# FUTURE OF BLOOMINGDALE'S PARKS TO BE DECIDED ON MARCH 18 

During the month of February the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association; Inc., received this letter from the Special Taxing District President, Fred G. Uphoff, Jr.:
"We understand that there is renewed interest in the STD taking possession of the parks vs the county accepting the deeds.
"It is our collective opinion that the STD through its Board of Directors will support and -trive to maintain the parks should they come nto our possession. For us to actively pursue this would be premature and presumptuous on our part, it is not our charter to become a second homeowners opinion group.
"The BHA through its standing committee has the mechanism to direct the question of ownership with Criterion, The County Parks Department and the homeowners.
-Let me assure you we are prepared to fulfill our obligation to our community and support whatever action the people choose, and we fully recognize the BHA as the "active political entity" in the Blocmingdale Gubdivision."

In an effort to attain an opinion of the Blomingdale residents regarding the dispasition
of both Parks East and West, there will be a one-time only vate at the General Membership Meeting on March 18 at the Bloomingdale Community Church at 7:30 p.m. Questions anyone may have will be answered at that time.
The single most important question to be answered is this: Should Parks West and East be 1) deeded to the County to become public neighborhood parks owned and operated by the Hillsborough County Parks Department, or 2) should Parks West and East be deeded to the Special Taxing District and have them remain private parks maintained by Bloomingdale residents.

PLEASE NOTE: Only those residents who come to this March 18 meeting will be polled. From this vote will come the recammendation in writing to the STD Board, Criterion, and the Parks Department. YOU DO NOT HAVE TO BE A MEMBER OF THE BLOOMINGDALE HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION TO VOICE AND VOTE YOUR OPINION. After this vote, the issue of the parks and their disposition will be considered concluded as to a recomendation from the Bloomingdale residents.

IF YOU WANT YOUR OPINION MADE KNOWN, THEN YOU must come to the march 18 meeting.

$\checkmark A$ D $\quad$ A L S M!! Unfortunately the large cities and low income areas are not the only jnes who suffer from this disease. Here at Bloomingdale we have recently had an increase in robberies; vandalism, and arson. (Editor's Note: See the related article in the MOBILE WATCH UPDATE column for more details.)

In an effort to curtail some of these destructive activities, Susan Meitz of Criterion Corporation has issued the following statement to all residents of Bloamingdale:
"Several of the Bloomingdale Residents have notified us of recent vandalism problems in both Park East and Park West and of teenagers using Park West as a motorcycle obstacle course. In Park West, the picnic tables have been destroyed, the fence rails torn down and the tennis fence gates removed andfor pulled off hinges, In Park East, the walls of the racquetball courts and the restrooms were decorated with grafitti.
"We have re-posted rules and regulations at both parks and have contacted the Sheriff's Department. The County Sheriff has reported that they will respond to any calls made to them regarding these matters and they have also promised us a special concentrated detail watch over the parks for the next several weeks.

- I am requesting that you as homeowners notify the Sheriff's Department as soon as you see any disturbing acts at the parks and hopefully, the offenders will be caught. I am also requesting that the parents who have children with motorcycles impress upon your children that motorcycles may not be used for any purpose in the parks.
-Thank you for your assistance in this matter."

We have been informed by Criterion that they have spoken with the Sheriff*s Department that we, as residents, have the right to call the Sheriff and ask the Deputies to curtail any destructive artivities. Don't forget the volunteer MOBILE WATCH is also out there keeping an eye out for trouble.

We have also been informed that illegal dumping is being done by Bloomingdale residents in the ?ark West area behind the houses on Cedar Grove. Boards, dirt, sand, and trash are being dumped there. Criterion says they will be going into that area soon, cutting the weeds, and performing general cleanup. Criterion is asking that residents refrain from dumping into the Park or anywhere in Blaamingdale.

Beware of door-to-door tree salespeople. They. are going out into the back woods of undeveloped areas; digging up trees and selling them. The trees die after they've been in the ground for a while because they were handled improperly.
Several residents in the West have already been stung by this operation.

