, but students and colleagues insisted on recognizing the chapters of Sutherland's life - new and old - as she transitions into retirement.

Students serenaded their mentor with specially chosen tunes, including "To Suth, with Love."

Despite her best efforts, Suther- audience from the concert stage land spent much of the concert last month, recognized many facdabbing her eyes.
"I don't think I've been that emotional in ... well, in ever," she said a few days later.
Students, colleagues and members of Bloomingdale's music booster programs raised $\$ 8,500$ to send Sutherland to Scotland, long a dream destination for the teacher. She said she plans to go this summer.

Apart from that; Sutherland's retirement was a bittersweet moment. Asked by band director Jon Sever what she most wanted to do with her new spare time, she replied, "Go to the beach," and "You kṇow, teach."

She said later she had entered the state's Deferred Retirement Option Program (DROP) a few years ago, with hopes of teaching beyond the typical five-year DROP period if possible. Legislative changes this year did away with that option.

Sutherland, who attended Brandon High when it was housed at what is now McLane Middle School, graduated from the University of Tampa and began teaching at her alma mater then a junior high school - in 1975. She taught at King High from 1979 to '92, then at Bloomingdale from 1992 on, except for a stint at Newsome High from 200406 . She has taught band, orchestra and chorus.

Rudes told the crowd he graduated from Bloomingdale and later came back to teach, taking over Sutherland's orchestra program as she focused on chorus.

Rudes said he found, in questioning his new class, that he had big shoes to fill.
"All of them said their favorite memory of. orchestra was Ms. Sutherland," Rudes recalled. "And I have to say ... my favorite memory of Bloomingdale is Ms. Sutherland."

Highlights of Sutherland's career include trips to London and New York with Bloomingdale music students.

She sums up the years: had the best job because l've had the best kids, and I've had the best co-workers, and a very understanding family."

## Bloomingdale High to get summer makeover <br> \section*{by Susan green}

Students at Bloomingdale High School will return to classes in the fall to find a fresh look, thanks to a $\$ 15$ million makeover approved in May by the Hillsborough County School Board.
Construction signs already went up around the school, which was built in 1987. Much of the work is planned for the summer months when classes are not in session.
The project includes new fencing painting inside and out, bleacher repairs, replacement of the heating and air conditioning system and remodeling to meet federal handicapped accessibility requirements. The school also will receive improvements to lighting, ceilings and kitchen equipment, electrical upgrades and safety improvements.
Not all work will be done this summer, according to information provided to the school board last spring. The target completion date for the remodeling project is Dec. $31,2012$.

rewritten with new rules to help consumers understand the loan costs and alert borrowers to changes in fees well in advance of closing. Now, the lender must provide their Good Faith Estimate within three days of receiving the borrowers' application, and closing cannot occur until the buyer has seven days to review the disclosure. If the final APR (annual percentage rate) differs more than 0.125 percent from the original quote, a new disclosure must be provided, granting the borrower the
right of rescission. This relieves the pressure that buyers once felt to agree to pay higher fees and rates at the very last minute. As always, borrowers can review the final document one day before closing, providing an excellent opportunity for you to review all the figures with your Realtor and ask any lingering questions before you make it official.

Tim Weir is a closet Metallica fan with a professed penchant for the acoustic guitar.

The Brandon native and longtime music teacher is comfortable with just about any style of guitar. He says the important thing is to feel a sense of achievement in producing music and enjoying the camaraderie of other performers.

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## Bloomingdale school expanding at new site on Boyette Road

The two-story building going up near Boyette and Bell Shoals roads is hard to miss, but motorists might do a double take at the sign announcing Valrico Lake Advantage Academy.

The charter school's principal, Bonnie Guertin, acknowledges the academy won't be in Valrico. anymore once students and faculty move to the new Riverview address this summer. She said the school, set to welcome students in August, may change names at some point, but for now it will remain Valrico Lake to capitalize on its reputa
tion.
"We're still toying with the idea" of a name change, Guertin said. For two years, the chool has operated on the campus of Celebration Church, across Bloomingdale Avenue from Bloomingdale High School. Students number about 210 in kindergarten through seventh grade. Already, 700 potential students have applied for enrollment at the new location, Guertin said.

The large building motorists see under construction is the first phase of a campus that eventually will include two buildings on 7 acres. The building nder construction will
encompass 41,000 square feet and offer classroom space for up to 650 students, Guertin said. By August 2012, the school is expected to add eighth grade.
The second building, which will measure 17,000 square feet, will be a dedicated middle school housing about 300 students, the principal said. No timetable has been announced for construction.
While in Bloomingdale, the school has attracted students from Brandon, Valrico, FishHawk and Riverview, Guertin said. The new site is expected to be convenient for many families, she added.
