The Mobile Watch Core Committee met on Feb. 23rd. Among the items discussed was including Bloomingdale Oaks in our watch area and a new long range plan. The latter was brought about due to the rapid growth of our area.

The Committee discussed the Bloomingdale Oaks area \& the decision was made to see if enough residents would volunteer to man a car in their area. We will be including a letter with the Gazette explaining our operation to the residents of the Oaks.

The core Committee has put together a long range plan for the Watch. This plan will be implemented in stages. The goal of the plan is to have 1 car in the West, 2 cars in the East, and 1 car in the Oaks. The people manning the cars would live in the areas they patrolled. Each section will have to maintain encugh people to operate their car each night or the number of nights that particular area will be covered will be reduced. We feel that more people will volunteer if they were patrolling closer to their home.

Stage 1 of the plan will be implemented as of April lst. At that time, only persons living in the west will patrol the West, the same in the East. If and when the Oaks has enough volunteers to man a car in their area, we will include their community in our operations.

Primary Prep, a Florida based preschool chain, if expected to open a new center in mid-August of this year. The location of this school, which is currently under site preparation, will be at the corner of Rosenead and Canoga Park Drive in Bloomingdale Wast.

Primary Prep Is e franchise has eight centers throughout organization which currently Pinellas, Pasco, and Hillsborough counties. Co-franchimes of this new Brandon school are Gail Bjormson and Christine Terrell. Ms. Terrell will be the school's Administrator while Ms.

Bjornson (a certified, experienced teacher in early childhood education) will be the Director.

Primary Prep delivers their schools in a package plan, already completely equipped and functionally correct for their new owners. True to his word, Com missioner Selvey has been following up on the placement of another Interim Wastewater Treatment Plant in Bloomingdale South. The following are two letters which he generated, and a meno, in their entirety.

Dear Dale:
I have enclosed a copy of a memo from Mike McWeeny concerning an interim wastewater treatment plant as required by an area.
As you are aware, we have had a series of problems with our sewage plant in Bloomingdale, snd since we have been
unsuccessful in rectifying these problems, we have elected unsuccessful in rectifying these problems, we have elected sub-regional plant in Valrico. Mike and I have related this intent to the citizens of Bloomingdale, and it was received enthusastically.
We now find, due to a prior agreement, we will be required to construct a 75,000 gallon IWWTP in order to save some
$\$ 6,000,000$ in future connection fees. As Mr. McWeeny states in the memo, it is highly unlikely this 75,000 gallon plant will ever be used, based on Criterion's Development schedule. However, should some insignificant volumn be generated prior to the Valrico Plant coming on line, there would be sufficient capacity in the existing Bloomingdale plant

My major reason for requesting your assistance is to eliminate what $I$ consider a waste of taxpayer's money. To build a plant with tax dollars that has little to no

With Hillsborough County passing our utilities rate studies and the subsequent placement of some $\$ 360,000,000$ in bonds, I think you can see we are committed. If you would coordinate your staff with Mike McWeeny, I am sure we can resolve this problem without the necessity of constructing

Confirming our conversation of last week, I would like to clarify the necessity for construction of the Criterion IWWTP.
By agreement, Hillsborough County has committed to provide capacity (500,000 gpd) for the Criterion project in Bloomingdale. Subsequent amendments to the agreement provided that an interim facility of 75,000 gpd could be provided
the county in settlement of the previous agreement. This capacity must be on line approximately Aprl1, 1987.
The necessity for this capacity is brought about by the DER requirement for treatment plant capacity as a pre-requisite for collection system permitting. sell their property with a sewer capability conmitnent.

Based on the construction schedule of the Criterion Development were it to be imnediately sold and constructed and the construction schedule of the Valric Subregional WWTP and the existing flow in the Bloomingdale (County) INrTP, is unlikely that any flow of significant volume would be generated by the
Criterion Developinent prior to the Valrico System becoming operational. Any Criterion Development prior to the reasonably anticipated flow from the criterion project could be handled by the Bloomingdale Plant in the interim until the Valrico Plant is on-line.

To clarify my action at our 1:30 p.m. meeting on Monday, February 16, 1987. I moved the purchase of a 75,000 gallon interim wastewater treatment plant tentatively slated for the Bloomingdale area. Prior to moving this action, asked Mr. McWeeney the following questions:

1. Is this plant specifically designed for use at the Bloomingdale site or can it be used anywhere? His answer was, it could be used anywhere.
2. Do you still feel it is doubtful this plant will he did not think it would be used by the developer.
3. Do you foresee other developers connecting to this plant, if the Bloomingdale WWTP did not have capacity? His answer was, no, this is strictly for the Agreement with Criterion.
Will this issue need to come before this Board again prior to construction of the interim wastewater treatment plant? His answer was, yes,

These answers lead me to believe we will not install the plant but rather are in position with the permits and. also be pointed out, should we not take this action, the developer has the necessary permits to construct the plant himself. This way, the county is still in control.

