LAST MINUTE GIFTS FOR MOTHER'S DAY &

If she's a Mother-to-be: Give her the gift of time - future time. Reassure her that in months to come she'll be capable, comfortable and won't always look like a beached whale. Get her a diary to write about the baby's first year. Buy her a silky, non-tent nightie. Hug her (as much as you can reach around), comfort her, rub her back and put up with her moods ...after all, you'll share the joys of your baby's future arrival...but she's doing all the work for both of you.

If she is the Mother of young children or babies: Give her the gift of time - her own. Offer (with a smile and a touch of sincerity) to watch the kids so she can go out for a few hours (or a whole unbelievable afternoon) gloriously ALONE. She could jog, shop, have lunch out, sit and read in the park, visit a museum...all in wonderful healing silence...and without a stroller. Remind her to leave the diaper bag at home and to take the plastic baggies of graham crackers out of her purse. Smile reassuringly as she leaves and try not to greet her return with "where have you been!".

If she is the Mother of older children: Give her the gift of time - your own. Do something special around the house - clean windows, polish silver, pick up your (gasp) room, weed a rose garden. Try to do it with a sense of appreciation for her efforts all year and not with a martyr's crown (this is not the time to ask to be paid for your labors!).

If she is the Mother of grown children: Give her the gift of time past. Tell her she looks great...and write her a note or make her a tape — let her know how you appreciated her years of mothering: carpooling to sports, craft ideas for scouts, TLC when you had chicken pox, trips to the park, CARE packages sent to college or barracks. In looking back, she often can only recall the times when she wasn't the mother she wanted to be...let her know you remember the other times.

A Mother - no matter what the age of her children - can always use some reassurance that she is special, that she is an individual...a real person - not just "Timmy"s mother". If you give her a present, choose something she won't buy herself: sheer lingerie, jewelry, an elegant accessory....not steam irons, garden rakes or new tires for her station wagon. Another possibility a gift of yourself: a drawing, a lumpy ashtray, an album of photos. But with or without a tangible present, the gift of time (given with love and enthusiasm) is truly memorable...and if you want to throw in a meal she doesn't have to cook (and you get the sitter ahead of time) — NOW that is heaven! #### SURVIVAL

Frequently, as a member of your Board, I am asked: "What does the Bloomingdale Homeowners' Association do? Why should I be a member?" Those of us who are "in the trenches" working to solve problems ranging from insignificant to catastrophic have always felt the answers to these questions were simple. We recognize, however, that due to work schedules, community growth rate, personal priorities, and individual life styles not everyone views things with the same perspective. For this reason, I'm asking you to take a few minutes to read the article titled "Why Should I Be A BHA Member?" in this issue. You're probably asking yourself "Why are they doing this now?". That's the only easy question to answer. For the first time since our creation, there is a very real threat to our existence as a community organization. This threat appears in the form of Criterion's proposed Bloomingdale Master Community Association which, if created in its presently proposed form, would literally negate the BHA at all levels. Your BHA has retained legal council to represent our best interests as well as protect our assets and our community. We have always endeavored to represent the entire community regardless of membership status. Since the key issues at hand now are mandatory assessments, negligible resident influence, external community control, and unbalanced voting and assessment levels, the proposed Master Community Association must be of significant importance to EVERY homeowner in the Bloomingdale Development. For this reason we are calling a COMMUNITY MEETING for Tuesday, May 17, at 8:00 PM. This meeting will be held at the Bloomingdale Civic Association building at Lithia-Pinecrest and Bloomingdale Roads. The purposes of this meeting are many: 1- We will incorporate the regular BHA General Membership meeting into it; 2- We will give a report on the meeting between our attorney and Criterion's attorney; 3- We will give an update on the overall issue; 4- You will be able to present your concerns. Your BHA has undertaken a major financial obligation in an effort to protect us all - yet our membership (a mere \$20.00 per year) is not even 30% of the community. We speak much louder in the ears of all concerned if we truly represent the majority of the community. Join us! We need your help -- your support.

"Neighborhood Watch Program Being Organized."

Attendees at the April 19th BHA general meeting, overwhelmingly supported the Community's complete participation in the Neighborhood Watch Program. Over 150 neighborhood programs have already been formed in unincorporated Hillsborough County, and the number is growing weekly. Program features include "PROJECT IDENTI-FICATION" (use of engravers to place driver's license numbers on valuables to simplify recovery of stolen property), fingerprinting services for children (an increasingly popular program), and home security surveys (conducted by Sheriff's Deputies). A security patrol consisting of community residents, is already established, and will also be a part of the program. Much greater participation is needed to get the program off the ground. #### "WHY SHOULD I BE A BHA MEMBER?"

This question is asked frequently and there are many ways to answer it -- but the bottom line is -- In order to be a responsible participant in my community. The BHA constitution charters the organization to promote: community improvements, neighborly relations and cooperation, for the overall common good of the community. A broad charter to be sure, but one that offers each member the opportunity to improve the community environment for the benefit of present and futuresidents. The BHA provides the mechanism to do things in the community that individuals or small groups could not or would not accomplish.

