

Taxing District Planted 2,000 Flowers In January

Excerpts from the January 2002 Bloomingdale Special Taxing property manager's report are as follows. The report was submitted by Al Devney, President, DPMI Property Management Inc. Information: 684-6617

In the irrigation department, Brandon Irrigation repaired a broken zone line on Rosemead and a broken main line on Erindale.

DPMI replaced 10 rotors, 10 spray heads and 31 light bulbs, and repaired 2 broken zone lines.

In the landscaping department, Neighborhood Pest control sprayed the area to kill carpet grass.

Planscape, Inc. installed 2,000 pansies in Blooming-dale East and West. DPMI measured Springvale Drive to determine quantities of St. Augustine grass, bushes and shrubs needed to landscape that street.



In addition, DPMI rated all the minor entrances and street entrances from one to four, one being the worst, for their need to be refurbished.

DPMI prepared a list of all minor entrances and street entrances indicating signs, lights and the last date of new landscaping.



A new special education unit was added to the schedule at Burns Middle School in Brandon last year. The eleven children in the autistic spectrum disorders class are identified by the school system as students with exceptionali-

But those involved with the program say it's the teacher, Raymond Stiles, who is exceptional.

neurological disorder that occurs in one out of every 500 children.

A wide spectrum of associated disorders can occur in autistic children. The severity of the syndrome, ranging from mild to profound, varies from child to child.

Autistic children may suffer disabilities in any or all of a number of areas including emotional, behavioral, language and communication

skills and both fine and gross motor skills.

Parents, students and educators say that in just six months, Stiles has created an exciting, innovative and successful curriculum for his students.

"Mr. Stiles' dedication, commitment and resourcefulness with the children has been unbelievable," said Burns principal Brenda Nolte.

County Reviews Widening Project, Needed Improvements

In reviewing the recently completed Bloomingdale Avenue widening project, Hillsborough County traffic engineers identified several areas as requiring further attention.

Engineers said they would work with contractors to insure the project is properly completed.

Some of the items still under review include left turn signals from Bloomingdale onto Springvale Avenue, and from Bloomingdale onto Culbreath Road. Engineers also are considering the addition of a right turn lane from Lithia-Pinecrest Road onto Miller Road.


Drivers currently have to merge into the left lane and then right back to turn onto Miller Road.

Hurley Road residents involved in the county's residential traffic calming program have requested a review of the left turn from Hurley Road onto Blooming-

Sidewalks are still needed near the Culbertson Recreation Center at Bloomingdale West Park





left. The county did mark the stopping point, but the fence interferes with your being able to see cars coming down Bloomingdale.

Also under review by county departments is the critical need for completing the sidewalks on Canoga Park Drive in Bloomingdale West, an area traveled daily by kids going to the Culbertson recreation center.

This area was added to another project and must now wait for completion.

In addition, although enhancements to the crosswalks between the Campo Family YMCA and the Bloomingdale Little League Park were expected to be part of the widening project, it has been determined that they are a separate item and funding is currently not available.

In the past, many people thought extreme sports were just for longhaired teenage boys that probably did drugs. That's not the case.

All these sports are physically demanding and require total concentration. They are not for everyone, but they are definitely for girls too. Allisa Steamer is one of the top female professional

For those skilled and brave enough to enjoy these extreme sports, there is a local business just north of highway 60 called The Cove. Open since 1979, the business caters to skaters and surfers.

Store owner Big Wave Dave said, "We are the only hardcore surf and skate shop in the Tampa area. All of these

sports are similar. The athletes either surf on the water or on the land. They can all be great fun but must be respected. Gravity is your worst enemy."

The store stocks a full line of skates, skateboards and surfboards. Dave tells customers, "You must start with the right safety equipment. You know you're going to fall, so be prepared. Helmets, gloves and pads are critical." They also carry a full line of accessories including board shorts, sandals, wetsuits, decals, paints and more.

Chris Powell, a Bloomingdale resident, recently shopped at the store with his children. Powell said, "I grew up with a skateboard and surfboard. Now my sons Chandler and Brandon both enjoy it. In fact Chandler, an aspiring athlete at the age of five, is sponsored by The Cove. He has shown outstanding abilities on the skateboard."



