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

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



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Association Pushes For Sidewalk Repairs

When Bloomingdale residents have issues, the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association board of directors does more than just listen – they take action.

Case in point - a resident homeowner recently attended the association's monthly meeting to voice concerns about the condition of sidewalks along Natures Way Boulevard and Culbreath Road.

The homeowner asked the board to look into the matter for two reasons. In addition to creating a safety hazard for walkers, joggers and bicyclists, the cracked sidewalks – poorly patched with black asphalt in some areas – are unsightly.

George May, a BHA director and public works committee chairman, assured the homeowner the board would look into the issue. May not only looked, he spearheaded efforts that prompted the Hillsborough County Public Works Department during the past six weeks to replace asphalt-patched walks with concrete and to complete numerous additional repairs. The county also agreed to grind down sidewalk joints in an attempt to level uneven areas.

"Between County Commissioner Al Higginbotham's office and John Newton, who oversees public works for our area, I explained our concerns and what would be acceptable to our community," May said. "I was determined to be the squeaky wheel."

May outlined to county officials the waste of taxpayer money for temporary asphalt patches, safety issues and possible lawsuits that could result from a resident's injury due to a misstep on the uneven sidewalks. Repairs

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began shortly thereafter and, according to May, will continue as long as the need exists.

The bottom line is that Bloomingdale residents have safer and more attractive sidewalks due to the efforts of the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association.

"This is just a portion of your \$25 annual dues working for you," May said. "We are only limited in what we can do by the

numbers of BHA members we have, the money to work with, and our volunteers."

Residents can report cracked and broken sidewalks to the BHA by phone, (813) 681-2051, or e-mail, bloomingdale.homeowners@verizon. net. Residents should provide a detailed physical location and the number of the nearest TECO pole in order to pinpoint the area for inspection.


There is much to enjoy in the community of Bloomingdale beautifully maintained landscaping, recreation areas, the welltraveled walks on Natures Way and Culbreath Road and topnotch schools.

Keeping Bloomingdale's common areas up to par takes money - your money, in the form of a \$130 tax assessed and added to each Bloomingdale homeowner's annual property tax bill.

In the 1980s, residents of the newly-formed development petitioned Hillsborough County to establish the Bloomingdale Special Taxing District, known as the BSTD. Special taxing districts, in general, are formed to cover an area's unique funding needs. In Bloomingdale's case, each taxpayer shares an equal assessment regardless of their property's

The BSTD includes all homes in Bloomingdale East and West,

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

with the exception of River Crossing Estates which as a later development was not included in the original petition. Heading the district is a seven-member, volunteer board of trustees comprised of Bloomingdale residents. They oversee the district's funds and meet monthly to determine community needs with regards to ongoing maintenance, repairs and improvement projects.

According to BSTD treasurer David West, it is the largest taxing district in Hillsborough County, with approximately 5,000 homes.

"In fiscal year 2008, we will add over \$600,000 dollars to our funds," West said. "This is money that stays in our community. We as a board are constantly trying to maintain the aesthetic value of our community common areas and preserve our property values."

In Bloomingdale, residents can look around them to see their special tax money at work. West cited some of the board's current budget figures - more than \$90,000 spent on landscape maintenance, including irrigation system; \$175,000 for lawn maintenance; \$33,000 for wall painting; more than \$20,000 to date to repair damages resulting from vandalism; \$2,000 for Christmas decorations, and the list goes on.

Overseeing the board's projects is Al Devney, Bloomingdale's property manager.

West said, "Al is responsible for the day-to-day operations of our community including contracting, work inspection, and basically making sure we get what we paid for."

In addition, Devney inspects Bloomingdale's common areas, entryways and irrigation systems for proper operation and possible vandalism.

Vandalism, according to West and Devney, is a big concern.

West said, "Vandalism costs residents money... money that could be used to improve our community in other ways. If we catch 'em [vandals,] we will prosecute them."

West also commented on misconceptions concerning the

BSTD and the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association.

"Some residents don't understand what each group does. We are totally separate by our missions; yet, together, our common ground is to make Bloomingdale a better place to live."

This is an election year for the BSTD board, with five current trustee terms expiring Sept. 30. The deadline to submit an application for the upcoming Aug. 26 primary election ballot is noon on May 19. 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

Property Manager's March 2008 Report

ZK Construction, Morningstar Electric, Davidson Landscaping and Thunder Irrigation completed repairs to a damaged wall on Groveway Drive and Culbreath Road.