The BHA, during its four year history, can look back on a number of issues and problems that have been brought to the attention of residents for community action. Some of these issues and problems have been resolved to the satisfaction of residents by BHA action. Others are still being worked. The point is that through the efforts of your BHA something was done. A brief recap of past BHA actions affecting the community include: acceleration of the installation of street-lighting, coordination of the developer's efforts for maintenance of common areas and entrances, dissuading the developer from giving park land to the YMCA, proposing the establishment of a Special Tax District for Bloomingdale, coordinating rezoning issues such as that affecting Park East.


Annual BHA membership dues form the working fund to carry on the activities of the organization. BHA is a "not for profit" organization which means that all revenues, whether from dues, donations, or fund raising events are used for community activities as approved by the General Membership. In addition to dues the BHA receives revenue from fund raisers such as an annual garage sale, and sponsoring a Coca-Cola sales booth at the Brandon Balloon Rally. Funds are used to publish the BHA Gazette (partially funded by ads) to keep residents informed of community activities, to provide refreshments for BHA meetings, upkeep of playground equipment, and to sponsor special events such as children's parties, community picnics and adult socials. Payment of membership dues affords each member the right to participate in BHA activities.

The BHA is an active, growing organization that needs the support of residents to improve our community. It is the forum for expressing collective opinions and desires to the developer, builders and residents in the community and to county and state legislators. It is as effective as its members and residents of the community want it to be.

Should you be a member of the BHA? --- Emphatically YES --- without the BHA the community has no collective voice to be heard.

# garden Checklist for May

■ Annuals—Replace weary spring annuals, such as pansies and petunias, with heat-tolerant bedding plants. Choices include portulaca, Madagascar periwinkle, marigolds, zinnias, cosmos, and scarlet sage. It's best to set out transplants, but these annuals can also be started from seeds.

Or you can use ½ cup of 10-10-10 per foot of plant height. Broadcast the fertilizer under the canopy of the plant, and lightly scratch it into the soil.

- Cannas—Feed cannas now to promote healthy foliage and good flowering. Apply ½ cup of 10-10-10 or ½ pound of 6-6-6 per 25 square feet of bed. Broadcast the fertilizer around the plants, and water it in. If fertilizer comes in contact with the foliage, immediately wash it off to prevent foliage burn. Prolong flowering by cutting off the old blossoms when they begin to brown; new flowerbuds will develop below the cut.
- Citrus—Mature trees need to be fertilized this month. Use a special citrus formulation according to label directions, or apply about 1½ pounds of 10-10-10 per year of tree age (up to 10 pounds). Feed young trees as follows: apply ¼ to ½ pound of 10-10-10 to those 1 year old, about 1 pound to 2-year-old trees, and 2 pounds to those 3 years old. Increase this amount ½ pound per year of age for trees between 4 and 10 years old. Apply by evenly broadcasting the fertilizer under the canopy of the tree.
- Crepe myrtle—Control powdery mildew on crepe myrtle as soon as noticed; it can spread to flowerbuds and keep them from opening. The disease looks like a white powder on the upper surface of the leaves. To control, spray infected plants with triforine or Benlate according to label directions. If your tree had powdery mildew last year, go ahead and spray to prevent the disease from coming back.
- Houseplants—For best growth, houseplants need such minor elements as iron and manganese, and they're often absent in potting mixes. So either use a houseplant fertilizer that contains them or apply bottled minor elements (available at well-stocked nurseries) according to label directions.

#### **Dealing With Slugs**

If you find transplants with stems that have been chewed bare of foliage overnight, your garden may be full of slugs. Vegetables and flowers are two of their favorites, but they also feed on the lawn.

Closely related to snails, slugs are softbodied, slimy mollusks that feed at night

There's an easy way to control slugs without pesticides. Make the most of their attraction to beer, and trap them in containers of it. Use a container with a fitted lid, such as a coffee can or whipped-margarine tub. Sink the container into the soil near the plants so that the top is flush with the ground; then fill with an inch or more of beer. Cut a 2- to 3-inch hole in the lid, and put the lid in place. While the hole lets the slugs crawl in, the lid keeps your pets from finding the beer before the slugs do.

Check the containers every morning to dispose of the drowned slugs. Replace the beer about every three days or when it has been strongly diluted by rain or

irrigation water.

#### Bloomingdale Country Club:

A flurry of activity moves the golf course construction closer to completion. Earthwork construction and irrigation system installation is complete and final dressing up prior to grassing is underway. 1 tsp. baking soda


2 eggs 1 (#2) can crushed pineapple

el C. margarine 1 tsp. vanilla 1C. canned milk 1. C. sugar



While cake is baking, mix topping ingredients in a saucepan and bring to a slow boil. When cake is done pierce all over with a cooking fork. Then pour the boiling mixture over it. Serve this cake with whipped cream or plain.