I do not feel particularly good about having to reach a solution to an old problem in this manner. However, I feel it to be the lesser of two evils.

It's time for another update from your Blooningdale Special Tax District. The contracts mere redone for the grass mowing and have been signed. In fact, the company that was hired has already started working. Should any resident notice poor performance or have any concern, please contact any STD Board menber or Mr. Wagner (Property Manager) at 681-7308. Mr, Wegner will be keeping tabs on the work progress and performance.

We apologize if anyone came to the February 9 meeting that we didn't have. Due to other comnitnents, the Board postponed the meeting to the 16th. This was unforseen and should not happen again! but if it does, we will at least place a note on the door.

We have had three bids for (r) wall painting, and these are , being studied by the Board now. We anticipate letting the bid by the March 9 meeting. We will be asking the
contractor to start work within 30 days after signing. If you live along one of the walls mentioned last month (almost everything on the West) start making plans to move things away from the wall and get plants off the wall. Remember--overspraying can kill plants. The contractor must be cautious but the work will be done, and done fully to our standards even if he has to trim your plante.

A recent accident which.put a large hole in a wall reminded us to tell those of you with walls that they are physically on your property and either your homeowners ingurance or the offending party is responsible for the repair. You do, however, need to coordinate with the STD before the repair is dons so we can ensure the repair meets the overall standards and color mateh.

The mail has been a little light; We received one letter which we need to comnent on. A concerned resident sent us a request to fix the fence around Park West and asked about lighting the parking lot. We are not responsible for the park
itself. Last year the developer deeded the park to the county. We did forward the letter to the county, as well as made some phone calls. The county had trouble finding the ten foot fence poles and ordered a completely. new fence, but in the more common elight foot sections. $A E$ moon as it arrives they will get it in. They also stated lighting the parking lot is a possibility they are considering. There will be an additional light placed next to the south driveway by TECO, one they overlooked when the street was lit. We will continue to pass our concern for the appearance of the park to the county. But remember your BHA has a standing comittee for the parkg, and you can send them your concerns as well.

There has been ZERO letters concerning landscaping or budget suggestions or on the lighting ideas for the sidewalk to the plaze or dark entrances. If you thought your voice would not count then you are wrong; you could have been "heard" all alone. If we don't hear

He and Don Bua, coowners of the Allstate Building on Bloomingdale Avenue have apartments in the back they would like zoned for offices. They have requegted this zoning change twice before and both times have been denied. The caunty is concerned that by allowing this zoning, they will be setting a precedent for the retst of Bloomingdale Avenue. The building is currently outfitted as apartments which have been rented on a month-to-manth

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Azaleas, with their spectacular flower display and wide variety of colors and sizes, are one of the most popular flowering plants for Florida landscapes.

Since many varieties of azeleas can be grown in full sun, inquire as to how the azaleas were grown. Whether they were grown in full sun, partial shade, or greenhouse grawn (forced to bloon), will determine how you should use then in your landscape.

You may plant containergrown azaleas anytime of the year. Select an area in sun or partial shade. Dense
shade will cause the plants to become leggy and flower sparsely, Plant large growing azaleas 3-5 ft, apart, depending on how tall you plan on letting them grow. Dwarf and semi-dwarf varieties should be spaced at about 2' to 2 1/2' apart. Distance is measured from the center of each plant. Dig the planting hole about twice the size of the root ball. Remove one-third of the soil and awend the remaining two-thirds with peat or potting soil and composted cow manure. Remove the azalea from the container and make 3 or 4 $1 / 2^{\circ}$ deep cuts in the root ball to break up rootbound conditiong. Place the azalea in the hole no deepr than it was when in the container. Planting an azelea too deep can cause it to die. Water the plant as backfill is placed around the root bali. Mulch the bed with a 2-3 inch layer.
flowering is completed and no later than June. Pruning your azaleas will enable them to form dence growth and produce mare +1 pwers. Long shoots that grow out of proportion may be removed at anytime of the year.

Azaleas should be fertilized with an cid-forming fertilizer formulated for azaleas. Fertijize about four times a year in winter, spring, summer, and fall.

Azaleas have a shallow root system and must be watered regularly and thoroughly to prevent thew from drying out. Maintain-a 2-92 Iayer of mulch to conserve moisture and inhibit weed growth.

Proper selection, planting, and care can give you success with azaleas in your landscape and provide you with color almost year round.

When I discussed this project with Mr. Bob Bushman, our Director of Public Works, he informed me it was because of the acquisition of right-of-way. It seems from John Moore West to 301 there is less conflict in the county acquiring right-of-way. From Johin Mooreseast to Lithia, there are two and possibly three parcels of land that will have to be acquired by the process of eminent damain.

This is a court actiony and in some instances requires several years. to settle the issue. Therefore, it was suggested that we begin on the western end of the project.

I personally feel with the development being encountered, the two new schools, and a lack of commercial business to disrupt, now would be the opportune time to widen the eastern leg of the project. However, since it will be some time before this right-of-way will be available, I concur with the decision to provide some relief to the other portion.