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During the past month we have had a rash of breakins; some of which may have been prevented had the homeowner been better informed and had taken a few extra precautions. This month, instead of giving you a statistical recap, I'm going to share an unfortunate tale of numerous robberies and what you can do to secure your home against an "easy target."

Briefly, we've had numerous breakins in the West, some of which toak place during the morning and daylight hours. In one case, a homeawner returned home early and found his home had been broken into. He realized someone was in his home and went next door to call the Sheriff's Department. While he was there the intruders were scared away. They did take jewelry, but the VCR and stereo equipment they had piled in back of the fence was not carried off. The intruders may have entered through an unlacked window.

In another "morning" incident, a neighbor witnessed a person climb over a privacy fence and into someone's backyard. The intruder realized he was made, jumped back over the fence, and sped away before the license plate number could be obtained.

Another daytime breakin was more successful, the intruders made off with some valuable jewelry. This time, someone was actually sleeping in the home during the robbery!

All of these robberies have occurred within the last 2-3 weeks and seem to be currently isolated to the Canoga Park/Caliente area of the West. But that does not mean the thief or thieves won't travel to other areas of Bloomingdale.

It also appears that our homes are being cased by individuals who are presenting themselves as salespeople. We have had at least two cases of salespeople asking to use the bathroom, then ripping off the resident prior to leaving. In one incident on Rosedale (West side), a "cleaning fluid" salespersan asked to use the bathroom and stole some property. Fortunately, the homeowner quickly realized what had happened and called the Sheriff. The thief was apprehended (still going door to door) and the stolen property was recovered. Other victims were not as fortunate.

Arson is another problem we are facing right now. Someone is purposely setting fires in the undeveloped areas of Blomingdale East by the Lithialculbreath roads. As a deterrent to this, Criterion has stepped up their security and of Ecurse the Mobile Watch will keep an eye out.

It certainly appears that crime is increasing--especially during the daylight hours. Even privacy fences aren't slowing these delinquents down. There are some things you can do that doesn't cost much but is well worth the effort.

Foremost; buy deadbolt double locks for every door that is an entry to your home. If you have a window on or near the door, get the type of lock that requires a key for inside and out. This prevents the would-be intruder from breaking a small window, reaching in, and -eleasing the deadbolt lock. A deadbolt lock is an absalute necessity. (My neighbor lacked herself out one afternoon and without ever having tried it before it took me only 10 seconds to open her door with a credit card.)

If any of your doors have hinges on the outside you must secure the door itself (hinge bolts can be popped in about two seconds). The easiest way is to buy $3^{*}$ carraige bolts (wood-screw type). Screw them into the entryway's frame (hinge side). Leave about 1* of bolt head $^{\text {. }}$ protruding. Drill holes into the door edge in such a manner that when you close the door, the head of the bolt goes into the drilled hole, thus securing the door even if the hinge bolts are removed.

Patio doors can also be secured by purchasing and installing small locking devices. These devices prevent the door from being lifted up and out.

Windows are also a prime candidate for uninvited guests. This is a nice time of year to open mindows and air out your home. However, screens affard absolutely no protection. The best way to secure your windows is to buy small locking cubes from a locksmith. The small locking cubes are attached to your window frame at a height you select. The windaw will then be restricted from opening higher than the device permits (I keep mine set at about two inches). The devices are cheap and the locksmith will even paint them if you desire (to match your window frame).

However, none of these preventive measures take the place of good old-fashion common sense. One night while riding on mobile watch, I observed six garage doors open late at night. Not only is this an invitation to steal from the garage, but unless you have a deadbolt lack on your garage/house entry door, the intruder also has easy access to your home.

A word of caution, do not let door-to-door salespersons in your home to use the bathroom. Even though most are legit, are you willing to take the risk? If all aur residents will take the few extra measures to secure their home, the word will get out--Bloomingdale is not an easy mark!

