



Luminaria Sale Lights Up Bloomingdale, Benefits Scholarship

Ten bucks for a kit of 20 luminarias, not a bad deal for a very good cause, according to the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association.

This year, for the second time, the association will sell kits to raise money for the scholarship program in honor of former Bloomingdale High School principal B.J. Stelter.

Each kit contains 20 bags, 20 candles, sand, matches and instructions for using the traditional Christmas lantern.

"We sold almost 200 kits last year, the first time out, without any publicity," May said. "This year we have 400 bags to sell. If we could sell all of them, we could award two \$2,000 scholarships, or four \$1,000 scholarships."

To aid in that effort, the BHA will start selling the kits earlier this year than last.

"We will start selling them the week after Thanksgiving," May said. "And we're going to do the contest again this year."

The contest works like this: The two subdivisions that buy the most luminaria kits, and the two subdivisions that buy the most kits as a percentage of homeowners, will win Santa Claus visits.

"Mr. Claus will be visiting four different areas on the evening of Dec. 22," May said. "Santa will drive through the neighborhoods, wave to the kids and pass out candy canes."

Santa also will be on hand to visit Bloomingdale kids Dec. 8 at the association's offices at 3509 Bell Shoals

BHA Asks Public To Weigh In On Deed Restriction Debate

No one wants to be the town cop, least of all the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association.

But someone has to beg the question that seeks the answer to how a mature community can build on its value by ensuring its neighborhoods' respective deed restrictions are enforced.

"You start seeing the deterioration of a community when homeowners start to ignore and disregard their deed restrictions," said BHA board member George T. May IV. "We don't want to be a Gestapo, but at the same time we want to maintain the integrity, quality and values of our neighborhoods."

Deed restrictions, also referred to as "covenants, conditions and restrictions," are the rules and regulations governing the use of a piece or property or real estate. Deed restrictions are separate from zoning ordinances and typically have been viewed legally as a private contract between the buyer and seller of land. These restrictions typically are enforced by a homeowners association, pass on through ownership of the land and cover such things as what types of fencing, if any, you can use on your property; how you can, and should, landscape your lawn; and what, if any, structures you can have on your property, such as a shed, boat, basketball court or trailer.

The BHA at its October board meeting discussed the necessity of staying diligent about the community wide enforcement of deed restrictions.

"Once you start ignoring the deed restrictions, boom! There goes your neighborhood," May said. "That's

some structure and some organized way of ensuring that homeowners are aware of their deed restrictions and that they are adhered to."

Board members noted that as the tarnish quickly. community ages, new homeowners step in and might not be aware of the deed restrictions to which they must abide.

"We're under the consultancy of an attorney to get more educated about what we need to do and how to do it." May said. "Our aim is to invite the public and get the support of the community."

Board members said they hope to meet and reach consensus quickly.

"Age sometimes gives in to neglect but you have to maintain your home," May said. "We're an established community, and once

what we're hoping to avoid and why you start getting homes that are 15 we're researching ways to maintain to 20 years old you're going to have some maintenance issues. The good news is we're an established area and value has already taken root."

But with neglect, that value can

"It doesn't take a whole lot to knock down the value of a home with a declining, difficult real estate market," May noted. "Neglect will knock down the value real quick."







Association directors bet big on the annual cleanup day, so much so that the entire board, with a good number of volunteers, runs the event all day long, or until the dumpsters are filled. This year there were 12 dumpsters.

"Thirty-yard dumpsters, and a couple 40-yards," Weaver said.

And just about all of them were filled to capacity.



"Her daughter commented one day on the trash she saw, so this good lady went back to the pond and loaded a pickup truck full of trash."

As Lee saw it, that one action spoke above all the others.

"We were astounded," Lee said. "And we love it. It makes you feel good that it's not just people cleaning out their garages, but that they're also going out and cleaning up the neighborhood. That's an excellent neighbor. And that's community spirit."

Weaver said the day's dumping was a good thing for Hillsborough County tax-payers. It costs money, and keeps county workers from other jobs, to rid the streets of unwanted possessions illegally dumped along the county's roadways.

"The majority of it is mattresses and box springs," Weaver said. "But there's also refrigerators, washers and dryers, the same stuff we get here (at the Bloomingdale Neighborhood Pride Cleanup)."

It's not too late for residents who missed the Oct. 13 cleanup.

Solid waste that cannot be left for curbside pickup,

including household junk, old appliances, residential yard waste, paint and batteries, can be brought to one of five community collection centers open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Closest to Bloomingdale are the Alderman Ford Collection Center in Lithia, at 9402 State Road 39, and the South County Collection Center, at 13000 U.S. Highway 41 in Riverview.

The Alderman Ford center accepts collectible and non-collectible waste, scrap metal tires and lead acid batteries. Call: 757-3820. The Riverview center accepts collectible and non-collectible waste, yard waste, scrap metal tires, used motor oil and lead-acid batteries. On the second Saturday of the month, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Riverview center also collects hazardous chemicals and electronics. Call: 671-7611.

To gain access to a community collection center, residents must present a copy of their property tax bill and photo ID. For additional information, call 272-5680 or visit www.hillsborough-county.org/solidwaste. Click the "Community Collection Centers" link to the right.






As a shopper, be extra cautious and stay aware of your surroundings and your actions. Don't get in a big rush and be careless. Stay alert

at all times. Definitely do not leave your car unlocked with the engine running. Do not leave packages or other valuables in your car. Lock them in the trunk. These are all invitations for thieves to take advantage of and they will. Lock up your vehicles at home too — there has been an increase in auto burglaries in our area.