About 60 parents of future Cimino students attended the Feb. 18 meeting at Alafia Elementary School to address traffic and safety issues. The school is currently under construction in Bloomingdale East and is scheduled to open for the 2002 - 2003 school year. The meeting was requested by residents of the school's neighboring subdivisions and by the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association.

School area director Bill Maxwell coordinated the meeting with school safety and public works staff.

Parents whose children will walk north to the school from the Bloomingdale Cove subdivision are concerned about incomplete sidewalks on the east side of Culbreath Rd. To get to the school on the east side of the road, students would have to negotiate a 325 yard grassy stretch along what parents say is a busy, narrow road.

Public works staff said sidewalk construction could be a possibility down the road, but not until a long list of conflicts is resolved.

They outlined what they called major obstacles to the project including a lack of funding for surveys and land purchase, and a lengthy process required to obtain the additional right-of-way need-

In addition, it was suggested that the odds of the owners of all 19 lots involved agreeing to either sell or donate a portion of their land to the county are slim.

County staff said if one property owner declines the sidewalks, the project could not move forward.

Additional property would be required because existing utilities and fire hydrants are situated just three feet from the gutter and two feet from the presumed property lines.

Public works said there is no room for sidewalks on the current right-of-way, and added that moving the utilities is not a feasible option.

The project would also have to be pushed ahead of numerous others already prioritized on the county's sidewalk master plan, many of 3509 Bell Shoals Road. which lack sidewalks on both sides of the road.

The staff response was that the district does not provide bus service to neighborhoods within a two-mile radius of the school.

Several parents pointed out that the two-mile rule has been bent in the past to provide safe passage through similar neighborhoods still under construction and ald busy roads.

Bill Maxwell had the last word, promising to send safety staff back to the site to for a closer evaluation, and to take the parent's concerns to his supervisor, Asst. Superintendent Randolph Poindexter, for consideration.

"The bottom line here is that if the safety staff says there is not a safe passage for your kids to walk and bike to school, we have an obligation to get them there in a safe manner," Maxwell said.

"I will get you everything I can for your kids."

Maxwell said he would report Poindexter's comments and the results of the additional studies at the next Cimino planning meeting, set for March 21, 7p.m., at Alafia.



What's In a (School) Name?



Coalition Clearing Path For Drug-Free Teens

They're still working on an official name and mission statement, but their goal is crystal clear; to make drug prevention and treatment resources in the greater Brandon area more accessible to teens and families, and to reduce the local demand for drugs.

In an effort to unite the greater Brandon community to combat teen drug and alcohol abuse, Bloomingdale resident Ellen Gates organized the group of parents and professionals last year. Gates is an active member of the Bloomingdale High PTSA and the mother of three teenagers.

Now serving as the group's director. Gates said her motivation for organizing the grass roots anti-drug abuse coalition stemmed from the anguish her family experienced over the tragic death of a close teenage friend.

Although various Brandon area agencies are available to counsel and treat teens involved with substance abuse, Gates said no clear link exists between the agencies, and no clear path is outlined for those seeking help.

The group met last week at the Campo Family YMCA in Bloomingdale to plan several upcoming activities and to begin formulating a name and mission statement, both of which are still in the works.

Bloomingdale High School Resource Deputy Harrison Bashner attended the Feb. 5 meeting.

Bashner said parent involvement and guidance is crucial to keeping kids drug and alcohol free.

"The more parents that are involved with projects like the substance abuse coali-

"Parents are the number one source of information for


The Bloomingdale Homeowners Association is sponsoring the coalition's youth rally for teens this month.

Residents Vent About Illegal Signs

The Gazette launched a new resident opinion poll last month on our community web site, www.BloomingdaleGazette.com. The "Snipe Sign Poll" asks residents to consider whether or not they feel temporary advertising signs posted throughout Bloomingdale are an eyesore, and if they feel the signs are beneficial to promote garage sales and homes for sale.

The illegal signs are in violation of county codes, but county staff says they do not have the resources to pick them up and issue fines on a regular basis. In effect, the residents of the community have the options of being lenient with the use of the signs, actively seeking more ringent county enforceent, or organizing a program to remove the signs

themselves.

Out of 41 respondents, 31 said the signs are an eyesore, and 10 residents said they are not. In addition, out of 40 respondents, 10 residents said the signs are beneficial for garage sales and homes for sale, while 30 said they are not.