A new Kinder-Care nursery school will be breaking ground in 30-60 days at the corner of Bell Shoals Road and Glen Haven in the Bloomingdale East area. The school is scheduled to open in September of this year.

## Under construction

 already is a Convenient Food Mart (with gas islands) which is scheduled to open April 1. 1986. South of the Food Mart will be a 14,000 sq. ft. shoppingstrip which is now available for the leasing of approximately seven stores. Though there are currently no prospects, the corner is also zoned for a bank branch. Caldwell Bankers is the leasing agent for all of this property.

But along with the growth has come cause for concern, according to Jerry and Ann Underwood who live off of Glen Haven in the Hooker Barnes area.

[^0]Jerry Underwood contacted Mr. Sam Moore of Ferris Contractors, Incs and asked--"the bank around the lake is being torn up. Will this be restored when they are done?" Also "The construction crew is throwing trash, bottles, and oil cans all around. Can this be stopped and can they clean up what they have done? Mr. Underwood and other residents are the ones responsible for keeping the lake area 50 clean and tidy. They have felt responsible for the lake area just because they care about Bloomingdale.)

Mr. Moore's reply was that the lake bank would be restored when they are done and that he would do something about the trash.

Another concern of the Hooker Barnes residents is the traffic in and out of the Kinder-Care in the mornings and afternoons at the peak rush-hour times. One of the side roads leading toffram the school exits onto Glen Haven which has given rise to the concern of residents trying to leave or come into the subdivision. Mr. Moore felt this would not be a problem as the Kinder-Care use would primarily be for the residents of Bloomingdale anyway and having this exit on Glen Haven would only make it easier for Bloomingdale to utilize the facilities.

CHCKENPOXII<br>BY PATRICIA JEANSONNE, M.D. COMMUNITY PEDIATRICS

A vaccine to eliminate this annoying childhood disease in under investigation in several countries. It is being especially studied for children with compromised immune states, as they are at greatest risk of severe complications from chickenpox (Varicella). It must be remembered that chickenpox is usually a mild disease. Its major complication in healthy children is Reye's Syndrome, a condition in which the brain and liver swell, causing elevated blood ammonia and coma lesperially if given aspirinl. A vaccine against chickenpox must be not only effective but also extremely safe and must not itself be associated with significant risk of Reye's Syndrome. Establishing such safety will take a while, so this vaccine remains experimental and is not on the market. In the meantime, chickenpox remains a usually mild but itchy and inconvenient illness.

The major symptons are:
fever - usually one day before onset of rash
rash - begins as small pink bumps which develop central blisters as new crops of bumps appear. They spread from head to toe and itch.

Complications are:
Impetigo (commen) 2 a bleteriEi skinc wis infection on top of the chickenpox
lesions. This should be treated with antibiotics.
Much less common:
Low platelet count
Arthritis - joint inflammation
Encephalitis - brain inflammation Nephritis - kidney inflammation Reye's Syndrame
Pneumonia
Shingles - a reactivation of the virus after a long period of time. A localized painful rash which usually occurs in older individuals.

Contagion: Direct contact with the infected person. Contagious $1-2$ days before onset of rash until no new lesions and all old ones are crusted.

Incubation period: 7 to 21 days.
Treatment: Symptomatic only. NO ASPIRIN should be given. Acetaminophen ITylenol, Tempra, Panadol, etc.) for fever. Benadryl liquid or calamine lotion for itching may be given. Aveeno oatmeal baths (ask pharmacist) are soothing.

## ANNUALS \& PERENNALS

## BY ROSILAND CREAGER <br> THE GREEN BOUTIOUE

Annuals and perennials are a great way to add color to your landscape, entryway, or patio. Plan your garden and use complimentary calors: such as violet and yellow, blue and orange, and red and white. Petunias and impatiens can be an exception to this rule because mixing their colors is very effective.

Annuals and perennials will require plenty of moisture, about two inches of water per week. Regular and frequent deep watering is important. At any sign of wilting be sure and water promptly. Dried-out soil can cause a plant to die immediately. Slow-drip watering prevents breakage and discourages fungus on leaves. It also conserves water. Over-head watering should be done in the morning.

