## CONTROLLING THE ODOR-A SOLUTION?

The Blaomingdale Gazette was in attendance at the Kings Avencie lift station when Utilities Director Mike McWeeney and Commissioner Jim Selvey watched a demonstration of sewer-odor control by Arr-Maz Products of Winter Haven. In an attempt to keep the Blocmingdale public informed as ta the progress being made in odor control, the Gazette was invited to watch this experiment.

The King's Avenue lift station is a pumping station that takes the raw sewage from the area and pumps it along to the main plant. Hydrogen Sulfide gas lwhich has a terrible rotten egg smell and is
toxic) has been emiting from this lift station into the surrounding neighborhoods. Arr-Maz Products demonstrated the use of a chemical whish $3 t$ taches anto the hydrogen sulfide inside the station, makes it become heavy, and then allows it to fall into the water below where it can be treated with the rest of the waste. This way the gas is not released into the Etmosphere. The company has a timer which attaches to the electrical circuitry of the lift station that releases the chemical every few minutes. Mr. McWeeney said that he was going to ask the County to allocate the funds necessary to purchase 10 units lat

$\$ 2,500$ each) plus the non-toxic chemical for various lift stations around the county.

How dass this affect Bloomingdale? In two years our current plant on Nature's Way will be dismantled. But the raw sewage must still be pumped from this area to the new plant to be built soon. Our plant must therefore be replaced with a lift station (or pumping apparatus) like the one on King's Avenue. The difference would be that there would be three such pumps together rather than just one like on King's. The rest of the area around this new lift station will be filled in with trees, according to Mr. McWeeney. But odors do eminate from lift stations. So they are attempting to control the problem before the stations are built in Bloomingdale. This cdor control apparatus that was demonstrated on Tuesday is for lift stations only, not for the big treatment plants.

Mr. McWeeney and Eric Bush (Assistant Director of Utilities) also demanstrated the use of special "analyzer tubes" to monitor the presence of hydragen sulfide gas in the air. Mr. Mcweeney stated that he would like to place these one-use tubes around Bloomingda!e in an effort to check the levels of gas being emited by the plant. He is considering asking local residents in the area to assist with this monitoring. He is also going to place these at the new school. These analyzer tubes are about the size of an cral
thermometer and cost \$2. 35 each.

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## STD ASKS CRITERION TO MEET OBLIGATIONS

The Developer has a "legal and moral responsibility to the residents of Bloomingdale" to take care of the walls, irrigation systems, and overall repair. So said Joe DeLuea, Trustee on the Board of the Epecial Taxing District. Such was the tenor of the meeting on October 7 when Criterion was invited as representative of the Developer, NILIC
(National Investor Life
Insurance Company). Susan Deluca, establisher of the
current STD, was also present and told of the verbal committments made to her during meetings with Criterion in October, 1985. At that time, Criterion stated they would repair and paint all walls, fix the irrigation systeas, and leave the lighting in warking order when the STD took over
January 1, 1987. The STD Board does not feel it should have to go backwards to try to do "catchup maintenance: due to a lack on the developer's part. Susan Meitz, of Criterion, agreed. She felt it was possible thet NILIC would set up an escrow account for the STD to do the work, rather than arranging for the painting and repair themselves.

On Wednesday evening, October 22, at approximately 8:00 pm a late model Mercedes Benz crashed thru the concrete wall on
Natures Way across from Bloomingdale Park East. According to a
spokesperson at the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Dept. there were no serious
injuries. Damages were estimated by the Deputy on the scene to be approximately $\$ 300$ to repair the wall, and around $\$ 3,000$ to repair the Mercedes. The driver and passenger of the vehicle were not residents of
Bloomingdale and are reported to be in their late teens. Cause of the accident was reported to be failure way to save money.

## VEGETABLE GROWING

Warm，cloudless days and absence of hard ground freezes are some of the best aspects of Florida flower and vegetable gardening． Abundant sunshine and easy to work soil can provide us with tasty，vitamin packed vegetables and deeply colored，strong，abundant flowers．

The gardening season here is different than the northern states．Dictated by hours of sunlight per day and daytime－high and nighttime－ low temperatures，the season begins now in fall．

The gardener＇s year in Bran－ don is conprised of four distinct yet overlapping seasons that begin in Octo－ ber．Many of the flowers and vegetables planted in the northern spring time
＋+ ＋
＇months of April，May，and June are planted here in October and November．Spring planted sweet peas are planted as soon as the soil can be worked in the north because peas are frost hardy and heat sensitive．To
plant at this time here in Brandon would have the peas growing into the rising heat of early summer which would greatly diminish the har－
vest．Peas planted now will usu－ally provide a superb harvest since the plants

## GUM CHEWING

Chewing gum may actually be good for your teeth. That's right! An article published in the August 1986 edition of the Journal of the American Dental Association produces strong evidence that chewing surbital-sweetened (sugarless) gum after cansuming retentive sugary foods such as cherry pies, raisins, chocolate bars, cupcakes, and chocolate cookies reduces the acid levels of the plaque between the teeth of the peaple who were tested. Plaque is the term for bacteria which colonize on the teeth, particularly in between the teeth.

The signficance of reducing the acid level of the plaque is that the acid produced by the plaque causes tooth decay. The acid is produced when bacteria in the mouth consume the sugar. The sugar content of food is more easily utilized by the bacteria when it is in a retentive form such as sticky sweets. -50 "Gum" Continued on page 23

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"IRA" cont'd from pg. 7 those not covered by employer pension plans, will not be affected by the new law.

This new bill passed October 1986 and will be effective for 1987 and thereafter. It has no effect on existing IRA accounts.

Most of us should take advantage of current law. The proposal is not effective until next year. This means we will have until April 15, 1987, to make our IRA contribution for 1986.

If a spouse is considering going back to work, she should do so quickly. If she can carn $\$ 2,000$ or more in 1986, she can fully shelter that income with her own IRA. Otherwise, the maximum deductible contribution when only one spouse works is $\$ 2,250$.

If we can no longer make deductible contributions to
an IRA because of our income levels, alternative savings programs should be considered. There are many investment programs offered by insurance companies and brokerage firm houses, which provide individuals with tax deferred income. The most pepular products are going to be deferred annuities; single premium life, and whole life insurance, including universal life. While these investments may not be deductible, interest is tax deferred. The rate of return, and whether it is guaranteed, will vary from product to product.