As a homeowner, prepare and secure your home before you head out for holiday traveling or even just for shopping. Burglars drive through neighborhoods looking for easy targets -- don't let your home be one! Special "Security Watch" requests can be completed at the Sheriff's Bloomingdale Community Station on Bell Shoals Road at Glenhaven Drive.

Classes Teach Teens Defensive Driving, Vehicle Control

The Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office is offering a new safety program for teen drivers to promote roadway safety and help new drivers get off to a good start behind the wheel. According to the sheriff's office, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for those ages 15 to 20 across the nation. The Teen Driver Challenge is one way teens and parents can build the foundation for years of safe driving.

The program, sponsored by the Florida Sheriffs Association, is part classroom, part driving experience, focusing on defensive driving and vehicle control. The two-day program is designed to provide young drivers with the knowledge and understanding of vehicle dynamics and human kinetics', the forces created by an automobile and the effects of the forces on the human body.

The objective of the program, created by law enforcement officials is to enhance the young driver's awareness of the complex task of operating a motor vehicle and to create and practice skills that will prepare them to anticipate and handle hazards that occur daily in normal driving conditions. The curriculums were created around the fact that most crashes involving teenage drivers are classified as "avoidable" and due to lack of experience or training, teens are not prepared to make the vehicle respond appropriately.

The education segment (defensive driving) is designed to give the student a better understanding of the responsibilities and liabilities of the driver, vehicle dynamics, friction and the effects of intoxicating substances on their ability to operate the vehicle.

Eight basic skills, actions and/or techniques of driving are identified as areas that teens need experience or training to safely operate a motor vehicle. Steering, acceleration, deceleration, backing and off road recovery are some of the tasks addressed in this program.

The Teen Driver Challenge will be offered on the following dates: Nov. 8, 10, 29 and Dec. 1. Participants must hold a valid driver's license (no restricted licenses); classes are limited to 10 students. Classes are held at 2200 Falkenburg Rd., Brandon. Driving experience is conducted at the Walter C. Heinrich Practical Training Site, 14603 State Road 39, Lithia.

Hillsborough School Board Is Tech-Savvy

The Center for Digital Education and the National School Boards Association have announced that the Hillsborough County School Board placed seventh nationwide among large districts in the 2007 Digital School Boards Survey, up from 10th last year.

The Digital School Boards Survey examines how school boards and their districts are applying information technology to increase

accessibility and enhance communication with the community, while improving the quality of instruction. Survey questions and criteria centered on school boards' online presence; technology applications that allow the public to interact with school board members; access to information such as school board calendars, policies and agendas; and technology advancements in the school board meeting rooms. The survey was sponsored by Verizon Business.

First Steps: Personal finance for 20- and 30-somethings

When the cashless revolution finally succeeds, the homeless guy who hangs outside my office probably will have to find a job. This occurred to me as I passed by his outstretched hand last week.

Normally, I'd drop a few coins into his beat-up paper cup. But I'd given up using real currency for a week as an experiment, to find out just how close we have come to the post-cash

I didn't bother asking Homeless Guy if he took plastic, since A) the answer seemed pretty obvious and B) I didn't want to interrupt the conversation he was having with himself.

Every year, for nearly three decades, economists and futurists have told us that we sit on the cusp of a cashless society, where money will exist only as a stream of electrons, not on paper. And every year, we keep lining up for ATMs and pulling a fiver out of grandma's birthday card.

The volume of these predictions has increased in recent years with the emergence of new technologies like the combo cell phone/wallet which, like your buddy's band, is big in Japan, if not America.

A recent study by ACI Worldwide

predicted that electronic payments will double by the end of the decade as consumers grow more accustomed to paperless transactions.

But we're not there yet. It was only in 2004 that electronic payments for the first time outnumbered cash payments, 55 percent to 45 percent, according to the Federal Reserve. The Fed just announced plans to examine the current mix.

The percentage of electronic payments is likely to be higher now, but as my week-long cash hiatus confirmed for me, it's almost impossible to live totally cash-free in 2007. (For a detailed accounting of my cashfree week, including a video, check out firststeps.mgblogs.com)

That's a shame. I hate cash. Not Johnny Cash. He's great. I wish paper and metal currency had died, and he were still around, instead of vice versa. I live as close to a cashfree existence as possible.

You should too. The problem with cash is that it costs too much.

That sounds odd, I know, like saying the problem with spicy food is that it is too spicy, but stick with me.

It has a high convenience cost. Unless you have free ATM usage,

in most cases you must spend your money in order to obtain your money. Banks raise these fees every year. If you (stupidly) hit up a check cashing place on payday instead of relying on an ATM, you'll pay even more.

There's also a huge information cost. With a monthly credit card or debit card statement, I know exactly how much I spend. I know where my problems are. For me, it's restaurants - and I'm not alone. A recent survey by Visa found that people in their 20s spend more on eating out than anything else but rent.

Let's not forget the missed opportunity cost. Using credit cards for every transaction provides more airline miles, points, or "cash" back. A \$20 bill only gives you the germs of the last person who touched it.

There are problems with a totally electronic existence. Unless you know how to use a credit card responsibly - as a tool of convenience and not as a loan - and pay it off every month. then you invite trouble.

Credit always leaves a trail. If you buy certain things that you'd rather the government, your spouse and the guy who steals your mail not know about, cash is a better choice.

I suppose we'll know the cashless revolution has finally arrived when drug dealers, gun runners and that homeless guy on the corner start accepting PayPal.