Giving your plants a good start is very important. Prepare the planting hole by mixing in a good potting soil, top soil. or peat, manure or compost and an all-purpose fertilizer. Also, you may mulch your plants to conserve water and discourage weeds. Now you are ready to plant.

Fertilize your annuals and perennials lightly once a month with 6-6-6 or a 20-20-20 water soluble fertilizer. If you use the granular type of fertilizer remember ta place it around the plants (not on them) and water so that you do not burn the plants.

Keep in mind that there are many ways to use annuals and perennials. Use a variety of plants in groups of interlocking patterns and colors to create a garden border. A johnny jump-up surrounded by alyssum in a clay pot makes a pretty centerpiece for a patio table. Plant a clay dish with an assortment of flowers for a miniature garden. The possibilities are endless; so let your imagination take hold and have fun. The calor you achieve from your plantings will be worth it.

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## VOTER INFORMATION <br> BY SHERRY HARDIN GAZETTE STAFF REPORTER



Elections will be coming up this fall and if you are a new resident in the Bloomingdale area you may need to register to vote. You must be registered at least 30 days prior to an election. The first primary is on September 2; the second primary will be on September 30, and the general election is November 4. This does give you through July to take care of this, but if you have a spare minute, you may want to get it out of the way now so you don't forget it.

You do not have to go to the Court. House to take care of this. There are over 100 places throughout the county. Two of the places you can go to are Sun Bank 1403 West Brandon Boulevard; 689-1231; open M-Th 9-4; Fri 9-2 and 3:30-6) and Southeast Bank (510 Dakfield Drive; 273-8748; ppen M-Th 9-4 and Fri 9-6). If neither of these places are convenient for you, call 272-5850 to see if there is a location better for you.

In order to register you must be a citizen of the United States and over $18 . \quad$ You may pre-register at age 17 1/2. You must appear in person and while nothing is required, an ID would be helpful. There is no length of residency required for you to become a Florida voter.

If you were already a Hillsborough County registered voter prior to moving into Bloomingdale, all you have to do is complete the back of your voter ID card and mail it in. Your new voter ID card will be returned to you.

The information concerning your polling place location and the districts you are qualified to vote in will be found on your voter ID card. If you have an questions about the elections, call 229-vOTE.

## REFINANCE NOW <br> BY CHERYL LEDFCRD <br> GAZETTE STAFF REPORTER



Have you heard the rumor that the VA loan, as we know it, will soon be history? According to Michael Alea, Loan Officer for Andover Financial Mortgage Corporation in Tampa, that's all it is for now - rumor. As of this week, the VA will be funded for the remainder of the fiscal year (September 30, 1986) and it's business as usual. And after that...? Michael's not speculating on the VA. However, he does feel that homeowners who have high interest rates on their existing home loans should consider refinancing at this time. In fact, it is best if you've been in your home two years or more, or if the loan is two or more years old, you can consolidate your bills or get cash out for other investments.

In order to refinance, the basic steps to follow
are:

1. Make an appointment with a mortgage loan officer to go over your present mortgage rate to see if it is in your best interest to refinance at this time. If your present interest rate is two points or more higher than the current rate, it may well be financially advantageous to you to refinance.
2. Fill out an application and pay for an appraisal and a credit report (approximately \$205).
3. Get employment verification.
4. Get deposit verification.
5. Have a credit check.

You may refinance for $90 \%$ of the appraised value with no cash out or $80 \%$ of the appraised value with cash out. In either case the applicant must qualify for the financing.

Normally it takes about three weeks for approval and 4-6 weeks for the total refinance process.

Discount points on a refimance vary, but there is always a $1 \%$ origination fee; a survey ( $\$ 150-\$ 250$ ), Doc Stamps on the deed, Intangible Tax, a termite inspection ( $\$ 35-\$ 50$ ) and possibly a roof inspection (\$35-\$50).
If you wish to refinance you should contact your mortgage loan professional for more information.