Danielle Fencing replaced a vandalized section of fence on Erindale Drive west of the Eagle Point entrance and also repaired a damaged fence across the street.

Morningstar Electric repaired two vandalized lights at the Heritage Park entrance on two separate occasions.

Planscape Inc., began replac-

ing 4-inch pop up sprinklers with 6-inch pop ups on Canoga Park Drive and Natures Way Boule-

A notice to trim 130 trees to meet Department of Transportation standards on Natures Way and Green Hollow Lane was mailed to six contractors. The proposals were due by April 3.

Davidson Landscaping and Irrigation repaired a leaking main line in the median at the Eagle Pointe entrance.

Planscape, Inc., helped canvass the community to select bush and palm groupings and entryways that need to be replaced this year. The contract should go out for bid late in the third quarter and be implemented in the fourth quarter, when rain can supplement the irrigation.

Entrances with flood lights were surveyed to determine the quantity of halogen lights that would be required to replace them. The cost for fixtures to replace 33 lights would be \$4,300 to \$6,200, depending on the size of the lights installed. There would also be additional installation costs.

The common area between the road and the bollards on Canoga Park and Bloomingfield Drive near Bloomingdale West Park was measured to determine

costs to install a well and irrigation system. The area measured 23,500 square feet. The estimated cost is presently \$29,500.

Entryways to Windsor Woods on Treeline Drive and Heritage Park on Culbreath Road continue to be hotspots for vandalism. At the Windsor Woods entrance 25 light bulbs were destroyed or stolen and at Heritage Park two

halogen lights were vandalized on two separate occasions.

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Stonewood Grill Is Smokin

It has been quite a while since I did a restaurant review for our friends at the Gazette. So by way of apology, I'll tell you all that this review was definitely worth waiting for.

Stonewood Grill and Tavern, at 612 E. Bloomingdale Ave., is right in our backyard. The Brandon location is the latest to open in the chain of 18 restaurants in Florida and North Carolina.

Mrs. Dumont and I had dinner vinegar reduction. there on a recent Friday night with our good friends from Bloomingdale West, Sandy Wynnwood and Misty Schots.

When you first arrive, you notice that the covered outside waiting area has a marble table and comfortable benches. Diners who waited for a table were treated to samples of a smoked salmon appetizer and red, white and blue chips topped with a warm bleu cheese and balsamic

Our wait was less than a half hour because we took advantage of call-ahead seating, a service that lets guests phone ahead to put their name on the waiting list shortly before they intend to arrive at the restaurant.

After our name was called, on our way to our "tabooth" - half table, half booth - we passed through the bar area. To our right we saw a large semi-circle bar with plenty of stools. To our

left was a walk-in wine closet with glass doors that allow you to view the large wine selection available to compliment your

Chris, our server, told us about some of the specials and said they make their soups, croutons and salad dressing fresh inhouse every day. He went on to explain that the cooking is done on an oak grill.

We started off with bruschetta, which was enough for the four of us and was unusual for two reasons. The bread was soft and not crunchy, which added to the wonderful taste. Plus, it was served with a balsamic vinegar reduction which was so good and actually sweet that in addition to spooning it over the bruschetta, I drizzled it on my salad. Whatever else you do, ask for a small portion of this to top off whatever you are ordering.

Three of us ordered a house salad which was served on a chilled plate and had large plum tomatoes, crisp lettuce and big homemade croutons. The sourdough bread we had to ask for was warm and just acceptable, but the homemade salad dressings were very good.

Our entrée selections were quite different. Mrs. Dumont ordered the oak-grilled pork chop with apple chutney, served over garlic mashed potatoes and accompanied by a side of French green beans. She gave it an A-

Misty selected the lemon chardonnay chicken Florentine, two tender breasts of chicken sautéed in a caper-laden citrus chardonnay and served with spinach and fresh grated mozzarella. Her rating was also A-plus.

Sandy chose the scampi shrimp with spinach and pasta, medium-sized tiger shrimp with fresh baby spinach sautéed in a light scampi sauce and tossed with imported linguini. Once again it was a large portion. Sandy raved about it and gave it an A.

I thought long and hard about the Emerald Bay crab cake platter, but decided on

the oak-grilled shrimp and scallop skewer, grilled basted tiger shrimp and cold water scallops, served with a creamy corn risotto and basil cream sauce. The scallops were small but tender, and the shrimp was very good. I increased my rating from a B-plus to an A-minus strictly because the corn risotto was that good.

