

Peruvian artifacts ever to travel to the U.S. and includes several thousand years of history. Over 30 civilizations are represented, including one of the most powerful, the Incas.

The ancient Peruvians were expert politicians as well as powerful warriors. They practiced mummification 1,000 years before the Egyptians and built an earthquake proof city hundreds of years before San Francisco was founded.

They also successfully practiced brain surgery 1,500 years before the discovery of penicillin. Evidence of this brain surgery has been found in the form of human skulls missing large sections of bone. The skulls show evidence of

bone regrowth indicating that the patients survived for a reasonable time after the ordeal.

Some of the artifacts on display are three mummies including a 1,500-year-old sorceress wrapped in over eight feet of her own hair. The mummy has never traveled outside of Peru – until now.

Several gold artifacts are also in the collection. Gold was highly symbolic to the Peruvian cultures. Its brilliant color and reflective property mirror the sun, which was worshiped as a deity in ancient Peru. Gold also indicated a person's status. A gold knife used in ceremonies of the Chimu is on



display. The knife, called a tumi, is inset with turquoise and depicts a winged man with an elaborate headdress. In a land where decapitation and human sacrifice were common, what this knife was used for may remain a mystery.

In ancient Peruvian cultures artisans also crafted ceramics where they depicted nearly every aspect of daily life. These ceramics are the primary link between the present and the past because although the ancient Peruvian cultures were powerful, they used no written language.

For this exhibit the museum's galleries have been reconfigured to take you back to ancient Peru. Nazca, a site of enormous intricate designs carved into desert sands 2,000 years ago that can only be understood by viewing them from thousands of feet in the air, and Chan Chan, are both incorporated into the elaborate gallery enhancements.

As always, visitors will receive an audio guided tour and view a multi-media movie, however, that is where the similarities with past exhibits end. A long sereis of corridors that at times will appear more like a maze than anything resembling traditional galleries, will create the illusion to your guests that they have actually traveledto Peru.

The first area guests will encounter on their journey will be a recreation of a rainforest so dense, visitors will barely be able to see very far in front of them. This rainforest section will simulate the Inca Trail which, once a visitor reaches a clearing, they will be able to see Machu Picchu in the distance. From here, through stone portals and into a tomb-like setting, guests will find themselves face-to-face with a number of strange looking tomb guardians. Around another corner they will encounter two eerie mummies, one of which bears a tattoo.

Through another series of corridors visitors will discover the medical mysteries surrounding brain surgery that was practiced thousands of years ago.

The adobe city of Chan Chan will also be included in the travels of the visitors as they explore the nooks and crannies that are filled with interesting artifacts and reminders of these lost civilizations.

The exhibit opens Oct. 23 at the Florida International Museum at 100 Second St. North in St. Petersburg. Tickets are \$13.95 for adults and \$5.95 for students; group rates are available. The museum is open seven days a week, daily from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and the last tour starts at 6 p.m.; Sat. from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. with the last tour starting at 8 p.m.

Snelling stated that the BSTD had picked up 153 new homes this year.

During monthly maintenance inspection, the following items were corrected: 14 spray heads, 5 rotors, 1 solenoid, 1 valve box, 6 light bulbs, 3 broken zone lines and 1 riser were repaired.

All 18 irrigation systems were turned of due to hurricane threat and then turned back on.

Continued "location project" started in July. The STD has 185 valves of which I have located 143. The reminder will be located with electronic equipment.

Landscaping

We installed 60 deep purple Crepe Myrtle trees on Canoga Park.

We installed 400 flowers on Bloomingdale and Canoga Park.

We installed 334 Creeping Fig plants on Erindale from Culbreath to Wrencrest.

We used 24-5-11 fertilizer on the grass and 12-2-14 on the beds, bushes, trees and creeping fig for this time of year.

We surveyed the area for large overhanging trees that are obstructing cars and trucks and identified 21 locations for the Board to discuss.

Miscellaneous

We approved installation of 10 electrical boxes in various entryways for Christmas lights.

We received 32 cartons of Christmas bows to be put up during the holidays.

Eat, Drink and Pitch - Picked up 36 bags of trash 13 political signs, 2 pair of sunglasses, 34 signs, 2 hubcaps, 2 tires, 5 socks, 1 traffic cone, 1 lamp shade, large piece of plywood, 4 gloves, 1 shirt, 1 deer head (that's right, a deer head) and 29 cents.

Future Projects (have received board approval) Install poinsettias in the entryways for the Holi-

The Value and Virtue of Pets

Many of life's best lessons can not be taught at school, at camp, or on the street corner. They can not be taught by the world's greatest teachers or the neighborhood's finest parents. They are taught by pets - furry pets, scaly pets, caged pets and wild "pets". Nothing can teach a child about give and take, work and play, kindness and caring, and responsibility and rewards better than a family pet. Children (and some adults) can learn valuable lessons about birth, life, death and yes - even sex from animals.

Pets also have a remarkable way of teaching us how to be resilient and forgiving. My children recently learned a valuable lesson about resiliency after witnessing a dog attacking our beloved ferret. We then watched her good-naturedly recover and adapt instead of give up and die - a lesson no parent could have taught as well. Pets also have a wonderful ability to foster responsible action in a child while giving out free wet-nose kisses and warm, wiggly cuddles. Responsibility is a virtue all children should develop - a little at a time, the sooner the better.

If you think a family pet could offer some of life's best lessons to your child, be sure your child is ready to take on the responsibility. The work will feel like punishment to both you and your child if your child isn't ready to care for a pet. Does you child help around the house now? Does he or she do chores without being reminded over and over? Take into account your child's maturity and dependability, not just age. The Humane Society cautions against parents assuming that children under 10 can take total responsibility for a pet.

If you are willing to assume most of the work until your child is old enough to take responsibility, a pet has a way of offering unconditional love and companionship. Day to day duties such as caring for a pet, are simply part of the giving which must be expected of each member of the family. No other job gives as many rewards to a child than caring for a pets' needs. Pets also instill a sense of kindness and generosity in a child. Giving food and water, as well as affection, to an animal softens even an adolescent's heart. A well-tended animal helps a child feel loved and wanted. Everyone needs this, especially children.

If you do decide to get a pet, let your child do a little research first as to the care it will require. Go to the library to find a book and to a pet shop to ask

questions. If you are considering a more unique pet, such as a ferret, an iguana, a snake, or a hedgehog talk to families who own one of these pets to get the real story about its needs and peculiarities (all pets have them). Find out what type of animal will fit your family best. A puppy will need lots of space, time and ocial/service organization. Our aim is to promote attention even after he is housebroken.