I hope this explains the reason for the decision, and although it is not $100 \%$ of what we want, it will substantially improve

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the traffic flow on Bloomingdale Avenue.

there has been a lot of talk ( In the news about filters
being put on sewer treatment plans to filter ouit the viruses that cause Viral Meningitis. Water is used to clean the waste solids and the water byproduct is call-
ed effluent. This effluent, if it doesn't pass through the proper filtering system, can contain these viruses. The effluent water is used to water golf courses and golfers can possibly be effected. Also, the viruses cen go down into the ground and affect our drinking water. I've asked Dr. Jeansonne to write the following article to explain "What is Meningitis?")

*     *         *             * 

Meningitis is a serious infection that involves the central nervous systen. The meninges are fibrous coverings over the brain and spinal cord. The ending"itis" -means inflammation (1.e. appendicitis is an inflammation of the appendix) in the case of meningitis, almost always an infectious caure of inflammation.

Meningitis is a serious Infection, but its course can range from moderate illness to death. Both viruses and bacterja can cause meningitis. In general, bacterial meningitis is a more severe illness, even though it can be treated with antibloticg.

What are the signs and symptons of meningitis? They can be rather non-specific. Fever, irritability, "malaise" Inot feeling welll, lethargy. A severe headache, vamiting, stiff neck lunable to bend forward), and certain rashes

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would point to a higher suspicion of meningitis. The ill child or infant often prefers to be left alone, rather than be held and cuddled. The older the child, the more specific the symptoms usually are. Unfortunatley, the younger child is moe likely to be afflicted with meningits.

Viral meningitis can be caused by several viruses, most of which belong to the family of "enteric" viruses, that is, those that of ten cause gastrointestinal symptome, such as vomiting and/ or diarrhea. Exactly how this type of meningitis is acquired is not always clear. Direct exposure to a pergon with viral meningitis does not usually cauge the disease in the exposed person. Contamination of water supplies with enteric viruses may lead to gastrointestinal symptoms only, in some persons, or to mening-

itis in others. Although viral meningitis is not treatable (viruses are not killed by antibioticsl, it usually "runs its course" like other viral illnesses, with full recovery the general outcome. Neurologic deficits, such as deafness, can sonetimes occur as an aftereffect of viral meningitis. Children with viral maningitis are usually admitted to the hospital for observation, awaiting bacterial culture of their spinal fluid.

Bacterial meningitis is caused by several different familles of bacteria, including tuberculosis. Even though it is trectable, the mortality rate can be as high is $5-10 \%$, and neurologic aftereffects fe.g., selizures, deafness, retardation or learning disorderg) can occur in 15-40\%
of affected children, depending on the bacteria involved. The younger the person, the more susceptible s/he is to meningitis bacteria. Two types, meningococcal meningitis and Hemophilus influenzae type b ("Hib"), are contagious to exposed persons, the latter empecially to children. Close contacts of persons with these two types should receive prophylactic medication to reduce their. chances of acquiring the disease. These bacteria are sometimes carried asymptomatically in the nose and throat of well individuals.

How is meningitis diagnosed? A spinal tap (lunbar puncture) must be performed to obtain spinal fluid for microscopic and chemical study, and for culture. The high risk potential of meningitis compared to the low risk of spinal tap justifles performing a epinal tap whenever meningitis is suspected. People are often frightened by the mention of
"spinal tap; " but the risk of harm from the tap itself if very low.

How can it be prevented? Our major weapon today is against the "Hib" organism. A vaccine is available to protect children from 2-6 years of age against Hib disease. After six years of age, the lower chance of acquiring the disease does not justify giving the
vaccine. Children under two years of age are at the
highest risk of disease, but unfortunately do not respond to the vaceine. A nower vaccine may soon (August, 1987 be available to protect younger children. How to avoid other types of meningitis is less clear. Good hygiene is important to health in terms of preventing all infectious digeasel, including meningitis. That; and healthy eating, exercising, and rest, help us all to resist disease as much as passible.

The following is a reply from Robert L. Buschman, P.E., Director of Public Works (and a Bloon- ingdale Resident, tool.

Dear Mr. Underwood:
This responds to your request concerning a crosswalk and speed reduction on Bell Shoals Road south of Bloomingdale Avenue.

Traffic Operation staff reviewed the area and performed spot speed studies; as required by State Statutes; and pedestrian counts

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at this location. Staff recommends the installation of the following traffic control devices:

1. Installation of a pedestrian craising with advance signing on Bell Shoals Road north of Rosemead Lane.
2. Installation of a double yellow centerline from Bloomingdale Avenue gouth to a point 250 ft . south of Rosemead Lane.
3. Upon approval of the Board of County Commissionerg, installation of a 45 mph speed zone on Bell Shoals Road from Bloomingdale Avenue to Boyette Road.

Pedestrian volume was not sufficient to marrant installation of a pedestrian signal at this time.