This time we didn't pass on dessert. Some selections were Key lime pie, cheesecake, chocolate bread pudding and a sixlayer Kahlua chocolate mousse cake with sliced strawberries and whipped cream on the side. After choosing the chocolate cake, we were presented with four chilled dessert spoons and immediately dug in. It was once again a terrific selection.

We found the prices to be moderate and not out of line for this level of dining. Appetizers run from \$3.50 for a cup of soup to \$11 for quesadillas, and our bruschetta was \$8. Entrees range from \$12.90 for a chicken pot pie to \$30 for the grilled New York strip. Misty's lemon chardonnay chicken Florentine was \$14.50, and Sandy's scampi with linguini was \$15.50.

Overall, I must say it was a very fine dining experience.

Until we eat again, I remain your humble gastronomical servant-



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
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extends into building the confidence and character of the boys who share his passion for the

"They offer the full package," he said. "They're about discipline and raising these kids to be good


He also believes coaches are more than just coaches.

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

Horrific Attack **Stuns Community**

The community of Bloomingdale was dealt a terrible blow on Thursday, April 24. On an otherwise typically quiet spring evening, a high school student who was simply dropping off books after-hours at Bloomingdale Regional Public Library was sexually assaulted and viciously beaten unconscious.

On April 26, deputies arrested a 16-year old Bloomingdale High School student for the crime. The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office on Monday said DNA test results link the suspect, Kendrick Morris of Clair-Mel City, to the attack at the library and to a rape in Clair-Mel City about a year ago. The victim is not a student at Bloomingdale High, but her identity and the school that she attends are not being released due to the nature of the crime.

There are no words to describe

Each and every individual must take steps to proactively prevent these crimes from occurring, because they can and do take place anytime, anywhere. It is now all too clear that our community is no exception.



Council Acts In Community's Best Interests

An organization of neighbors who aim to improve safety and the quality of life in the greater Bloomingdale area is looking for a few good men and women.

Volunteer members of the Bloomingdale Area Community Council, also known as the BACC, are residents of Bloomingdale and the surrounding communities. They work together and with local law enforcement and government agencies and representatives to proactively address at the local level issues such as traffic, vandalism, road improvements and personal safety.

The BACC invites all interested neighbors to attend its next meeting, 7 p.m. on Thursday, May 15. The group meets at the Bloomingdale substation at 4342 Bell Shoals Road on the third Thursday each month. Residents can also stop by the station for information (hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays) or call (813) 635-8040.

Current items of interest and discussion at BACC meetings are as follows:

Roads

The widening of Bell Shoals Road will soon start. That means residents must be prepared to make adjustments to their schedules to offset traffic delays. The Boyette Road widening project has met some delays in right-of-way acquisitions. The Bell Shoals Road project includes several traffic safety enhancements including the installation of traffic signals on Bell Shoals near Wal-Mart, the installation of a left-turn lane onto Garnett Drive off Bell Shoals and other improvements at the intersection of Bloomingdale and Bell Shoals.

Traffic Blitz

Special traffic monitoring activities will continue in the Bloomingdale area. There

have been some complaints about these blitzes, but most of the gripes are from drivers who were stopped for speeding or running red lights. The purpose is simple – to stop and cite drivers who break traffic laws and endanger other drivers and pedestrians. Basically, break the law and you will pay big. Running a traffic light will cost you about \$184.50. That is a lot of gas.

COP Program

The Sheriff's Office volunteer Citizens Patrol Program, known as COP, was recently launched in Bloomingdale and is becoming very active and successful. With continued growth in our area and the large number of deputies deployed on active duty with the military, this program is a critical addition to the sheriff's patrol programs. We owe many thanks to the Bloomingdale residents who have completed their training and are now patrolling our community.

Open Garages, Unlocked Cars

One of the biggest problems in our area is residents who actually help criminals by leaving their garage doors open at night or their cars unlocked with valuables inside. These are open invitations to criminals who look for easy targets. Please do not help the bad guys.

Hurricane Season

Next month is the start of hurricane season. Now is the time for all Bloomingdale residents to make disaster plans for their families, homes and businesses. Experts expect this to be a very active season. Remember the Rule of 72 - be prepared to take care of your family and help your neighbors for at least the first 72 hours following a storm. 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
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
